Local storm warning system reviewed as tornado season again approaches

On May 7, 1957 Plains and the Plains area was struck by a tornado which destroyed several buildings and caused damages into the thousands of dollars. Since it is that time of the year again — tornado time — there are several pointers needed to be reviewed and to acquaint newcomers with the local warning system.

The barometers at the City Light Plant register high and low pressure and should a twisting wind come within 30 miles

of Plains the needle will begin "cutting up."

The local sheriff's department is in touch with the weather bureau in Lubbock at all times and should a tornado alert be needed a fire whistle will sound a continuous blast without stopping.

However it is well to remember that the whistle blows one short blast each Monday night to remind firemen of their weekly meeting. In case of fire three blasts are sounded.

The tornado breeding grounds are Kansas, Iowa Nebraska, Oklahoma, Missouri and Texas. This region is a battleground between two different air masses — warm, moist air from the gulf and the cold, dry air from Canada. As cold air is heavier than warm air the cold usually pushes its way under the warm air. But sometimes the opposite happens and the cold air rolls over the warm air about a mile above ground. When this happens there is always the danger that tornadoes may develop.

If a tongue of cold air breaks through into the warm air, the lighter warm air surrounding the tongue will begin to float up into the tongue. As the warm air rises it becomes cooler and rain is produced and the bases of a tornado is formed.

The darkness of a tornado is caused by the dust it picks up as it dips to the ground. Once it is formed the funnel move along the ground usually from southwest to northeast at a speed between 25 to 40 miles an hour.

The damage that a tornado produces is caused by the air pressure within the cone being reduced so low that when it comes into contact with buildings it causes them to explode. Injuries are caused by flying debris and the throwing action of the inner winds of the cone.

The best refuge when a tornado is seen approaching to get underground. The outdoor cellar furnish excellent protection for persons who reach them. The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is usually safe, as tornadoes commonly move from the southwest and debris is ordinarily carried to the opposite side of the basement. The most advisable thing to do for a person caught in the open is to lie down preferably in a low place. To remain erect is to invite injury by flying debris.

It is entirely possible for a person in an automobile to outrun a tornado if the road ahead is clear over even to drive at right angles to its path. A person on foot, if there is sufficient time, path by running at right angles can often escape the narrow to the direction from which the tornado is moving.

The organizational meeting of the Plains Community Student Loan Fund was held Wednesday afternoon at the local high school. Neil Taylor, principal of the local high school was elected president with Mrs. Carl Stroup elected secretary and Mrs. P. T. St. Romain elected treasurer. Directors named were Roger Harvey, Mrs. R. H. Meixner, B. J. Campbell, Bill Loyd, Mrs. Casey Brown, Roger Curry, A. B. Carpenter and Mrs. J. W. O. Alldredge.

By-laws were adopted by the group and passed. Those eligible for the loan are graduates of Plains High school with a good scholastic rating, high moral character and a desire for higher learning.

The application must be made in writing before the close of spring term. The report on previous semester activities and scholastic standing must be made to the committee before the end of the first semester or at the Christmas holidays. Re-application must be made for the following semester. The applicant must also have his grades for the preceding term for inspection.

Applicants must discuss their finances with the committee and they must work through the summer months if not in school.

The scholarship loan will be repaid by the student starting six months after his graduation with minimum payments of \$25 per month until the loan is repaid. The loan must be secured by a note for each semester and will carry 4 percent interest.

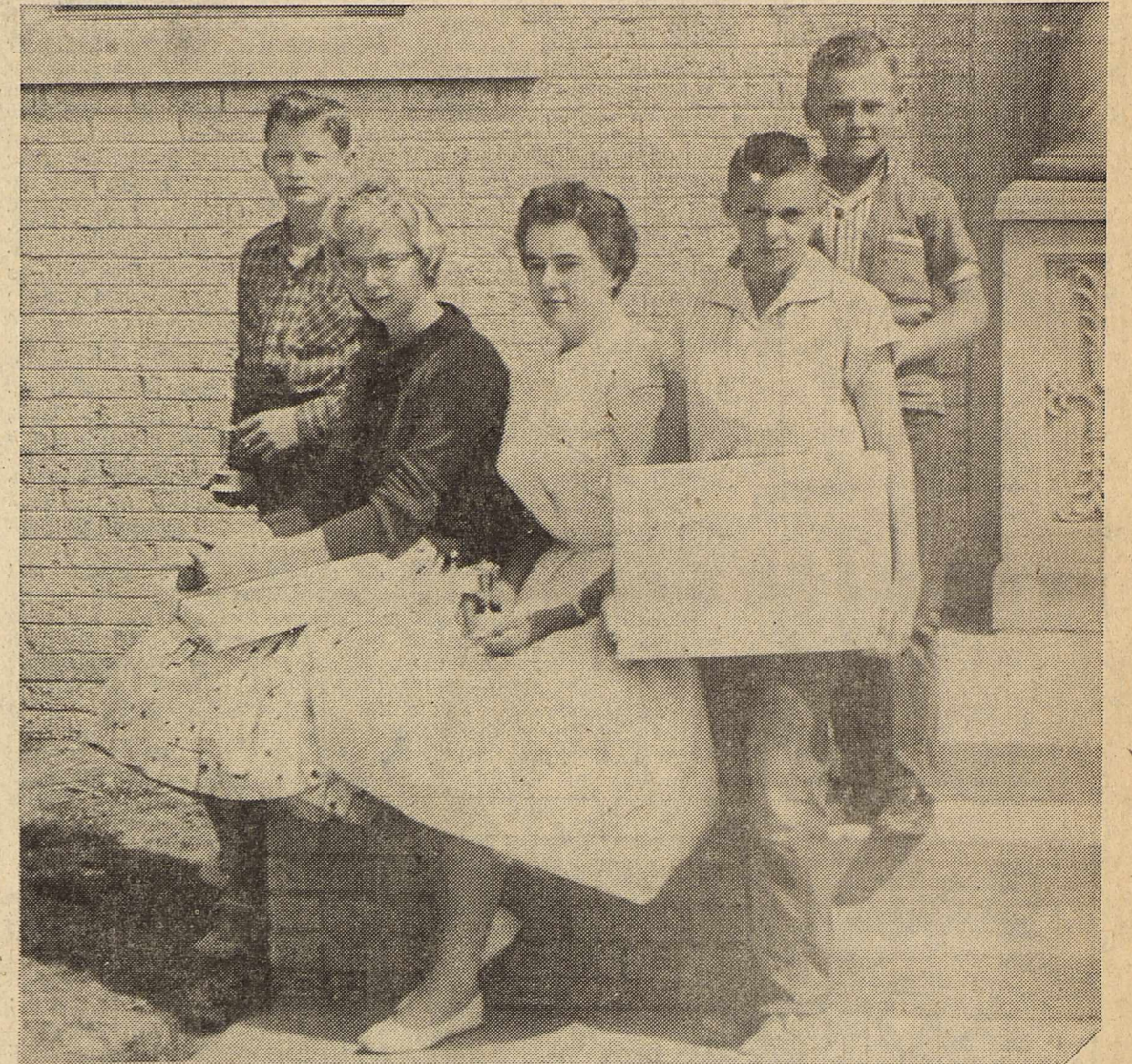

City lets contract on new electric generator

The City of Plains received bids on the proposed new 500 K.W. generator and other improvements Friday afternoon. The contract for the construction was given to White Motor Company who bid \$73,560 on a Superior engine. After negotiations the open bid was dropped to \$70,400. The contract calls for installing the generator-engine and building an extension to the present building to house the new equipment.

Other bids received were from the B. C. Jones Electric Company of Brownfield who bid \$66,500 on a used LeRoI engine, Fairbank - Morris who bid \$80,226 on a new engine and Boden Construction Company of Odesa who bid \$86,959 on two used Ingersoll-Rand electric engines.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Plains, Texas, on the 13 day of May, 1960, in obedience to a RESOLUTION AND ORDER duly entered by the Board of Aldermen on the 26 day of April, 1960, which is as follows:

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS CITY OF PLAINS COUNTY OF YOAKUM

ON THIS the 26 day of April, 1960, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Plains, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

And with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; at which time the following, among other business, was transacted, to-wit:
Alderman Hale introduced a resolution and order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Faulkenberry. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: five
NOES: None
The **RESOLUTION AND ORDER** is as follows:

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Plains, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; and therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 13 day of May 1960, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the Board of Aldermen of the City of Plains, Texas, be authorized to issue TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of making permanent public improvements, to-wit: constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of twenty (20) years from their date and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (5-1/2%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's Waterworks System after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute; such lien upon the revenues to be inferior to the lien securing the payment of outstanding City of Plains, Texas, Waterworks Revenue Bonds, heretofore authorized and issued as the result of elections held in said City on August 11, 1953, and on June 15, 1956, and bonds hereafter issued on a parity therewith?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the City of Plains, Texas; and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit:

J. L. Fitzgerald Presiding Judge
Mabel Camp Judge
Gracie Mac Hale Clerk

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$20,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF AS SUBMITTED IN THE PROPOSITION"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$20,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF AS SUBMITTED IN THE PROPOSITION"

EACH voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the proposition.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

SECTION 7: That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." The said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Plains, Texas,

and published in said City, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

SECTION 8: That all revenue bonds presented in the proposition hereinabove set forth are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bond. It is the intention and purpose of the Board of Aldermen that if authorized at the election herein ordered the revenue bonds herein proposed shall constitute an indebtedness against the City's Waterworks System for the purpose hereinabove stated, and that such bonds shall constitute a lien upon the revenues thereof inferior to the lien securing the payment of the "City of Plains, Texas, Waterworks Revenue Bonds", dated October 15, 1953, originally issued in the principal amount of \$50,000, and "City of Plains, Texas, Waterworks Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," dated July 15, 1956, originally issued in the principal amount of \$40,000, and bonds hereafter issued on a parity therewith. Such bonds as are approved by the resident qualified electors, voting at the election herein and hereby ordered, may be issued in one or more installments but as a single authorization.

Maximum loan per semester will be \$200 and the student will pay all expenses connected with his administration of student loan affairs. If the student does not finish college then the note will fall due and payable immediately after he leaves college. Insurance shall be provided for by the student totaling \$1,500 on a 10 year basis with a company approved by the committee, naming as first beneficiary the Plains Community Student Loan Fund. In the event of death or disability to the student the organization will deduct the full indebtedness and the remainder of the policy will go to the next of kin or second named beneficiary.

'Were you counted' drive underway to end census

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor Earl E. Kerr, Lubbock, today announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe that they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of "Were You Counted?" forms. Area newspapers are printing these forms as a public service. Prompt mailing of the forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

Importance of a complete count was stressed by the District Supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must

stand as official until the next Federal Census, 10 years from now.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to States and state funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," Kerr said.

Coline Oil Corporation of Amarillo No. 1-816 N. W. Willard is to be drilled as a 5,700-foot test in the Reeves (San Andres) field in Southeast Yoakum County.

Location is 660 feet from north and 990 feet from east lines of section 816, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Coline No. 2-816 N. W. Willard is 1,980 feet from north and 990 feet from east lines of section 816, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

H. Garrett Oil Company No. 2 A. L. Moore and others has been completed in the Brahaney field in Central Yoakum County.

Oil well drilling crews in Oklahoma brought up fish skeletons from the 6,000 foot level—in California, petrified wood was found in cores from the 1,400 feet depth.
