How important is preplanting irrigation? According to recently published research data it is the most important one. This is the irrigation that brings the moisture content of the soil up to field capacity. It is the moisture that brings the crop up and keeps it growing until it is large enough to irrigate again. First they will help you determine how deep the soil is on different parts of your field and how deep the roots are likely to penetrate under certain conditions. They will be able to give you an estimate of the amount of water that can be stored in each foot of the root zone and the condition of your soil. This information when properly analyzed and combined with your cropping plan will pro-





cording to Mr. Howard O. Nichols, Administrative Officer of the Lubbock office. New F. I. C. A. rates on wages paid on or after January 1, 1957 will be 2-1/4 percent each for employers and employees ,a total of 1/2 percent, Mr. Nichols said.

The change in the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, he explained, provides that employers who had four or more employees on at least one day of each of 20 calendar weeks during 1956 will be required to file Form 940 by January 31, 1957. The filing of Form 940, An-




