

The City of Plains has completed a month of operation of its light plant and work on the distriution lines is nearing comptribution, according to City Secretary Rod Duff. The City began tying on customers in the north part of town, and now that a few essential crossings have been made, is ready to take on new customers in other sections.

The plant has been carrying sufficient load to allow the operators to iron out any possible difficulties that might have arisen on the new operation. In the first phase of tying on customers, 47 had been connected to Wednesday morning, This included several business connections.

Few difficulties have been encountered in putting the plant into operation. The only trouble that has come up to date has been attributed to some faulty gas regulators which feed gas to the engines, and they are being changed out in order to prevent stopping on an engine.

City Secretary Duff said that the City Council has expressed their thanks to the citizens of the town for their assistance in working out the problems that have arisen in getting the light plant into operation. The manner in which the project has been received and the interest in the welfare and future of Plains has been gratifying, he said.
