

A report of the Seventh Annual Bull Progeny Test was published in the May issue of Southwestern Crop and Stock magazine. The tests are carried on at Texas Tech's PanTex Farm near Amarillo.

The magazine article shows four charts which ranks the animals according to performance of individuals and pens. All bulls were fed the same basic ration for a 112 day feeding period. There was 140 bulls in the test this year and some of them did exceptionally well. The highest gaining bull put on 396 pounds during the 112 day feeding period for an average daily gain of 3.54 pounds.

zine shows the amount of feed required to put on 100 pounds of gain. The most efficient gainers was a pen of three bulls that required only 783 pounds of feed for each 100 pounds of gain. The least efficient was a pen of four bulls that ate 1,333 pounds of feed in order to put on 100 pounds of gain. The feed cost \$1.73 per hundred pounds so the most efficient gaining pen put on weight for a feed cost of \$13.55 per hundred pounds in comparison to a cost of \$19.06 per hundred pounds of gain for the least efficient pen.

Another chart showing the results of the tests gives the weight of the animal per day of age. At the end of the test, the top ranking weight for bull weighed 980 pounds and he weighed 2.79 pounds for each day of his life. This same bull was in a pen that required 1,012 pounds of feed in order to put on 100 pounds of gain so he was not so good in that respect.

The top selling bull of the sale was the one that ranked first in total gain, sixteenth in weight for age and he was in the pen that ranked twelfth among the 38 pens in feed efficiency. The bull sold for \$1,500. to Max Blau

of Follett and PanTex Farm. I thank that PanTex Farm is doing some good work for the beef cattle producers in their progeny tests. They are showing the value of selection for herd improvement and they are bringing out the fact that there are other things to select for besides body conformation, color and blood lines. It is my opinion that weight for age is the most important factor for the beef cattle producer to use in his selection of breeding stock. Next in importance, in my way of thinking, is the ability of the animal to efficiently convert feed into meat. The third item in importance would be body conformation. When a young herd sire shows to be excellent in all three of these characteristics, he should be a very valu-

able bull. I have seen one bull calf that weighed 400 pounds on the day that he was four months old. With that kind of start in life, it would be possible for him to weigh 1,000 pounds by the time he is ten months old. That is what we are shooting at. It may be several years before a good type animal with that kind of gaining ability is ever produced but I believe that it will finally happen. It may as well happen in Yoakum County as anywhere else and it can if our producers will continue to select for herd improvement by the use of outstanding sires.






