Initials, 'C. H. S.' Inside Of Fraternity Ring Causes Interest At Colorado

The badly decomposed body of young man found crammed into vent of a refrigerator car at Big Spring Wednesday afternoon in all probability was not that of a graduate of Colorado high school. John E. Watson, superintendent of the schools, stated Thursday afternoon. A fraternity ring worn on finger of the dead man carried the initials "C.H.S." and was dated 1932.

Watson stated at 2 o'clock Thurs day afternoon that he could not recall if the initials corresponded to name of a youth in senior class last year. "I am going to go through New Bills Returned the records, however, to ascertain whether or not such is true," "The initials 'C.H.S.' are identical with those used in ring worn by our graduates, but, course there are other high school in Texas using the same letters."

The man had been dead several days and was so badly decomposed that only his hair served to establish whether or not the man was white or black. The body was found after a freight had pulled into Big Spring from the east. Men riding on the train complained of offensive edor issuing from the car

LOW PRICE CARS VS. CHEAP CARS

We do not build a low-price car: the cost to us of building our car is pretty high.

But we do sell a high quality car at a low price.

Almost every new Ford V-8 car we have built so far this year, has cost more to manufacture than its selling price was. As you buy them at only \$490 to \$610, we have to depend on increasing volume to make up the difference.

The reason for this is simple: -- a manufacturer who gives good value must expect to lose money on the first cars he sells because he cannot charge all his costs to the people who are first to buy.

But with the purchaser it is different -- he cannot afford to lose anything on a car. It must give him full value from the first, and keep on giving him full value for years.

Two things make possible our combination of low prices and high cost quality:

1. Volume Production

2. Taking only one profit

First, we set our price at what would be fair to the public on the basis of economies we enjoy in volume production. Then, in order to justify and maintain our low price we must get volume sales. Thus it comes that a car which is really high-cost to make, is also

low-cost to buy.

There is a difference between a cheap car and a low-priced high

Ford prices are always fixed at a point which makes it profitable for a

customer to buy. Good and lasting business must produce profit to the buyer as well as to the seller. And of the two, the buyer's profit must be, comparatively, the larger one.

It pays us to sell the Ford V-S because it pays you to buy it.
