## Whitaker named head chamber of commerce

For Fifth Consecutive Year

### Plains Takes UIL Crown Again

For the fifth consecutive year, Plains High School took top honors in the University Interscholastic League contests held here Saturday. Plains now has won first place every year since it started competing in district 5-A.

The locals piled up 166 points to give them a comfortable margin over second-place Seagraves which had an even 100. O'Donnell was third with 52 points. Freshman had 32 and Sundown got just 5.

In the elementary division, however, Plains lost out for the first time. After four consecutive years on top, Plains was edged by Seagraves for the top spot. But the locals were a close second.

### Group Elects Officers for New Year

Archie Whitaker was elected president of the Plains Chamber of Commerce at the annual election held Tuesday in the Clubroom. Whitaker assumed duties of the office immediately, succeeding Roy Edwards as head of the organization.

Other officers elected included J. E. Cooke, vice president; Mollie Courtney, secretary, and P. W. St. Romain, treasurer.

Five new board members also were elected. These included J. S. Wagley, Dr. Bill McCollough, Dr. Clyde Lynn, Neil Taylor and Gayle Craft. All were elected to two-year terms except Craft, who was selected to finish the unexpired term of Jerry Smith.

The new president announced immediately that an extensive effort would be made to enlist new members.

It was pointed out during the meeting that Chamber of Commerce income on its present basis is not sufficient to operate the organization. "Expenses run about \$165 to \$175 per month," said Edwards, "and income has dwindled to less than half this amount."

The C-C has been able to keep in operation because of surplus built up after last summer's rodeo. This money is now exhausted.

Whitaker said he hoped to get quite a few more members. "We'll go after small businesses, those which can contribute only a few dollars a year," he said.

Mrs. Courtney will assume the secretarial duties within the next few days. She will manage the C-C office. The new secretary will take over the duties now handled by Mrs. Emery Longbrake, who is moving from Plains.

Several matters were discussed during Tuesday's meeting. The group received word that the Yoakum County Roping Club is making plans for another rodeo this summer. Reports on the street lighting and street marking projects also were heard.

The new president will make committee appointments and commence work soon on other phases of the annual banquet, which probably will be held in the very near future.

## Plains Records Amazing Growth Mark in 1950s

Plains was the 37th fastest growing city in Texas during the decade between 1950 and 1960, according to information released this week by the Texas Municipal League.

The county seat city of Yoakum County increased its population from 480 in 1950 to 1,195 in 1960, a whopping 117 per cent increase.

Forty-seven Texas cities more than doubled their population during the 10-year period, but only nine had a 1950 census figure lower than Plains.

This spectacular rise in popu-

lation for Plains moved the City into 473rd place in the state. In 1950, Plains was not listed in the top 1,000.

The Municipal League report stated that virtually all growth in population during the 1950's took place in five geographical areas. These areas included the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area, the Gulf Coast

area, the area following the Balcones fault line, the West Texas Permian Basin and the Western half of the Panhandle of the state. Isolated areas which experienced big growth

were Abilene, El Paso, Tyler and Wichita Falls.

Fastest growing city in the state was Irving, a Dallas suburb, which increased from 2,621 in 1950 to 45,985 in 1960. In fact, the top 10 were all in the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area.

Fastest growing city in West Texas was Andrews, which jumped from 202nd to 91st in the state standing on the strength of a population increase from 3,294 to 11,135. Andrews was the 16th fastest growing

## Plains Man Dies In Auto Wreck

A 44-year-old Plains man was killed early Friday in an accident at the outskirts of the city.

Johnnie Bernard (Cotton) Brown apparently died instantly after the car he was driving went out of control and plunged into a barbed wire fence. Deputy Sheriff Olan Heath said the automobile tore up one-tenth of a mile of fence as it cut a path along the fence row.

Injured in the accident was W.R. (Dub) Nelms, 26. He was admitted to the Yoakum County Hospital in Denver City with a back injury and lacerations.

The accident, which occurred at 2:45 a.m. Friday on a rain-soaked stretch of the Bronco highway, accounted for the County's fifth traffic fatality of 1961, three more than were recorded during the entire year of 1960.

Brown was employed by Scott's Gold Service Station in Plains. He had lived in Plains for about five years and at one time was in business here. He formerly worked for the Texaco station.

Funeral services were held in Gatesville. Survivors include

his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Brown of Gatesville, and a brother, J. W. (Casey) Brown also of Gatesville, a former Plains businessman.

## Wreck Kills Lubbock Man Here Monday

A grinding two-truck collision Monday night resulted in the fourth traffic fatality in the Plains area in the past three weeks.

Killed instantly was Ralph E. King, 31, of Lubbock. King was an auto parts salesman who covered the Plains area. He was known by several here.

King was traveling east on the Bronco highway when his van-type truck collided with a grain truck driven by Howard Linton, 33, of Dallas. Both vehicles were badly damaged. Linton was not injured.

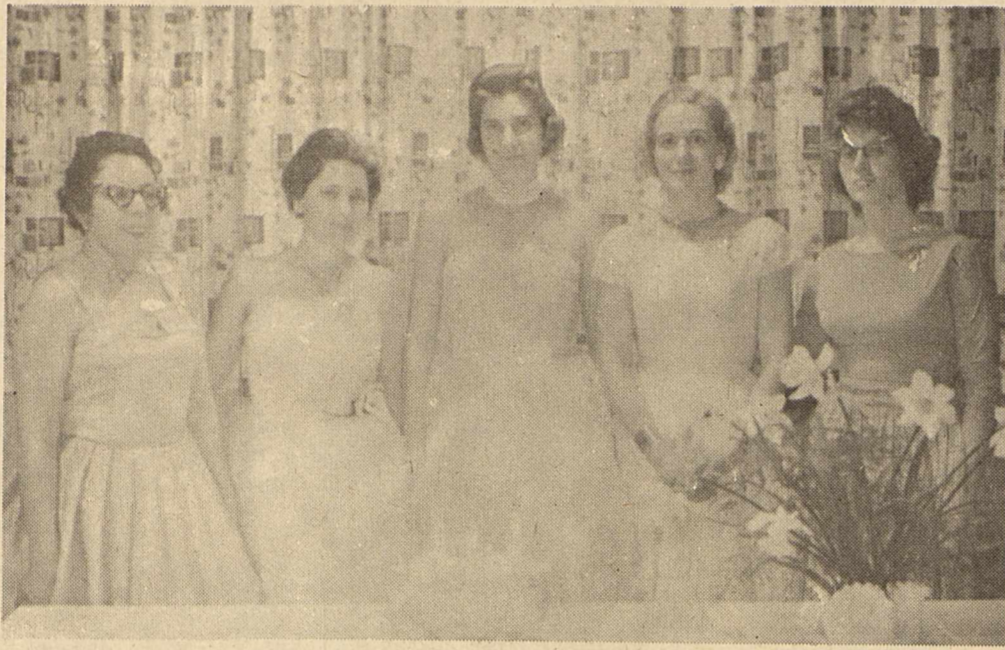

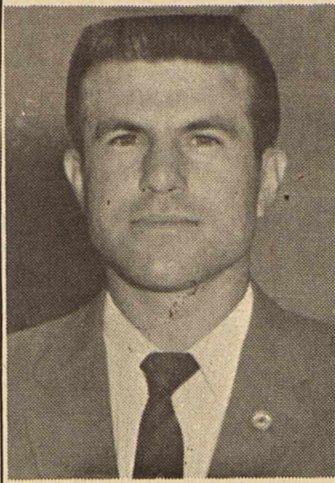
Plains will play host next Thursday, March 30, to at least 231 boys from 13 area schools.

Plans are being made by local club members to attend the national championship Kart races in Clovis Sunday.

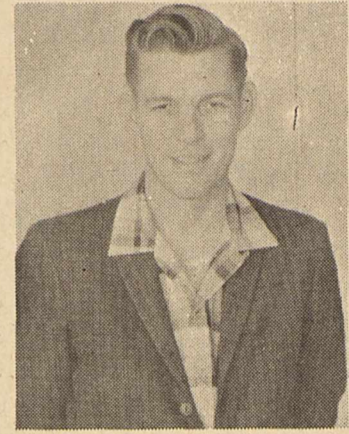
### 8th Grade Track Meet Is Tuesday

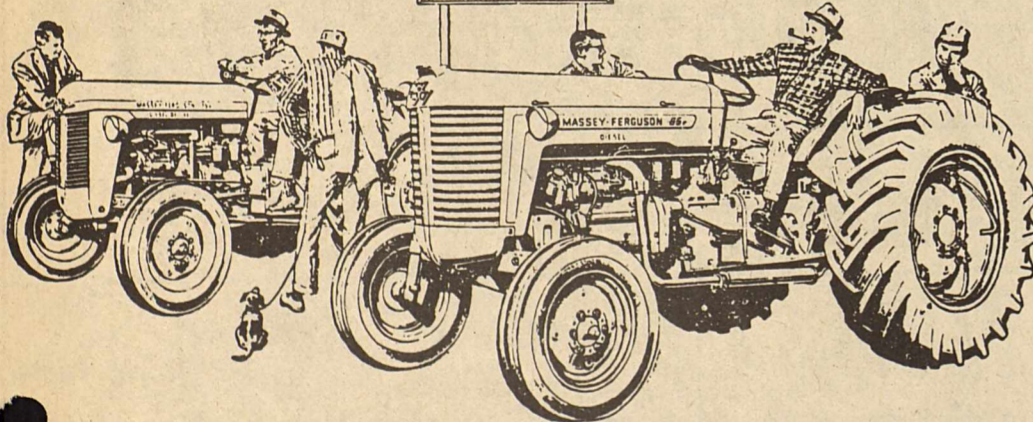

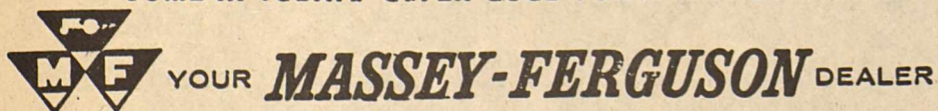
