



TEXAS LEGISLATURE WILL BE CONVENED WITHIN FEV **WEEKS TO CONSIDER CODE**

NRA Administrator Assured Of Full Cooperation At The State Capital

A special session of the Texas Legislature is to be called within sixty days, Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson Friday telegraphed Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, administrator under the national recovery act.

Johnson had telegraphed the Governor asking as to the intention of holding a special session, presumably to amend or suspend the antitrust laws of the State as an aid to industrial recovery. The reply was that such a session was considered inevitable within sixty days. Mrs. Ferguson already has pledged herself to cal! it if needed. It is expected to assemble Sept. 5 or 12.

"There will be no need of a session until after the Aug. 26 election," said James E. Ferguson, as the Governor nodded assent, "Gen eral Johnson indicated that his desires will be met if the session comes within two months. That will make one session serve all purposes including the vitalization of the \$20,000,-000 State bonds which should be voted next month and such other matters as are made necessary by the election and revenue situation."

Ferguson said he expected to campaign in behalf of the bond amendment as well as repeal ratification. He discussed the proposed speaking tour of United States Senator Morris Sheppard against repeal. He poked fun at Sheppard's sound wagon, saying Chesley W. Murney had tried it ineffectaully in an effort to be elected Congressman at Large.

Ferguson took exception to a statement by Edward Crane of Dallas, former university regent, that an effort will be made to make the university purchase the bonds, that this course is not contemplated. He predicted there would be plenty of buyers and that the university fund present for the funeral services. Dewould not be called on.

San Antonio Judge Rules 3.2 Beer Is Within State's Law

Sale of 3.2 percent beer gained ground in San Antonio Friday by a court decision in which a district judge refused to grant an injunction against a cigar store where the brew had been sold.

Judge W. W. McCrory dismissed the city's injunction action when he ruled they failed to prove beer sold at the Marr Cigar Store there was intoxicating. The city attorney introduced evidence the brew seized had an alcoholic content of 2.78 percent. Witnesses for the defense declared it was not intoxicating.

Judge McCrory explained the state has its remedy at law under the criminal statutes which was interpreted as additional reason for refusal to grant the injunction.

In view of the definition of intoxicating liquors in state statutes the state has recourse in criminal prosecution. The judge said, "The deense has met the issue raised by the prima ficie case. The witneses have proved that the beer is not intoxica ting. Therefore, I refuse the injunction and let the case remain as is to be tried in the October term

The state election on August 26 may end the case, attorneys indicated. Attorneys for the defense said the Dean Law was in conflict with national statutes which ruled 3.2 per
