### Savings Bond Sales Total \$45,847 in March

Savings Bond sales for the first three months of 1964 in Eastland County totaled \$103,640. Of this amount \$45,847 were purchased in March according to a report released by Mr. Guy Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1964 amounted to \$16,181,153, which represents 26.6 per cent of the state goal of \$150,000,000.

"On May 1 the new \$75 Series E Savings Bond, bearing a portrait of the late President John F. Kennedy, went on sale. Beneath the portrait of Mr. Kennedy appears the words from his inaugural address, 'Ask not what your country can do for you, but ask what you can do for your country.'

"This new bond will fill a gap in the lower denomination range of Savings Bonds. The issue date of May 1 is also the twenty-third anniversary of the issuance of the first Series E Bond," Chairman Parker reported.

**POISON IVY!**  
 Every year many people un-

necessarily suffer severe and painful skin irritations because of contact with poison ivy and other related plants. Poison ivy and poison oak are widespread throughout Texas, particularly along streams and in shady places. All parts of the plants are poisonous.

Only a small amount of toxin from the blisters on a person is needed to cause inflammation to be transferred from one person to another. Don't be fooled by the idea that burning the plants will serve as a protective measure, for the toxin may also be spread in smoke.

For prevention of poisoning by the plant, take particular care not to come in contact with poison ivy plants. Neither should pets be allowed to run through the plants as the toxin can be transferred on their feet.

Do not burn leaves and trash that contain poison ivy plants. Should contact be made with poison ivy, wash the contaminated parts of the body thoroughly with soap and water. Neither should contaminated clothing be worn until it is washed.

With care, ammate will satisfactorily control all growth forms of poison ivy without danger to other plants or the soil. The chemical is also safe for use around animals and humans.



## Social Security Earnings Rules

In the first seven weeks of 1964, more than 663 persons in its 14 county district made application for retirement benefits through the Abilene social security office, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager. "But this doesn't mean," he explained, "that all these persons have stopped working. Many are continuing to work in regular jobs, in part-time jobs, or in new jobs."

"It's possible," Tuley said, "to work and receive social security benefits at the same time — it depends on the person's age and earnings. Many folks earn over the familiar \$1200 in a year and still get some social security checks."

One example of this, he explained, is the worker who is 72 years old. At that age social security payments are made regardless of earnings.

But the individual must still file an application — benefits are not paid automatically.

This is one of the reasons the social security people have been promoting the idea of "Inquire Before You Retire." In fact, Tuley pointed out, social security has prepared a free booklet to explain the details of retirement and social security. The name of the booklet is, "If You Work While You Get Social Security Payments." It tells how social security works, why you don't have to retire completely to get payments, the earnings limits, the age limits, and other pertinent factors.

The Abilene office has a supply of these booklets, and anyone may get one by writing or calling the office and asking for Booklet 23. There's no charge for this valuable booklet, by the way.

**Vets Questions And Answers**

Q — Is a veteran given preference in obtaining private employment?

A — A veteran is aided in obtaining private employment by the Veterans Employment Service of the U. S. Department of Labor. This work is carried on through the local state employment offices in each of the 50 states. A veteran also has some re-employment rights for the job he held prior to going into the service. Full details may be obtained at the nearest state employment office.

Q — I am disabled and the premiums on my National Service Life Insurance are waived. When I die will my beneficiary receive the full amount of my policy or will the unpaid premiums be deducted at the time of settlement?

A — Your beneficiary will receive the full face value of your policy. No deduction will be made to cover the premiums you did not pay while the policy was on waiver.

Q — As the widow of a veteran who died of service-connected disabilities, I receive a monthly compensation payment. I have been thinking of going back to work. A friend tells me that I will lose the compensation payments. Is this so?

**Rules Revised For State Parks**

AUSTIN, — Two key regulations for state parks have been revised according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

The new regulations, effective April 1, will permit camping and shelter occupancy for a 14-day limit during the regular park season between May 1 and September 15.

Radios, recorded music and musical instruments will be subject to a 10 p.m. curfew in picnic, camping, shelter and other overnight facility areas of the parks; however, they may be permitted in the concession buildings and immediate concession areas until 11 p.m.

Our new regulations which conform generally with those in national parks, have been well received by the public," said Watson.

A — No. Compensation payments are made without reference to your income. Your friend is thinking of VA pension payments, paid to widows of veterans who died of non-service-connected causes. Income limitation do apply in these cases.

Q — Are eyeglasses among appliances furnished by the VA to eligible veterans?

A — Yes, they are.
