

### **ACROSS THE Cattle Guard** by LEO W. WHITE County Agent

As 1957 draws to a close we over the year and recall some of the things that have happened. One reason why we look back is come about in all classes of livebecause we need the experience of the past to guide us in the

Looking back over the past several years we see that employment and industrial production reached a new high in 1957. Farm exports set a new record in both value and volume. The prices that farmers and ranchers received for the products they had for sale was about the same as 1956. Livestock prices were nigher, feed stuff and fiber proticles that the farmer and rancher had to buy were higher with

the exception of feed and seed. some rapid changes made in agamount of irrigated land in the

In 1940 the average wheat farmer produced 15.4 bushels per acre. In 1956 this average had increased to an even 20 bushels. The same thing happened to the corn farmer. He is now producing 45.4 bushels per acre compared with 29.6 in 1940. About the same thing has happened in the case of cotton, grain sorghums and tobacco.

Livestock and poultry have

boosted the output per animal even more than land yields have increased. A hundred pounds of broiler feed would produce 24.3 pounds of meat in 1940 and now the same amount of feed will produce 36.5 pounds.
