

## Cowboys win over Portales

Large crowd sees Plains edge out Rams by 6 points

In a nip and tuck game Friday night the Plains Cowboys edged out Portales 6 to 0. Rain threatened but failed to materialize as a large crowd was on hand to watch the second game of the season.

Portales with a one tied and remainder lost for a two season record played close ball with the Cowboys. In the toss Plains elected to receive and Portales chose the east goal to defend. On a kick by Portales player Larry Ward, Eldridge Tidwell caught the ball on the Cowboy's 10 and ran it to the Cowboy 34 yard line. In a series of plays the Cowboys went deep inside the Ram territory winding up on the 1 yard line. A strong Portales line held the Cowboys for the fourth down.

The Rams carried the ball down field making two first downs. A 15 yard penalty against the Rams for clipping cut down their chances for a third first down. On the fourth play a double penalty was called, the Rams were charged with off-sides and the Cowboys with clipping.

Portales kicked with Ronnie Hendricks receiving the ball. On four tries the Cowboys failed to make a first down and Hendricks kicked from his own 30 yard line to the Portales 41. A fumble by the Rams was recovered by Plains on their own 5 yard line.

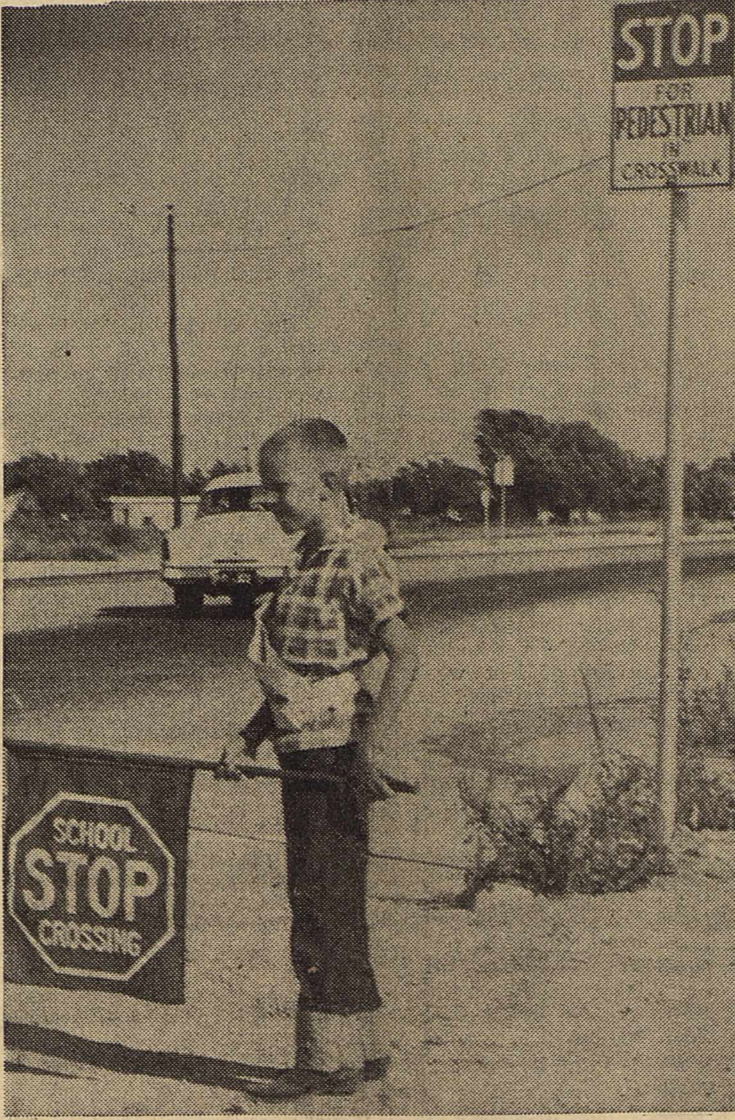
In the second quarter of the game the Cowboys racked up three first downs. On a fourth try attempt Hendricks picked up 8 yards to give the Cowboys their third first down. In the next play Dick Cooke scored the first touchdown of the game as he carried the ball 35 yards over the Ram goal line. A play for extra points failed.

Tidwell kicked the ball to the Ram 10 yard line where Jasper, the senior fullback for the Rams, picked up the ball and ran to the 34 yard line before he was stopped by Sam St. Romain. A drive by the Rams was stopped when a fumble was recovered by Plains. On the fourth play the Cowboys kicked, Ram player James received the ball and was stopped by Morrow, Warren and St. Romain on the 45.

The Cowboys took over the ball in mid-field as the Rams failed to make a first down.

In the third quarter Tidwell kicked and Jasper carried to the Rams 33. In the second play Rea carried for a first where he was stopped by Todd. Rea was thrown for a loss in the first play of the second first down as Morrow broke through to catch him behind the line of scrimmage.

### Sensible

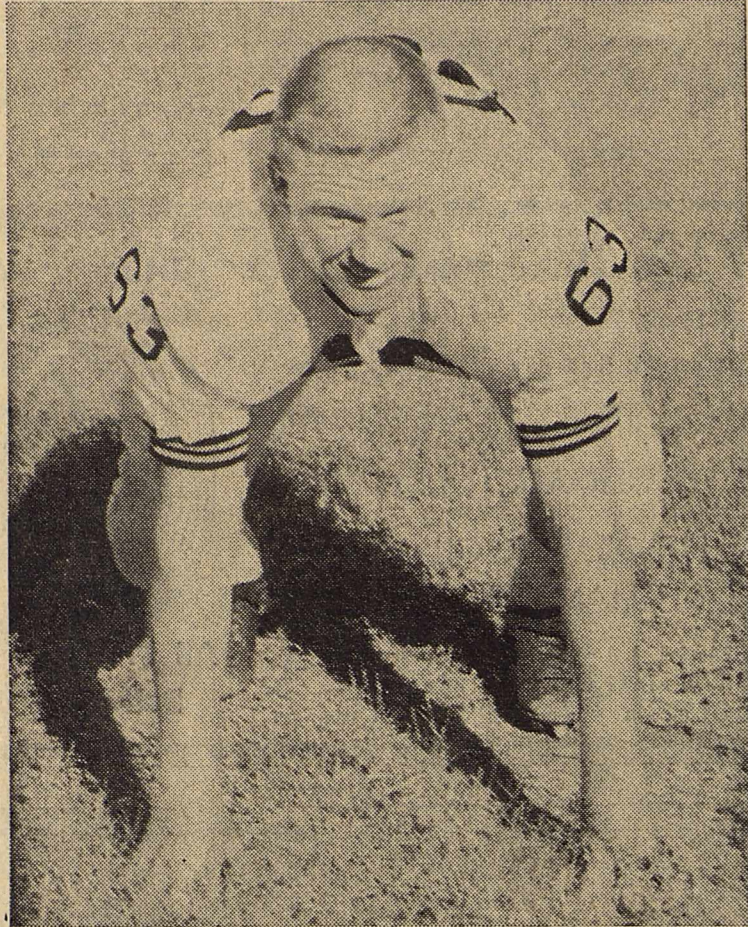
It is astonishing how sensible some people talk; but still more astonishing how few follow out the views enunciated by an exchange:

## New wildcat is located near Plains

Jake L. Hamon has located a 12,200-foot Devonian wildcat six miles northwest of Plains.

No. 1 J. P. Williams is seven miles southeast of the Fields (Devonian) pool and 1,980 feet from east and 660 feet from south lines of section 304, block D, Gibson survey.

Operators finished two new tests in the Wasson area of Yoakum County this week.

Skelly Oil Company No. 8 T. R. Rhodes in a dual completion in the Wasson (7,200) and Wasson (6,600) pay zones, one mile west of Denver City.

The well flowed 462 barrels of 36.5-gravity oil daily from upper zone perforations at 6,215-6,741 feet after being fractured with 30,000 gallons. The oil flowed through a 32/64-inch choke with a gas-oil ratio of 262-1.

From perforations at 6,444-7,417, No. 8 Rhodes pumped 266 barrels of 33.4-gravity oil daily with a gas-oil ratio of 290-1.

Site is 467 feet from north and 1,426 feet from west lines of section 37, block AX, PSL survey.

Shell Oil Company No. 21-A George Baumgart also was completed in the Wasson (6,600) field, one mile north of Denver City.

This well pumped 162 barrels of 32.8-gravity oil, plus 2.4 per cent water, daily with a gas-oil ratio of 156 from perforations at 6,442-6,874 feet. Perforated interval had been treated with 15,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 30,000 gallons.

No. 21-A Baumgart is 2,300 feet from south and 480 feet from east lines of section 828, block D, Gibson survey.

Sur. Oil Company and Oil Development Company of Texas both finished wells in the

Reeves (San Andres) field.

Sun No. 8 Dell Barber, five miles east of Denver City, pumped 119.94 barrels of 33.5-gravity oil daily plus 25 per cent water.

Production was pumped from perforations at 5,636-51 feet after being acidized with 6,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio measured 368-1.

No. 8 Barber is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 887, block D, Gibson survey.

Twelve miles east-northeast of Denver City, Oil Development Company of Amarillo finished No. 2-817 ODC Fee for 157 barrels of oil daily.

The well pumped the 33-gravity crude through perforations at 5,614-34 feet after being acidized with 3,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio measured 232-1.

It is 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 817, block D, Gibson survey.

New Branahney field well is Cherry Brothers No. 2 Argo Oil Corporation. On potential the well flowed 150.23 barrels of 32-gravity oil daily through a 16/64-inch choke from perforations at 5,268-94 feet after being fractured with 10,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio is 972-1.

Five miles southwest of Plains, the Cherry Brothers' well is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 516, block D, Gibson survey.

Five Yoakum County fields gained new locations this week.

Shell Oil Company staked No. 22-A Baumgart, two miles north of Denver City in the Wasson (6,600) area, to go to 6,900 feet. Site is 2,000 feet from north and 480 feet from east lines of section 828, block D, Gibson survey.

Shell will plug back and attempt to dual complete No. 8-A E. C. Brand in the Wasson (5,900) field, 1/2-mile west of Denver City.

Old total depth of the well is 7,006 feet. Operator will test the Gorieta after plugging back to 6,957 feet.

Location is 500 feet from north and 467 feet from west

There will be no signup this fall of additional land of contracts under the Soil Bank Conservation Reserve. W. M. Overton, manager of the ASC office, said this week. He added that program contracts which expire in 1960 or later are no longer eligible to be extended for an additional period of years.

"Under the Soil Bank Act enacted in May of 1956," Overton explained, "the Secretary of Agriculture was authorized to enter into Conservation reserve contracts with producers during the five-year period of 1956 to 1960."

## Slight increase noted in drilling

A slight increase in rotary drilling activity in Yoakum County was noted last week in the weekly survey conducted by Reed Roller Bit Co. of Midland.

The latest report, compiled on September 16, shows that there were four active rigs in the county compared with only three during the preceding survey one week earlier.

Increase in the county coincided with a general boost of drilling activity in the Permian Basin, the area covered by the weekly survey of actual working rigs made by the Midland firm.

Last Friday a total of 226 rigs were counted in the Basin, compared with 222 in the survey conducted on September 9. On a similar date in 1959 there were 339 active units in the West Texas-Southeastern New Mexico area.

There were more units drilling in Lea County, N. M., than any other county in the basin. Lea counted 29 units, compared with 17 in both Ector and Andrews counties which tied for second place.

Crane, Winkler, and Eddy County each counted 16 rotaries drilling to tie for fourth place. The count increased to nine in Gaines County and was held at one in Terry County.

# NOTICE to City TAXPAYERS

It's almost time for tax notices to be mailed again and the City Council would appreciate your consideration of the following comparison of the tax rates with cities the approximate size of Plains. In this table the percentage of assessed value and total tax rate is taken into consideration and an adjusted tax rate is shown.

As can be seen by this table some taxes are higher and some are lower than Plains. In all instances of consideration of taxes one must bear in mind that all towns differ in the services rendered to citizens and to the extent of these services are paid by taxes.

This year the evaluation was raised from 50% to 62½%, however the rate was LOWERED from \$1.25 to \$1.00 thereby leaving the taxes assessed the same. Very few taxes were raised this year and these only where the equalization board felt they had been too low.

**ORDINANCE NO. 35**

An ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large on public or private property; defining terms; providing for vaccination of dogs; providing for the wearing of collar with tags attached; providing for impounding of dogs; providing for notice of impounded licensed dogs; providing for release of dogs impounded upon payment of fees; providing for the sale or destruction of dogs not redeemed; providing for redemption for dogs sold; providing for records; providing for vicious dogs; providing for inspection; providing for unconstitutionality; repealing certain ordinances; providing for cumulation of certain ordinances; and providing publication.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Plains, Texas, finds that the public health and welfare is endangered by the running at large of unvaccinated dogs which creates conditions leading to rabies epi-

demics; and, WHEREAS, the running at large of all dogs has resulted in the destruction of untold dollars' worth of private property; and of many of the inhabitants of the City of Plains, Texas, and thus detrimental to public welfare; and

WHEREAS, the said City of Plains, Texas has no adequate ordinances regulating the running at large of dogs within the City, and it has come to the attention of the governing body that dogs are being kept within the City limits in a manner which is dangerous and disturbing to the residents of the City of Plains, Texas, and the City Council of the City of Plains, Texas deems the following ordinance provisions necessary in the public interest THEREFORE,

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS:**

**SECTION 1. Definitions.** "Dog" shall for the purposes of this ordinance mean both male and female.

"At large" shall for the purposes of this ordinance be intended to mean (1) not under control of the owner either by a leash, chain, cord or other suitable material attached to a collar or harness; or (2) not restrained securely within an enclosure or fence.

"Owner" shall for the purpose of this ordinance be intended to mean any person, firm or corporation owning or keeping or harboring or having control of, or custody of, a dog.

**SECTION 2.** It shall be unlawful for any person owning, or having control over, or having custody of any dog to permit or allow such dog to run or be at large upon any public highway, street, alley, court, square, park, sidewalk, or any other public grounds or public property with-

in the corporate limits of the city of Plains, Texas.

**SECTION 3.** It shall be unlawful for any person owning, or having control over, or having custody of any dog, to permit or allow such dog to run or be at large upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the City of Plains, Texas.

**SECTION 4.** It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain or keep a dog more than six (6) months of age on any premises within the corporate limits of the City of Plains, Texas, unless such dog wears a collar or harness securely attached to its body to which shall be securely attached a tag issued for said dog by a licensed veterinarian, licensed to practice veterinary medicine in the State of Texas, showing that the dog has been within the current calendar year, vaccinated against rabies.

**SECTION 5.** It shall be the duty of the animal warden or any of his deputies or any City Policeman while on duty, to seize and impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, all dogs found at large upon any public highway, street, alley, court, square, park, sidewalk or any other public property within the corporate limits of the City of Plains, Texas, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise.

**SECTION 6.** It shall be the duty of the animal warden or any of his deputies or any City Policeman while on duty, to seize and impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, all dogs found running at large upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the City of Plains, Texas, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise, and such animal warden, deputy or City Policeman is hereby authorized to enter upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land for the purpose of seizing and impounding any dog running at large thereon.

**SECTION 7.** Any person may take up and deliver to the public pound any dog which the animal warden is by the provisions of this ordinance required to impound.

**SECTION 8.** Any dog found trespassing or running at large on any private property may be taken up by any person and delivered to the pound keeper. Every person other than a public officer or the animal warden or his deputies that takes up any dog under the provisions of this ordinance shall immediately thereafter give notice thereof to the animal warden, and every such person, or any person in whose custody such animal may in the meantime be placed, shall deliver such dog to the animal warden without fee or charge, and the animal warden shall thereupon hold and dispose of such animal as though such animal had been found running at large and impounded by him.

**SECTION 9.** The animal warden or his designated deputies, upon receiving any dog, shall make a complete registry, entering the bred, color and sex of such and whether licensed and the place and address of the owner and the time of taking into custody. If licensed he shall enter the name number of the license tag. Licensed dogs shall be kept separate from unlicensed dogs.

**SECTION 10.** After the impounding of any licensed dog, if not redeemed within five (5) days from the date of impounding, said dog shall be disposed of by sale or destruction.

**SECTION 11.** If there is no license tag for the current year attached to any dog impounded and such dog has not been redeemed by its owner within seventy-two (72) hours from the time of impounding such dog, such dog shall be destroyed or sold as hereafter provided.

**SECTION 12.** The owner of any licensed dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to sale or destruction by the payment of One Dollar

(\$1.00) impounding fee and One Dollar (\$1.00) per day for each day such dog shall have been impounded.

**SECTION 13.** The owner of any unlicensed dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to sale or destruction by having such dog duly licensed, vaccinated against rabies and the payment of Two Dollars (\$2.00) impounding fee and One Dollar (\$1.00) per day board fee for each day such dog shall have been impounded.

**SECTION 14.** It shall be the duty of the animal warden to keep all licensed dogs for a period of five (5) days from the date of the impounding. If at the expiration of five (5) days such dog has not been redeemed, it may be destroyed or sold as herein provided.

**SECTION 15.** The owner of any dog at the time it is impounded may, within thirty (30) days after such dog is sold, redeem the same from such purchaser by paying to him the amount of the purchase price paid by him to the animal warden, and in addition thereto a charge of One Dollar (\$1.00) per day for the number of days from the date of sale to the day of redemption. At the end of thirty (30) days from the day the dog is sold, the right to redeem shall expire.

**SECTION 16.** The animal warden shall keep necessary records as are required to show in detail this disposition of all animals impounded and the money collected by him and such other records as are required by the City Secretary. All money collected shall be delivered as required to the City Secretary, who will deposit the same in the general fund.

**SECTION 17.** The animal warden shall file such reports under oath as are required by the City Council or City Charter.

**SECTION 18.** If any dog within the City of Plains shall bite, scratch or otherwise attack any person, the person so attacked was not at the time trespassing upon the property of the owner or person having control of such dog, or if it cannot be proved beyond a reasonable doubt that the person so attacked was provoking or teasing such dog, the Corporation Court of the City of Plains shall have the authority to order and hold a hearing, and if such court shall determine at such hearing that such dog is vicious or dangerous to persons or other animals, the Court may order that such dog be kept muzzled, or that such dog be kept within a sufficient enclosure, or that such dog be delivered to the animal warden and by him destroyed.

**SECTION 19.** Any owner who shall maintain or keep a dog more than six (6) months of age on any premises within the corporate limits of the City of Plains which has not been vaccinated as required by this ordinance, shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

**SECTION 20.** Any person who shall refuse to deliver any unvaccinated dog to the animal warden or any of his deputies or any City Policeman upon demand for impounding, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and

shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

**SECTION 21.** Any owner, keeper or custodian of a dog who shall allow such dog to run "at large", as such term is here-in defined, whether on public or private property, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

**SECTION 22.** The animal warden or his authorized deputies shall have the right at any reasonable time to inspect any dog to determine if said dog is vaccinated as required by this ordinance and shall have the authority to enter any premises for such purpose, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse entrance to such animal warden or his deputies or to impede, obstruct or exclude such animal warden or his deputies when attempting to enter such premises for the purpose of inspecting such dog, and any person who shall refuse entrance or impede or obstruct such animal warden or deputy shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

**SECTION 23.** If any, section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not effect the remaining portions of this ordinance.

**SECTION 24.** All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and the City Secretary is authorized to so note in the margin of the ordinance books that said ordinance or ordinances have been repealed.

periods range from 5 to 10 years, and annual rental payments for 1960 amount to approximately \$163,626.38.

Nationally, there are more than 300,000 Conservation Reserve contracts in effect in 1960, covering a total acreage of approximately 28.6 million acres by 48 States. The average rental payment is \$11.85 per acre, and the rental payments for 1960 will amount to about \$338 million.
