Sale at Fat Stock Show hits record of \$20,704

broken Saturday afternoon when 130 4-H club animals sold for a grand total of \$20,704.17 at the climax of the 7th annual Junior Fat Livestock Show staged at

Auctioneer Hank Matthews handled the four-hour sale in expert fashion and every animal entered in the show by Yoakum County 4-H club members went through the sale.

The 37 lambs weighed a total of 3,824 pounds, and sold for \$1,-624.58 for an average price of \$42.48 cwt. The 52 barrows weighed 10,617 pounds, and sold for \$3,335.83 for an average of \$31.42 cwt. The 41 beef calves weighed 35,805 pounds, sold for \$15,743.76 and brought an average price of \$43.97 cwt. These figures are with the grand and reserve champions included. The grand champions sold for about the same price they have demanded in past sales but reserve champions sold slightly higher than usual.

Following is a complete list of the sale animals in the order they came through the ring. The first name is the exhibitor, followed by the weight of the animal, the buyer, and the price per pound.

Marsha White sold the grand champion calf, weighing 863 pounds, to Investors Security Life Insurance Co., Lubbock for \$1.05 per pound. The grand champion lamb, exhibited by Billy Taylor, weighing 107 pounds was purchased by Lovington National Bank for \$1.45 per pound while the grand champion barrow, shown by Oscar Henard and weighing 213 pounds was bought by Yoakum County State Bank for \$1.10 per pound. The reserve champion calf, exhibited by D'Lois McGinty, weighing 921 pounds went to Rusty Mc Ginty for 75 cents per pound while the reserve champion barrow belonging to Ralph Meixner, weighing 231 pounds, went to Bob Jones for 65 cents per pound. The Cowboy Band will play a concert for the visiting bands and directors at 2 p.m. The public is cordially invited to at-





Post office will issue new stamp on April 9th

The Post Office Department will issue a special stamp in the 4-cent denomination in honor of the tenth anniversary of the signing of the North Atlantic Treaty, through the Washington, D.C., post office, April 4, 1959.

The stamp will be 0.85 by 0.98 of an inch in dimension (Famous American size); arranged vertically, printed in sheets of 70. The color of the stamp will be blue. An initial printing of 120 million has been authorized.

The stamp will feature the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's emblem and motto. The four-pointed star appears to the left, superimposed on a solid dark circle. In the upper right portion of the design is 'NATO' with the year '1959' in smaller white Roman letters directly below. The value '4c' in white Roman, appears in the lower right portion of the design. Across the top, against a plain background, is the motto 'United For Freedom', and across the bottom is the inscription "United States Postage".

Collectors desiring first day cancellations of the 4-cent stamp should send request together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D.C. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed. An envelope must not be sent for return of first day covers. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers NATO Stamp". Orders for covers must not include requests for uncancell-

The stamps may be purchased at the Plain post office April 5, 1959.

With maturity dates approaching for a number of grains which are under price support in this area, Yoakum County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee Chairman, T. Elmore reminds farmers that they should be alert to market prices that enable them to redeem these loans at a pro-

"Farmers who redeem their price support loans and take advantage of price increases on local markets are using the support program as it was intended to be used," Mr. Elmore said. "The price support rate tends to set a floor under local prices. It also protects farmers from the low market prices that usually exist at the height of the harvest season. If the market rises to a point where farmers can sell on the open market and still repay their loans plus interest with a profit, it is better for them to do this than deliver their grain to the government in settlement of their loan."

Mr. Elmore urges farmers to check with their local ASC office if they have loans that might be redeemed profitably. Grain loan dates in this county are: Grain sorghum, March 31, 1959.




