



Plains tripped the Cranes here in the 1960 opener by a score of 8-6 in a game just as close as the score indicates. That is the only meeting be-tween the two schools.

Among seven returning starters for the Golden Cranes is Quarterback Calvin Kirkham, one of the state's finest passers. He completed 14 of 21 against the Cowboys last season.
