# CITY'S FINANCES IN GOOD CONDITION, REPORT FILED BY SECRETARY INDICATES

All Mature Obligations Paid Leaving Cash Balance Of \$50,000 In Funds

The city of Colorado on April 30 came to the close of another fiscal year under most favorable condition, in so far as finances are to be reckoned. Annua! statement filed with the city council. Monday night by Secretary J. Lee Jones shows a cash balance of \$50,509.45 in the general and sinking funds, after all mature obligations had been paid.

The report giving struistical record of real and personal property values as assessed for taxes during the five year period ending with 1933, shows depreciation of \$754,935 during the time. Tota! assessments for 1929 were \$4,175,895 and for the 1933 rendition the figure dropped to \$3,

Tax assessments on the relative enditions deopped from the total of \$64,795.75 in 1930 to \$34,209.60 in 1933, a reduction of \$30,586.15. A cut in tax rate from \$1.50 in 1930 to \$1.00 in 1933 did much to reduce the annual tax income.





#### Payment Of \$223,993.58 To Be Made On Over 42,000 Acres Being Retired

Cotton acreage rental contracts as recently completed by 958 Mitchell county planters have been given federal approval and Thursday were started on their way to Washington for filing in offices of the department. The contracts will take 42,326 acres out of cultivation during this and next year, Ben J. Baskin, county farm agent, announced

The 958 planters and land owners placing the rental contracts are to receive in the aggregate \$223,993.58 from the government, \$168,880.74 of which will be listed as rentals and the remainder of \$55,112.84 in par-

Fifty percent of the rental payment totaling \$84,440.37, is due for payment during the month of June, exact date yet to be announced by the government. The ther half will be paid in either August or September. The parity payments are due to be paid during the month of Septem-

Baskin stated that the contracts affected a total of 111,989 acres. The average acre yield over a period of five years ending with 1933

is given at 131,960 acres. In handling the rental contracts, reporting on inspections and other details entering into the acre control program a considerable amount of clerical work has been entailed. An extra force of filing clerks has been employed in the county agent's office during the past several weeks in order that the work be progressed.

To take the temperature of a person, place the thermometer, already sterilized, in the mouth of the per son, or in some place where the utensil will come in contact with the heat of the body. Thermometers are very easily broken, and must be handled with care. One must be careful not to jar or shake the thermometer after it is taken from the person, for this will lower the reg-

stered temperature. To time the respiration of a person, one should count the inhalations and exhalations of the patient. These should be counted for a set length of time, usually a minute.


