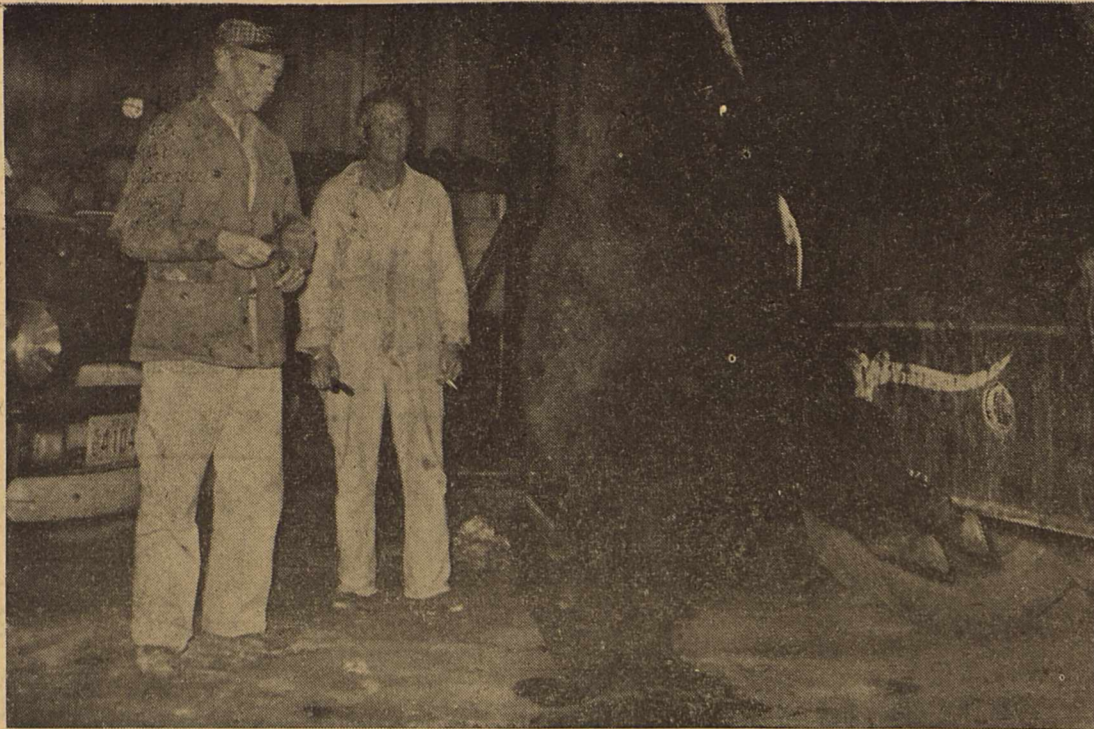

## Council Rejects Co-Op Request for Electric Rate Cut

The Plains City Council convened last Thursday night in regular session and disapproved an application of Lea County Electric Cooperative, Inc., to reduce residential electric rates ten per cent in the city of Plains.

The application has been on file with the council since March of this year, with no action having been taken previously. Present at the meeting Thursday night was R. B. Moore, manager of the Lea County Electric Cooperative, Inc., who requested the council take positive action at that time, so that his company could either drop the matter or place the rate reduction into effect.

In the application, Lea County Electric stated they wished to reduce rates in Plains to make the rate structure here comparable to that being used in Lovington and Tatum. The latter two cities accepted the company's offer of a 10 per cent residential reduction some months ago.

Plains councilmen gave as their reasons for disapproval of the proposed rate reduction the following:

The rate structure as set by the Lea County Electric Cooperative was adopted as adequate at the time the city of Plains held a bond election to build a municipal electric system. The city did not at that time wish to ask for a lower rate, if Lea County Electric Cooperative needed this particular rate structure in order to continue operations.

According to Mayor W. R. Curry, the City has voted for and sold the bonds based on the rate structure adopted as set up by Lea County Electric Cooperative. At this time, he said, the council does not deem it practical to go into a rate adjustment when the city plant has only been in operation.

A very outstanding and valuable experience will be granted a local youth and student of Plains by being a delegate on the Odd-Fellow sponsored, 1958 Youth Pilgrimage to the United Nations next spring.

Sponsoring the project will be the Plains I. O. O. F., Lodge Plains Rebekah Lodge Canton and L. A. P. M. Lodges and Denver City Encampment. The student selected will join other delegates from over the State and the Nation on a bus tour to United Nations Headquarters in New York City where they will have an opportunity to study and learn first hand the operations of this vitally important body. The Tour will be made shortly after the close of this school year.

Expenses of the trip will be met from funds raised by the local lodge groups and from various money raising projects which are being planned.

Last year a total of 694 young people and 74 adult leaders from all over the United States and Canada joined in the eighth annual United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth. Nearly 3500 young people have taken part in this project of Odd Fellowship since its beginning in 1950.

The youths have six days of study and observation at United Nations where they can see firsthand how the affairs of the World are handled. They are able to sit in the Council Chambers and with the use of earphones, listen to the discussions carried on in any of the five official languages. They are able to attend committee meetings, dine in the Delegate dining room where they are given an extra opportunity to become acquainted with People from other Nations. They visit the Embassies to the U. N. in New York, as well as many other important places.

Selection of the delegate will be made later on in the school year with the help of the school teachers. To be eligible, the student must be between the ages of 16 and 18, with at least one year of High School and one year remaining. The delegate will be chosen on the basis of Character, Scholarship, Community service, Leadership and Public Speaking. The latter is especially important, as the Delegate, upon returning, will be asked to speak at engagements.

The education value of the tour is regarded as priceless.

## Brownfield Man Receives Sentence In Court Monday

Buddle Ross Chidester of Brownfield, charged with failure to stop and render aid on two counts, pled guilty Monday afternoon in district court and was given a five-year probated sentence by District Judge Louis B. Reed.

Chidester was also ordered to pay into the registry of the court \$25 per month, beginning January 1, 1958, until \$1,000 has been paid, for the benefit of Mrs. L. G. Warren of Andrews, legal guardian of Jerry Warren, a minor. The sheriff of Terry County was named as probation officer.

Charges were filed in the case following an accident several months ago near Plains in which the car driven by Chidester sideswiped the Warren vehicle, the impact severing the arm of young Warren. The case was originally scheduled to be heard Friday, but was postponed due to the snowstorm.

Emily Marie Hardin was granted a divorce from Dester A. Hardin, with her maiden name restored; Shirley Garrison was declared a dependent and neglected child, and the case of Athilea Birdwell et vir vs. Great American Reserve Insurance Company, for collection of insurance payment, was dismissed.

The suit for damages, filed by Charles Gist as next of kin of Mona Fae Gist against R. D. Blacklock and Sonnie Blacklock, earlier that day was tried and settled for \$1500 and costs, plus attorney's fees. In the suit, Gist had sought a total of \$4,250 for damages sustained as the result of a car accident early in August at the intersection of 10th and Avenue C in Denver City.

## Argo to Try Wildcat As San Andres Strike

Argo Oil Corporation and others have given up attempts to complete their No. 1 McGinty, Northwest Yoakum County wildcat, as a discovery from the Wolfcamp, and now will concentrate on attempts to complete the well as a San Andres strike. Operators tested the wolfcamp through perforations without

developing commercial production. The casing now has been perforated opposite the San Andres from 5,214 to 5,262 feet. Attempt will be made to complete the wildcat from that one.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 280, block D, J. H. Gibson survey, seven miles northwest of Plains.

Pure Oil Company No. 1 C. E. Oberholzer is a 5,600 foot location in the Reeves (San Andres) field of Yoakum County.

Drill site is 330 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of northeast quarter of section 752, block D, J. H. Gibson survey, 6 miles northwest of Seagraves.

James G. Brown and Associates have completed No. 2 E. W. Jones on a 24 hour pumping potential of 195.91 barrels of 32.4 gravity oil through perforations of 5,236 to 5,284 feet. Gas-oil ratio is 640-1.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 391, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Shell Oil Company and Cities Service Oil Company No. 9 Foster Petroleum Corporation is a 7,740 foot project in the Russell 7000 (Clear Fork) field of Gaines County.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 492, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey, 10 miles southwest of Denver City.

D. W. St. Clair No. 3 Kendrick is a 7,500 foot location in the North Robertson field of Gaines County. It is 980 feet from north and 591 feet from east lines of section 7, block AX, psl survey, 10 miles southwest of Seminole.

## Snow Fall Provides Variety of Activities for Local Residents



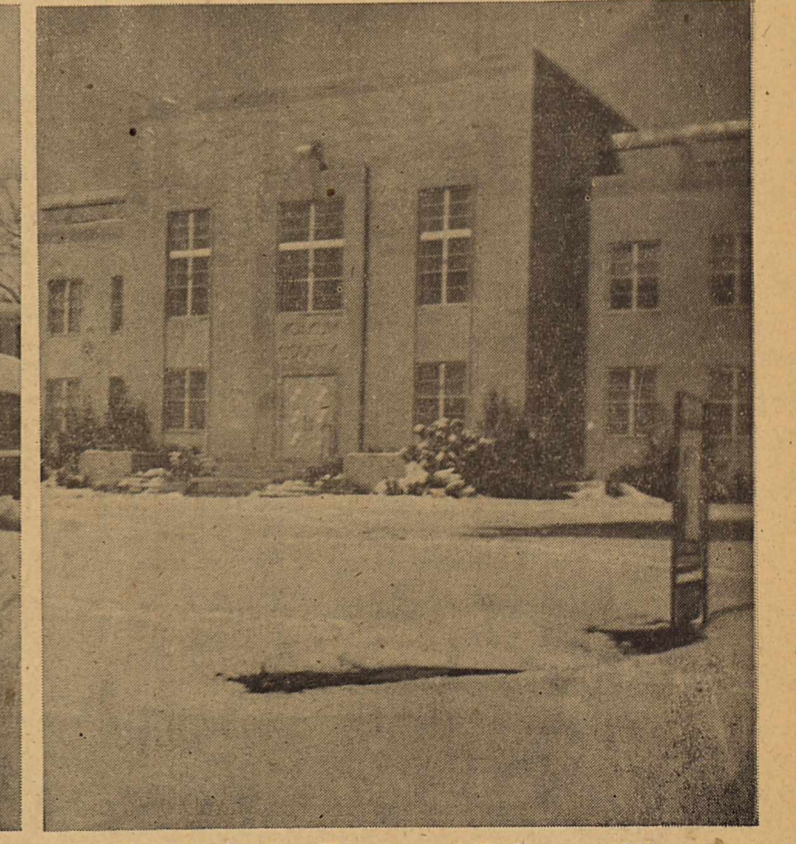

**Homespun Hints**

The Thanksgiving season is filled with good things to eat. The family usually dines on turkey and all the delicious trimmings. However, the cook may need to check each day to see if the family is eating the food they need to be healthy. Each day the housewife should check her meals to include the following:

**TEXAS FOOD STANDARD**

- Milk- 1 pt. to 1 qt.
- 1 serving meat
- 1 serving potatoes
- 1 serving green or yellow vegetable
- 1 serving citrus or tomatoes
- 1 other serving fruit
- 1 serving whole grain products
- Other enriched cereals and breads

Butter or margarine with vitamins added.  
Some sweets  
More of the above or other foods as needed

6 to 8 glasses of water  
For meat or eggs one may substitute dried beans, peas, cheese or nuts without lowering of the score.

The Texas Food Standard will insure that each family member get an adequate amount of protein, vitamins, and minerals.

After Thanksgiving the big question is "What can be done with left-over turkey?"

Here are two recipes which would be helpful.

**TURKEY CREOLE**

- 2 cups diced, cooked turkey meat
- 1 tablespoon shortening
- 1 tsp. flour
- 2 small onions (little garlic may used)
- 1 green pepper
- 2 tsp. chopped parsley
- 3/4 cup chopped celery
- 2 cups canned tomatoes
- 1 sm can mushrooms
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

Salt and pepper  
Put shortening, flour, onions, green pepper and parsley in skillet and cook until onions are brown. Add tomatoes, chopped celery and mushrooms. Season with salt and pepper. Add cooked turkey meat and cover. Let cook very slowly for one hour. One-half hour before serving, add Worcestershire sauce. Serve over cooked rice and sprinkle with chow mein noodles, or serve rice and creole separately.

**CREAMED TURKEY**

- 3 tsp. butter or margarine
  - 4 tsp. flour
  - 1 cup broth
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1/2 tsp. salt
  - 1/2 tsp. paprika
  - 1/8 tsp. pepper
  - 1 tsp. finely grated onion
  - 1 1/2 cups diced cooked turkey
- Melt fat, add flour and stir over low heat until blended. Add cold broth and milk all at once. Cook stirring constantly until uniformly thickened. Then set over hot water. Add the seasonings and turkey and heat thoroughly. Add more seasonings if desired. Serve over biscuit, toast, plain or fried noodles or rice. Serves 6.

Note: If creamed mixture is

thicker than desired, thin with hot milk or water.

**STUFFED PORK CHOPS**

Select rib pork chops 1 1/4 inches thick. Have the butcher cut a pocket through the lean part to the bone of each chop. Stuff with cranberry dressing. Fasten with skewers. Brown the chops quickly on each side in a hot skillet. Add 1/2 cup boiling water, cover tightly. Reduce heat and simmer slowly 45 to 60 minutes or until tender.

**CRANBERRY DRESSING**

- Celery- 2 outer stalks
- 1 Small onion
- 1 sprig parsley
- 1/2 cup Cranberries
- 2 tsp. butter
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1/2 teasp. salt

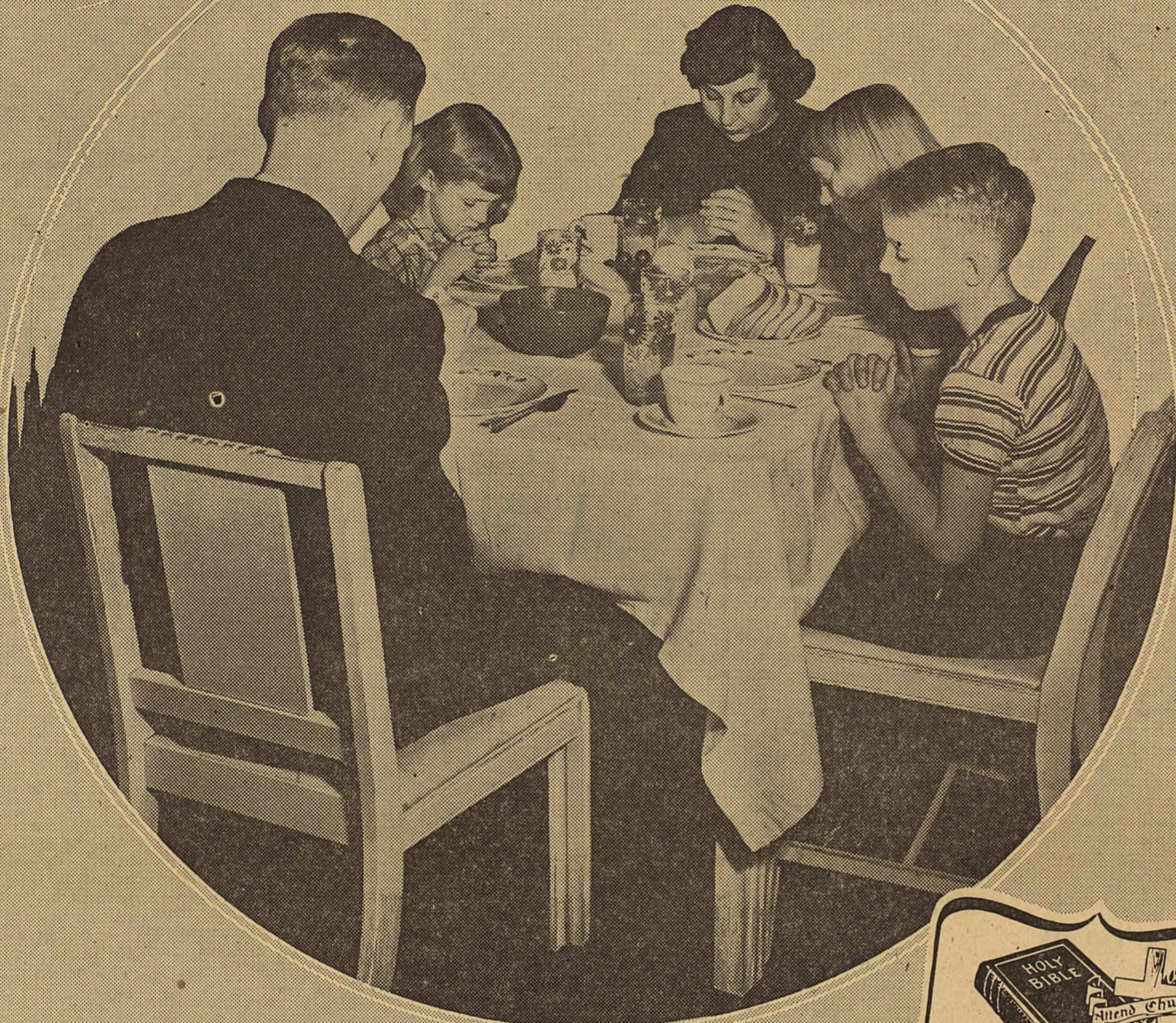
Few grains pepper  
1/4 teasp. poultry seasoning  
1/2 teasp. sugar

Place celery, onion, parsley and cranberries in chopping bowl and chop fine. Saute in butter a few minutes and combine with other ingredients. Makes enough stuffing for 8 porkchops.

### ACROSS THE CATTLE GUARD

About two weeks ago I was down in the southern part of this state and saw some of the country that was all new to me. I learned that in that area the people are pretty proud of Blue Panic grass. They have it growing in all of the pastures where brush and nothing seems to grow they can get it established. Some of the pastures are covered with there except brush. They have done a great deal of brush eradication work and where the brush has been cleared away they have Blue Panic grass started. Occasionally there will be an irrigated pasture where they have planted a mixture of grasses and one of the grasses in the mixture

will always be Blue Panic. Blue Panic grass has been growing in Yoakum County for several years but it does not seem to do the job here that it does farther south. It may be that soil and climatic differences would keep it from doing as well in this area as it does in the San Antonio area but our people cannot feel that Blue Panic is our one best grass. We have other grasses in Yoakum County that are also doing a good job of producing forage. Some of them have not been grown long enough for us to tell if they will do well in this Locality.

Our newest grass is probably Sorghum Alnum grass which is supposed to be a cross between Johnson grass and some of the sorghums. We have some reports on the few acres of Sorghum Alnum that was planted in this county this year. Most of the people who planted this grass was interested in producing a

seed crop rather than having something to graze. Growing seed for the first year was a wise move because seed prices were high at planting time last spring and a farmer could well afford to wait one year to plant the acreage that he wanted to be in grass. One acre of Sorghum Alnum will produce enough seed to plant several hundred acres. The seed was high only because they were scarce. Farmers who did not grow any seed this year can probably buy seed fairly reasonable next Spring.

I doubt if many people will say that Sorghum Alnum is going to be our one best grass. I do believe that it is going to be one of our better grasses. It makes an enormous growth and produces a large amount of forage that can be grazed like Sudan grass or it can be stored as dry forage or used as a silage crop. It is closely related to Johnson Grass and people fear that it will be a problem to get rid of. We will have to grow it for a while before we will know how hard it is to kill.

The only person that I know of who has grazed Sorghum Alnum this year is Rusty McGinty. He had ten acres that was planted for grazing and another small plot that was planted for seed production. His ten acres furnished grazing for a part of the Summer for about thirty head of cows and calves. He put in a few head of cows and calves and left them a while to see how they would do and when he saw that both the cattle and the grass was doing well, he turned in some more cows and calves. He can give you the exact number of cattle and the number of days they grazed on the grass. The important thing is that the cattle did well and gained in flesh during the time that they were eating nothing but Sorghum Alnum grass.

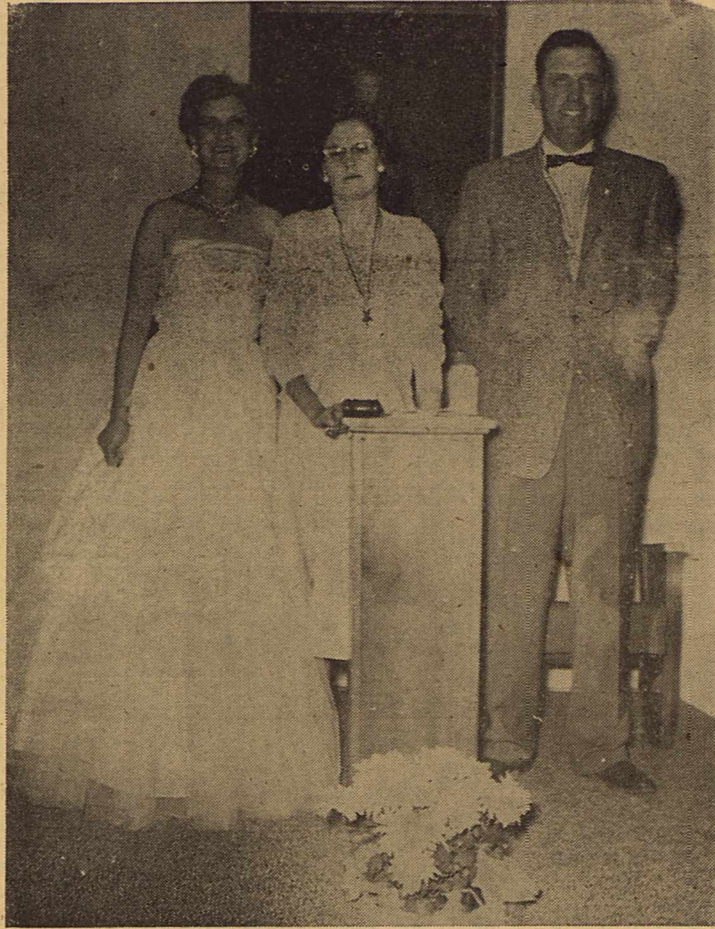
Regardless of the kind of grass that is used, my prediction is that Yoakum County will follow along with the idea that grass farming is here to stay. When an acre of land will produce enough forage to feed one mother cow for twelve months and enough additional to feed her calf up to weaning age, then that acre will probably make more clear money for the owner than a similar acre growing grain sorghum or cotton. There is a way to grow a number of different grasses on the same farm and fit them into a rotation grazing system whereby year around grazing could be achieved with a minimum of supplemental feeding. A number of Yoakum County farmers are thinking along this same line and it will take a few years to get it worked out. I would be very interested in talking to anyone who has a plan of grass farming.

tion for a period of two months, and not allowing time for a comprehensive study of the rate structure.

(Texas law would require the City of Plains to adjust the rates charged by their municipally-owned plant if the proposed rate reduction of Lea County Electric Cooperative were approved.)

The sale of future bond issues in Plains, Curry said, depends largely on the manner of repayment of the present bonds, the handling of the facilities of the City, and accumulation of surpluses. It is felt by the council they cannot do this without maintaining present rates until a study of same can be held.

The council has expressed a belief that if a rate adjustment had been asked for prior to the issuance of the electrical revenue bonds that adjustment could have been granted, without reflecting against the actions of the council. Mayor Curry stated the council did not permanently disapprove the rate adjustment; that time was needed to determine the city's position in the matter and to determine if the application submitted by Lea County Electrical Cooperative was a fair reduction since it only applied to residential service.

In other action, the council authorized final payment to B. C. Jones Construction Co. of Brownfield for construction of the city's electrical distribution system. The system was completed on Wednesday of last week.

Present for the meeting in addition to Mayor Curry and R. B. Moore were Perry Anthony and J. R. Morgan, with Lea County Electric, City Secretary Rod Duff and Council members Johnnie Fitzgerald, Amos Smith and J. S. Wagley.

## Postmaster Urges Early Mailing Of Yule Cards, Gifts

Postmaster Robert Watson said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas."

The Postmaster urged special care in preparing gift package for the mails. Make sure that all addresses are legible and complete.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package.

When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipient's full name, street address, city zone and state.

"Remember these three rules," the Postmaster said, "Wrap securely, address correctly, and mail early."

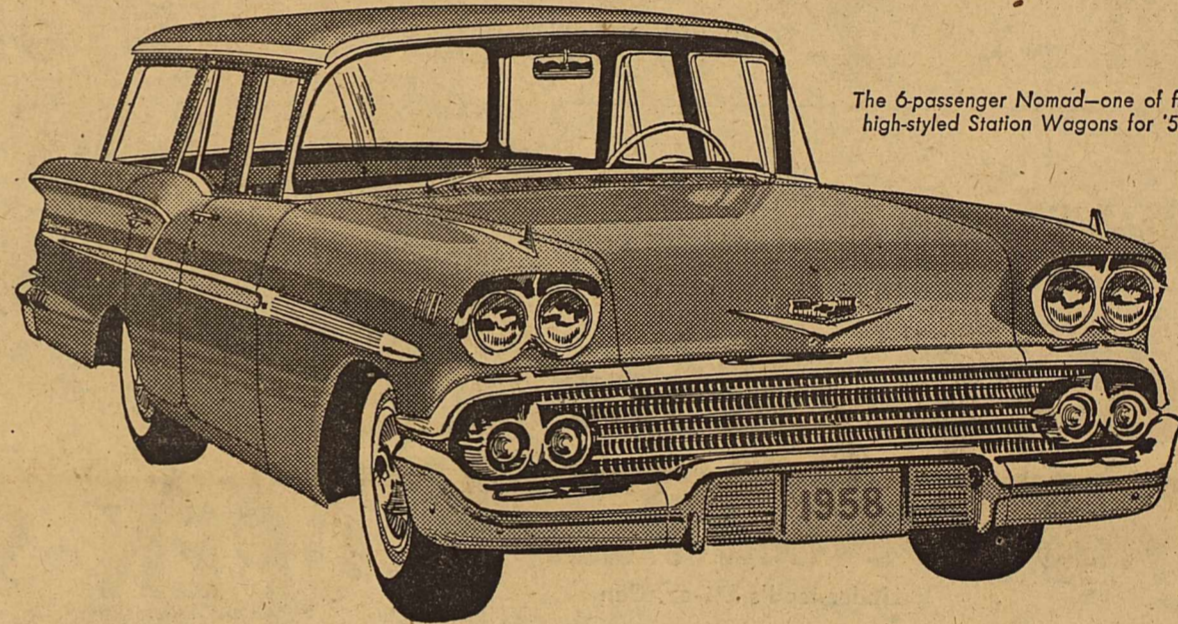

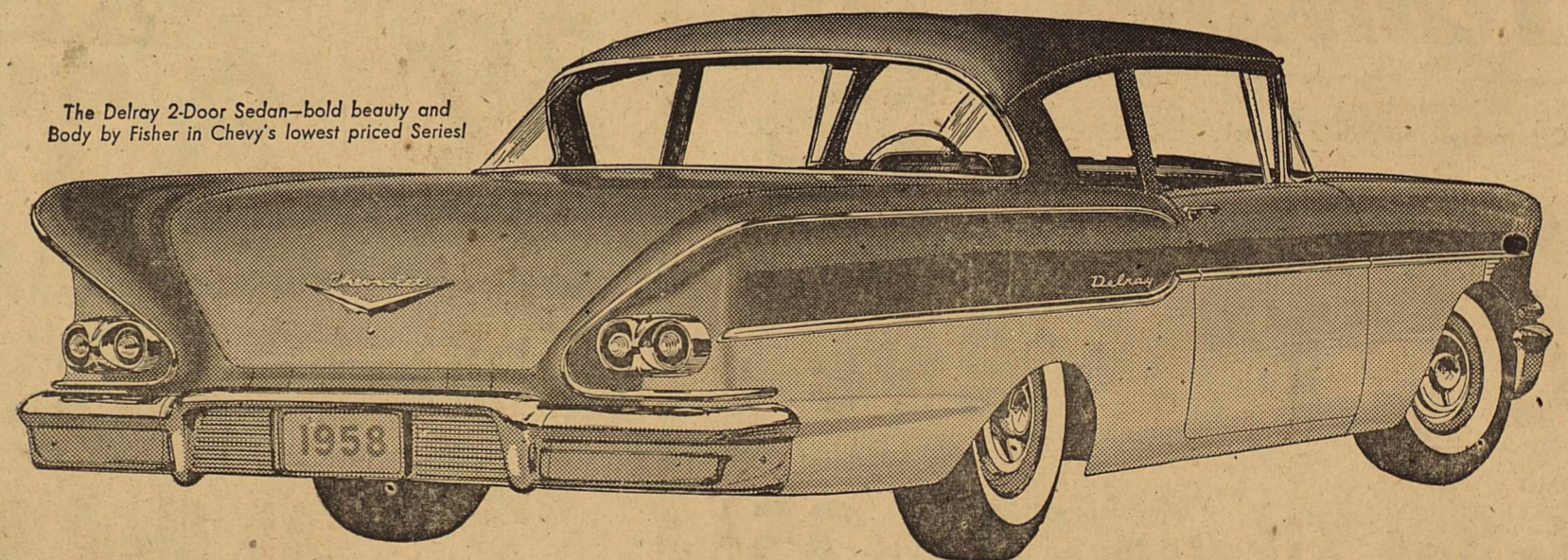
