
nearly 1,000 Masonic Lodges in the state



### **PCA** Officials **Attend Houston Annual Meet** Representatives of the Ste-

phenville Production Credit Association attended the eighth annual meeting of stockholders and patrons of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, at the Rice Hotel in Houston.

The Credit Bank is discount and supervisory agency of the 36 home-owned and operated Production Credit Associations and 14 other financing insti-tutions in Texas which provide more than \$500,000,000 annually in farm and ranch loans to 30,000 Texas farmers, ranchers and dairymen.

Highlights of the meeting included a dinner at historic San Jacinto Inn, an awards luncheon and addresses by nationally-recognized leaders in agricultural financing .

Representing the Stephenville Production Credit Asso-

cition were general manager W. M. Irwin and assistant manager Robert Norwood of Stephenville, president and Ms. R. Cal McCudy of Deciation were general manager catur, vice president James Crouch of Arlington, director and Ms. C. M. McCain of Eastland.

The 36 Production Credit Associations of Texas, now observing their 30th anniversary as free enterprise agricultural financing institutions, have loaned the state's farmers and ranchers more than \$3 billion since their organization in 1933 and 1934.


