Vets Questions And Answers


Q — Are dividends payable on U.S. Government Life Insurance policies after approval of a waiver of premiums?

A — No. Approval of a claim of waiver on premiums under the Total Permanent Disability provision matures this type of policy. The proceeds of the policy are payable in monthly installments but dividends cease.

Q — As a so called peacetime veteran, am I entitled to any service-connected disability compensation from the VA? A—Yes, such disability compensation is generally 80 percent of the wartime r ates. However, if the disability occurred under extra-hazardous conditions or simulating wartime; i.e., service in Viet Nam, wartime rates apply.

Q — I hear a lot about deadline dates for GI loans. Does it make an difference if the veteran is disabled?

A—If dishcharged (or retired)
for disability incurred in the
line of duty, a veteran is entitled to the maximum deadline date for the war in which
he was disabled. This means
July 25, 1967, for World War
II service and January 31,



Ribbons and trophies will be awarded the winners through the courtsey of the National Pecan Shellers and Producers Association in Chicago.

Cash prizes are to go the first three winners in the best table centerpiece division. All centerpieces must employ the use of pecans, leaves and other materials in keeping with the pecan motif.

Pecans to be entered in the show may be left at the County Agent's office in Eastland or in the Chamber of mmerce office in Ranger. Entrys will be accepted on any day prior to December All nuts except the first three winners will be refurned to the owners.
