

## Former Local Rancher Ridin' Range for Air Force

Born on a farm, Major Stringer moved to a ranch near Plains, at the age of 14 and lived there as a rancher until Uncle Sam beckoned for Air Force duty in August 1942.

First was Sheppard Field, Tex. as an aircraft mechanic—far from the hot, dusty ranges where he had spent so many years.

Major Stringer is assigned as Initial Operational Capability Officer at Cooke AFB, but until the 43-day coastal deer season ends, he and his nine volunteer assistants patrol Cooke's entire 63,000 acres on horseback, jeep and foot.

There are four controlled hunting areas comprising 30,000 acres, with 16 hunters per day permitted. By the time the curtain drops on the season there will have been 688 deer hunters with or without their limits.

Hunting permits are issued daily at Cooke on a first-come basis. Four nimrods are allowed in each of the four areas. State laws are strictly enforced by Warden Stringer and his assistants in conjunction with state game officials. Most of their patroling is done after normal duty hours to detect any wouldbe poachers.
