





Our experiment stations have shown us that mother cows will wean heavier calves if they are kept in good condition during the time the calves are sucking. This does not mean that they should have all that they can eat but it does mean that a cow should not be allowed to lose weight in excessive amounts during the nursing period. Milk is the main thing that makes the calf heavy and silage is one of

the better feeds to make a cow give milk. When a cow is getting silage as the only feed, she is not getting a balanced ration and she cannot do her best job of raising a calf. She needs a little protein along with it which is usually supplied in the form of cottonseed meal or cake.
