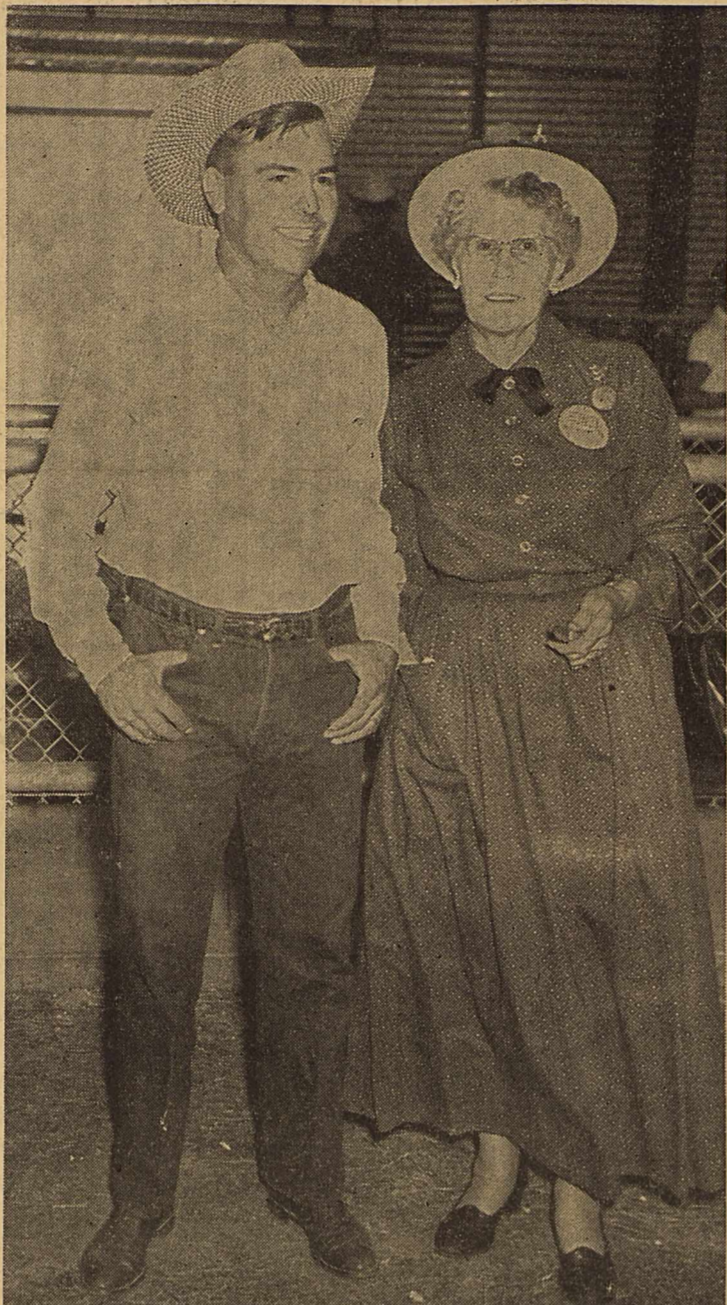

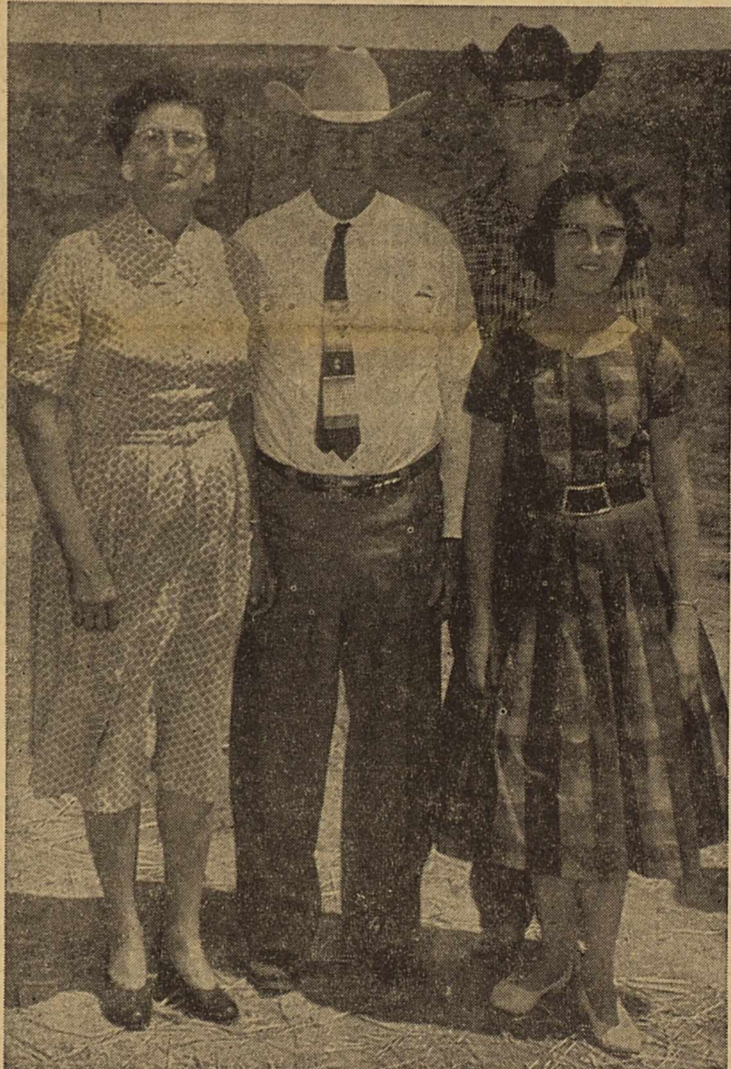

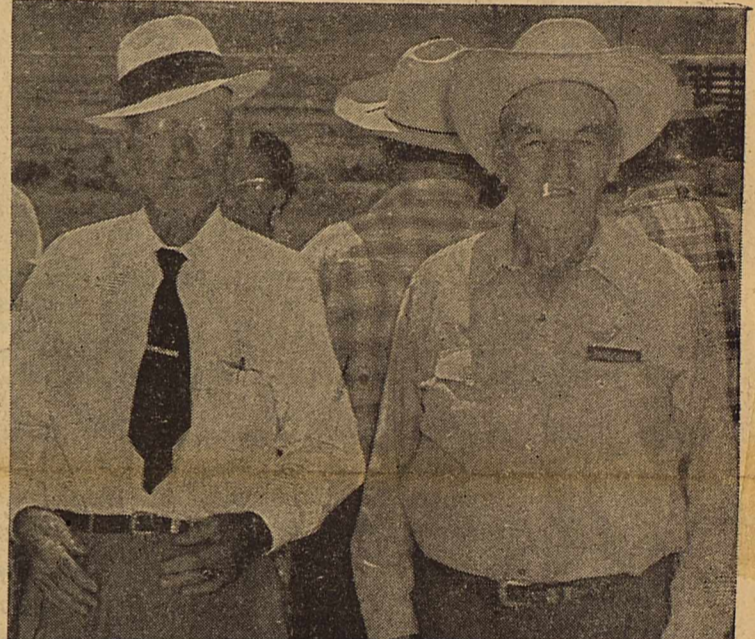

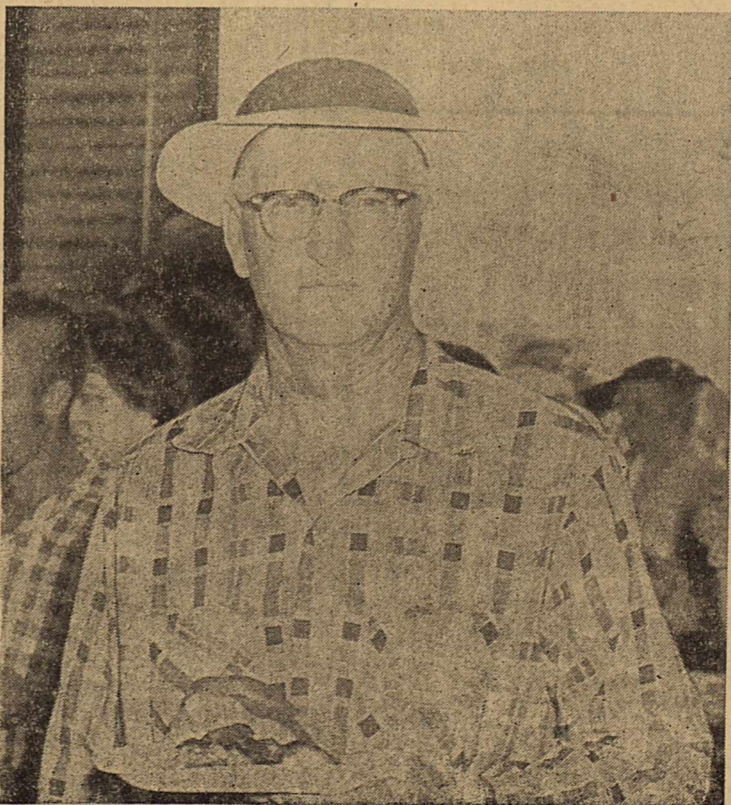

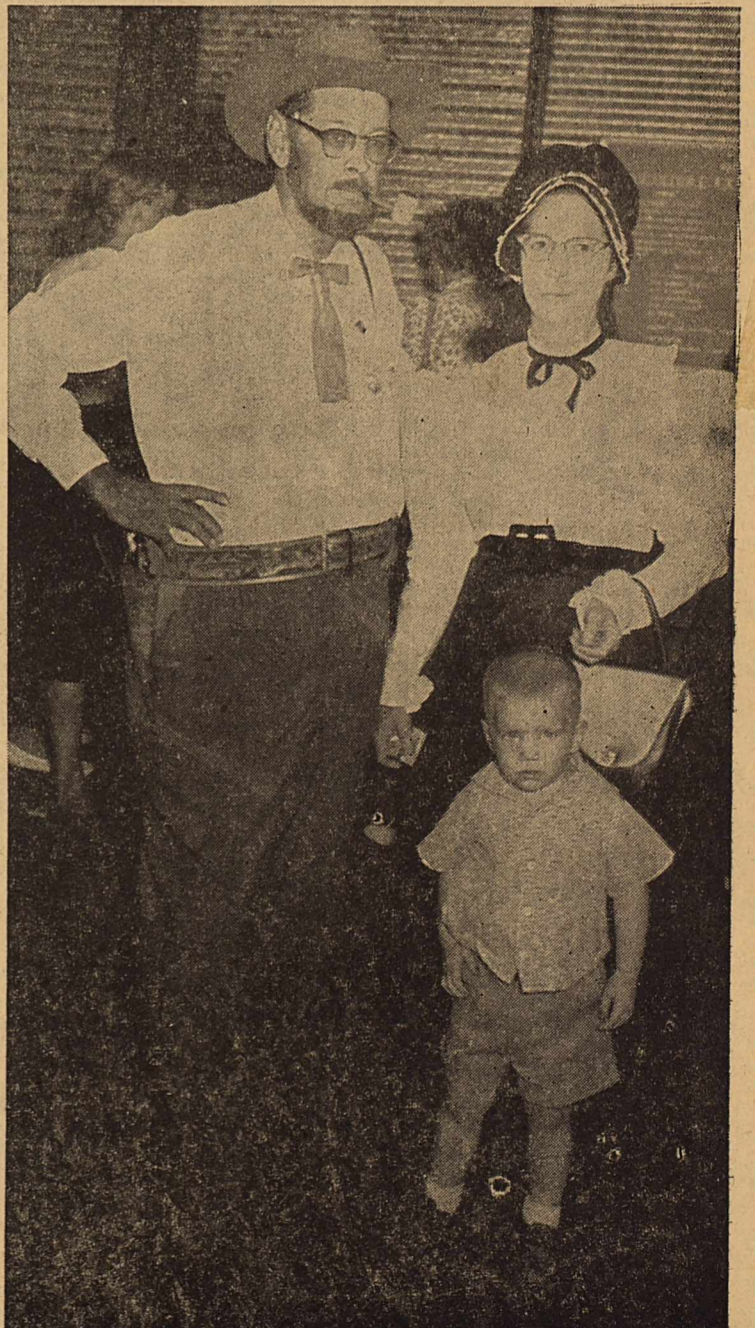

Amerada Has Discovery

Amerada Petroleum Corporation completed No. 1 L. W. Abbott, Central Yoakum County wildcat, 2 1/2 miles northwest of Plains, as a discovery from the Wolfcamp.

On the potential test, the strike flowed 24 hours through a 3/4th-inch choke and produced 225.20 barrels of 41.5 gravity oil, plus 28.65 barrels of water.

Gas-oil ratio was 978-1. Tubing pressure was 404 pounds. The production was from perforations at 9,028-73 feet and at 9,092-9, 115 feet. Those sections had been treated with 500 gallons of acid.

The pool opener is 1,980 feet from south and 440 feet from west lines of section 335, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

It drilled to 12,419 feet in barren Devonian. Plugged back depth now is 9,139 feet.

Pan American Petroleum Corporation No. C. H. Barber is to be drilled as an 11,700 foot Devonian project in the West (Devonian) field of Southwest

Yoakum County. Drillsite is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 639, block D, John H. Gibson survey, nine miles southwest of Plains.

City Hires Light Plant Operator

Bob Hampton was hired as chief operator of the city's light plant in action taken at the regular meeting of the city council last Thursday night.

Hampton will receive a starting salary of \$350 per month. He has been a resident of Plains and this vicinity for about six years, having worked as a motorman for drilling contractors for several years.

Services are now being run to residences who desire to hook on to city electricity, Roger Curry, mayor, reported. This work was started Monday and is being done by city lineman Jude Willingham, and Bob Hampton.

The service lines, the mayor explained, will be finished as soon as the distribution system is completed.

During the council meeting, the city also purchased a Chevrolet pickup for the light plant from Plains Motor Company for \$1530.

School To Open Tuesday Morning With Assembly

The Plains School will open the 1957-1958 session with a brief general assembly at 8:45 a.m. on Tuesday, September 3rd. Bus routes on the first few days of school will be the same as at the close of last year. Students will be dismissed at 12:00 o'clock noon on the first day.

The assembly will be open to the public, however it will be a short one and principal business planned is the introduction of teachers and outlining registration instructions to students.

Due to the fact that the cafeteria is not completed, the students will have to carry lunches for the first several days of school. Supt. Kennedy reports they expect the cafeteria to be open about the third week of September.

The school board has set up an immunization regulation, Supt. Kennedy said, all children must have immunization to small pox, diphtheria, polio and whooping cough. The board has not set any deadline on the immunization, thereby giving all students ample opportunity to meet this requirement.

All first-graders are required to have a photostatic copy of their birth certificates.

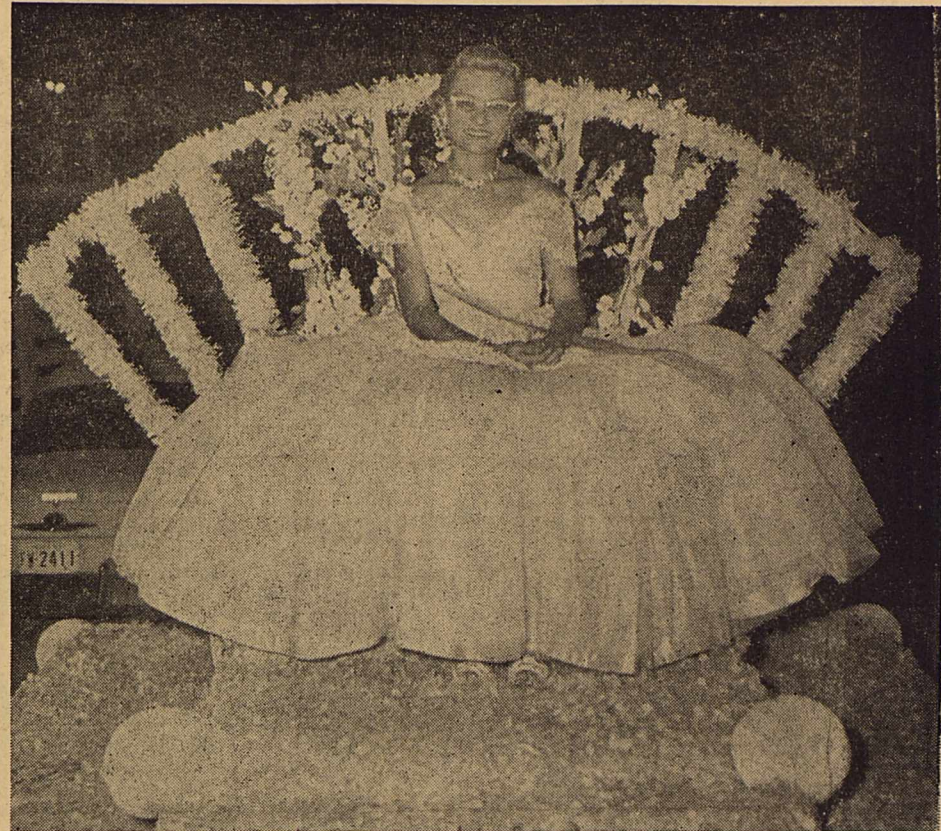

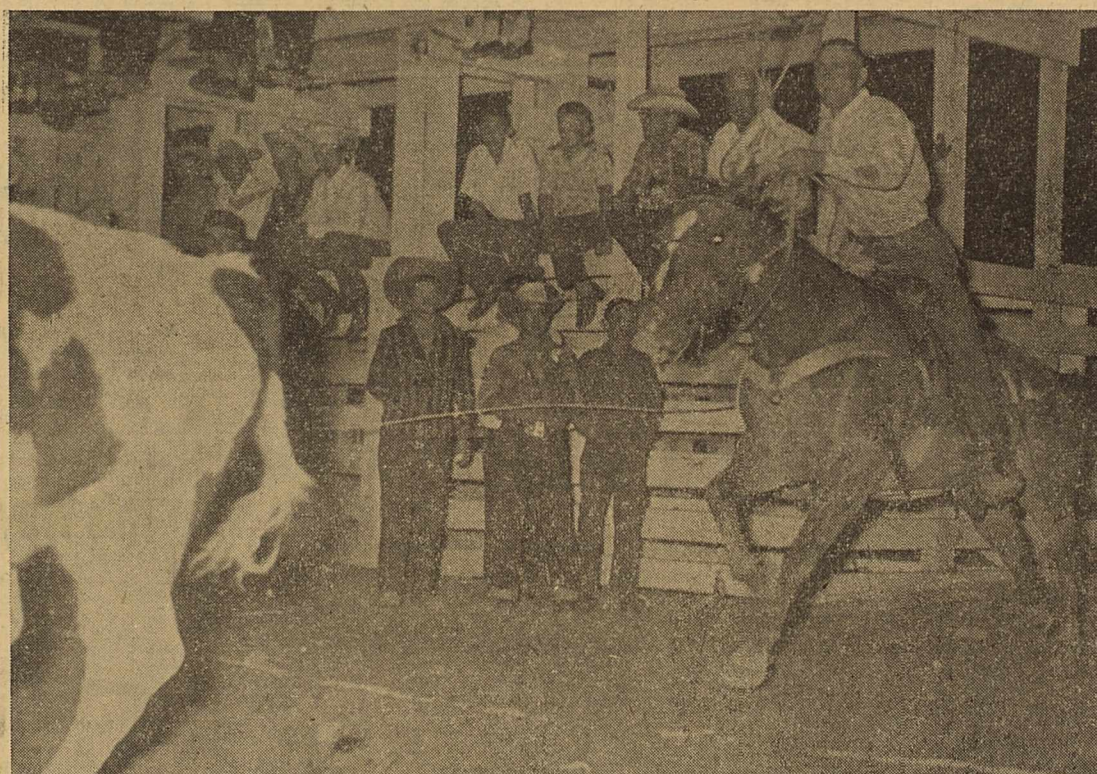

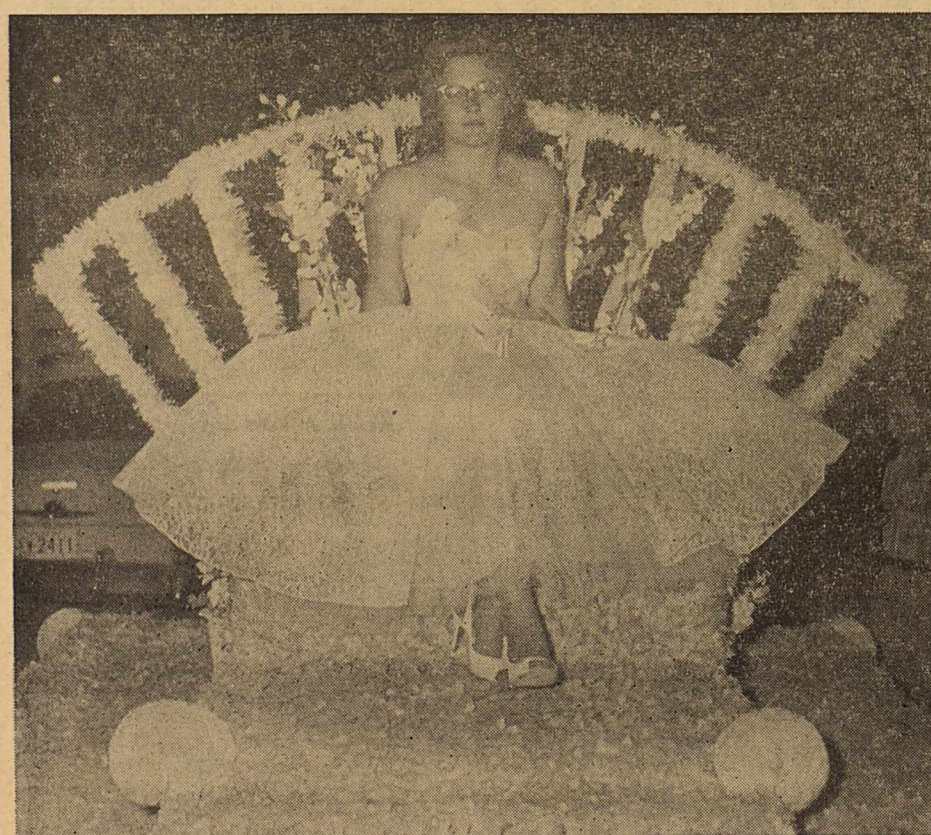

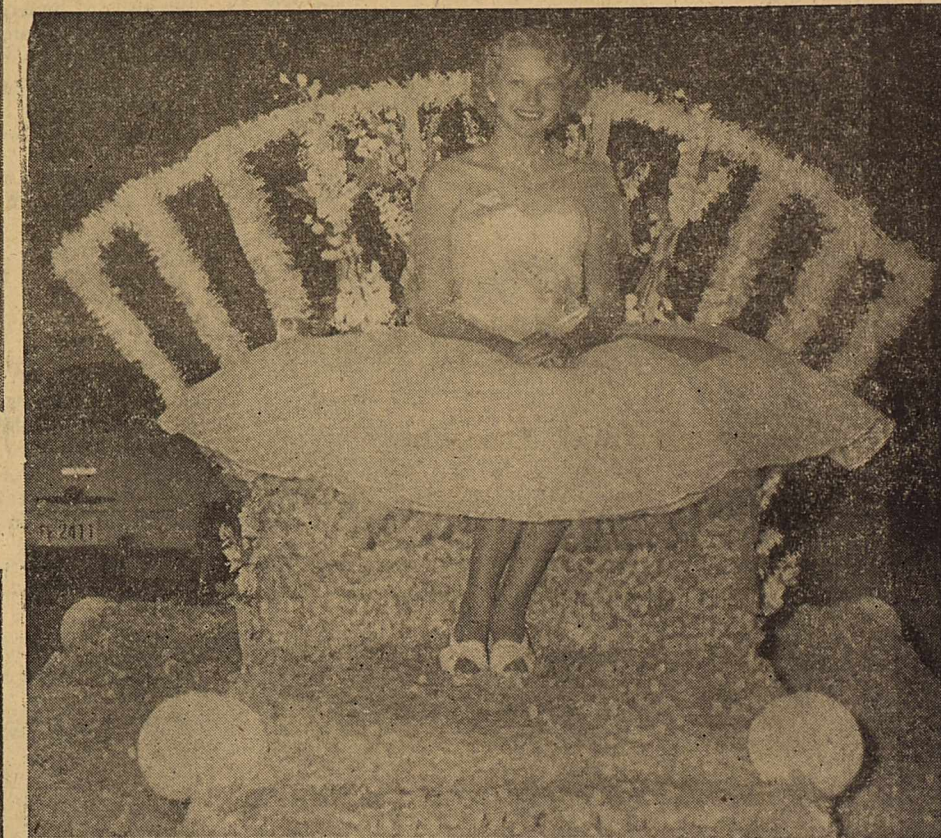

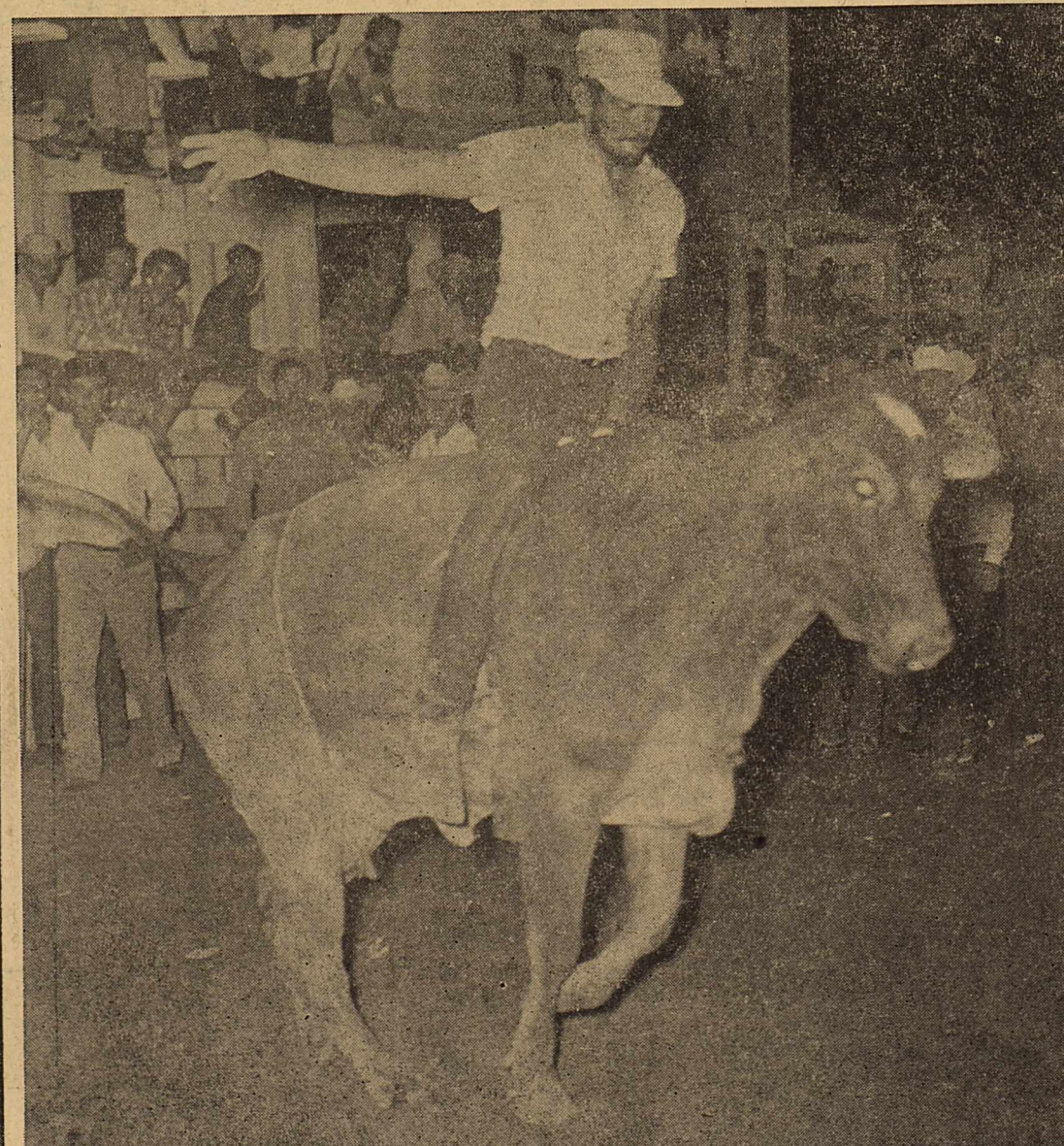

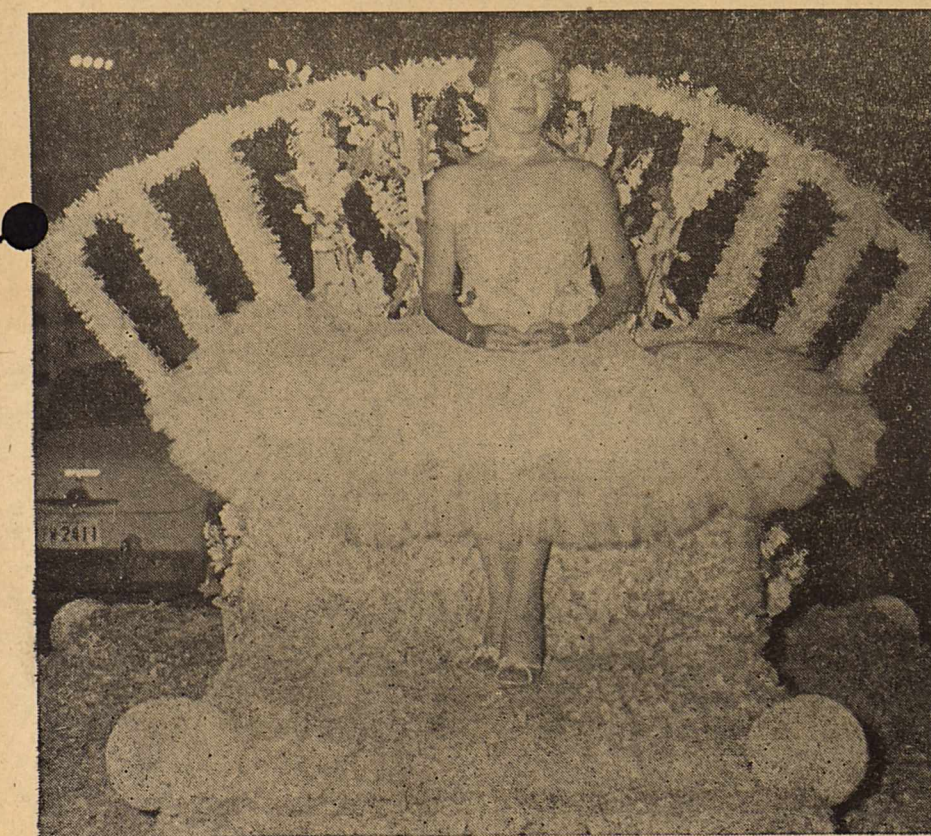

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

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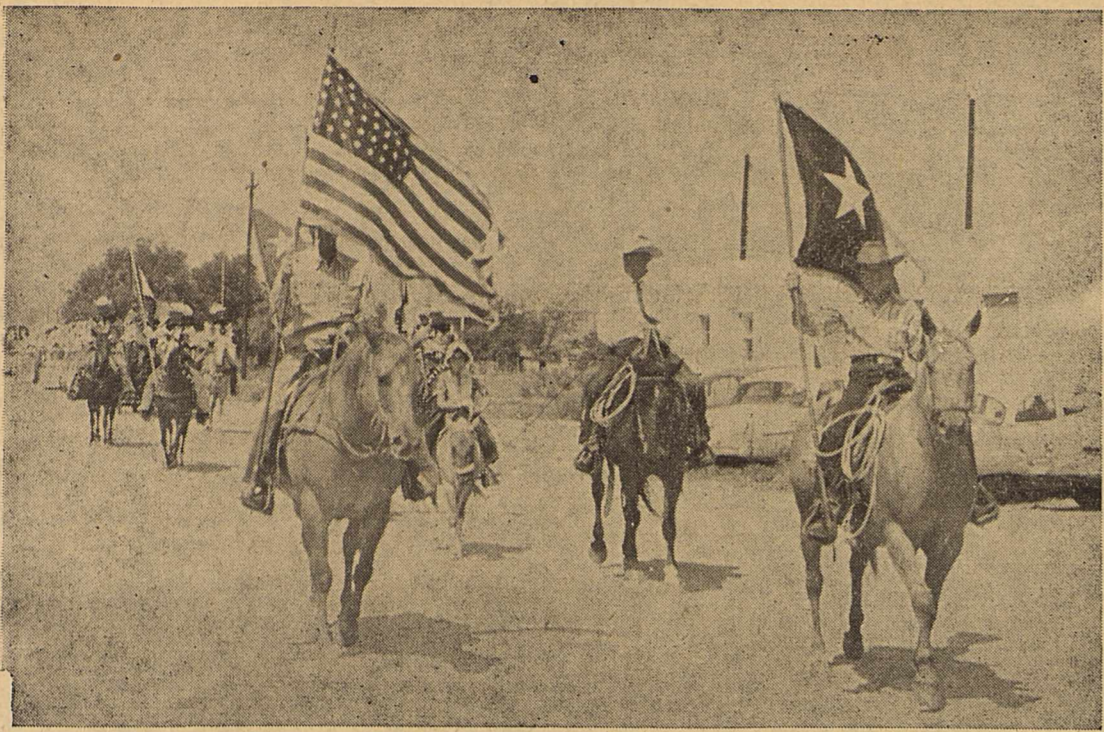

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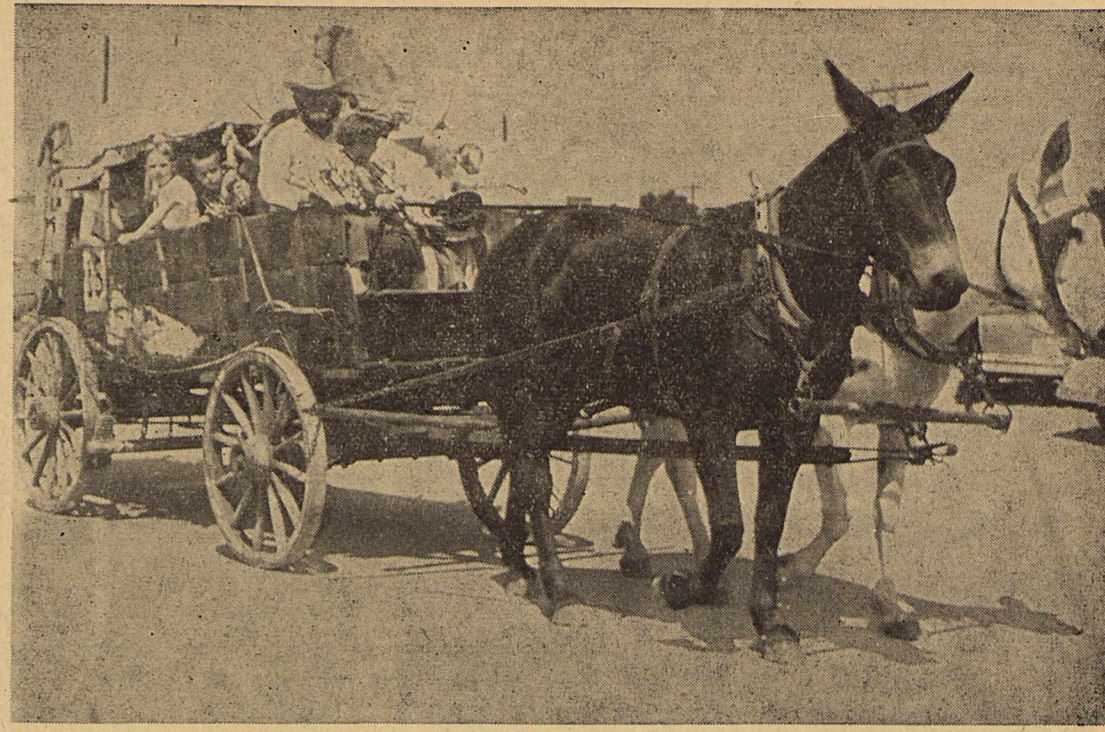

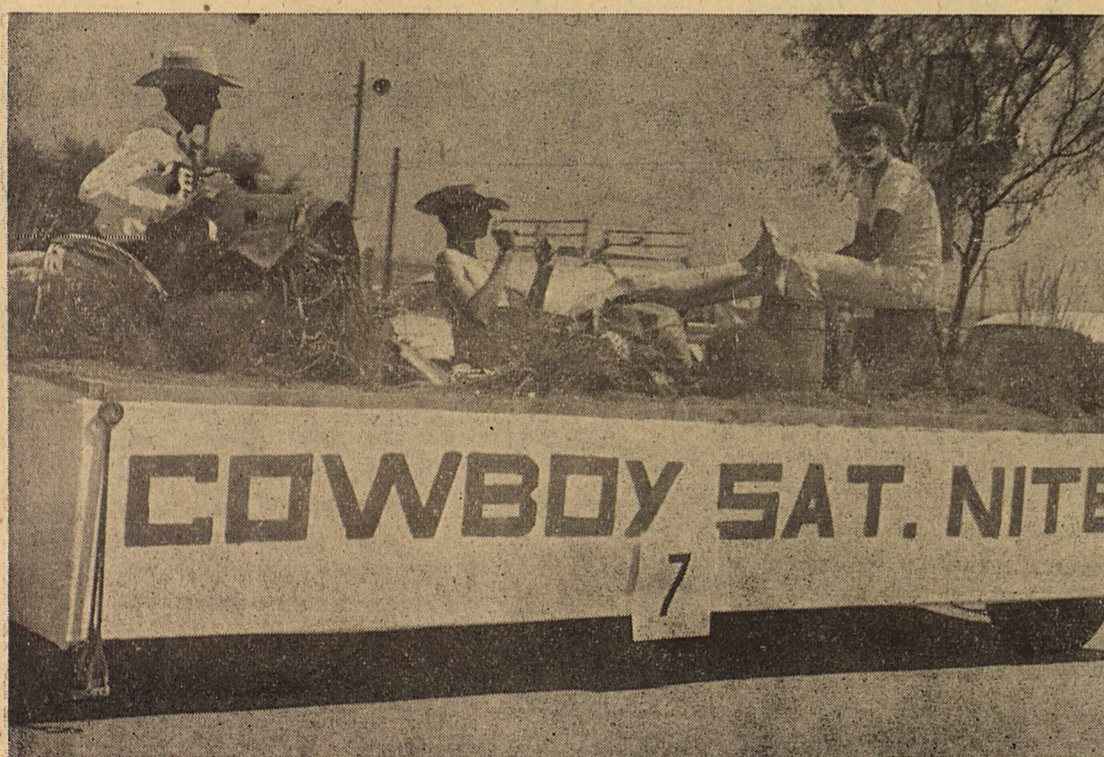

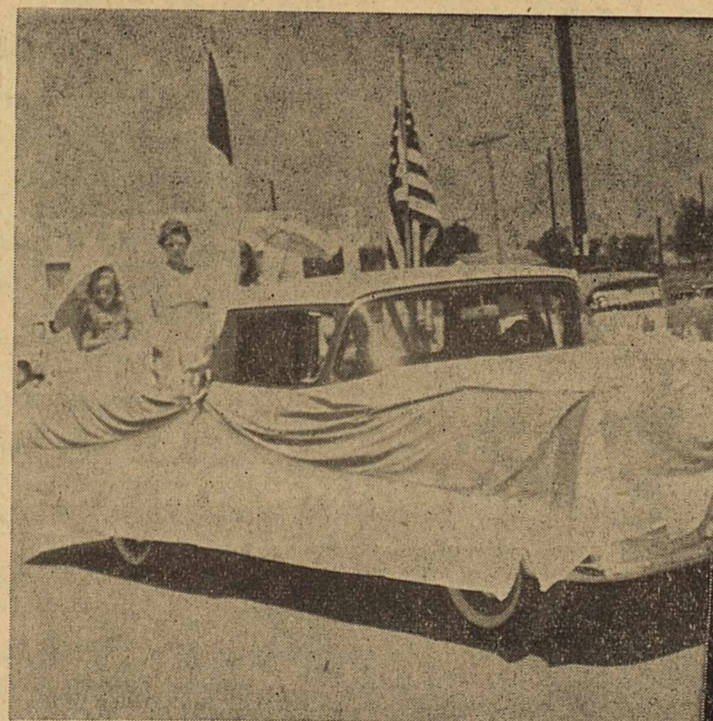

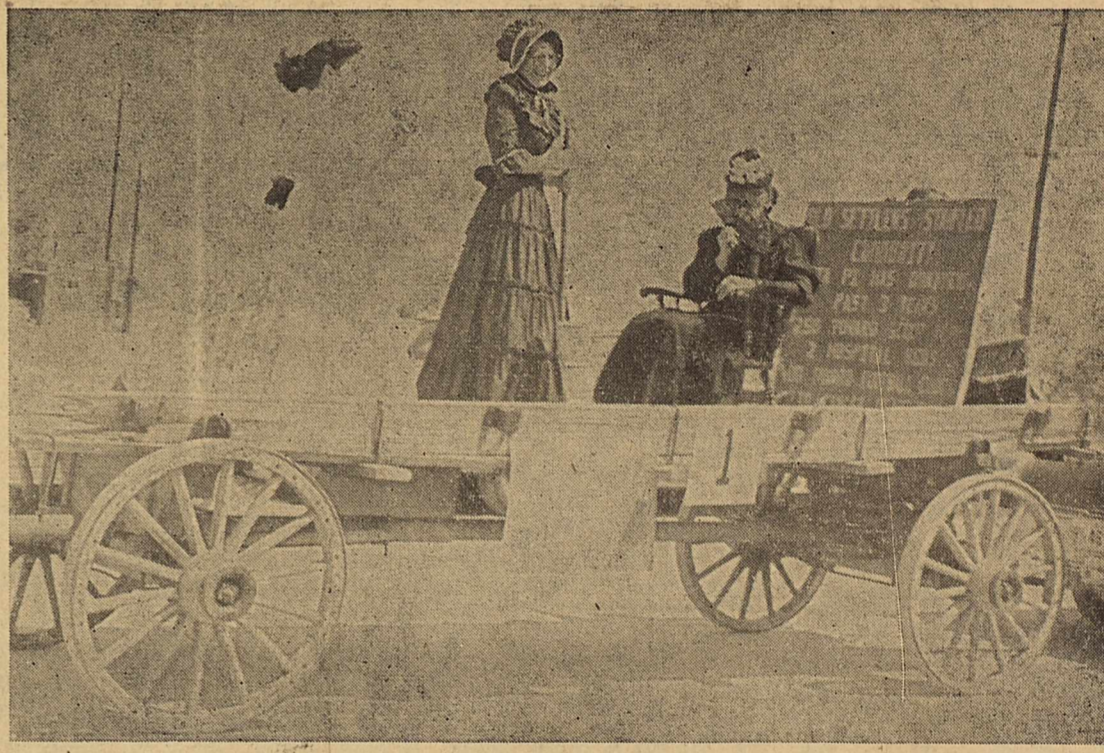

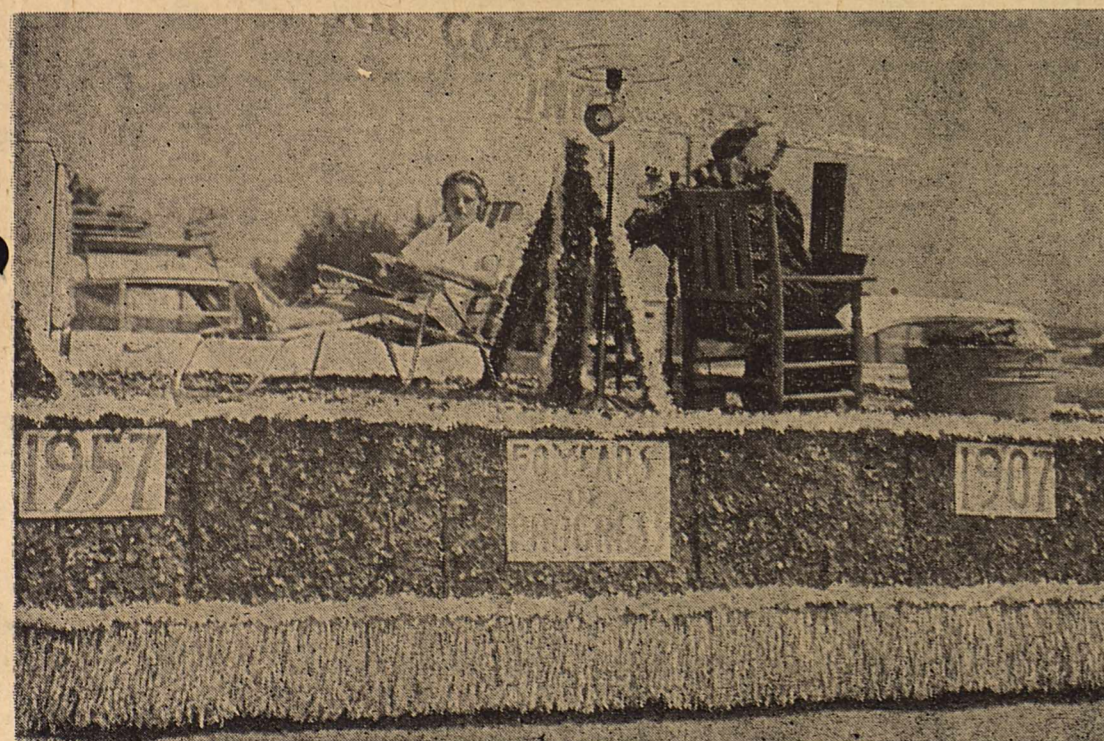

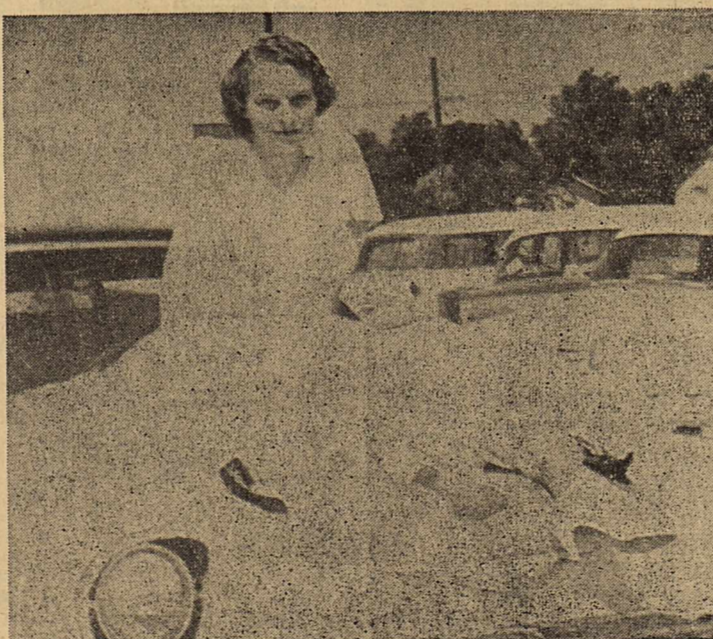
THIS DECORATED CAR, carrying the message "Christ for All", was entered in the festival parade by Mrs. J. H. Jost of Plains.



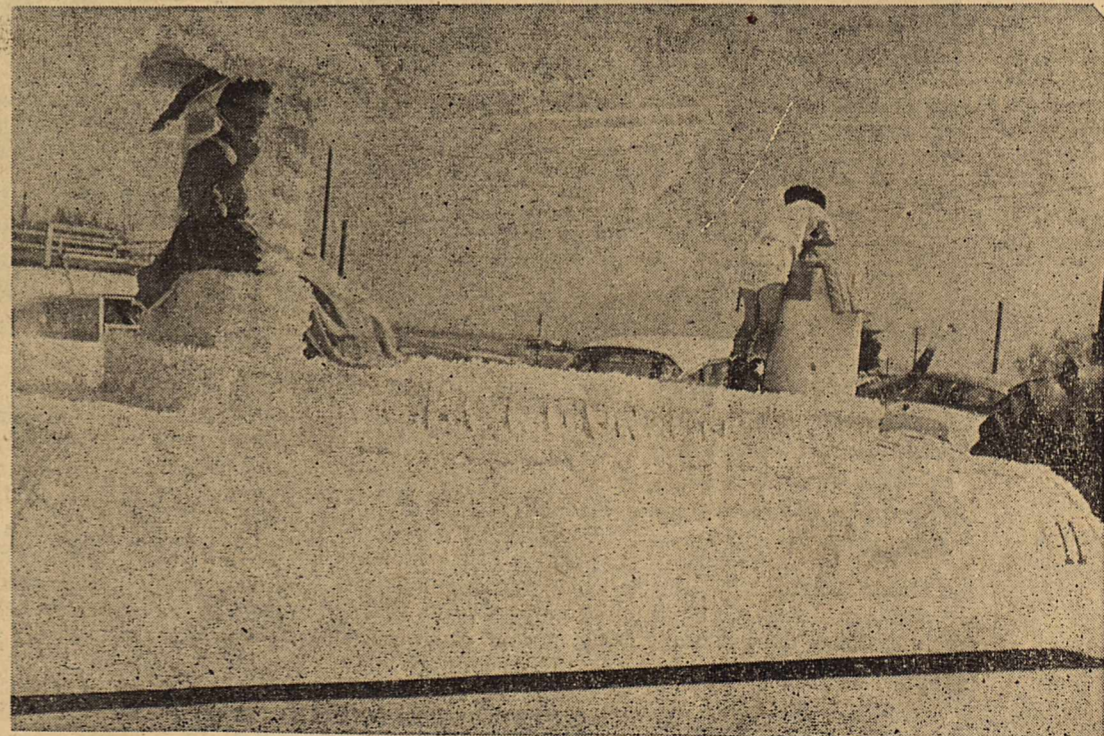

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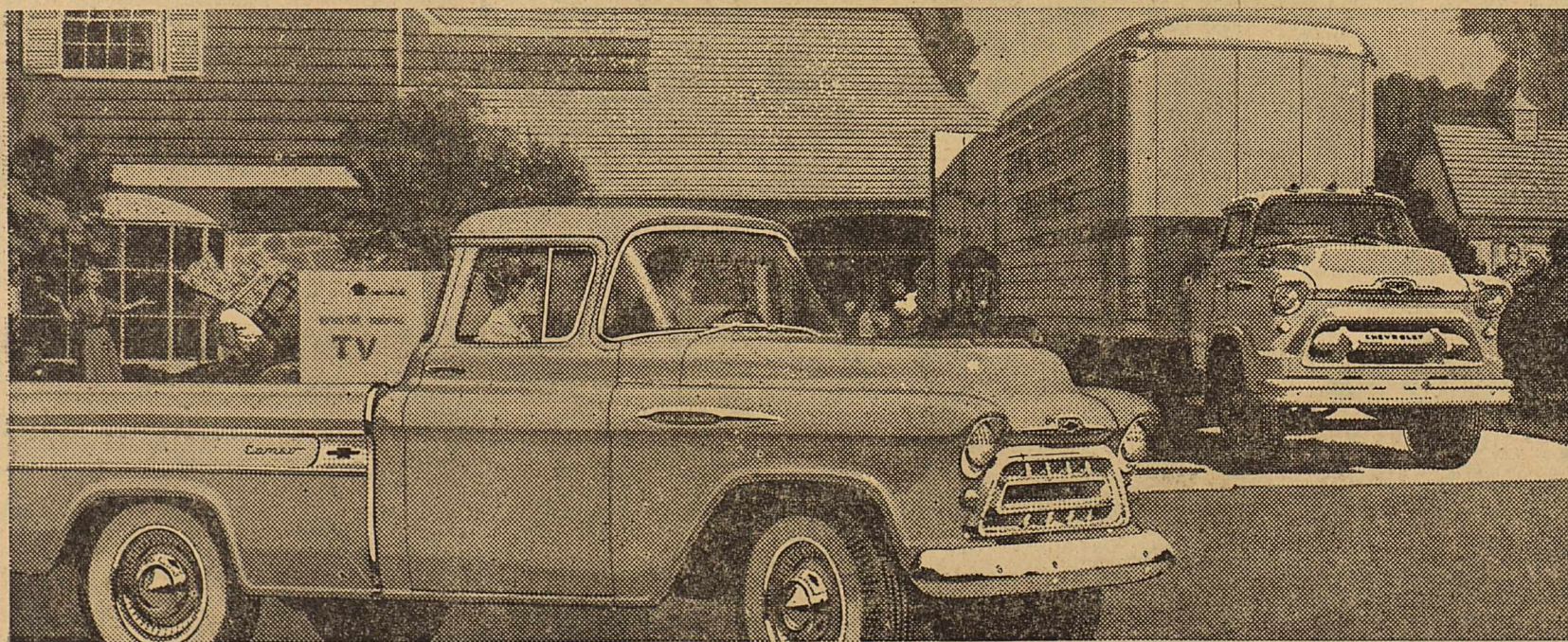

Dear Editor:
Due to a few errors in the story "Sue Stevens Recalls Early Days in County" which was published in the Golden Jubilee Edition of your paper, I wish to submit the following corrections:
Although the seven sections of land my family acquired in the southwest portion of Yoakum County was a part of the lands over which the Poole & Holloway (Seventy-six Ranch) cattle ranged, it was never owned by the ranch nor did my family ever own any portion of the lands actually owned by that ranching firm. The ranch was never particularly famous nor did their range cover as much as 225 sections of land.

At the time my family moved to Yoakum County, November 1915, the majority of the ladies were not riding side saddles but had adopted the "astride" mode of riding wearing the divided skirt and shirts or long-sleeved, shirt-type blouses instead of the leg-o-mutton sleeved blouses as related in the story.
The town of Allred, which was organized primarily to provide much-needed living quarters for the influx of oilfield workers, never attained a population of 3,000. Fifteen hundred population at the peak would be nearer correct. The little town was never particularly "dear to my heart" as related in the story, although I made and cherish several lasting friendships with people who came to the community during the life of the town.
