

City light plant completes first year of operation

The City of Plains announced this week that as of Tuesday, Sept. 16, the first year of operation for the home-owned light and power company had been successfully completed.

A total of 8,760 hours of continuous service had been furnished by the plant, with only minor periods of interrupted service amounting to only 12 hours over the entire year.

Operation of the light plant has progressed according to plan, city officials reported, with 226 meter connections having been made during the year. Connections are still being made frequently, they said.

An invitation is extended to the public to visit the plant, at any time, but especially during this first anniversary of its opening in Plains.

Doris Faye Whitson is wed to Johnnie Neil Billingsley September 6

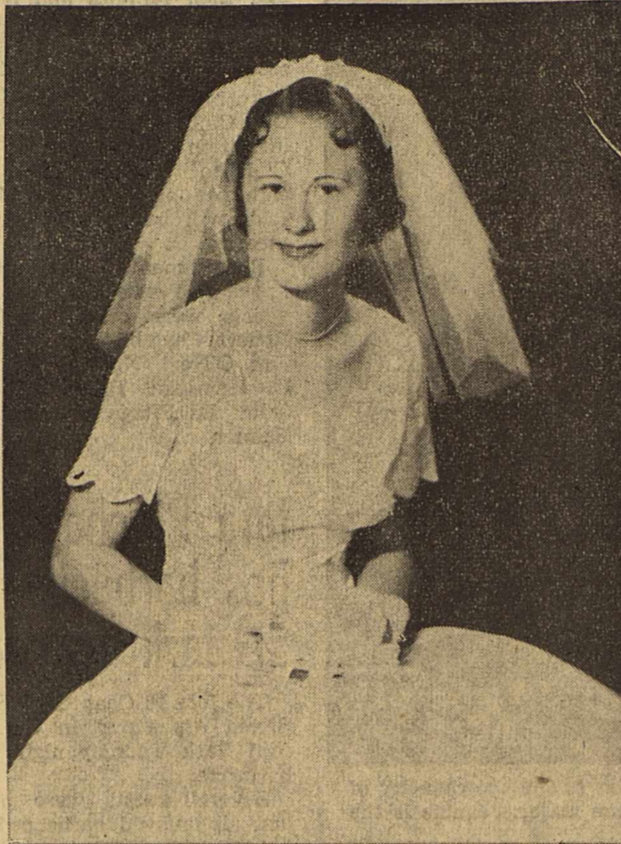

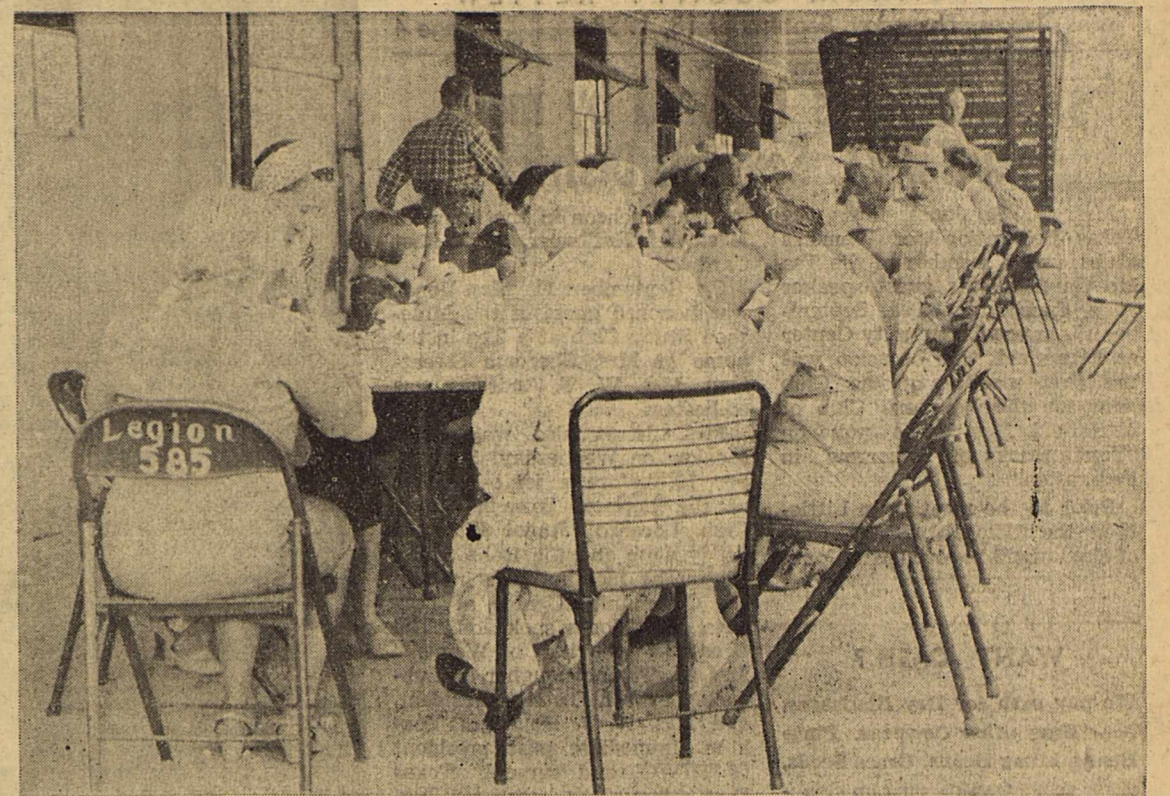

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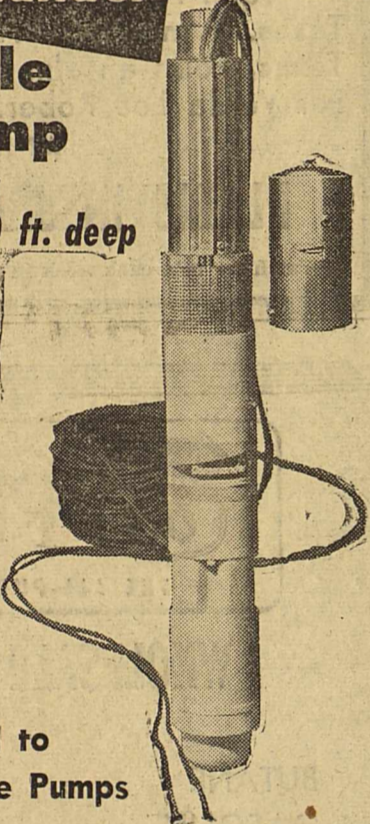

Mrs. Gayle was given a nice white Bible for having enough points at her party to earn it.

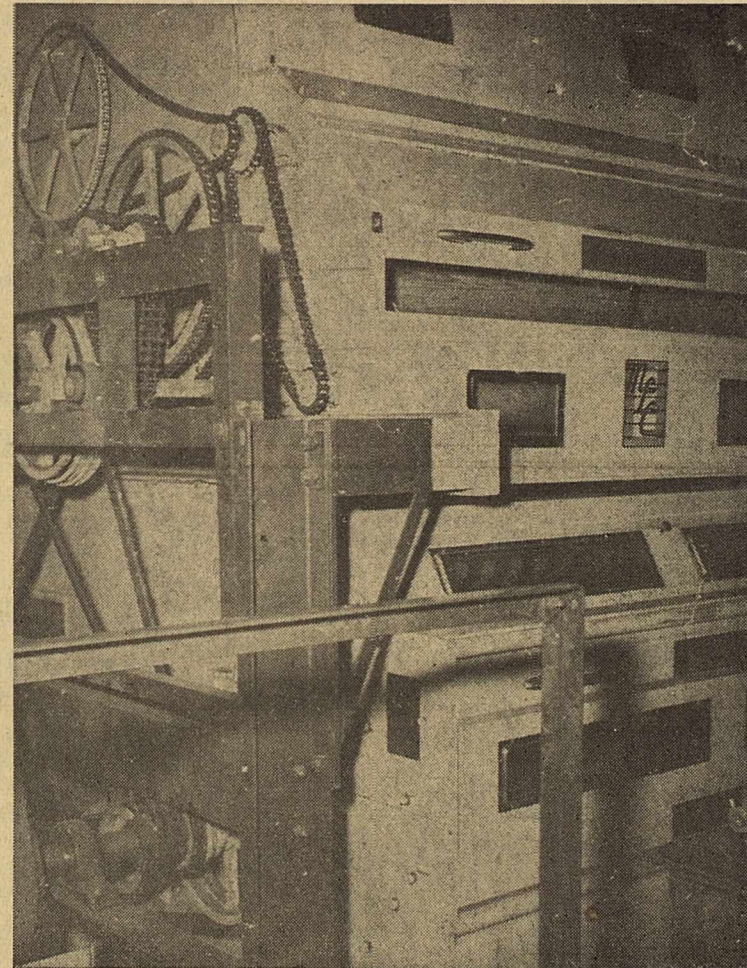
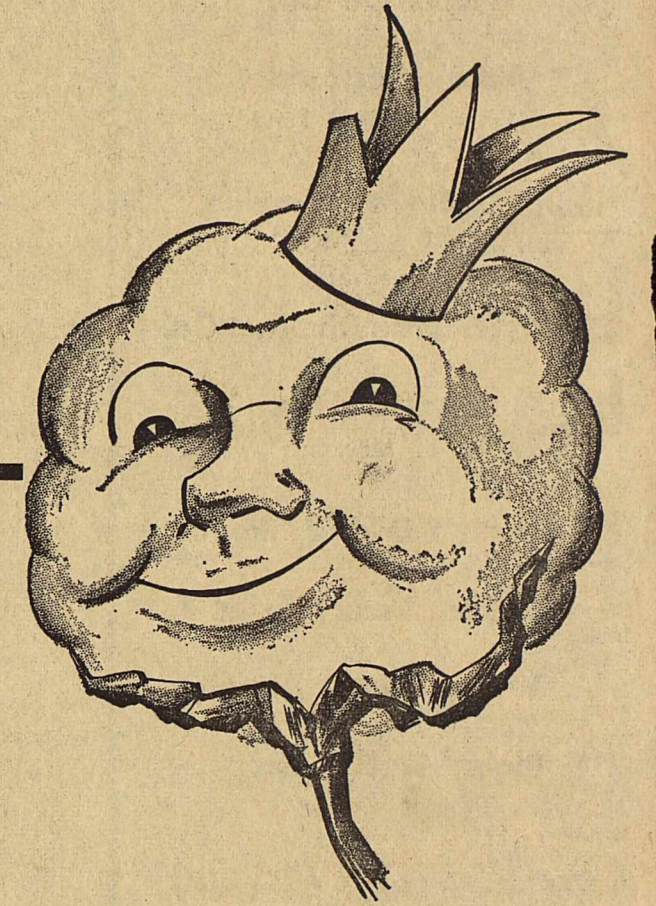
