## Heath and Craig in race

### Initial plans made for Plains rodeo in July

Initial plans were made Monday night for the Plains rodeo which is slated for July 21, 22, 23. Troy Lane will furnish the stock for the three day event. The rodeo is being sponsored by the Roping Club, the Lions Club, and the Chamber of Commerce. Other civic and social organizations will take part in the program.

The rodeo will be a five or six stage event with jackpot prizes for the contestants. According to several members of the sponsoring organizations, Mr. Lane is well-known in rodeo circles and has good selection of stock. He will furnish the stock and the announcer and clown on contract bases.

Sidelights of the rodeo will be the gaint barbecue which

will be held in Stanford Park. Tentative plans call for food preparations for 2,000 people.

A new item in this year's rodeo will be the "Queen's Contest" which will be sponsored by all civic groups. Further details have not been worked out at this date.

Other plans discussed but not worked out include more seating for the three performances, a saddle raffle, and buckle awards.

Two Plains candidates are in the running for major offices in the forthcoming June 4 runoff election. Olan Heath and E. W. Craig led the way in the race for sheriff and tax assessor collector and will vie in the run-off race against Sander and Wilkerson.

Also in the runoff election will be Ty Field and Raymond Bookout both who are trying for the commissioner's post in precinct 3.

Heath racked up 928 votes to his closest opposition, V. E. Sanders who had 914 votes. Woody Sullivan of Denver City pulled only 624 votes to take third place in the balloting. Sullivan failed to carry a box in the county and only pulled 35 votes in the four boxes in the

Plains courthouse. The majority of his votes was picked up in the Denver City boxes.

Sanders pulled up the majority of his votes in three Denver City boxes with 23 votes coming from Plains, two at Tennessee Camp, 39 in Sligo and had 25 absentee votes.

In the tax assessor's collector's race Craig almost won the race without a runoff. He totaled up 1,149 votes to his nearest opponent Reese Wilkerson who had 699 votes. Third man in the race W. W. Anderson who pulled 598 votes.

Ty Field in the commissioner's race racked up two more votes than the others to give him the lead over his other three opponents. Raymond Bookout received 78 votes to put him in the runoff with Field. The other two candidates, Rod Duff and Bob Jones, pulled 38 and 26 votes respectively.

The closest election in the primary was the county attorney's race with Vernon Townes edging ahead of Claude Freeman by 85 votes. The race rocked back and forth with both men staying within a few votes of each other. At one time Freeman stayed ahead of Townes for several hours but at final tabulation the score stood 1,263 to 1,178 in favor of Townes.

Townes carried three Plains boxes by a slim majority and Freeman carried only one plus the Sligo and Tennessee Camp and one box in Denver City.

Vance Brown won re-election by trouncing V. R. "Cowboy" Jones by 653 votes to 394. The only box carried by Jones was in Plains where he picked up 127 votes to 90 for Brown.

### Petitions circulated for hospital improvements

Petitions have been circulated during the past week to call a bond election in the near future for the purpose of additions to the local hospital. The bond election, if called, would be for \$195,000.

The money would go to add an operating room and other operating facilities to the present clinic and a new wing to accommodate patients.

At present there has been controversy between Plains supporters and the administration and backers of the Denver City hospital improvement group. The Denver City group expressed themselves as saying that Plains had no need for additions and that with the improvements in Denver City the county hospital there could take care of all Yoakum County patients.

Plans were drawn up by a group and presented to the City Council in Plains last week.

### Immunization clinic to be held Wednesday

Mrs. Ann Foster, County Public Health Nurse, reminds you of the Free Immunization Clinic to be held Wednesday, May 18 from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. in the Public Health Department in the basement of Gaines County Courthouse, Seminole, under supervision of Dr. Steve Hood, City Health officer of Seminole.

Polio is more prevalent in summer and swimming time is almost here, she warned, now is an ideal time to get immunization shots for it. Also, now is a good time to get small-pox immunizations that are compulsory before your youngsters can enter school next fall.

Mrs. Fister visits Plains each week, every Monday in the old-courthouse. Regular visits are made to the school during its nine month term.

### An editorial "Dirty pool"

In a pool game when one member edges the ball or tries to take unfair advantage over his opponent such a person is said to be playing "dirty pool." We say someone in the "hospital group" is playing "dirty pool."

The plans for the new improvements in the Plains clinic were discussed recently with the hospital board and others from Denver City, and with the understanding that the two groups would meet again to work out some agreeable plan for both parties.

Well — the local City Council was presented plans last week for additions and improvements to our clinic — plans drawn up without even notifying Plains, or asking about our needs here. The plans also included plans and improvements for the Denver City hospital. There was no discussion, no suggestion heeded, no form of communication between the group in Denver City and the local group working on our hospital plans.

Now Denver City and Plains have had their squabbles and at times one or the other have both been at fault — but this deal was under-the-table tactics, and this play can be laid on a small minority at Denver City. We don't like it!

Hospitals are not things to be given or taken away by the whim of a few people and the need of a hospital or the plans cannot be judged solely by a few "in the know."

The people know — the people pay the taxes — so let the people decide . . . and let the people have a say in what they are getting.

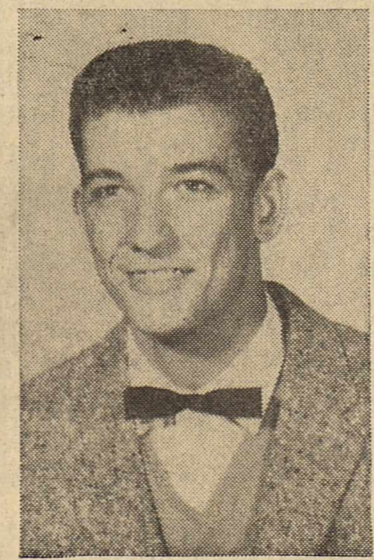

### Water bond election is to be this Friday

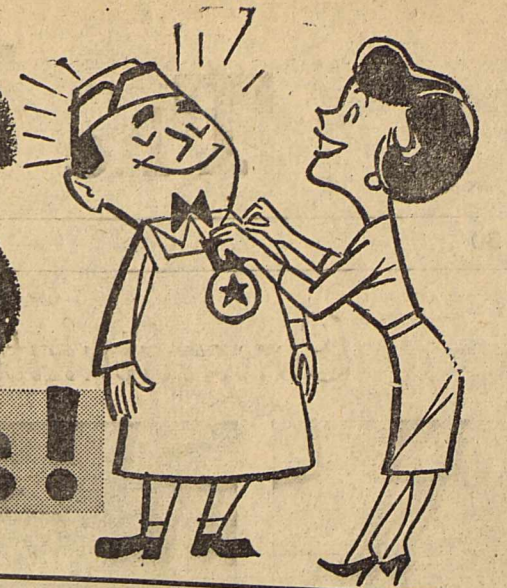
Plains city voters are reminded that the \$20,000 water bond election is slated Friday, May 13. The revenue bonds will go to improve and extend the present waterworks system.

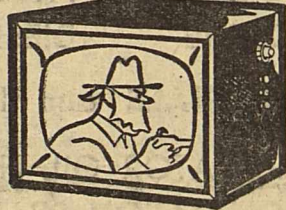

## Funeral services for Matt Williams slated for Friday

Funeral services will be held at 10:00 a.m. Friday May 13 in First Baptist Church, Plains, for P. M. (Matt) Williams, a resident of Yoakum County for half a century. Rev. R. H. Meixner, pastor of First Methodist Church, will officiate assisted by Rev. C. J. Coffman, Baptist pastor. Burial will be in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

The 80 year old rancher was born in Virginia in 1879 and came to Texas at an early age. Much of his young manhood was spent in the Dickens County area and he helped organize the Texas Cowboy Reunion Association. He attended the annual Stampede each summer until the early 50s.

"Mr. Matt" and Mrs. Williams voted in Plains Saturday afternoon and upon returning home he remained in the car to enjoy the warm air and sunshine. It is presumed he suffered a stroke as he got out of the car causing him to fall, breaking his leg. He was still conscious when his son Charles found him, but lapsed into a coma enroute to a Brownfield hospital where he passed away at 8:00 a.m. Wednesday morning.

A stalwart friend, neighbor, father and husband, he was one of the most beloved individuals in the county. His home was always a haven and hotel to people from all walks of life. Through ill-health forced him to stay indoors a lot he never lost interest in the schools of which he served as commissioner a number of years, and his church, the Methodist, in which he was a tireless worker and supporter until his death.

The well, nine miles east of Plains, finished for a 24-hour pumping potential of 155 barrels of 24-gravity oil, plus two per cent basic sediment and water, through perforations at 6,073, 6,079, and 6,084 and at 6,089 feet.

Wellsite is 467 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 502, block D, John H. Gibson survey. Operator has suggested the field be named Ownby (Glorieta).

Argo Oil Corporation and others No. 3 McLaughlin is a new well in the Sable (San Andres) field in Southwest Yoakum County.

On 24-hour potential test, the well pumped 109 barrels of 32.8-gravity oil, plus two per cent water. Completion was through perforations from 5,202 to 5,242 feet.

Location is 680 feet north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 35, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

Pan American Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Mollie S. Courtney is making hole below 4,825 feet in lime and shale.

This East Yoakum County wildcat is being drilled 1,985 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 4, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

Texaco, Inc., No. 17-B Mrs. Annie Miller, slated 11,300-foot wildcat in South Yoakum County, two miles northwest of Denver City, was making hole below 5,425 feet in lime and shale.

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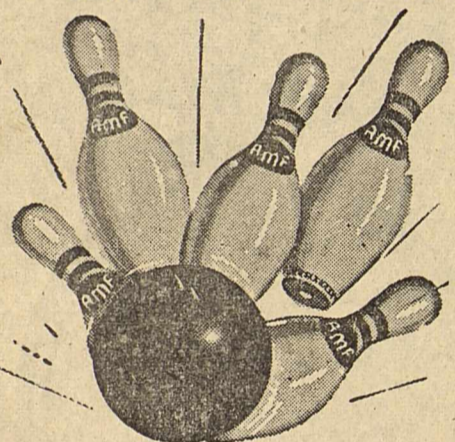

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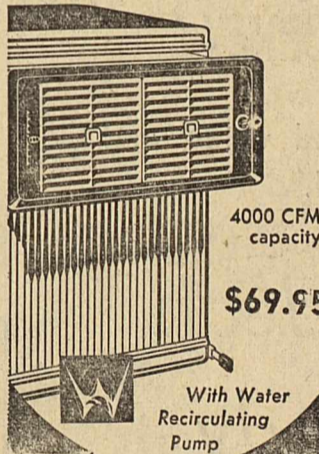

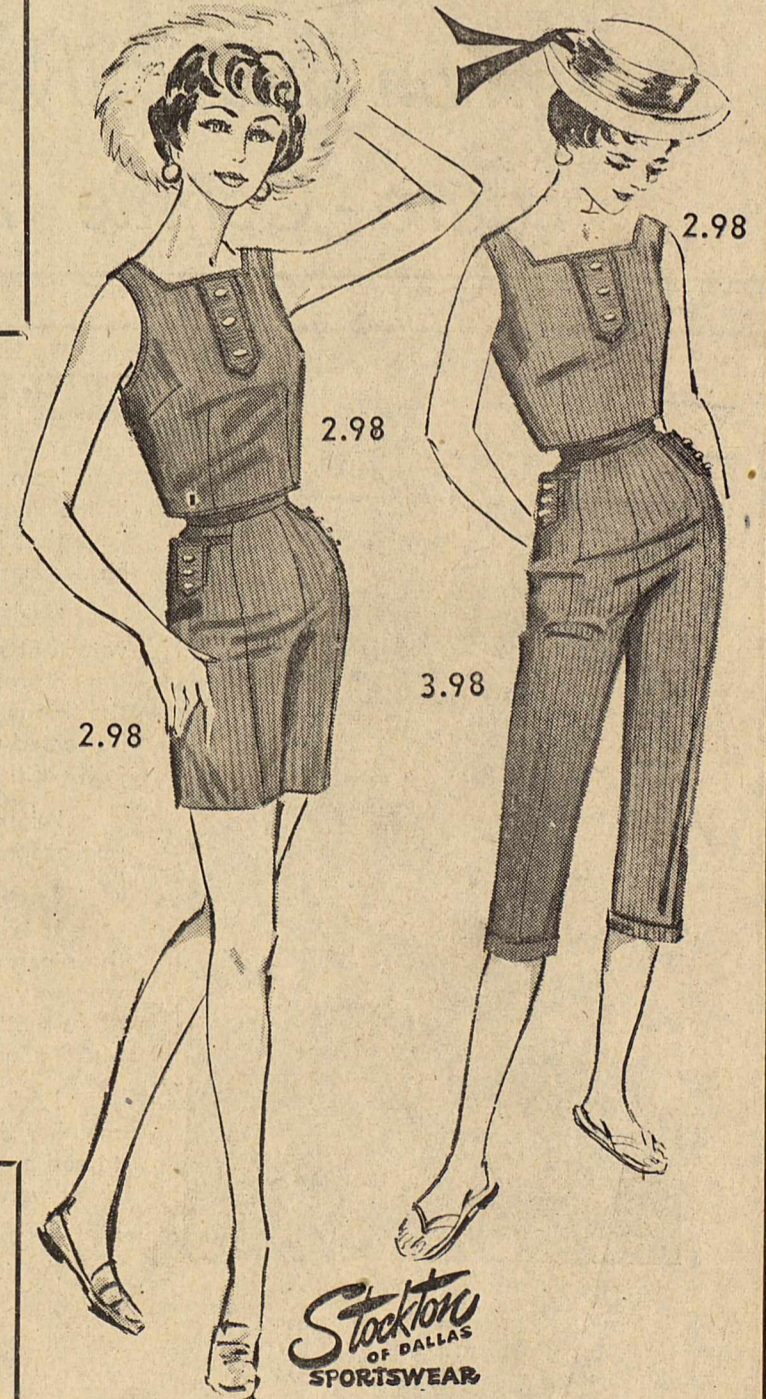
