

A group of interested farmers and members of the Plains Chamber of Commerce met in the City Hall at Plains last Friday night to draw plans for a county wide campaign to raise money for a cotton classing office to be located in Brownfield and serve Yoakum, Gaines and Terry count-

A spokesman pointed out that the government will pay the operating expenses for the office but will not build the building, which will cost an estimated \$70,-000. A pro-rata part of \$10,000 is the goal set for Yoakum County.

Enthusiam has been evident on the part of a number of farmers and businessmen because of the belief that the cotton from the three counties classed separately will be more uniform and have an over all higher grade and staple. Another important consideration is the fact that stripper harvest usually begins about two weeks earlier in the northern counties, which tends to give a grade basis break.

It has been estimated by cotton buyers that a classing office will increase the value of the cotton from \$2 to \$4 a bale and with the 35,000 bales produced last year would mean an additional \$100,000 to Yoakum County. It would leave better than a half millon dollars in the tricounty area.

The contributions are entirely voluntary; however a proposal has been submitted asking farmers to give on the basis of 50 cents per bale on last year's crop. D. N. Taylor, president of the Plains Chamber of Commerce, stated that a number of business men and land owners have also signified an intention to

AF jet plane crashes; pilot is killed

An F-100 Super Sabre fighter man, on the scene just shortly plane from Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis, N. M., crashed near Plains Friday about 2 p.m., killing the pilot, 1st Lt. Barnard Martin, 26, Fort Covington,

The plane crashed seven miles north and two and a half miles east of Plains, while on a routine training flight, digging a deep hole in the freshly listed ground on the G. R. Todd farm only a quarter of a mile northwest of the house. However, no one was at home at that time.

Bob Loe, an eye witness to the crash, said he was working in his field about two miles southwest of where the plane crashed when he heard the roar from the jets. As he looked up, one of three jets flying in formation started in a flat spin to the ground. "It resembled a leaf coming down through the sky" he recalled.

Loe said the plane hit at an angle, exploding immediately and strewing wreckage over a wide area. Smoke, fire and dust erupted some 1500 feet into the air. According to Loe, the plane canopy was ejected while it was





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

Post office to issue new stamp

The Post Office Department will issue the 41/2 cent "The Heritage" ordinary postage stamp, in coils, perforated at the top and bottom of the stamp, on May 1, 1959 through the Denver, Colo., post office on the occasion of the 10th annual Rocky Mountain Philatelic Exhibition.

The stamp features "The Hermitage", home of President Andrew Jackson, and the design is identical to the 4½ cent issue of the regular size currently in

Collectors desiring first - day cancellations of this stamp may send addressed envelopes together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed to the Postmaster, Denver 2, Colo. A close-fitting enclosure of postal card thickness should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. Envelopes submitted should must be properly addressed.

An envelope must not be sent for return of first-day covers. Orders for covers must not include requests for uncanceled stamps. It is recommended that no more than two stamps be requested for affixment to each cover, as it is practically impossible to attractively cancel a longer strip. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers 41/2cent Coil Stamp.

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
