when Lea County filed an ap-
plication for pilcation for an injuncto
against the city. Purpose of the
injunction was to force the city injunction was to force the
to lower rates for power. The action stemmed from
previous requests by Lea County previous requests by Lea County
to have power rates lowered, The co-op, which serves
about 25 per cent of the city population, has sought permission of the City Council to
lower city rates, Lea County lower city rates. Lea County
claims it is seeking to establish the same rates here that it has in Tatum and Lovington.
But city officials claim the But city officials claim that
present rates are the same as those recommended by Lea County several years ago. In an answer filed by the city, the City of Plains claimed that
it has the sole and exclusive right, power and authority to set and establish the rates to be charged for electric energy and that the court has no juris-
diction to interfere with this regulating power. The city further claimed that
Lea County is attempting to regulate electric rates by ju-
dicial decree through governmental agencies as prescribed by statute. According to the cross suit,
