VOTE FOR EMERGENCY RELIEF BONDS, IS CITIZENS' APPEAL

RELIEF BOND ISSUE MUST BE AUTHORIZED OR TEXAS FEDERAL AID BE STOPPEC

Greene Attends State Rally Held At Austin Friday; \$20,000,000 Sought

The Federal government has gong as far as it can in undertaking to care for emergency relief demands in Texas, without manifestation of a willingness upon the part of this State to do something to help her own indigent, and unless voters of this commonwealth authorize proposed \$20,000,000 relief bond issue in the election Saturday, August 26. Federal relief will be withdrawn

Jim Greene, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and who attended State-wide rally in Austin Friday, brought back to Colorado that information. The proposed bond cannot be retired through a tax on real or personal property and is not a "Ferguson proposition," as some have charged, Greene says.

"The Federal government has been pouring money into Texas during the past several months to be expended in relief employment and Mitchell county has been well provided for under grants coming from the RFC," Greene stated in address before a mass meeting of local citi zens Saturday morning. "However, the Government has come to the place where this and other States of the Union will be expected to a something to help themselves. If



Judge W. H. Garrett, Colorado at- Washington Announces That the Texas "Gin Law," that since Public Works Program. Will Be Pushed

> Construction work on Colorado's proposed postoffice building is due to begin within ninety days, according to announcement made in Washington Saturday. The public works administration was quoted as being anxious to begin work on the Colorado and sixteen other similar buildings without further delay. The information, considered authoritive, new lacks only final formal approv-

> While plans for these buildings are yet to be drawn in a number of instances it is expected that actual construction in nearly every case will start in 90 days because the publie works approval will make the money immediately available. All of these projects were approved by the former administration but progress was automatically held up when the administration changed. The total construction involved will be several million dollars. The projects on which approval is understood to have been practically completed are:

Athens, Colorado, Eastland, Edinburg, Graham, Lamesa, Dockhart, Luling, Mercedes, Midland, Mission, Nocona, Port Arthur, Quanah, Ranger, Shamrock and Bowie.



Where Urschel Was Held in Remote Texas Farm House



Section 2 .- That no person shall be permitted to park a motor truck or other vehicle in said parking

Section 3 .- That no motor truck or vehicle or other propelled or drawn vehicle shall be permitted to park in said zone, having trailer of semi-trailer thereto attached.

Section 4.—IT IS FURTHER PROVIDED, That motor trucks or other vehicles having a larger carrying capacity than ONE-HALF TON shall be permitted to park in said zone FIVE (5) MINUTES in the center and parallel with the street

GOAL OF TEXAS PLANTERS

Formed In Austin; Price Of 16 Cents Sought

Formation of a permanent organzation aimed at promulgation of a Federal code to fix minimum price of 16c per pound for cotton was perfected at Austin Saturday at a meeting of Texas cotton farmers.

J. E. McDonald, Texas Commis sioner of Agriculture, was instructed by the organization to go to Washington immediately to confer with Federal officials on provisions of the proposed code.

He was also requested to invite agricultural commissioners and leading cotton farmers of the South to join him in pressing for immediate stabilization of the cotton market through Government action.

McDonald probably will leave early next week for Washington.

A resolution stating that the declining cotton market would prove disastrous to the South unless checked, was adopted. It suggested 16c a pound as a price at which farmers could pay their obligations and provide for their families on the many service on the Mexican border, died night in that they might witness one

It was the sense of the organization that any plan, however radical, be employed to stem the declining market and advance it to an ade-

It is important to use a pressure cooker and to pack the corn hot in order to insure as sma'l a loss as corn, which is an easy thing to do. Doss Druggist And many people prefer dried corn to the canned variety, also the dried corn contains the food value that the canned corn possesses, so there is nothing to hinder a person from trying some any way.

Husk, sak and then cook the ears of corn 10 minutes in boiling water. While still hot cut from the cob and spread thinly on shallow container and place in the sun, or, if preferred, it can be dried inside an oven. The temperature should be just warm inside the oven, with the door open. Be sure to cover so that flies will not get on the corn if dried out of doors. If put out in the sun early in the morning and the day is clear and sunshiny, the corn should be dry, or nearly so, by night. All evidence of moisture should be done away with before storing the cora. Before storing in buckets, with lids, fruit pars, or paper sacks that can be sealed, heat the corn in an oven to kill the insect eggs that might by chance have gotten on the corn -- be sure not to scorch the corn.

If you are preparing to can the orn in tin cans, cut the corn from he cob, scrape the cob, then put on a stove with one-half as much water by, weight as corn, add salt and sugar as follows: 1 teaspoon salt and 2 to boiling, place in cans boiling hot and seal. Process No. 2 cans at 15 pounds, pressure for 70 minutes, if well matured corn, less time if


