Mr., Mrs. T. F. Jones visit famous caverns

Mr. and Mrs. Truett F. Jones and family, of Tokio were visitors to Carlsbad Caverns National Park where the new \$590,000 Visitors Center was dedicated last weekend by National Parks Director Conrad L. Wirth.

The Center is only one of the recent improvements at the magnificent National Park, combining comfort and breathtaking beauty. Located at the elevator shaft site, the Center provides orientation facilities, a museum exhibit telling the story of the caverns, spacious waiting room, nursery and kennel, information center, restaurant facilities, naturalists office, first aid room and observation tower.

The addition of two more elevators makes it possible to bring 1,400 persons to the surface from 754 feet underground in one hour.

Carlsbad Caverns National Park is unique among the world's caves because of the vast size of the spectacular chambers — has an underground lunchroom seating over 1,000 persons, gently sloped paved paths through the fairyland tour portions, beautiful lighting, additional seating facilities for tour stops, running water, and tiled restrooms. The improvements were developed through the National Park Service Mission 66 ten year program.

The modern improvements all have been accomplished without disturbing or detracting from the natural beauty of the unsurpassed formations which had their beginning as long as 60 million years ago.

Carlsbad Caverns National Park is open every day of the year. Carlsbad National Park Superintendent Oscar Carlson has scheduled the start of trips as early as 7 a.m. and as late as 4:15 p.m. for the summer months. For the photography fans, there are both morning and afternoon camera tours.

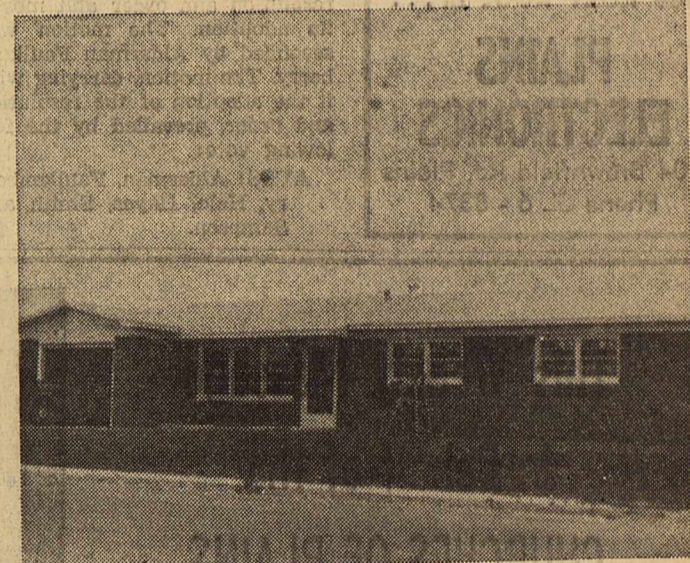

Mrs. O. C. McCan registered about twenty guests in the lovely books.

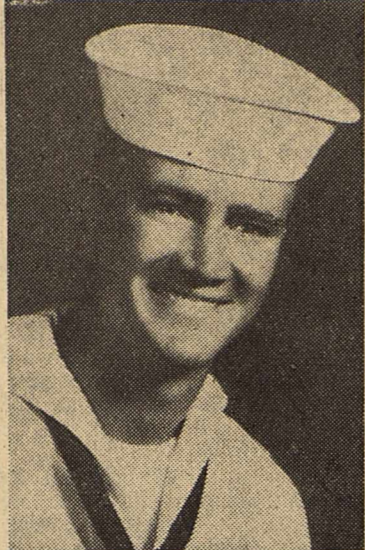

Wills, property laws explained at Home Demonstration Club meeting

The State Line Home Demonstration Club met Thursday afternoon in the home of Mrs. A. C. Stewart with the hostess giving the devotion. Mrs. Alton Billings, president presided.

After a short business session the meeting was turned to Mr. Claud Freeman, Denver City Attorney, who explained wills and property laws in Texas.

Only one woman answered in the affirmative when the roll call was "Do I have a will?" Mr. Freeman said that we all have a preference and it might not be to our liking the way our property is distributed unless we have a written will drawn. The State appoints administrators who look after the property, it's settlements, etc. when there is no will, he said. This is sometimes very expensive to the estate and is often quite contrary to the person's desires.

Mr. Freeman asked the ladies "What would become of your minor children if both parents died at or near the same time?" The state would perform this duty if we do not provide for it.

A family lawyer who is familiar with the family's business can often be of much more help than one chosen hastily or in an emergency and is almost as important as your family physician, Mr. Freeman pointed out.

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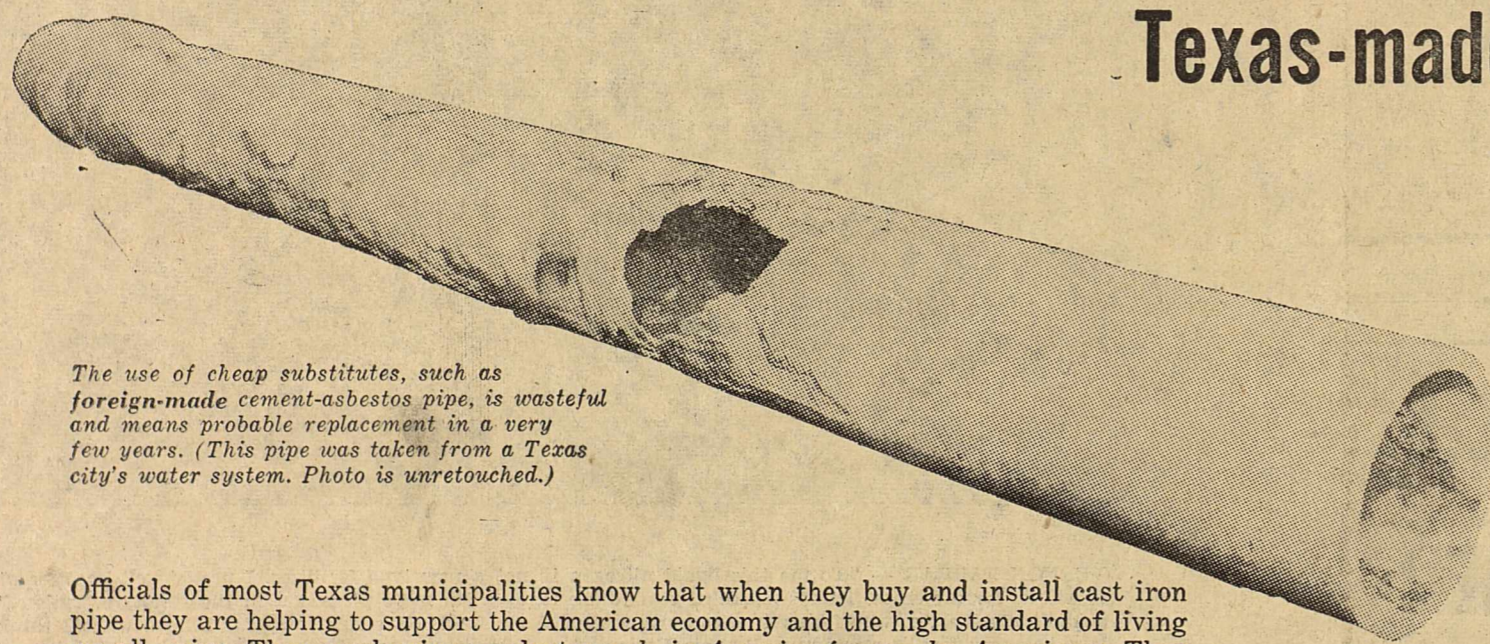

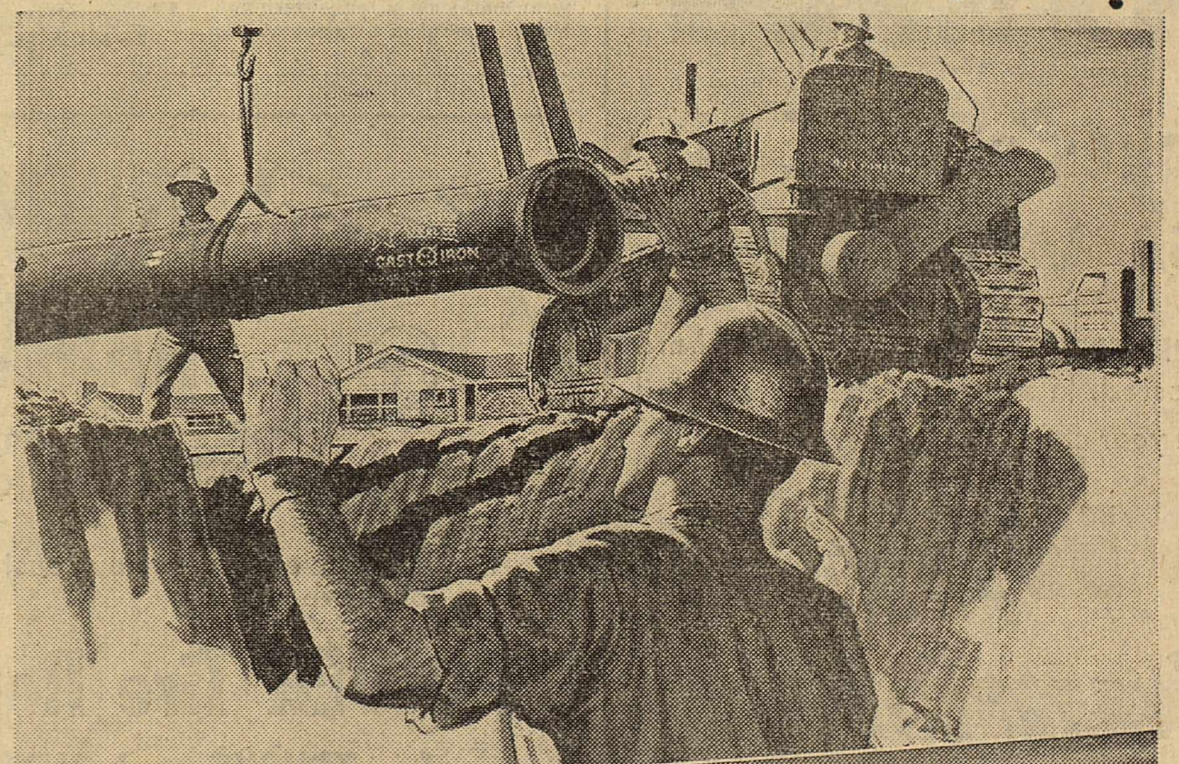
