Materials Moving In For Test In Howard; Six Wells Drilling

BIG SPRING.—Materials were being moved in Monday by the Big Spring Drilling company for Lee C. Harrison's No. 4 Denman, 2325 feet from the south and 2370 feet from the east lines of section 14, block 30, township 1 south, T & P survey, Howard county.

This test will be on the west edge of Harrison's acreage and offsetting the test being drilled on section 10 by M. D. Bryan and others on Denman acreage. The Bryant test is 2,310 feet from the south and west lines of section 10, block 30, township 1 south. It had drilled past 1,100 feet in redbeds after under-running 10-inch casing through from 615 to 740 feet late last week.

Harrison's No. 4 will bring the number of drilling wells in the Denman-Dodge field of Eastern Howard county to six. A seventh test is being drilled further west by Harrison and others on the old Rhotan ranch, in section 4, block 30.

Other tests under way in the pool southeast of Coahoma are:

Frazier and others' No. 1 G. T. Hall, 330 feet from the south and 1650 feet from the west lines of section 2, block 30, township 1 south, T & P survey.

Mid-Continent No. 2 Denman, 330 feet out of the southeast corner of section 10, block 30, township 1 south, T & P Ry. survey, was waiting for cemented 6 5/8-inch casing to set at 2,333 feet in lime.

Sinclair-Prairie No. 1 Denman, 330 feet out of the northwest corner of section 14, block 30, township 1 south, T & P survey, was trying to return 10-inch casing at 735 feet in redrock.

Sinclair-Prairie No. 6 Dodge, 330 feet out of the southwest corner of section 11, block 30, township 1 south, T & P Ry. survey, had drilled to 660 feet in redrock.

Jimmy Allred Seen As Ready To Offer Bid For Governor

AUSTIN.—Although Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson has been in office only three months a capitol frequenter will hear much talk about probable candidates for 1934.

Of all the political gossip perhaps the most interesting is that Senator Walter Woodward of Coleman has definitely made up his mind to aspire to the attorney-generalship. It has been accepted in many corners and Woodward would make a bid for chief executive as the champion of those who felt the sharp blade of disappointment when R. S. Sterling was defeated for a second term.

Senator Woodward's decision if he has made one, seems to indicate that James V. Allred, attorney general now serving a second term, has definitely decided to become a candidate for governor. Some had wondered whether his political ambition lay in that direction or towards the United States senatorship. The term of Senator Tom Connally will expire next year. It appears possible to some the attorney general has it figured to try for the governorship and then seek the senatorial toga, possibly that worn by Senator Morris Sheppard.

Fred Minor of Denton has been advocated for attorney general. He was speaker of the House of Representatives during the 42nd legislative session.

Edgar Witt of Waco, lieutenant governor, is considered a certain gubernatorial candidate. Tom F. Hunter of Wichita Falls, so prominent in the race last year that he crowded Sterling for a place in the run-off with Mrs. Ferguson, already is canvassing in the open. Senator Clint C. Small of Amarillo, who ran well in 1930, is expected to throw his West Texas-Plains sombrero into the ring.

There are those who predict Coke Stevenson of Junction, present speaker of the House, will take an active part in the gubernatorial race, probably offering himself for consideration as chief executive.

He is survived by Mr. Geer of Sweetwater and Mrs. Shumaker of Tyler.

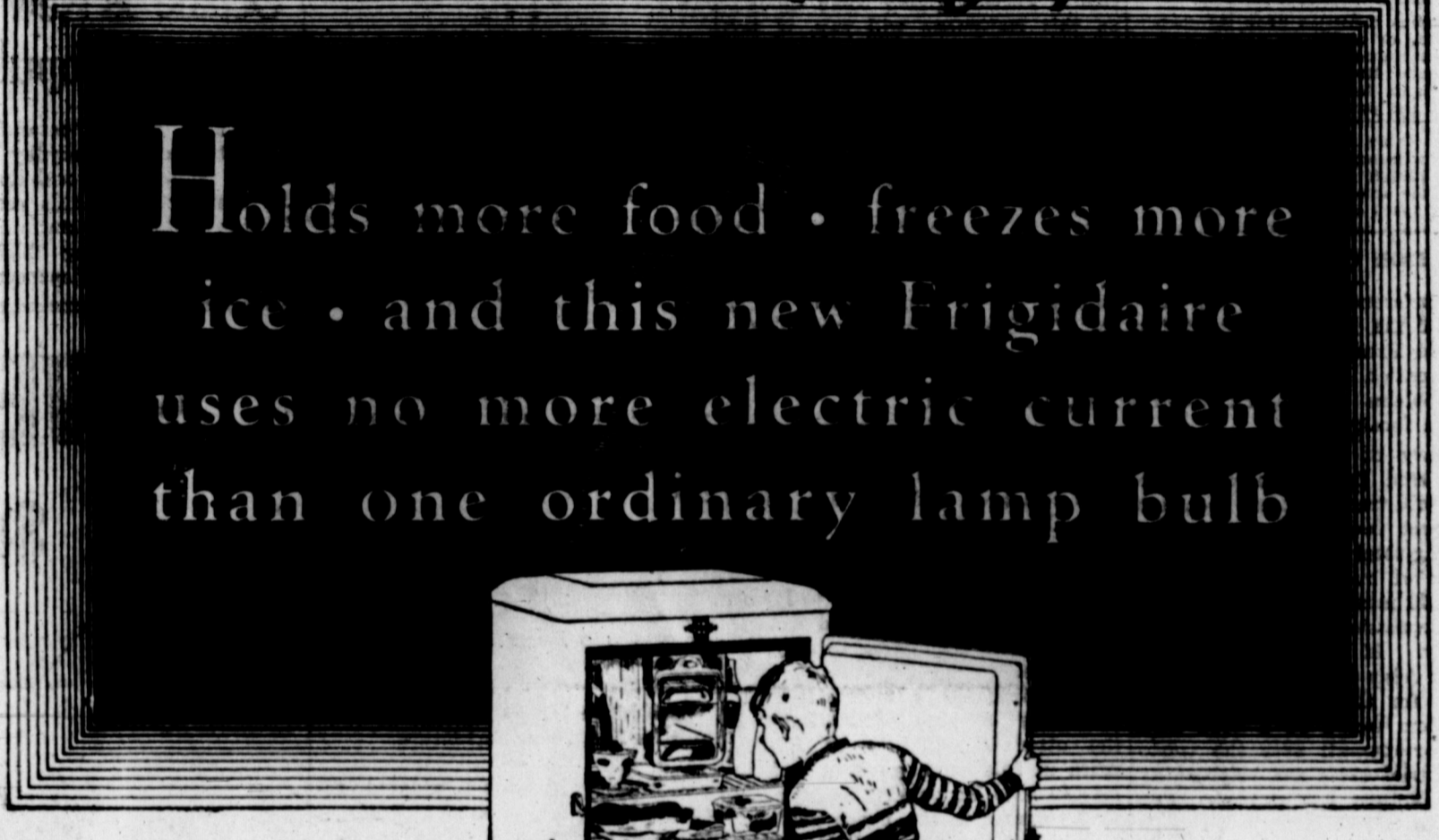
