McIntyre killed in automobile wreck

the year was recorded Tuesday afternoon around 1 o'clock when L. E. McIntyre was pronounced dead on arrival at the Plains Clinic. McIntyre was involved in a car accident five miles west on the Roswell highway.

According to investigating officials the exact cause of the accident was not known but witness said the 1953 Packard driven by McIntyre veered into the path of a truck pulling a house trailer.

The car was headed west and hit the truck driver's side then hit the house trailer as it apparently jack-knifed on the highway. The truck apparently turned over several times comng to rest on the west side of the highway. The trailer broke loose from the truck and skidded approximately 40 feet from

First arrivals on the accident scene said that McIntyre was dead by the time he was removed from the vehicle. The driver of the truck, Delecy Coleman of Roswell, was taken to the Plains Clinic where doctors said he suffered cuts and lacerations.



farm employment, if otherwise obtaining the maximum income eligible, may obtain farm oper- from their farms and from takating and development loans from the Farmers Home Adminisration, under the recently revised regulations of the agency. Eddie T. Taylor, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Yoakum County, said the new regulation went into effect October 1. Previously, except in rural development counties a farmer had to spend most of his time farming in order to qualify for a loan.

Experience gained in rural development counties has shown that many farmers who are regularly employed off the farm can profitably use the Farmers Home Administration's credit facilities to increase the farm portions of their total incomes. The regulation, which had limited credit assistance to farmers

Farmers who have regular off- farming, prevented some from ing advantage of opportunities for industrial and other off-farm employment.

> Other eligibility requirements remain unchanged. Applicants must have sufficient farm experience to carry on sound farm operations, must need credit, and be unable to obtain financial assistance from other sources. As in the past, credit will be extended only to operations of farms that are family-type size or smaller. No loan will be made unless a plan for the coming year's farming operations shows that income from the farm and other sources will be large enough to enable the farm family to have a reasonable standard of living, pay debts, and have an adequate reserve for emer-

Loan funds may be used to pay farm operating costs, purchase equipment and livestock,

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pay farm development costs, and refinance certain debts. The interest rate is five percent. Repayment schedules depend upon the purposes for which funds are advanced and upon the estimated incomes from the farms. Usually, loans made for real estate purposes will be from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Technical farm and money management assistance is supplied to each borrower to the extent necessary.

The Farmers Home Administration office serving Yoakum County is located in the Old Courthouse Buildng, Plains. The agency also supplies credit for farm housing and soil and water conservation.

Mid-Continent Oil Company will drill No. Mary Hamilton in the Ownby (Upper Clear Fork) area of East Yoakum County, eight miles east of Plains. It is contracted to 7,-

PATENTS

A priblic service feature of the State Bar of Texas

Much of our nation's strength rests upon the brains and ingenuity of our scientists and inventors. Our Constitution and the patent laws aim to give them rights in their inventions and to encourage them to pour out new labor - saving devices.

You may have good, useful ideas, but never do much about them. You can patent your new useful process, machine, position of matter, or an improvement in any one of them. However, your patent application must be completed and filed in the United States Patent Office within one year after the first sale or first public knowledge or use of your device or process. If your application is not on file within one year you forfeit your right to a patent.

You may not know how to protect your rights while perfecting and patenting such items. Under our patent laws, the one who first conceives a new invention is entitled to a patent on it. If claims conflict, the patent office and the courts try to find for their splendid cooperation out who first had the idea, not who first sought a patent.

Of course, apply for a patent as soon as you can, but protect yourself while you make your drawings, plans, and such tests as you need to perfect your patent. As soon as you can, write out and date the facts, describe and sketch your invention, if possible. Have two persons, whom you can call on as witnesses, note the date and state on the statement that they have read and understood the statements and drawings. Retain the witnessed statement and drawings, and witnesses will evidence

You will thus set up a date showing when you first got your idea. After you do that, go on with your work, perfect your idea, and apply for a patent as soon as you can.

In applying for a patent, you may file and prosecute your own case or you may be represented by someone authorized to practice before the Patent

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
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
