COWBOYS IN FINALS

Sale at Fat Stock Show hits record of \$20,704

All previous records were broken Saturday afternoon when 130 4-H club animals sold for a grand total of \$20,704.17 at the climax of the 7th annual Junior Fat Livestock Show staged at Plains.

Auctioneer Hank Matthews handled the four-hour sale in expert fashion and every animal entered in the show by Yoakum County 4-H club members went through the sale.

The 37 lambs weighed a total of 3,824 pounds, and sold for \$1,624.58 for an average price of \$42.48 cwt. The 52 barrows weighed 10,617 pounds, and sold for \$3,335.83 for an average of \$31.42 cwt. The 41 beef calves weighed 35,805 pounds, sold for \$15,743.76 and brought an average price of \$43.97 cwt. These figures are with the grand and reserve champions included. The grand champions sold for about the same price they have demanded in past sales but reserve champions sold slightly higher than usual.

Following is a complete list of the sale animals in the order they came through the ring. The first name is the exhibitor, followed by the weight of the animal, the buyer, and the price per pound.

Marsha White sold the grand champion calf, weighing 883 pounds, to Investors Security Life Insurance Co., Lubbock for \$1.05 per pound. The grand champion lamb, exhibited by Billy Taylor, weighing 107 pounds was purchased by Lovington National Bank for \$1.45 per pound while the grand champion barrow, shown by Oscar Henard and weighing 213 pounds was bought by Yoakum County State Bank for \$1.10 per pound. The reserve champion calf, exhibited by D'Lois McGinty, weighing 921 pounds went to Rusty McGinty for 75 cents per pound while the reserve champion barrow belonging to Ralph Meixner, weighing 231 pounds, went to Bob Jones for 65 cents per pound. Cote Trout's reserve champion 111-pound lamb was sold for 80 cents per pound. Other results:

Nip Missouri City in thriller, 50-48

The Plains Cowboy basketball team will battle the Huntington quintet Saturday afternoon at 2:25 for the Class A state championship at Gregory gymnasium in Austin. Both teams won semi-final contests Thursday in Austin.

The Cowboys knocked off the Missouri City team, 50 - 48, Thursday afternoon, in a thriller that wasn't decided until the final seconds of play. Huntington had an easier time disposing of White Oak, 61-47, later in the day.

Plains had to withstand a Missouri City rally in the final quarter to preserve their victory. The Cowboys jumped to a slim 16-15 first period margin, and were ahead 31-27 at half-time. In the second half, the local five had a seven-point lead several times, and on other occasions, the advantage was whittled to one point by the losers.

Going into the final period, the Cowboys still hung onto a one-point lead, 32-31, increasing it once again to seven points, only to have Missouri City come back to within that one point again.

A full court press by Missouri City in the closing minutes of the third quarter threw the Cowboys off stride and threatened to change the complexion of things, as the Plains boys lost the ball three times in succession and Missouri turned the mistakes into baskets. However, the Cowboys regained their composure somewhat in the final period.

As the game became close in the final minutes, both ball clubs

The Plains High School Band will be host to approximately 400 band students from neighboring schools when they hold their first Plains Band Festival Saturday March 14.

Entries in the high school division of the contest will be from Sudan, Springlake, Seagraves, and Ropes. Junior high entries are Muleshoe, Seagraves and Sordown.

Each band will perform three numbers in the playing contest, and two in the reading contest. A thirty-minute period has been allotted each band for concert performance, after which the bands will sight read.

Time of the festival is 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and all events will take place in the auditorium in the Junior High Building.

The Cowboy Band will play a concert for the visiting bands and directors at 2 p.m. The public is cordially invited to attend all events.

Fat Stock Show winners are named

The 7th annual Junior Fat Stock Show, sponsored by the Yoakum County Livestock and Agriculture Improvement Association, and held Friday and Saturday at Plains, was declared an outstanding success, surpassing all past records.

Marsha White, Oscar Henard and Billy Taylor exhibited the grand champions in calves, barrows and lambs, respectively, with the reserve champions being shown by D'Lois McGinty, Ralph Meixner and Cote Trout. The 79 exhibitors in the show received approximately \$1,346 in

premiums. The Livestock Association contributed \$666.50 in cash awards, \$287.50 will be given by Plains State Bank, another \$287.50 by Newsom Gin Co., and \$105 will be given by Kersh Implement Company of Brownfield.

Oscar Henard, winner of the grain contest, received a silver loving cup donated by G. W. Cleveland. Lamb showmanship honors were won by Larry Coffman, who received a \$5 gift certificate presented by E. E. Longbrake. The showmanship award in the fat barrow division went to Ralph Meixner, who received a nice trophy presented by Gene Bennett. Douglas Todd was the winner of the showmanship award in the beef calf division and received an engraved belt buckle, donated by Pat Henard.

In the beef cattle breeding show, the first time for such competition to be included in the program, the O 7 Ranch operated by R. K. Field of Bronco, Shedd Henard and Sons and Bob Loe, took the grand and reserve champion honors.

Professor Dale Zinn of New Mexico A&M College took plenty of time to satisfy himself while making decisions during the day and a half affair.

Marsha is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo White. She is 14 years old and she has been feeding calves since 1954. Marsha fed and exhibited seven calves during her 4-H Club career and this is the first time for her

'Sugarfoot' wins gain contest for Oscar Henard

Mr. G. W. Cleveland presented Oscar Henard with an engraved silver loving cup last Saturday at the Fat Stock Show because his calf "Sugarfoot" was the winner of the 1959 beef calf gain contest. Sugarfoot gained a total of 776 pounds during the period from May 17 to February 27, the highest gain that any calf has made during the four years that Mr. Cleveland has been sponsoring this contest. His average daily gain for the 286 day feeding period was 2.7 pounds per day.

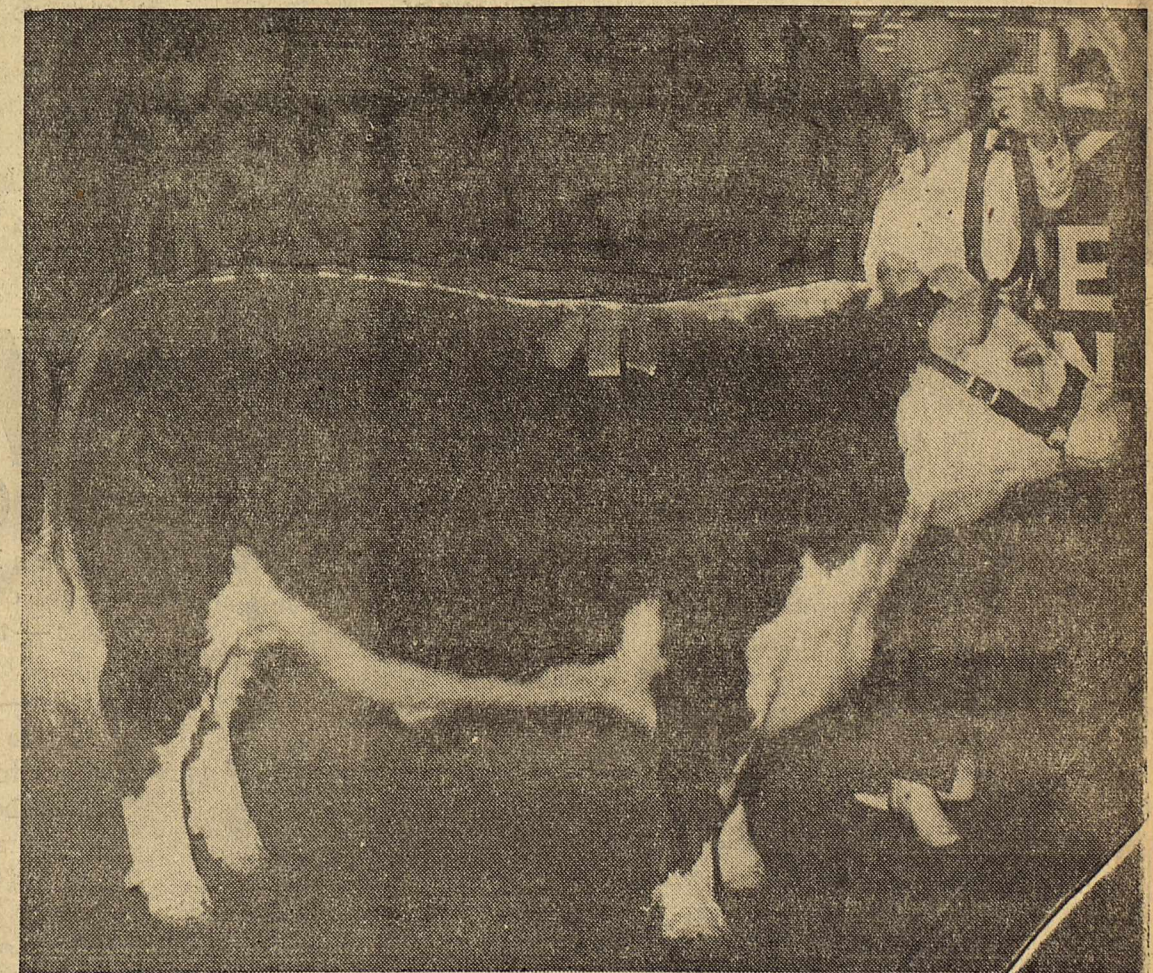
Sugarfoot was born on February 18, 1958, and on May 17 he entered the contest weighing 277 pounds. He was weighed on the 3rd Saturday of each month and he showed a steady gain

all through the feeding period. At the final weighing on February 27 Sugarfoot weighed 1053 pounds. On that day he was one year and nine days old. His weight per day of age at that time was 2.81 pounds.

Sugarfoot was bred by Sherm Henard and Sons and his sire is CC Zato Heir 5th, a bull they purchased from Elmer Lengford at the 1956 Hereford Sale at Lovington. Sugarfoot placed 6th among the 14 milk fed calves in the 1959 show.

D'Lynn McGinty, who won this contest in 1957, was the runner-up this year. Her calf was named Tequilla and it gained 755 pounds during the 286 days. Tequilla was bred by Terrell

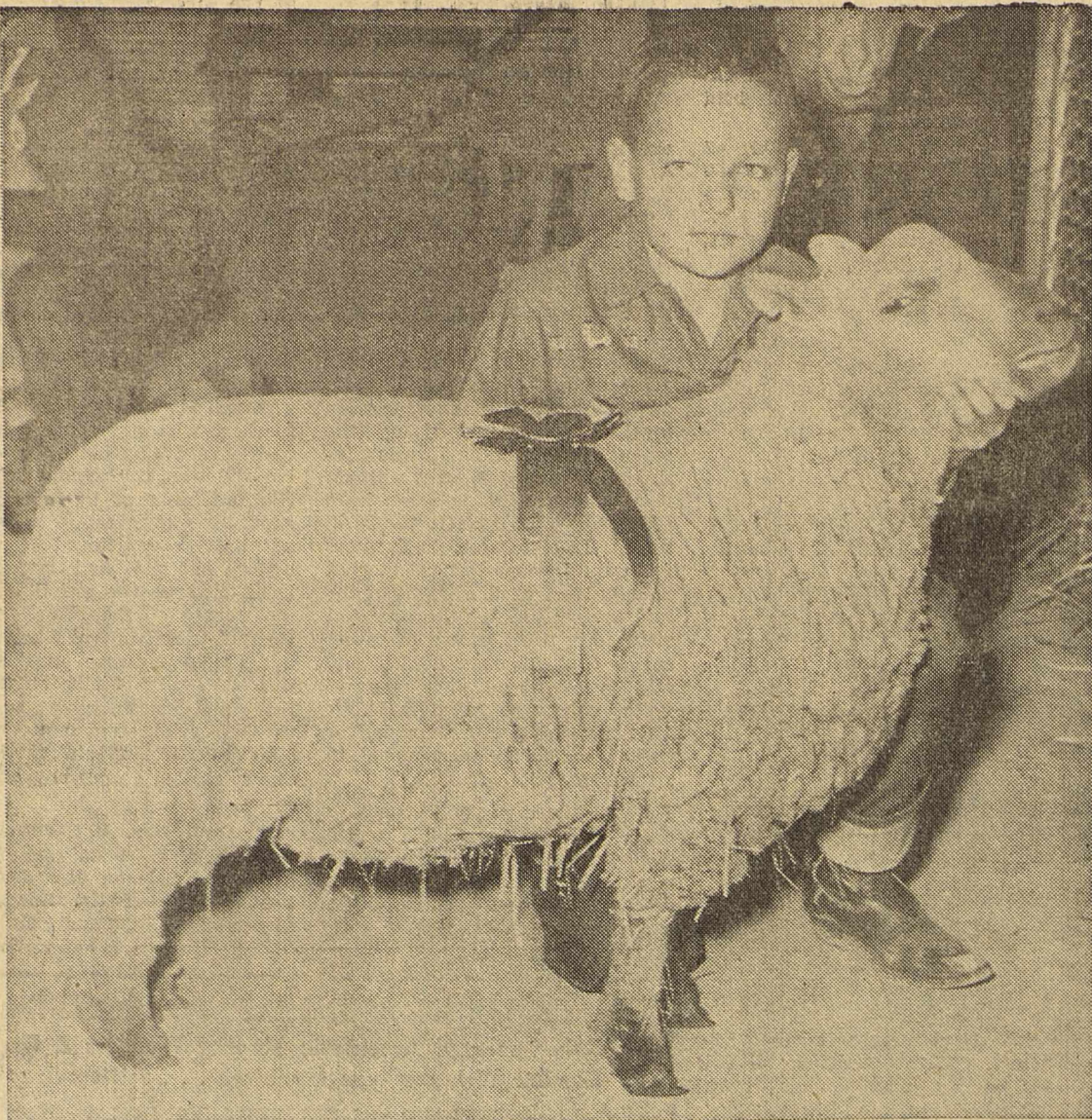

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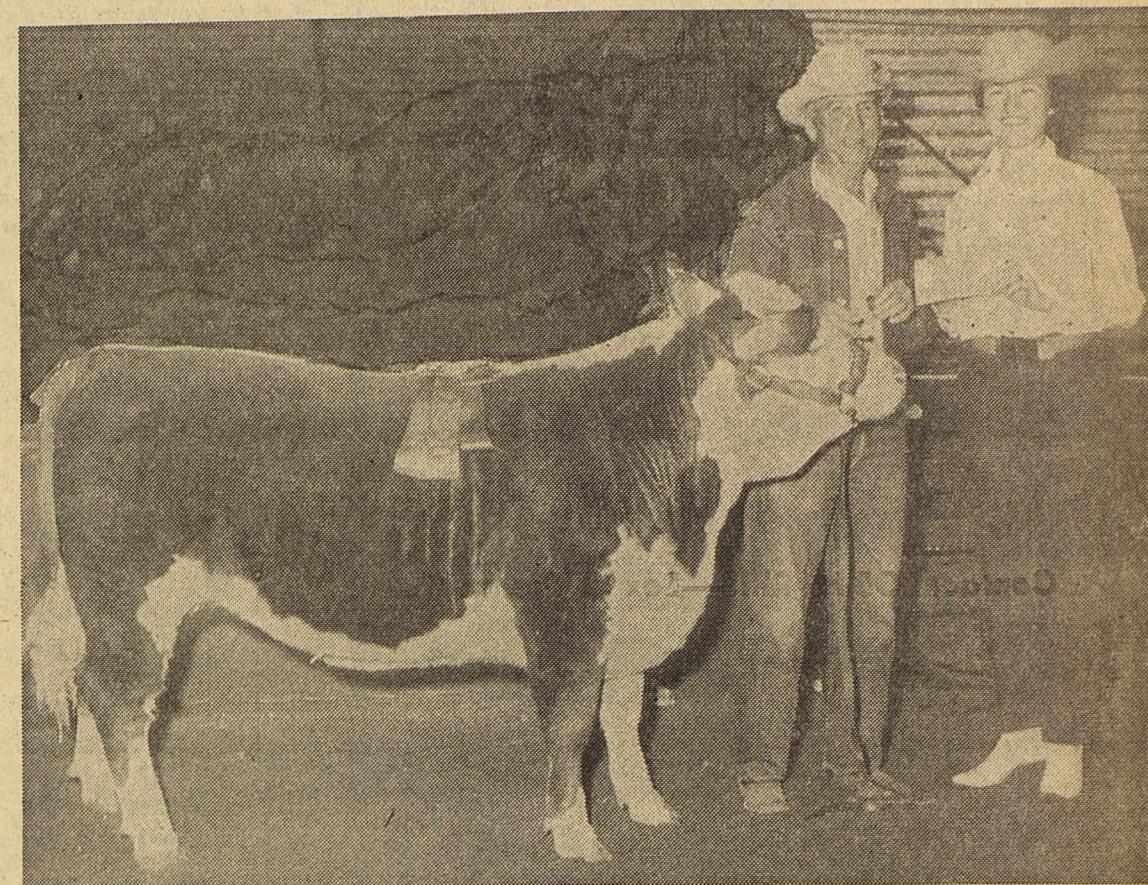

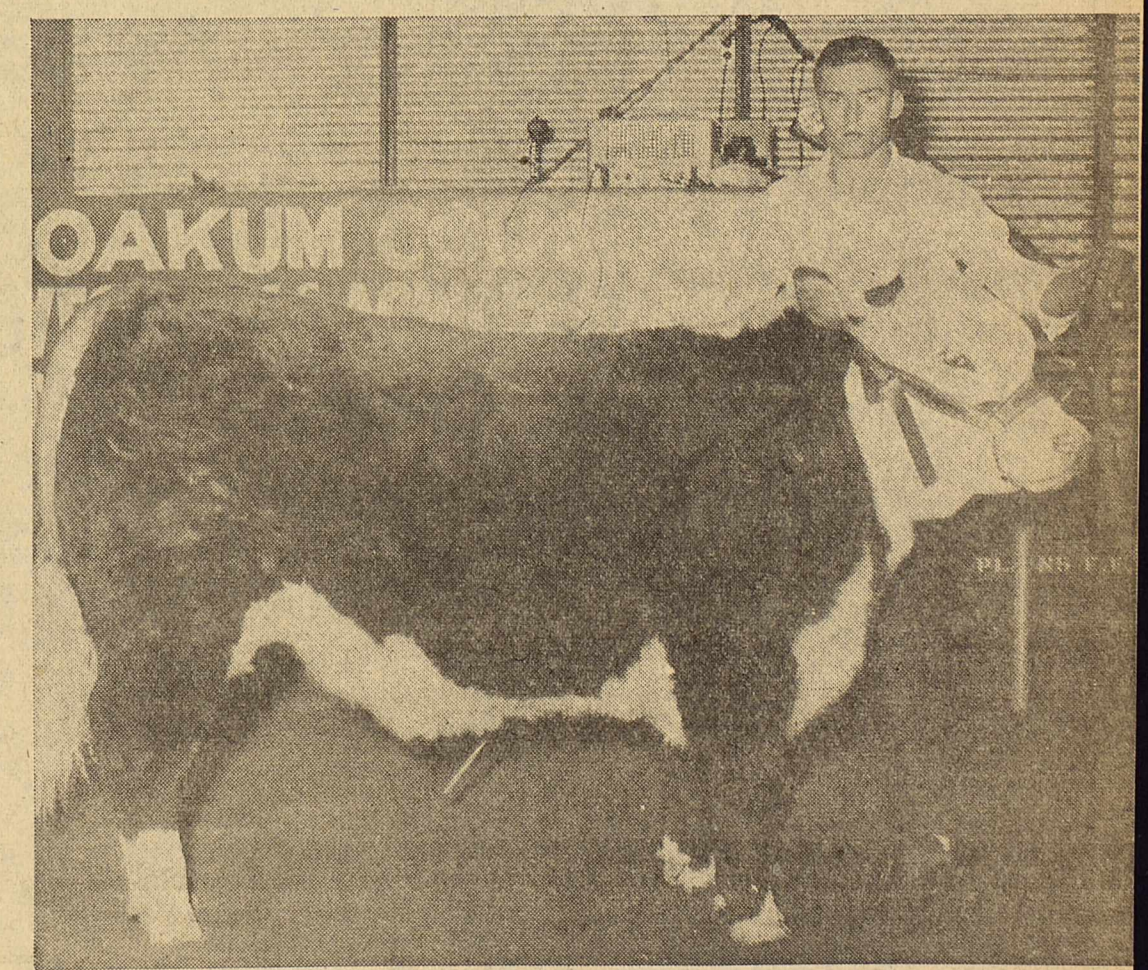

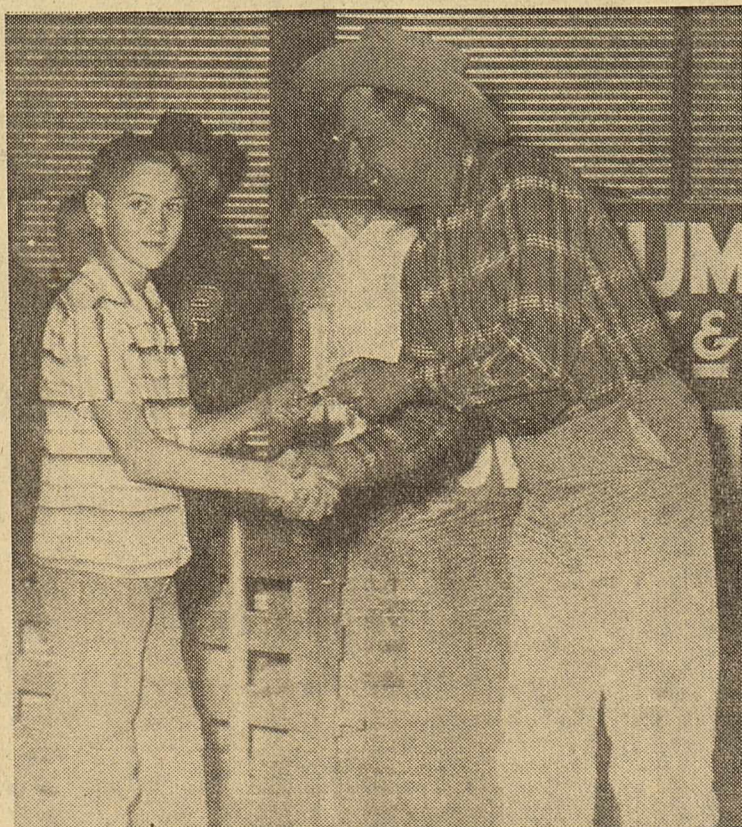

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Post office will issue new stamp on April 9th

The Post Office Department will issue a special stamp in the 4-cent denomination in honor of the tenth anniversary of the signing of the North Atlantic Treaty, through the Washington, D.C., post office, April 4, 1959.

The stamp will be 0.85 by 0.98 of an inch in dimension (Famous American size); arranged vertically, printed in sheets of 70. The color of the stamp will be blue. An initial printing of 120 million has been authorized.

The stamp will feature the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's emblem and motto. The four-pointed star appears to the left, superimposed on a solid dark circle. In the upper right portion of the design is 'NATO' with the year '1959' in smaller white Roman letters directly below. The value '4c' in white Roman, appears in the lower right portion of the design. Across the top, against a plain background, is the motto 'United For Freedom', and across the bottom is the inscription 'United States Postage'.

Collectors desiring first day cancellations of the 4-cent stamp should send request together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D.C. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An envelope must not be sent for return of first day covers. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers NATO Stamp". Orders for covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

The stamps may be purchased at the Plain post office April 5, 1959.

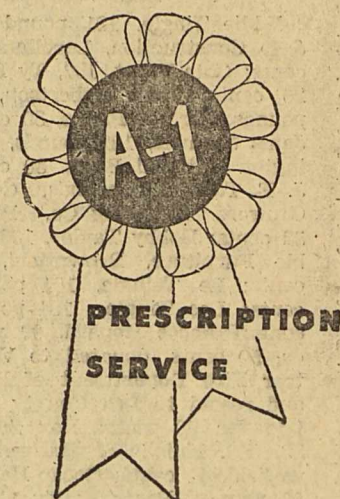

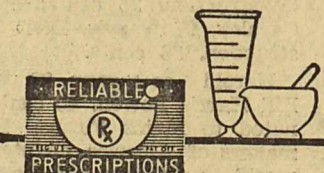

With maturity dates approaching for a number of grains which are under price support in this area, Yoakum County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee Chairman, T. A. Elmore reminds farmers that they should be alert to market prices that enable them to redeem these loans at a profit.

"Farmers who redeem their price support loans and take advantage of price increases on local markets are using the support program as it was intended to be used," Mr. Elmore said. "The price support rate tends to set a floor under local prices. It also protects farmers from the low market prices that usually exist at the height of the harvest season. If the market rises to a point where farmers can sell on the open market and still repay their loans plus interest with a profit, it is better for them to do this than deliver their grain to the government in settlement of their loan."

Mr. Elmore urges farmers to check with their local ASC office if they have loans that might be redeemed profitably. Grain loan dates in this county are: Grain sorghum, March 31, 1959.

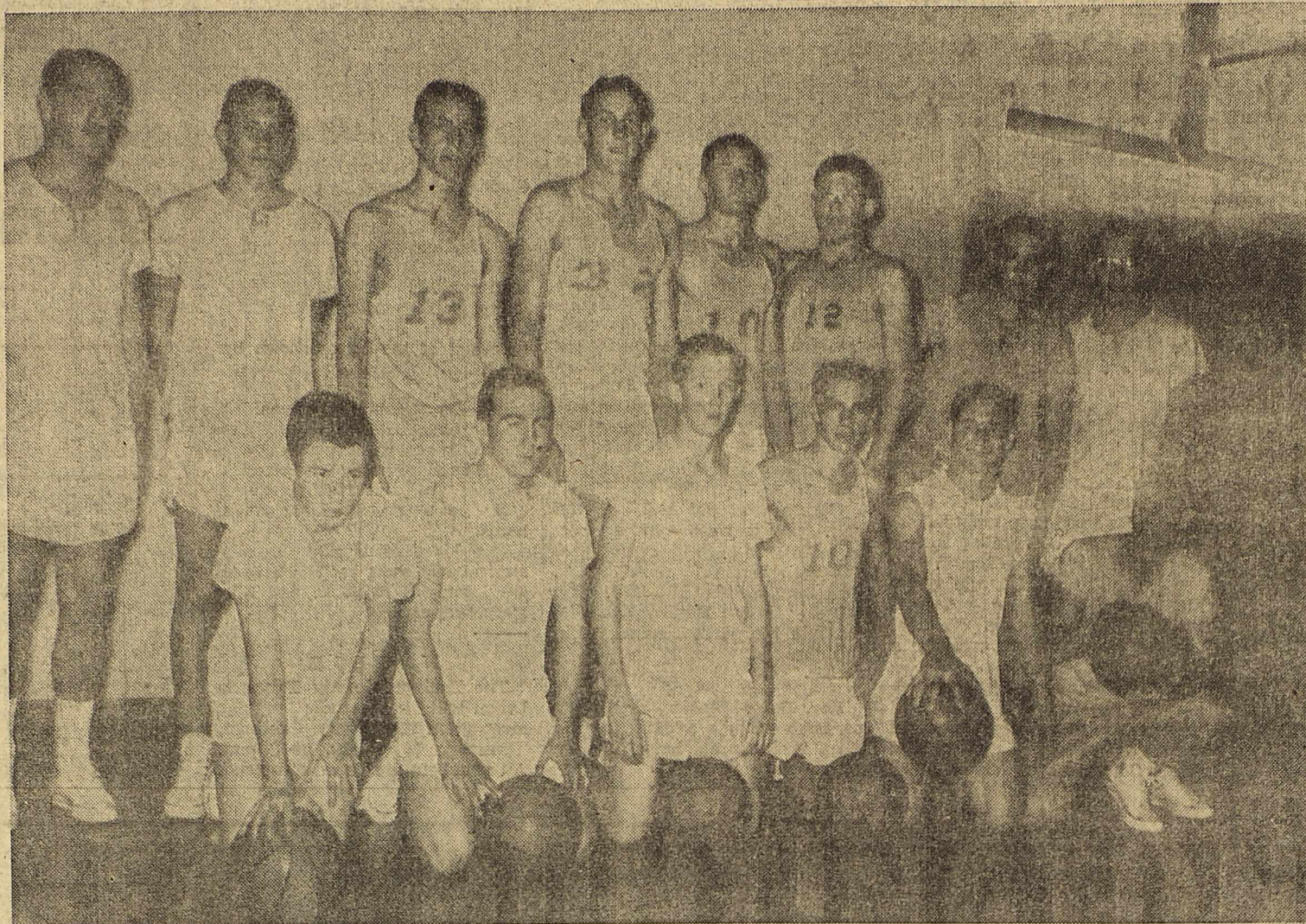

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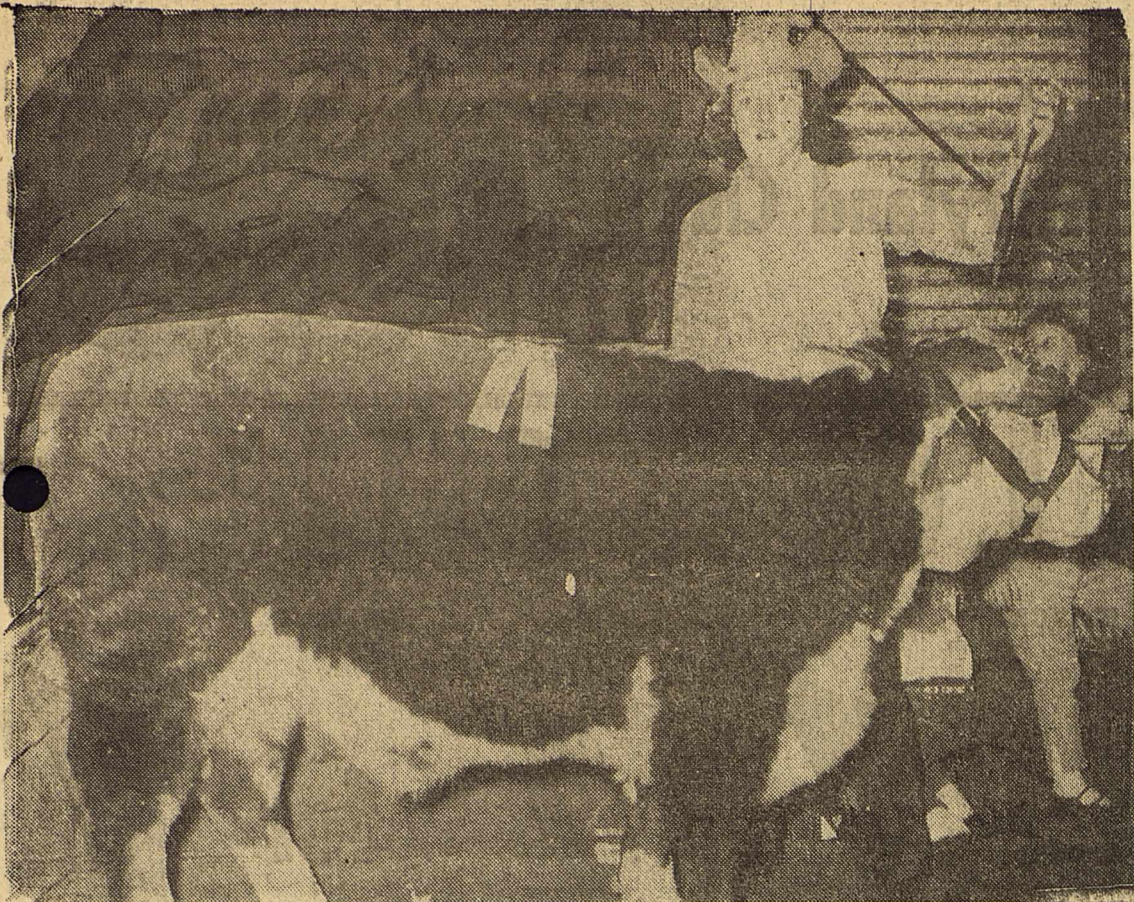

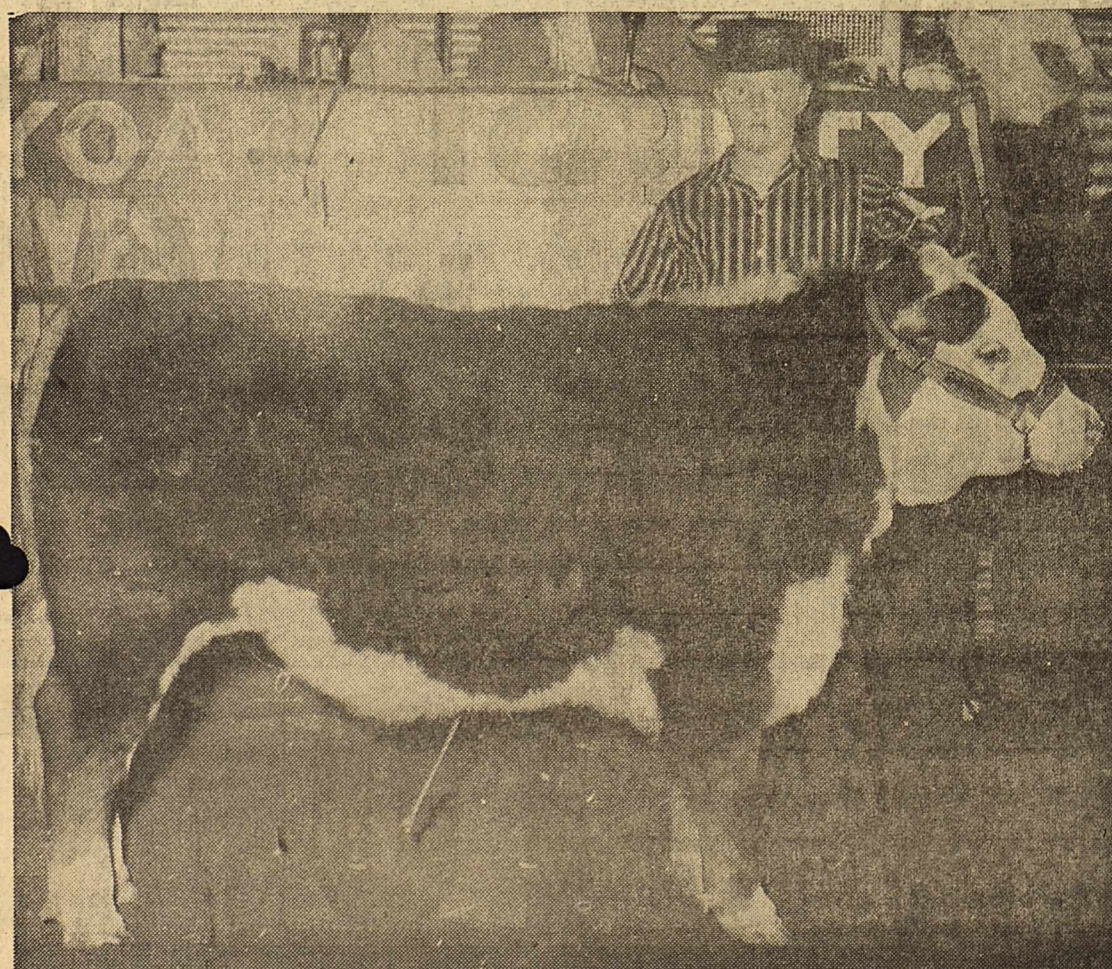
THE RESERVE CHAMPION CALF was exhibited by Terrell Christian of Claude. The 921-pound steer was bred by D'Lois McGinty.



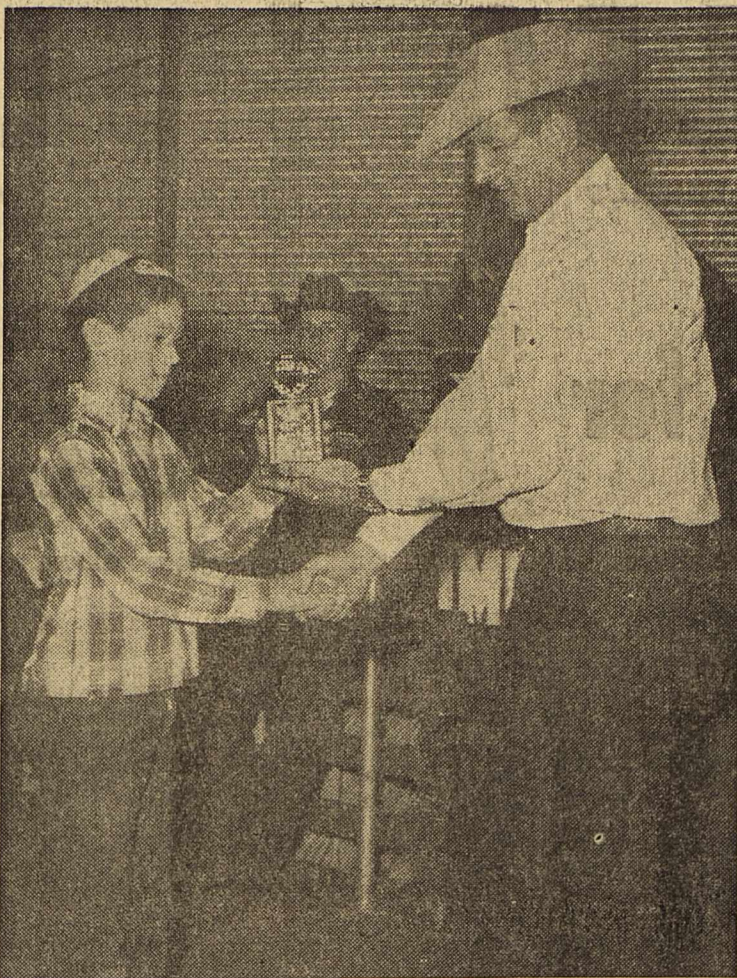

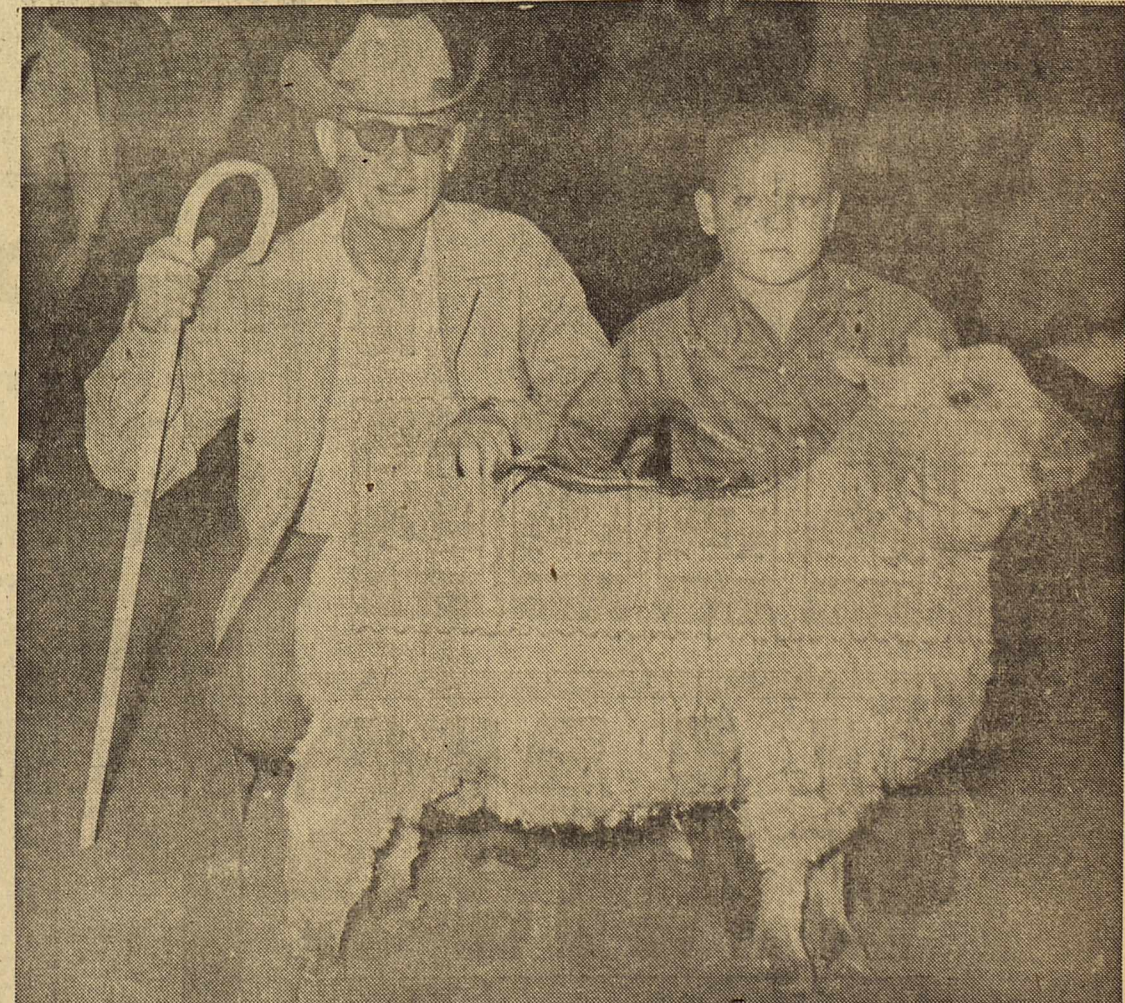

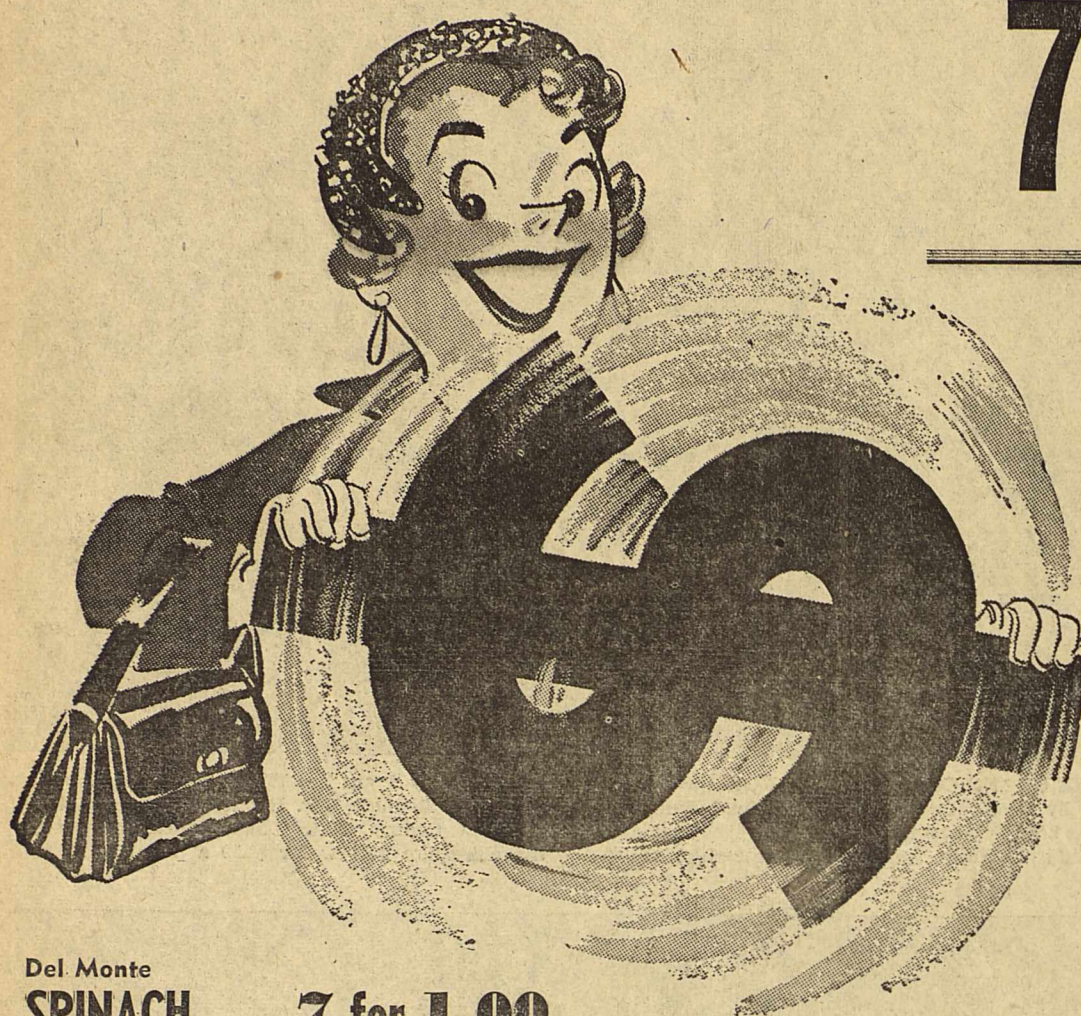
