### 23 County Ag Families Receiving FHA Loans

Mr. H. P. Cole, county supervisor of Eastland County, advises that 23 young farm families are receiving loans to assist them in the purchase of farms, the construction of essential farm buildings, the acquisition of livestock and machinery, and funds for the further development of their resources this year.

"Over 1,000 young farmers less than 35 years of age have received the financial and technical assistance of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas this year," stated L. J. Cappleman, state director. Mr. Cappleman reported that, "One of the major endeavors of the Farmers Home Administration in 1964 is to assist young farmers in accomplishing the extremely

difficult task of acquiring the capital and the skill needed to take over the farms of their retiring elders."

Mr. Cole stated that over the past three years, many young farmers who received the assistance of the Farmers Home Administration have been formally recognized as outstanding young farmers in the state by various publications and farm organizations.

He advised that this financial assistance is available to young farm families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from private sources, met all other eligibility requirements, and have the ability and the desire to become successfully established in farming and ranching operations.

### County 4-H Club Members Celebrating Anniversary

Over 300 4-H Club members in Eastland County will observe National 4-H Club week, Sept. 26 to Oct. 3. The head-heart - hands - health youth are in areas throughout the 50 states and Puerto Rico, according to Billy McCutchen,

assistant county agent.

A major local and national aim of this year's 4-H week observance, McCutchen said, will be to recognize the 50th anniversary of the Cooperative Extension Service, of which the 4-H youth program is a significant part. In 1914, when the Smith-Lever Act authorized the Extension Service, the same federal legislation provided funds for 4-H Club work. For this reason, 4-H also celebrates a Golden Anniversary.

Prospective leaders or other interested adults and interested boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 21 are encouraged to attend the next 4-H Club meeting in your town or community. There is a 4-H program for you whether you live in town or on the farm. To find out when and where the next club meeting in your community will be and what your opportunities in 4-H are, contact the local 4-H Club leader, one of the members or the county agent's office.

## Registration Begins For Nurses Training At CJC

The Cisco Junior College School of Vocational Nursing is accepting applications for its next class which begins February 1, 1965, according to an announcement.

The twelve months course consists of classroom work as well as actual experience in hospital nursing. Upon graduation from the school students are eligible to take the state board examination to become licensed vocational nurses.

Requirements are that students be between the ages of 18 and 55, in good physical and mental health, and have at least two years of high school or its equivalent (pre-entrance test given) with preference given to high school graduates.

Anyone in the Cisco area who is interested in this phase of nurses training should contact either Mrs. Nova Graham at Graham Hospital in Cisco or Mrs. Veneta Mitchell at

Cisco Junior College on Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. for further information and application forms. Those planning to take the course were urged to make application as soon as possible, as applications must be completed and returned at least two months before the enrollment date.

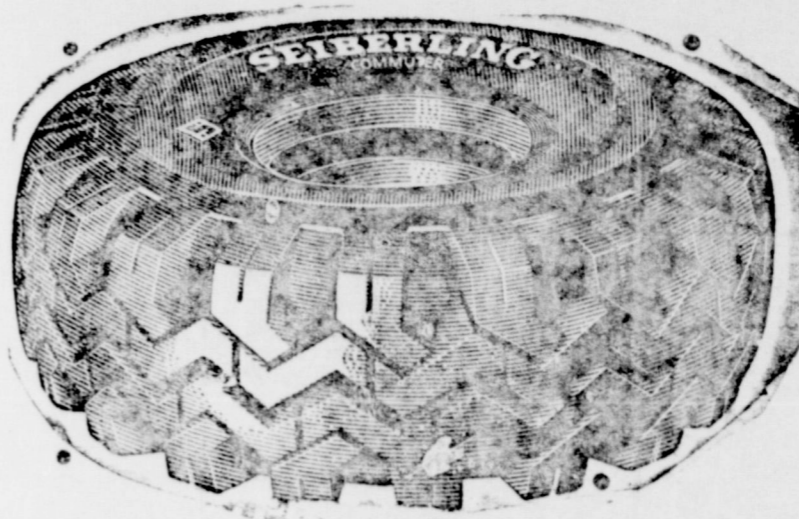

## Browsing With Bev

One of the most popular flowers for a colorful garden is the zinnia. To get your gardening program into full swing next spring, start planning now and consider this annual as a "must" for color.

Zinnias are easily grown from seed and bloom in only six to eight weeks. They continue to produce showy blooms during the entire summer.

Since zinnias can be sown outdoors with great success, they can be planted in the ground where they are to grow as soon as the soil becomes warm in the spring. A warm sunny location is best.

Seeds should be planted about one-fourth inch deep and about four inches apart. Keep the soil moist but not wet, and do not let it dry out until the seedlings emerge. Then keep the soil rather dry and thin out the seedlings, leaving them eight to 18 inches apart depending upon the

type plant being grown. As soon as the first flower bud is produced, pinch it off so that the plant will develop lateral shoots and produce a bushy plant with numerous flowers.

Since zinnias require large quantities of water, soak the soil well, watering below the foliage to keep the leaves dry and to avoid mildew.

There are many kinds and types of zinnias in a wide range of colors and varieties. While the horticultural forms are myriad, the average gardener will have a general knowledge of what is available from the following groups.

Cupid zinnias are the dwarfest and most compact type, seldom growing more than 12 inches tall.

However, Mexican zinnias grow slightly taller, reaching from 12 to 15 inches. Flowers range from double to semi-double to single and are small, usually never more than 1½ inches in diameter. "Old Mexico" and "Persian Carpet" are All American winners in this class.
