

This Juanita Cox spent the day with new interpretation of the processing tax will have its effect upon all farmers that market a portion .of their fresh pork locally in the form of sausage, spare-ribs and backbone during the winter months. Under the present ruling anyone slaughtering hogs and marketing any portion or all of the carcass is subject to the payment of a processing tax on that portion of the pork sold. The tax is as follows: for the month of November. 50c per 100 pounds; for December, \$1.00 pes 100 pounds; January, \$1.50 per 100 pounds; and for any month thereafter \$2.00 per 100 pounds. This tax is based on the live weight in all cases. The following explanations will clarify several points in regards to this Federal law.

1. Everyone who slaughters hogs and sells the meat must pay the processing tax, The party who owns 50 head of good mules, Mares the hog at the time it is slaughtered and horses. Anyone needing is the one to pay the tax.

It can be shucked; shelled, cleaned and ground into coarse corn chops or cracked corn without being subject to the tax. When corn is ground into fine corn meal or flour suitable for human consumption it is subject to the tax, regardless of whether it is fed to human beings or animals but that portion consumed by the household of the individual is exempt. In this latter case it is necessary for the individual to make out the form but he claims the exemption from tax in the place provided for ame on the form. The tax in all
