Ever hear anyone say, "Old man in Plains. So and So is sure an efficient rancher. He never lets has grass go to waiste. Every time a blade of grass comes out he has a cow there waiting for it." Well, maybe this rancher is efficient and maybe he isn't. It all depends on how you look at it. Generally speaking this fellow will be the first to go broke if the market breaks or if a severe drouth occurs (and it will; t always has).

There are a few basic princioles, which of followed, will greatly increase the amount of grass that can be grown on a pasture. To really understand this we must first understand how grass grows.

in the spring it uses stored up plant food from the roots and crown of the grass plant. After a few blades of green grass appear, (Sort of like using a little booster engine to start a big diesel).

This plant food is the fats, proteins, and carbohydrates used to grow new grass roots, leaves, and seed. Now then, what happens when a cow bites a leaf off a grass plant? A part of the factory shuts down until repairs can be made and the leaf is growing again. When all the leaves are eaten, the whole plant shuts down until repairs are made. Because of this the grass plants stay shut down most of the growing season on many pastures.

If the grass plant is closely grazed all year the grass will be slow coming out in the spring. Through research it has been proved that if you leave about half of the plant ungrazed then the normal process of growth will continue. This will enable the plant to grow more forage, grow a larger root system, and make seed to replace grass plants which have died from old age or some other
