Cowboys Meet Crane in Grid Opener

Tough Assignment Anticipated For Defending Champs

With plenty of spirit and a healthy tradition, but a shortage of experience, the Plains Cowboys open the 1961 football campaign Friday night at Crane, against the ever-dangerous Golden Crane of Coach Dan Anderegg.

Game time is 8 p.m. Hundreds of Cowboy fans are expected to make the 149-mile trek to Crane to get their first look at the 1961 edition of Coaches Jack Pierce and Rip Sewell.

It will be the toughest opener in history for the Cowboys as they will be meeting the defending champions of district 4-AA. In fact, the Cranes are old hands at winning district titles. They've hoarded up eight in the past 10 years and are pre season favorites to pick up another one this time.

Plains tripped the Cranes here in the 1960 opener by a score of 8-6 in a game just as close as the score indicates. That is the only meeting between the two schools.

Among seven returning starters for the Golden Cranes is Quarterback Calvin Kirkham, one of the state's finest passers. He completed 14 of 21 against the Cowboys last season. Also back for another year is Korkham's favorite target, End Charles Peek. Still another familiar name is that of Fullback Paul Lively, back for his fourth year with the Cranes.

Against this formidable crew Plains will throw a team of lettermen, but few of them regulars on last year's championship outfit.

With only three weeks of practice, Cowboy coaches have made numerous changes in position assignments. Among last-minute changes has been a shift in the vital quarterback assignment. Mike Field, 150-pound sophomore, is now ticketed for the starting call in place of Steve McGinty who held the position in early practice rounds. McGinty probably will start at halfback, opposite Ronnie Hendricks. Fullback duties will be in the hands of Walt Hawkins.

Up front, the Cowboys probably will start a line which has Norman Huddleston and Jerry Jones at ends, with Ernie Anderson also scheduled to see a lot of action; Dennis Hickman and James Hooper or Clarence Todd at tackles; Sam St. Romain and

Oscar Henard won the title of best all-around junior and Pharon Pharr was best all-around senior in the Second Annual Kids and Kayuses Round-Up completed here Saturday night. Oscar is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Henard and Pharon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Pharr.

Young Henard received 19 points by winning three first places and one second in the junior division. Robert Jones was his closest competitor with 11 points.

Pharr received 15 points in the senior division by winning two firsts, a second and a fifth place. Kress Jones was the runner-up in the senior division with 14 points followed by Jeff Smith with 12.

This two-performance Round-Up was considered very successful in that the 4-H Clubs of Yoakum County have found a program that is entertaining to watch as a fan and wholesome recreation for the contestants. It is also a fund raiser because about 130 people paid to see the performances each night. Gate receipts for the two nights were \$65 and the 4-H concession stand made a profit of \$30.27.

The 1961 Kids and Kayuses Round-Up was sponsored by all of the 4-H Clubs in Yoakum County through their central organization, the County 4-H Council. Tommy Elmore is chairman of the council and was the one to present the awards Saturday night.

Four-H members are indebted to a large number of people for the success of this event. Bob Loe was the announcer and he did a good job of keeping the 23 boys and girls lined up for a fast show. Hardin-Simmons has the services of exactly half of the one-time Cowboy greats. Jim Williams, 1959 graduate, is being talked for a starting half-back position with Hardin-Simmons. Walt Coffman, 1960 grad, saw a lot of action with the H-SU Cowboys last fall although only a freshman then.

Donald Todd, 1960 graduate, was a freshman at Hardin-Simmons last year but an injury kept him from playing. He was a first string guard with the varsity during spring practice. His brother, Douglas, a 1961 Plains graduate, will report for freshman drills.

Joe Don Marrow and Ray Faught, both backs with last year's Cowboy champions, have accepted football scholarships to Texas Tech. They will play on the Tech freshman team this fall.

Two more members of last year's Cowboy powerhouse will cast their lot with Sul Ross. Center Ronnie Stockstill and Eed James Alberding will report for drills at Alpine school.

Funeral Home Open Under New Owners

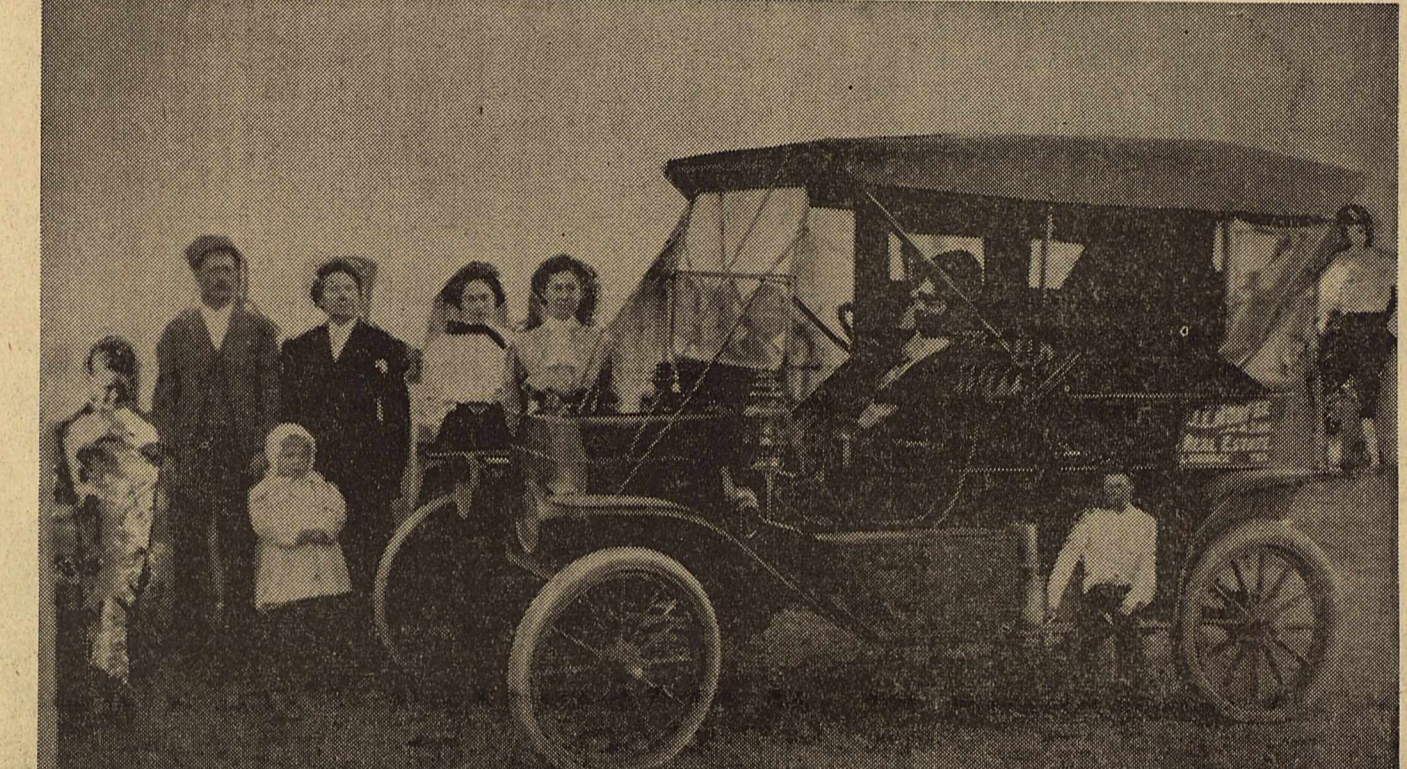
Opening of the funeral home in Plains has been announced by Mr. and Mrs. Elbert E. Huffman, who have moved here from Meridian.

County Wildcat Yields Oil

In northwest Yoakum County, U. S. Smelting, Refining and Mining Co., operating from Midland, is drilling ahead below 9,122 feet at its wildcat No. 1 Trasher after recovering shows of possible production in the Wichita-Albany.

The zone from 8,960-9,020 feet was tested with tool open two hours. Recovery was 2,000 feet of gas in drill pipe, 20 feet to 34 gravity oil and 1,180 feet of very heavy oil and gas cut mud.

Flow pressures ranged from 94 to 122 pounds and 30 minute shutin pressure was 8,724 pounds.

The exploration is 12 miles northwest of Plains and spots at 330 feet from south and 2,310 feet from east lines of Section 343. It is located one and one-

half miles northwest of Block D (Devonian) wells and four and one-half miles northwest of Bronco field. Scheduled total depth is 12,500 feet.

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., is setting five and one-half inch casing to 10,730 feet to

test the Pennsylvanian at its No. 1 Mary Hope Pusey, west Terry County wildcat dug to 13,190 feet in barren Silurio-Devonian formations.

After hitting total depth logs were run and open hole cemented form 12,990-13,190 feet

and 10,730-11,000 feet.

The wildcat is 330 feet from north and west lines of Section 30, Block K, Public School Land survey, one mile southwest of Tokio and one and one-half miles north of South Tokio field.

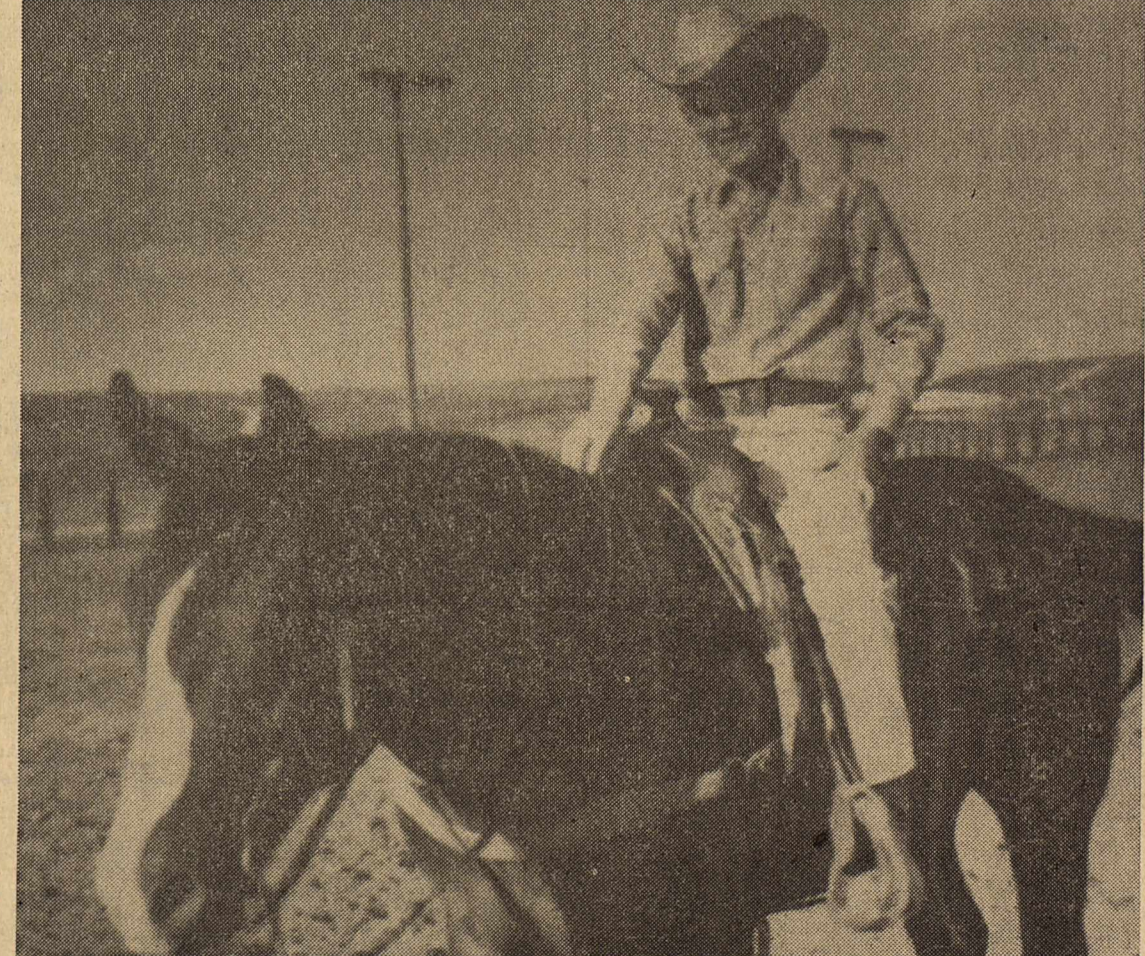
Kennedy stated that the only vacancy yet remaining was music teacher for grades one through four. He reported also that the first days of school had been accomplished with a

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To Save Millions

Trailer License Law Will Benefit Farmers

Texas farmers and ranchers will save millions of dollars annually from the new farm trailer law which became effective May 29.

Senate and House agricultural leaders said that many farmers do not understand how the law benefits them and were protesting the payment of the annual fee required under the new law.

The law requires that farm trailers from 4,000 to 10,000 pounds gross weight be registered with the county-tax assessor. It also provides that owners secure a special trailer license plate for a five dollar annual fee.

Senator A. J. Rogers of Childress and Rep. Grainger McWhaney of Wheeler, said that before the law was passed,

the license fee for a 10,000 pound gross trailer was \$55. They pointed out that the department of Public safety had warned that if a farm trailer law were not passed they would begin strict enforcement of laws on licensing and brake requirements.

Under the old laws farm trailers only up to 4,000 lbs gross were exempted and brakes were required on all trailers over 3,000 pounds gross. The new law is a compromise law.

The elimination of the brake requirements will save the farmers "untold millions of dollars" annually. Adequate brakes for a trailer were estimated at \$200.

Under the new law, farmers who fail to obtain license tags will be subject to fine and also must immediately register their trailer as a commercial trailer and obtain a commercial license plate.
