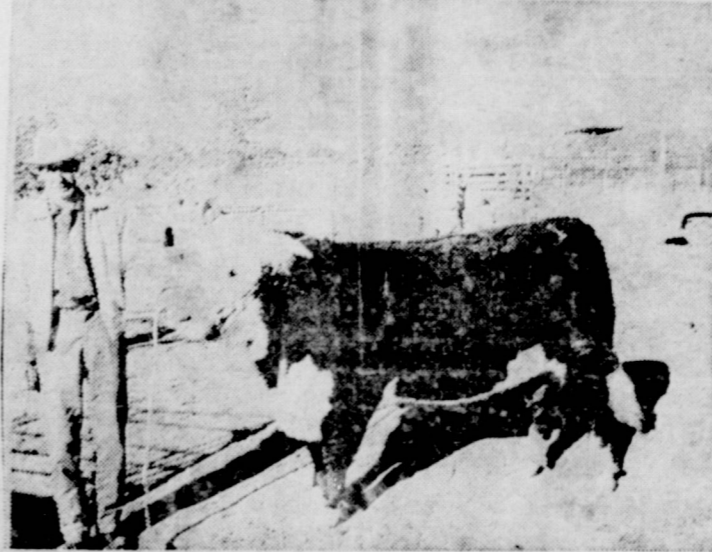
Hereford Sale Termed Success

The sale was held Friday, November 22 at the County Livestock Show Grounds in Eastland. The sale was considered a success according to the president of the Association, Ross Wilson of Gorman.

It was explained that the average was not exceedingly high but that many short aged bulls were sold that lowered the average.

The Champion bull was owned by Dr. D. V. Rodgers of Gorman and sold for \$500. Ed Harrison of Gorman was owner of the Reserve Champion bull which was high selling individual bull. J. S. Floyd of Sidney bought the Reserve Champion bull for \$670.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — Are dividends payable on U.S. Government Life Insurance policies after approval of a waiver of premiums?
 A — No. Approval of a claim of waiver on premiums under the Total Permanent Disability provision matures this type of policy. The proceeds of the policy are payable in monthly installments but dividends cease.
 Q — As a so called peace-time veteran, am I entitled to any service-connected disability compensation from the VA?

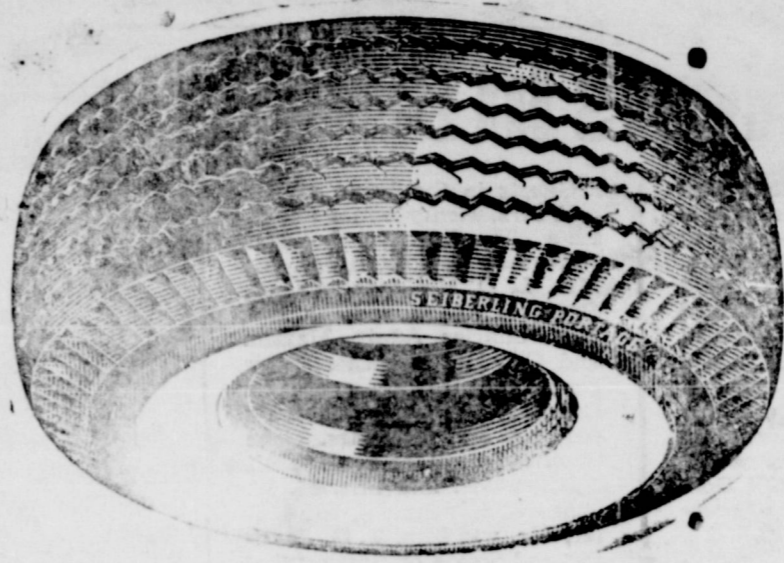
A — Yes, such disability compensation is generally 80 percent of the wartime rates. However, if the disability occurred under extra-hazardous conditions or simulating wartime; i.e., service in Viet Nam, wartime rates apply.

Q — I hear a lot about deadline dates for GI loans. Does it make a difference if the veteran is disabled?

A — If discharged (or retired) for disability incurred in the line of duty, a veteran is entitled to the maximum deadline date for the war in which he was disabled. This means July 25, 1967, for World War II service and January 31,

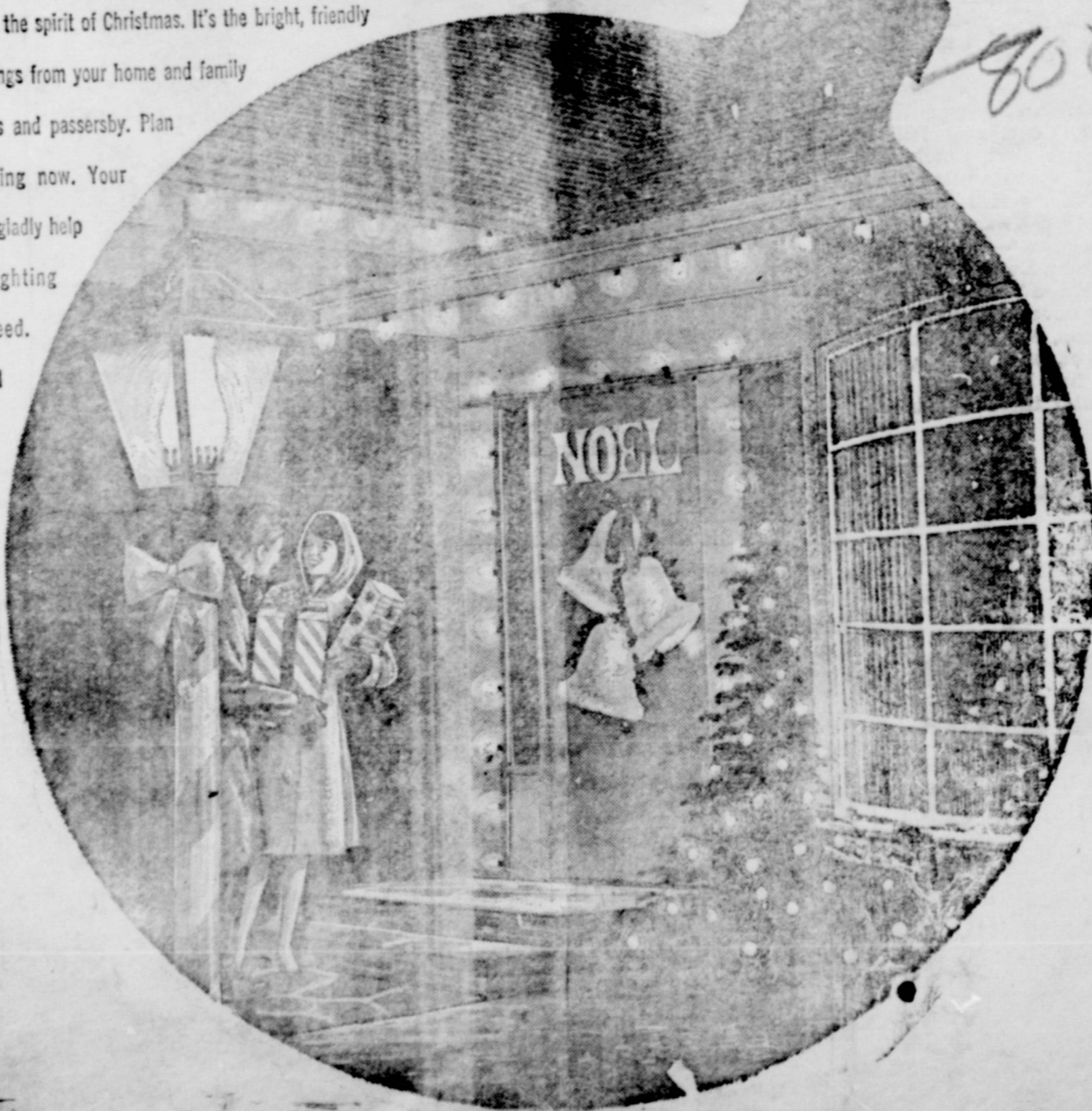

A&M Horticulturists To Judge Pecan Show

Horticulturists from the A & M University, College Station, will judge the exhibits at the eleventh annual Eastland County Pecan show to be held in the Joseph building in Ranger, December 13 and 14, according to C. E. Smit of Rising Star, president of the county pecan growers association. His organization, jointly with the Ranger Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the affair.

The two judges, B. G. Hancock and Dr. Benton Storey have judged the county pecan show for many years. First and second place win-

ners will be entered in the Texas pecan show at A&M the following week.

The pecan queen contest will be in charge of the Ranger Junior College. The bake contest will be conducted by the Band Boosters club and the Garden Club will assist in the centerpiece contest.

All pecans must have been grown by the person exhibiting them in 1963.

The Band Boosters will have the concessions at the show. Entries in the pecan show are accepted from the growers, not only in Eastland county but from adjoining coun-

ties. Growers are limited to one entry of each papershell variety. There is no limit, however, to the number of native seedlings entered.

Ribbons and trophies will be awarded the winners through the courtesy of the National Pecan Shellers and Producers Association in Chicago.

Cash prizes are to go the first three winners in the best table centerpiece division. All centerpieces must employ the use of pecans, leaves and other materials in keeping with the pecan motif.

Pecans to be entered in the show may be left at the County Agent's office in Eastland or in the Chamber of Commerce office in Ranger. Entries will be accepted on any day prior to December 13. All nuts except the first three winners will be returned to the owners.
