MUNICIPAL TAX CUT IS ON 1934 OBJECTIVE OF CITY'S RULING POWERS

Colorado property owners are to experience another reduction in municipal tax levy for 1934, should ambitions of Mayor J. A. Sadler materialize. The mayor announced Monday morning that he was confident that a reduction from the present levy of \$1.00 on assessed property valuation of \$100.00 would be possible when the city turns to the task of fixing this rate in May.

Colorado's municipal tax levy. has been reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.00 during the administrations of Former Mayor Hutchinson and the present administration.

"I am in favor of reducing the present tax rate, if such may be found practical, and I believe the city council will find such a move to be supported by good business methods," Sadler said.
