tist Church of Plains has been named winner of the District 8 Town and Country Achievement Award sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

District Missions Secretary J. W. Arnett of Big Spring said one of the judges' main considerations was the church improvement program, which included a new educational building, new pastor's study and refinishing of the parsonage.

Devided into three categories, the achievement program is judged on projects designed to build a better church, community and world.

District 8 includes five associations, 123 churches, ten missions and nearly 60,000 members. The district's 12-county area extends from Yoakum County on the North to Midland County on the south and from Mitchell County on the East to the western borders of the state.

It is one of 17 geographical areas in which BGCT promotes the achievement program each year. The winning pastor in each district receives a parchment scroll, the church a metal plaque which may be displayed in a prominent position outside the building.

One church and one pastor will be recognized as statewide winners during Texas Baptist's annual convention Nov. 5-7 in

Pastor C. J. Coffman said the church renovated its auditorium. installed a central heating and cooling unit, and remodeled the church kitchen to round out the

The church budget was increased from \$8,400 to \$15,050. However total gifts amounted to \$30,500 with 20 per cent of the budget going to mission work through the Texas Baptist cooperative program.

The only way to get an increase in organic matter in the soil is to grow it on the land and leave it there or grow it somewhere else and haul it there. The hauling of cotton burs is less expensive than growing a crop to turn under as a green manure crop. The green crop will take out a certain amount of organic matter to produce the tonnage that is turned under but the green manure crop will return much more than was taken out. A crop of sweet sorghums will produce five to fifteen tons of silage per acre which is about one third water and if it were plowed under while it was green the soil would get two to five tons of dry organic matter added to it. Farmers who have used cotton burs have applied from four to twelve tons to the acre The lighter applications have been made on dry land farms and some of the irrigated farmers like the heavy applications.

Farmers should make arrangements with the gins and let them know that the burs will be used for soil improvement. The ginner would like for the farmer to haul the burs away as soon as they are ground or heated or whatever is necessary to comply with the pink bollworm program. The main thing is to get the burs on the land where they will do some good instead of burning






