Trout files petition reply

tion to contest election, made last week by Paul Loe, defeated candidate for the post of commissioner of Precinct 4, was filed Friday on behalf of Clyde Trout, who gained the position through a wr.te-in in the November general election.

The defendant. Trout, takes exception to several specific allegations, and in general asserts that the petition does not in most instances state any cause of action.

The reply takes exception to allegations of Paragraph 3 of the petition in which it is stated that votes were cast for the dedant who were not duly and cally qualified to vote, basis being that the plaintiff (Loe) did not give the names of the voters not so qualified. He asks that the paragraph to be struck from the pleadings; or that the plaintiff be caused to give the names of the voters that he alleges to be unqualified.

Exception is also taken to paragraph 5 of the notice wherein it is alleged that 16 voters were deprived of the right to vote, and it is asked that this be also struck from the record or the plaintiff give the names of such persons.

Band to compete on Saturday at Plainview contest

The cowboy Band of Plains High School will take part this Saturday, December 6, in the Region I Marching Contest at Plainview. This is the regular annual marching contest of the Interscholastic League, and it will be attended by about 35 competing bands. Region I of the UIL extends from Plains on the south to Kress on the north, and from Plains on the west to Spur on the east. The contest consists of both required drills, which all bands must do alike for comparision, and special maneuvers in which each band displays its skill. Bands are judged not only the way they look but also on the way they sound.

The following have been listed as the official objectives for school marching bands, although not necessarily in the order of importance: to teach self-discipline and personal responsibility, to develop leadership and citizenship, to represent the school to the community and to other towns, to develop school and group loyalty, to provide entertainment for students and patrons, and to provide an activity which will assist the student in his physical development.

The Plains band will march at 11:28 a. m. Prior to marching, the band will stand for inspection, which includes inspection of uniforms, equipment, and instruments, as well as execution of stationary commands.

The band contest will be concluded at 4:30 in the Plainview Schol Stadium .It will be followed at 7:00 p.m. by the Plains-White Deer football game, which the Plains band will attend for its second appearance of the day. The band will leave Plains at 7:00 a. m. Saturday morning and is expected to return about 12:00 p. m. Saturday night.

Allotments for '59 cotton acreage are announced

The 1959 Upland Cotton Allotment has been released and Yoakum County's share of the allotment is 33,083.1 acres. This less the reserve is the Choice A Allotment. This compares with program. The County Cotton Alotments are issued to the Counties based on the County History Acres for a five (5) year period 1953 through 1957.

According to W. M. Overton, ASC Office Manager, the Yoakum County ASC committee retained 175.0 acres of the allotment for New Growers, Correction of Errors, etc. The balance of the Council Allotment has been issued to old cotton farms based on the farms 1958 history acreage allotment. Notices are being mailed this week to all farm operators.

The Choice B Allotment will be 140 percent Choice A Allotment and both allotments will be shown on the allotment notices. If marketing quotas are approved in the December 15 Referendum, farmers will have a choice between the two allotments, if marketing quotas do not carry the Choice B allotment will not be in effect.

financed by the bond issue is badly needed, Supt. G. D. Kennedy said this week. Expected continued growth will make the need even greater, the superintendent declared

Present enrollment in the system is approximately two and a half times that of 1949-50, Kennedy reported, and many predict that the growth during the next ten years will be as great.

Proposed construction includes: (1) a high school library, (2) conversion of the present library into two or more classroms, (3) laboratory for biology and general science, (4) new auditorium with administrative offices attached, (5) conversion of existing auditorium into four classrooms and an improved band band department, (6) new gymnasium and (7) moving and improving the school stadium.

Based upon the present valuation of the Plains School District, the retirement of this proposed bond issue would require an average annual rate increase of 37 cents per one hundred dollars assessed valuation. As an

rendition of \$2,000 would amount to \$7.40.

Supt. Kennedy said it was felt that his increase will lessen due to anticipated increase in the district's valuation. During the past eight years, the valuation of the Plains School District has increased from about \$18,-000,,000 to over \$28,000,000. "It is believed that it will continue to increase," he stated.

Meet White Deer Saturday night at Plainview

toughest test of the year this Saturday night, when they face the rough and ready White Deer Bucks in the quarter final game of the state playoffs at 7:00 p.m. in Plainview.

Plains advanced into the quarter finals by sneaking by the Ozonza Lions, 20-18, while the White Deer eleven earned the right to advance a round by stopping the Farwell Steers, 26-16. Both games were played last Friday night.

The White Deer team is undefeated during the 1958 grid season, having won eleven contests and been tied once. Stinett, a perennial Class A power, held the Bucks to a 6-6 deadlock early in the year. White Deer's leading ball carrier is Hershall Powell, 180 lb. tailback, who is another candidate for all-state honors. The Bucks' forward wall averages 174 pounds, and tilr backfield had good size coupled

with better than average speed. The only common foe Plains and White Deer have played is Farwell, Farwell handed the Cowboys their only loss early in the season ,taking a 24-22 verdict, while the White Deer team defeated Farwell by ten points in the regional meet last week.

According to comparative scores, the White Deer team is two touchdowns better than the Cowboys. The Bucks will probably be favored by at least one touchdown in the tilt, but being the underdogs will be no new role to the Plains team. Many people did not pick the Cowboys to get out of the district, but they came through when it counted and topped Sundown for the title.

Plains was a slight favorite to knock off Rotan in bi-district play, but the Cowboys turned the game into a rout ,winning 36-14. The local eleven was not given too much chance of beating Ozona for the regional crown, but once again they came through when the chips were down, and there's no reason why the Cowboys can not do it again this week.

Lady Luck was dressed in a Plains uniform Friday night, as the Cowboys slipped past the tough Ozona team, 20-18, for regional title in Big Spring.

It was all the Cowboys could do to stop the Ozona team, and if the Plains boys had not have been alert enough to capitalize on breaks, it would be the Lions from Ozona representing this region in the playoffs instead of

is a prominent business man who inherited his grandfather's knack for operating a business. J. W. Moore, born in Terry County near Gomez in 1909, has spent most of his life in Terry and Yoakum County. He is the son of Mrs. J. W. Moore, Sr. of Brownfield and the late Mr.

When J. W. was about three years old, the family moved from Terry County to Hamilton County near Pottsville. This is where J. W. began his schooling. At the end of the first semester the family moved back to Terry County, settling near Gomez where his father farmed and ranched.

J. W.'s grandfather, A. P. Moore, owned and operated a General Merchantile store at Gomez. J. W.'s boyhood days were spent helping out with the farming and assisting his grandfather in the store. Mr. Moore's merchandise was brought by rail to Tahoka, then by wagon to Gomez. The Tahoka rail center served western Texas and eastern New Mexico. Most of his lumber was hauled from Plain-

J. W. was one of eight children. The family consisted of four boys and four girls. One brother, Weldon, was killed in service in the European Theater

"Defendant would further show that in Box 4 of said precinct that the ballots of four duly qualified voters were improperly discarded in that in each of said ballots the voters marked out the name of Loe and wrote in the name of Trout and that said ballots should not have been discarded and should have been counted in favor of Trout.

"Contestee further represents

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in said general election there were four votes cast for Loe in Box 5 and six cast for Loe in Box 4 on ballots that were mutilated and illegal, and contestee says that all of said votes so cast were illegal and were not entitled to be counted and should not be counted and credited to the contestant.

"Contestee further alleges and shows to court that in the election there were 7 votes cast for Loe by voters who were not duly and legally qualified to vote in the election in that they had not duly and legally paid their poll taxes in accordance with the laws of the state of Texas, and that said persons had not resided in Yoakum County for a period of six months immediately preceding the election and were not bona fide inhabitants and residents of said precinct and that all of said votes so cast were illegal and were not entitled to be counted and credited to said contestant.

"Contestee would represent and show that in the election there were 12 votes cast for Loe by voters who were not duly and legally qualified to vote in said election in that they had not duly and legally paid their poll taxes in accordance with the laws of the state, said 12 voters not having been residents of Yoakum County on January 1, 1957, and said voters having paid their poll taxes in Yoakum rather than in the county where they resided on January 1, 1957, all of which said votes as cast were illegal votes and not entitled to be counted and said votes should be

New withdraws as candidate for district attorney

Paul New, attorney and also county judge, who had been contacted earlier this fall in regard to his acceptance of the appointment of district attorney for the 106th district, announced Monday that he had notified Governor Price Daniel of his withdrawal as a candidate.

The office became vacant December 1, when the resignation of Mitchell Williams of Tahoka, previously announced, took effect.

In commenting on his decision to withdraw as a candidate for the office, New said:

"At the time I was originally contacted this fall, I understood that if I wanted the office and was accepable to the Governor, I would be appointed. From this point, the situation became confused and I felt constrained to withdraw, since it was not thought desirable to receive the appointment under these condi-

"I am very grateful for the confidence and efforts of all the people who assisted me."

Notification of his decision was made in a telegram sent Monday to Governor Daniel at Austin by Judge New:

"My application for District Attorney of the 106th Judicial district is with your office. Resignation of our District Attorney is effective today. It's originally hoped an early decision of

prospective appointee from your office would eliminate burden and confusion on you and better enable prospective successor to shoulder duties of these six counties. Expressing my thanks to you and affirming the sincerity of my intentions, for the good of the district, I respectfully withdraw my name as ap-

plicant from consideration." No appointment of a district attorney has as yet been forthcoming from the governor's office, leaving the office vacant at the present time.





In Bobby Sutton, Ozona's allstate candidate, the Plains boys saw one of the outstanding backfield men in the state. Faught was almost the "goat" of the contest, as Ozona scored their first touchdown after he fumbled a Lion punt. However, he more than made up for it with his defensive play later in the game.

Ozona scored with 8:40 left in the first period, after Faught's fumble was recovered by Jim Doran on the Plains 19 yard stripe. Sutton crossed over for the TD from the two, five plays later. A bad pass from center ruined the try for the conversion.

Plains took the ensuing kickoff and marched the length of the field in five plays. Marrow thrilled the crowd on 57 yard touchdown jaunt, circling his own right end and rambling down the sidelines to pay dirt. The try for conversion was no good, leaving the score knotted at 6-6 with six minutes left in the first quarter.

The Cowboys stopped an Ozana drive on the Plains 22 yard line and began to march once again themselves. A big play in this drive was a 36-yard pass from Cordell Huddleston to Faught, giving the Cowboys a first down on the Ozona 32 just before the first period ended.
