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

> If this bill passes and becomes effective in 1959, there is one thing that strikes me as being important. Every farmer who produces grain sorghum under this plan will have some grain to feed. He will need a place to keep it and he will need some livestock to feed it to. If the price of grain sorghum goes from \$1.50 up to \$2.50 then no farmer will want to sell his feed grain for less than the going price. Surely he will be able to get that much for it by feeding it. We will need to watch the turn of events in Washington and if it going to be necessary to have because of the new farm program, then we will want to use the most practical and economical means of storing grain.

The most economical consumer of grain is hogs so if this bill is passed it will mean that there will be hogs on almost every farm. The cheapest way to get into the hog business is to grow into it so there will be a number of farmers starting out with a few small gilts as soon as they learn that the feed grain pro-

gram is in effect. It is not for me to say whether the program is good or bad. I am sure it has some merits and I am also sure that there will be something distasteful about it. The thing that I am interested in is whether or not the grain sorghum producers in Yoakum County will want to affiliate with this organized commodity group. In case they are interested in setting up a county organization, I would be glad to help in the initial phases of geting started. I understand that in other counties, each farmer pays 2 pounds of grain sorghum for each 1,000 pounds that he produces into the organization and the local elevators are the collection agencies.

A. degree from Baylor-Belton now Mary Hardin-Baylor College in 1914. In the fall of 1914, she came to Yoakum County from her home in Llano to teach in the school at Glen Park a small community east of Plains.

The next year she returned to Llano and taught school there one year, then returned to Yoakum County in September, 1916, to teach in the Plains High School. She continued to teach in the high school for two years, then retired to rear a family of two sons and daughter.
