Premier Khrushchev's prediction that America's grandchildren will live under socialism could very well come true -- if the present drift toward centralized control of the nation's economy continues.

The warning comes from John W. McGovern, Board chairman of the National Association of Manufacturers, who added that the "virtues and values which made this nation the greatest and most powerful in the world are being steadily whittled away." McGovern said in a recent talk that neither the American people, the Congress, nor the Administration wants socialism "any more than the previous Republican Administration wanted it."

"However, the drift toward centralized government has continued steadily under both of our great political parties," he continued, "despite the earnest efforts of individual leaders in each to halt and reverse the trend. "If it is not halted, we inevitably will wind up with government controlling and directing our lives and our activities, even though we stop short of socialized ownership of the means of production and distribution."

The NAM spokesman said it was gratifying to note--particularly among young Americans--evidences of concern over the fact that in mid-1960 the various levels of government -- Federal, state and local -- were spending 37 1/2 cents out of each dollar the American people earned; that the Federal Government alone was spending 29 cents, and that for years the growth of government has been outrunning the growth of the rest of the nation.

Mr. McGovern urged more young Americans to become students of political and economic affairs and active participants in the process of citizenship.

Farm Labor Information

Since time is very short and in order that all employers may have an opportunity to make use of this method of publicizing our needs for qualified labor, a short meeting was held in the District Court Room in Brownfield on January 3, at 3:00 p.m. to fully explain and discuss this procedure.

It is imperative that every potential source of farm labor be fully explored if we are to alleviate the shortage of farm workers with which we are now faced.

The Texas Employment Commission has available interstate clearance procedure through which we may project our needs for workers to have other states and areas where they may be available.

We hope that you and any other interested farm employers that you know of will accept this invitation to contact us in an effort to at least partially solve the problem of farm labor shortages.

Improved depreciation allowances on equipment have been recommended by Secretary of the Treasury Dillon. He also urges a tax credit for all new investment in plant equipment, saying such moves are necessary for industry modernization that will keep this country competitive in world markets.

Dr. Lynn Receives Call-Up

Local Doctor Told To Report By 15th



TO REPORT BY 15th--Dr. Clyde Lynn, Plains Physician, has received verbal orders to report for active duty with the U.S. Army's 49th Armored Division, which is currently stationed at Fort Polk, La.

Citizens of the Plains area became quite concerned a few months ago when it was learned that the local physician, Dr. Clyde A. Lynn was being considered for call-up from his Reserve Officer status of active duty in the U.S. Army.

Concern reached a peak this week as it was revealed that Dr. Lynn is now expected to report for active duty with the 49th Armored Division which is presently stationed at Fort Polk, Louisiana.

On December 7 Dr. Lynn received orders which stated that he definitely had been assigned to the 49th, and that that assignment has been effective since October 9, which was just one week before the time when the 49th was activated and sent to Fort Polk.

Since that time Dr. Lynn has received a series of postponements in the form of delays in his orders in the hope of possibly being able to stay and serve in Plains.

General Kerr in Washington, D. C. told Dr. Lynn this last week, however, that there would be no more delays and that

he would be expected to report on or about the 15th of January to Fort Polk.

Dr. Lynn presently resides in Plains with his wife and their children and his plans are that his family remain behind in Plains and that his children continue to attend Plains Schools.

As for the matter of providing possible medical care for Plains area citizens, Dr. Lynn has contacted several doctors in the hope of getting one to come here and at least fill the vacancy which he will leave. One doctor from a neighboring city in New Mexico is seriously considering the possibility with the further possibility of staying on in practice here even after Dr. Lynn is released from the service. Word was to be received on this definitely this week.

Mrs. Lynn, at present, plans to remain on as a part of the staff at the clinic, as Dr. Lynn will continue in his lease of the facilities. Lynn originally, about two and one-half years ago secured a 10-year lease on the Yoakum County Clinic and its existing facilities.

Upon being questioned about the possible length of the period he would be expected

to serve on an active basis in the Army, Dr. Lynn replied that published plans for the activation of the entire 49th were expected to be accomplished by sometime in the next October. Some syndicated news stories have even stated the probability of some members of the Division's being phased out beginning in the very few months. At any rate the length of stay for Dr. Lynn is not expected to be longer than probably will be much shorter than one year.

Political Activity Begins In Earnest

The pace of Yoakum County politics stepped up this week as the number of announcements for various offices continued to mount.

With the date for the Texas primary, May 5 and the date for announcement deadline, February 20 rapidly approaching, speculation, talk and rumors about various offices and various candidates is rapidly picking up momentum.

Two announcements for the post of County Commissioner of Precinct No. 4 were revealed this week. Mrs. Pearl Loe, who has been acting Commissioner of that precinct for the past several months, since the death of Paul Loe, her husband, stated that she was a candidate for that post. Mrs. Loe was appointed by the county to serve the remaining months of her husband's unexpired term.

In announcing her candidacy, Mrs. Loe stated that she intends to issue a formal statement of announcement in a few days.

Also making known his intention to seek the Precinct 4 post was T. J. Bearden, who has recently moved to the town of Plains from near the Tokio community.

Bearden also stated that his formal announcement will be forthcoming at a later date. Following close on the heels of John Wise, Denver City businessman, who is seeking the post of County Judge, two more have announced their intentions to seek that office.

Paul Cobb of Plains announced this week his intention to be a candidate for the office of county judge, subject to action of the Democratic primary on May 5. Cobb has lived in the Plains

area most of his life and has been associated with Plains, mainly from the standpoint of Agriculture since 1915.

He served for several years as a trustee on the board of Plains Independent School district.

Cobb resides in Plains with his family, which includes his wife and two sons, one, Jack, of the home and Joe, a married son who also lives in Plains and is engaged in the deep-breaking business which his father helps operate.

Cobb has stated that his formal statement of announcement will be forthcoming within the next week.

Garland Wheeler, who has served as Yoakum County Deputy Sheriff for the past 18 months; has also announced his candidacy for the office of county judge, subject to action in the democratic primary, May 5.

Wheeler had previously submitted his resignation from the position of deputy, which is effective as of January 1. Appointed as Yoakum County deputy in August of 1960 Wheeler has a background of 12 years in law enforcement work both with city and county agencies.

His career in this field began in 1949 in Altus Okla., where he joined the city police department. Later, he was employed for three and one

Water District In Law Suit

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has made final preparations for the trial of a lawsuit brought by Marvin Shurbet, a Floyd County farmer, against the U. S. Internal Revenue Service.

The trial was to have commenced January 3, 1962, in the U.S. District Court at Lubbock; Judge Joseph B. Dooley will preside.

Shurbet's suit is sponsored by the High Plains Water District and is being treated as a test case by the Internal Revenue Service.

Testimony by witnesses for the plaintiff, Marvin Shurbet, will attempt to show that ground water in the southern High Plains of Texas is a natural deposit and that it is being exhausted by pump extraction.

Plaintiff will further contend that landowners who can establish an actual initial cost in the ground water beneath their land, as distinguished from the cost of the land itself, and who are using that water to produce income, are entitled to deduct this cost of water on their federal income-tax returns as the water is exhausted.

The High Plains Water District has worked for seven years (Continued on page 6.)

Daniel Runs Far Ahead In Test For Governor

Among the men most prominently being mentioned today as the possible next governor of Texas, it is Price Daniel who remains first choice among the greatest number of people.

A state-wide survey by the Texas Poll just completed reveals that Sen Ralph Yarborough and former Gov. Allan Shivers rank second and third in the public's mind. The best that can be said for the other five aspirants included in the survey is that they have most of their campaigning ahead of them.

THE FIRST QUESTION asked on the gubernatorial race now beginning to draw candidates tested the familiarity of the electorate with the eight men who appear to be the most likely candidates: "Here are the names of several men who may run for governor of Texas next spring. Which ones have you ever heard or read anything about?" (Names on the list shown were rotated from one respondent to the next to avoid biasing the results toward the top of the list.) Here are the percentages familiar with each person:

Allan Shivers	83
Will Wilson	68
John Connally	44
Jim Wright	43
Jack Cox	41
Marshall Formby	15

It is axiomatic that to get people to vote for him, a candidate must first make himself

known to the people. This is never easy in a state the size of Texas. Even the first four above, the only ones who have held state-wide elective offices, are not "known" by everyone.

The survey was completed shortly before Secretary of the Navy Connally of Fort Worth had announced for governor. The only formally announced candidate before the survey was Atry Gen Wilson, and Formby, former highway commissioner, has told many friends that he intends to run.

The second question asked was, "Please look at all the names on the list and tell me which one would be your first choice for governor at this time." The results:

Even with Gov Daniel commanding nearly three out of 10 votes at present, the above figures indicate that the race, more than four months before the first primary, is still wide open. Anything could still happen, depending on campaigning and other events.

JACK COX, WHO was defeated by Daniel in the last election, has now switched to the Republican Party and appears to be the candidate-designate for the GOP. He will not oppose Democratic candidates

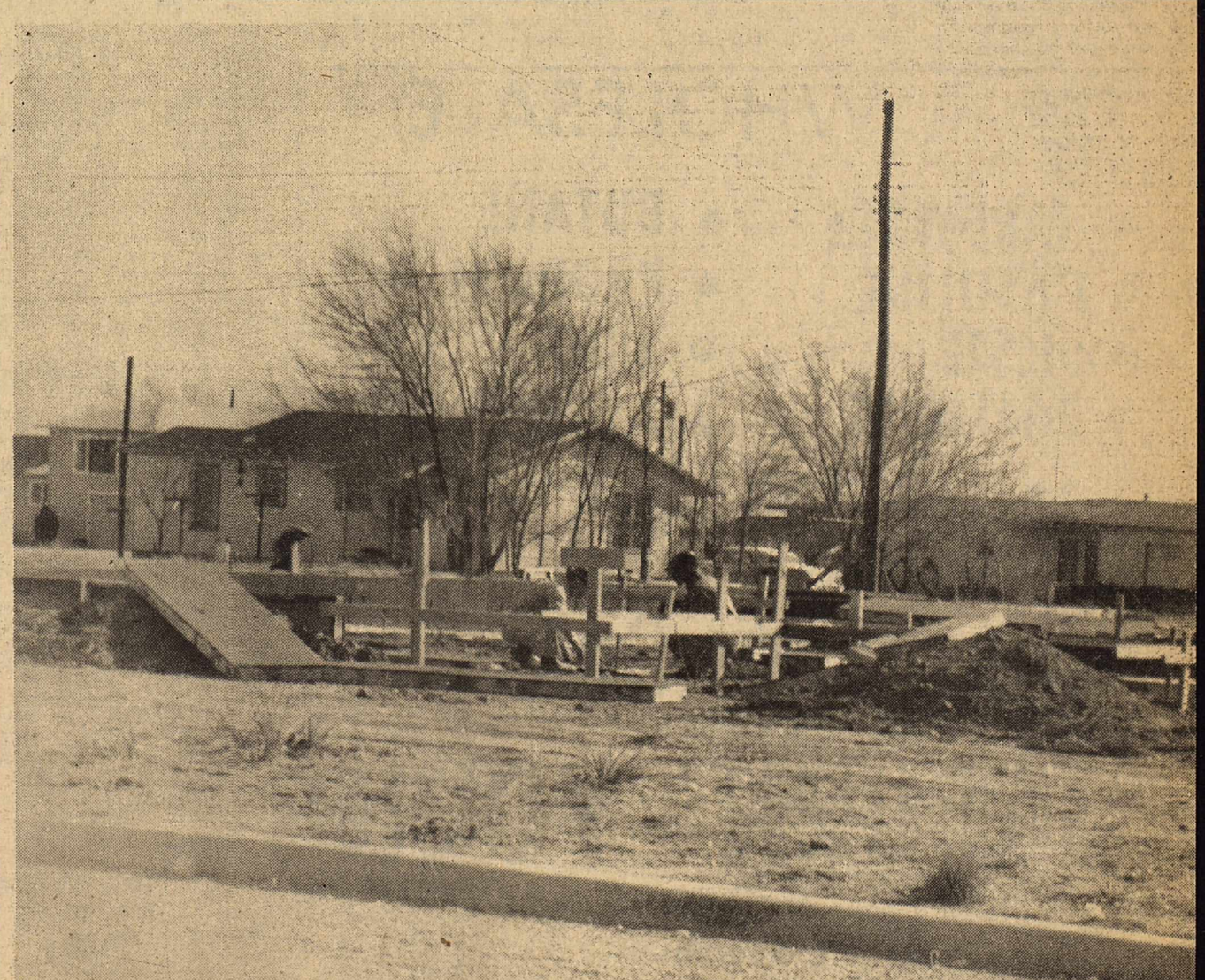

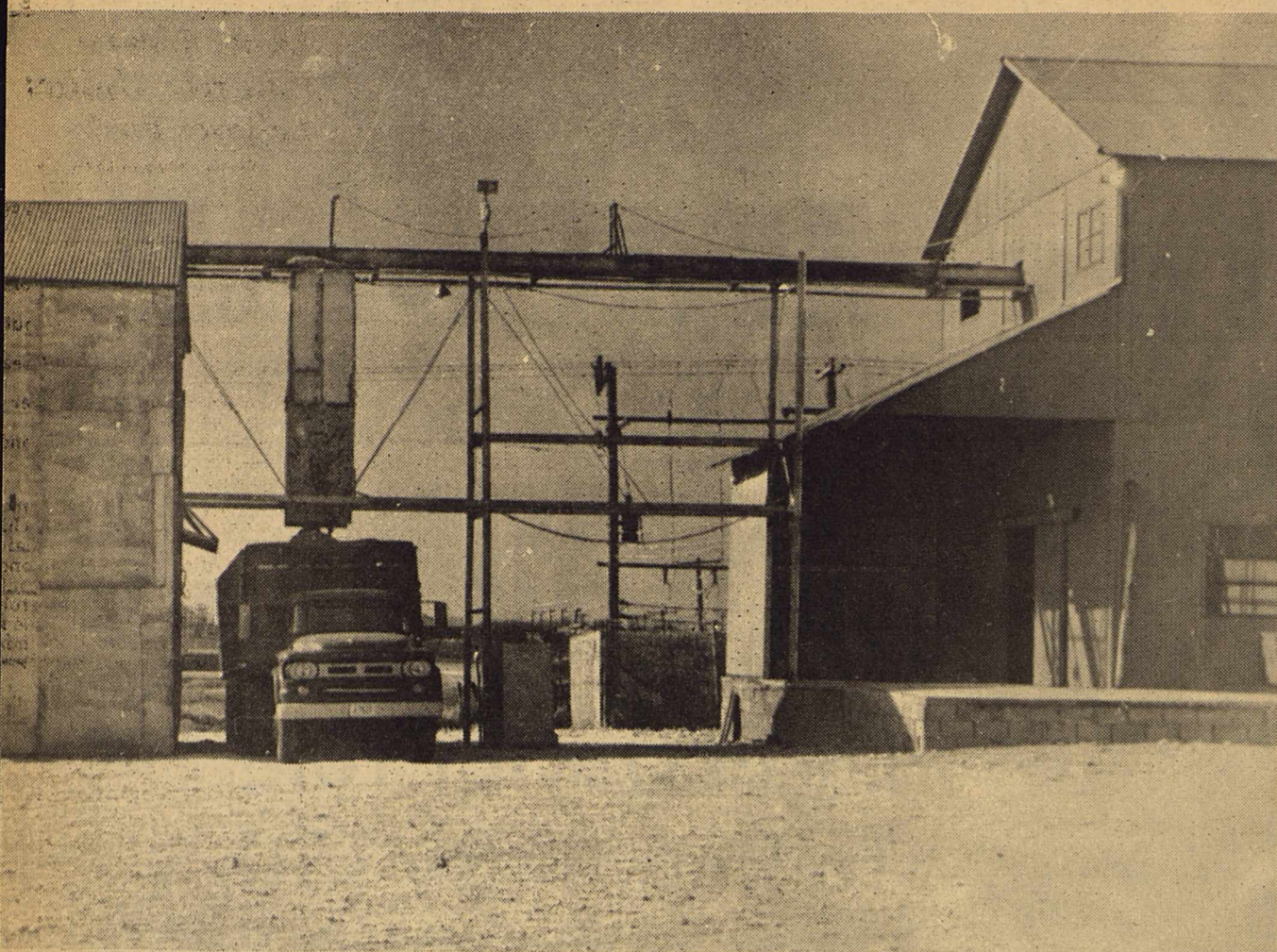
permits issued in the city of Plains during 1961 amounted a total of \$204,412, of which \$157,100 were for residential construction and \$47,312 for commercial construction.

Defoliation Information

According to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. information bulletin, defoliation, if properly used, can be an effective tool in your harvesting operation. Be sure your crop is fully matured and ready for defoliants or desiccants before they are applied or it may mean a loss in maturity, grade and possibly staple. Check with your County Agricultural Agent or some other reliable source.

When 60 percent or more of the bolls are open, it is safe for most true defoliants to be applied. Desiccant applications should be made when from 60 to 80 percent of the bolls are open.

Read carefully and follow the precautions printed on the container labels. Avoid using any defoliant that is not labeled as to exact chemical content. Unknown defoliants may injure open fibers, unopen bolls or cause fire hazards at the gin. Wait two weeks before operating stripper harvesters after applying desiccants.

More efficient defoliation results when cotton is mature with leaves in a condition of activity, not wilted and not toughened by drought or starved by lack of fertility; and where plant moisture is adequate and weather is warm and humid. Consider carefully all weather information, such as dew and humidity forecasts, temperature, wind velocity and rainfall from radio stations.

Until official Federal regulations are issued governing the use of a specific defoliant or desiccant, it should not be used.

Who Must File A Federal Income Tax Return For 1961

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return. John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock, Texas, announced today.

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is

not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by telephoning the IRS office.

Oh, yes, the filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16!

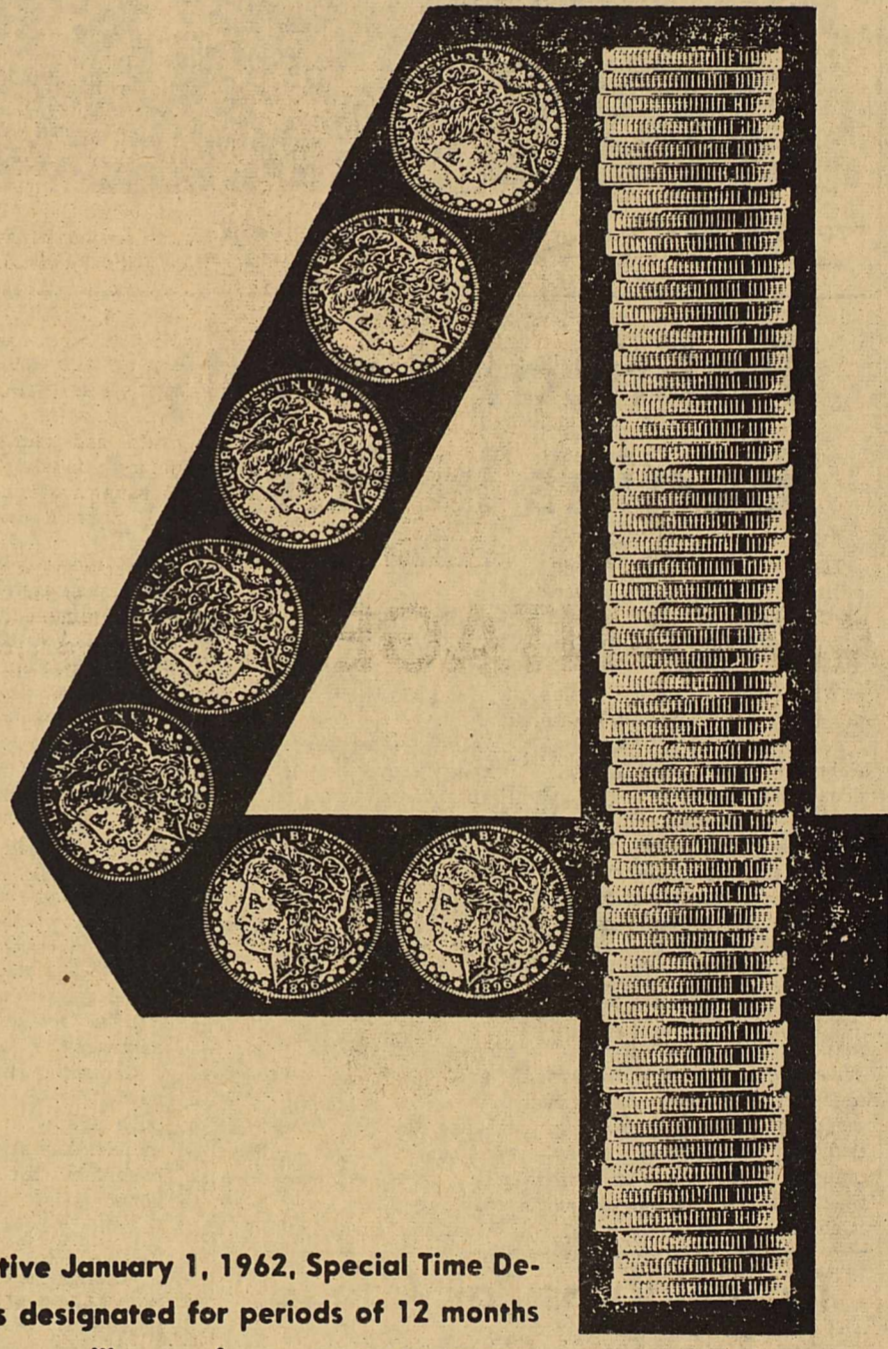

- 1 6-ounce can chow mein noodles

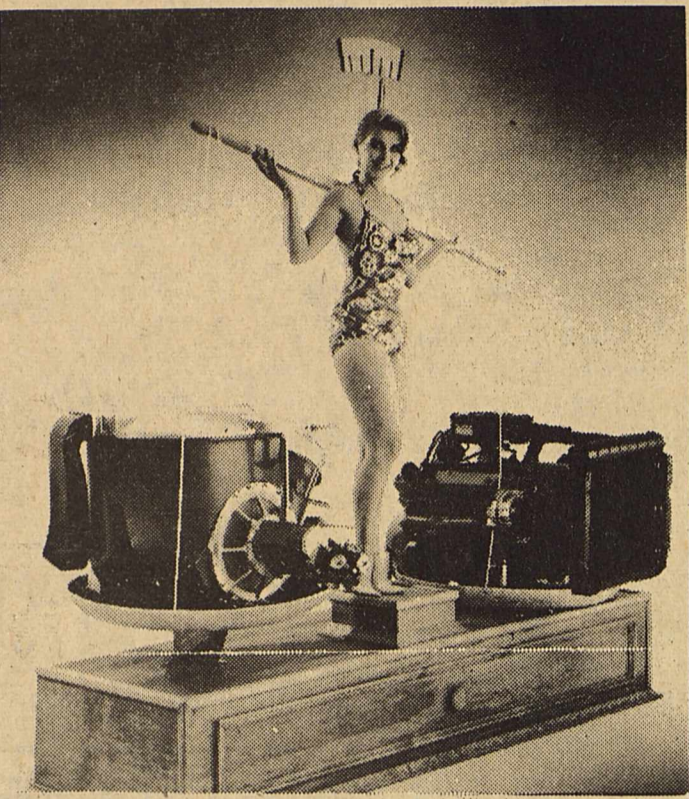

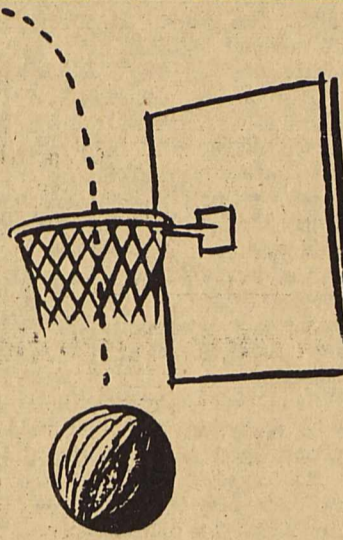

Higher Cotton Allotment Asked

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- Representative George Mahon advises that he has urged Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to fix the national cotton acreage allotment for the 1962 crop at a higher level than the 1961 allotment, and to do so at a lower figure. The 1961 allotment is 18,400,000 acres. The Secretary is required to make his decision by October 15.

Mahon stated that a moderate increase in 1962 over 1961 is necessary in order to make sure that the American cotton producer will be able to maintain his fair share of the world market in addition to supplying domestic needs. He said that a reduction would stimulate foreign production and be unacceptable to domestic growers.

Cotton growers and producer groups have appealed to Members of Congress and

government officials in regard to the cotton acreage matter. Mahon stated that he had discussed the matter with various officials of the Department of Agriculture in addition to the Secretary of Agriculture, and had wired the President and discussed the acreage situation with members of the White House staff.

Farm Journal says: "Our country has become the chief dispenser of the great principles of human liberty: the Judeo-Christian concept of the dignity of man; the right of the individual to choose rather than live under statism; the right of free enterprise; freedom of speech and assembly; the right to vote; the right to own property; the right to worship (and a belief in doing so). "We've got to lead the fight for these ideas. And we can't do much leading if we don't guard our strengths right here at home."

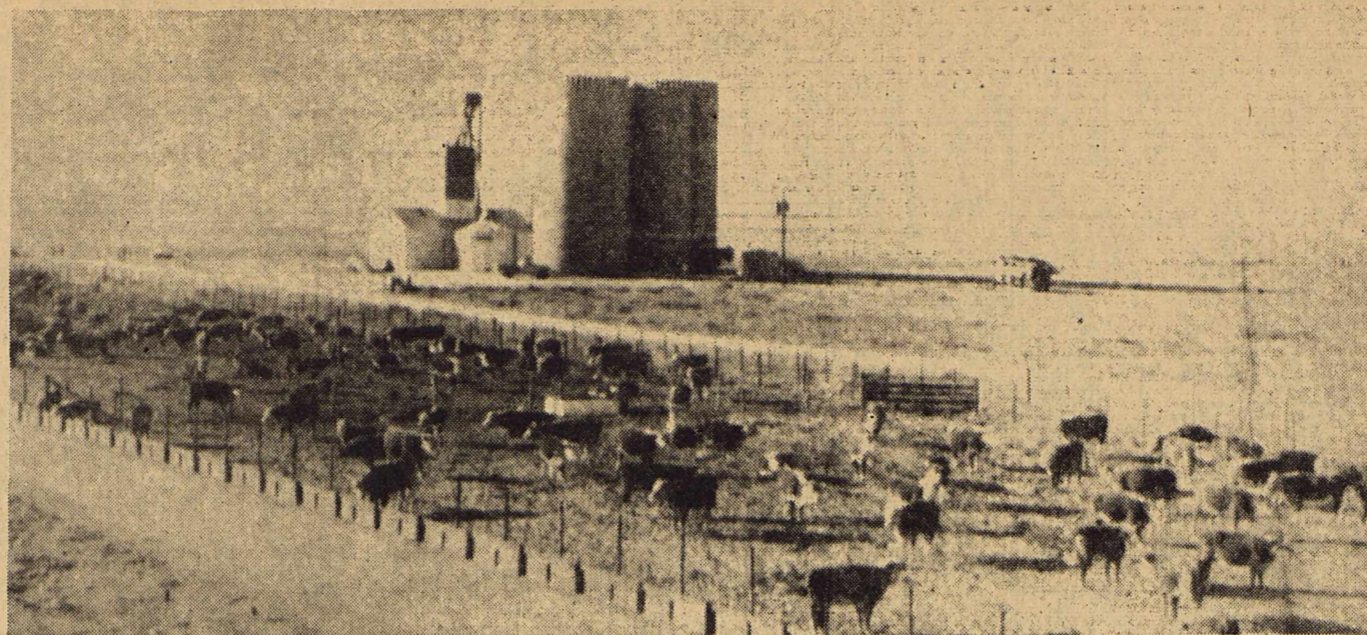

Lagume Research

An observation program on sixty - six grasses and one-hundred and fourteen legumes conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation will be continued for 1962. The source of the seed were both native and from foreign countries. Some varieties showed promise of adaptation to the needs of the area. A search will be continued for a high protein grass that can be easily eradicated. This will be used to help restore humus to the soil and at the same time be used for profitable grazing.

Water Depletion Question Goes To Court

One more step was taken this month toward a long-sought goal--the goal is a federal income-tax deduction for the depletion of underground water within the High Plains Under-ground Water Conservation District.

A pre-trial hearing was held in the U. S. District Court in Amarillo, September 25, before Judge Joseph B. Dooley as a prelude to the full-fledged trial which has been scheduled by the Court for January 3 in Lubbock.

The purpose of the pre-trial hearing was to establish agreement between the attorneys and

the Court concerning procedures to be followed in the trial and to agree upon certain stipulated facts pertinent to the case.

Marvin and Mildred Shurbet, a farm couple who reside in southwest Floyd County, filed this most-important legal suit against the Internal Revenue Service. Mr. Shurbet is a former member of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Water District. The Shurbets contend that property owners who can establish an actual cost in the underground water beneath their land and who are using the water to produce income should be entitled to deduct this cost on their tax returns as the water is exhausted.

The trial of this case will culminate seven years of diligent work by the High Plains Water District.

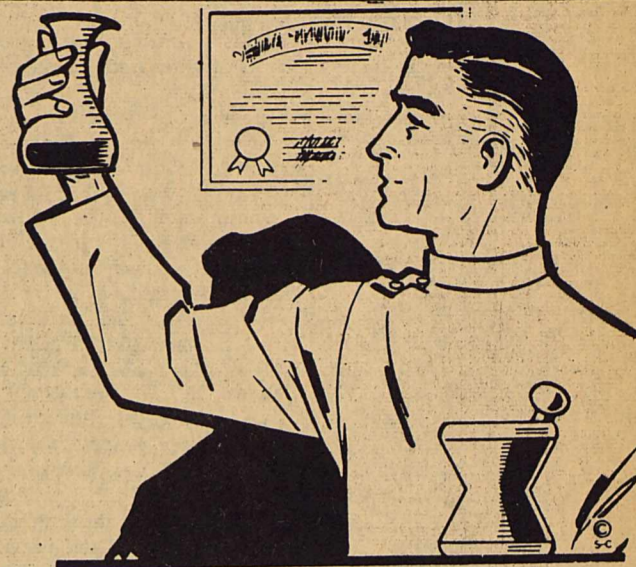
In 1954, the first of two requests was submitted to the Internal Revenue Service. These requests asked the IRS to consider underground water in the High Plains Water District as a depletable natural resource under existing federal tax laws, thereby making land-owners in this area eligible for a tax deduction as depletion

takes place.

These requests were submitted to the Internal Revenue Service, but were disallowed. It was determined that the only other feasible means of gaining the tax-deduction was through the courts.

Your Legal Name

Most probably you are never quite sure whether your wife should use your first name, or her own, when signing an important paper.

Perhaps you also wonder whether to put a "Mr." or a "Mrs." in front of a signature; and you can get all mixed up about a "Jr." or a "Sr."

after it. Then, what about your middle name or initial?

It seems that for centuries under common law a legal name has consisted of one Christian or given name and one surname or family name. The law presumes that every person has a given name and a surname which must be stated in full on any legal document.

The law pays little attention to a middle name or initial, but it is wise to use either one or the other for exact identification. You must be consistent, too. For example, one real estate buyer was advised to sign all papers by his full name "William Alton Smith, Jr." to make it clear which of the Bill Smiths was buying the property.

If you are a "Jr." or a "Sr." such description should be used to help distinguish you from namesakes. As for "Mr." in front of your name, that's not important at all. The same is true for "Mrs.", because it's your wife's own given name that counts.

When a woman marries, she takes her husband's family name. Her maiden surname is absolutely lost. Many women incorrectly use their husband's full name, and sign "Mrs. William A. Smith", for example. The correct way is for her to sign her own given name and her husband's surname such as "Joan Marie Smith."

A divorced woman who wants to resume the use of her maiden name may, under some circumstances, have it returned to her by court order.

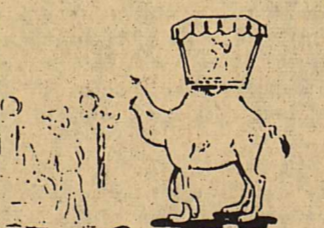

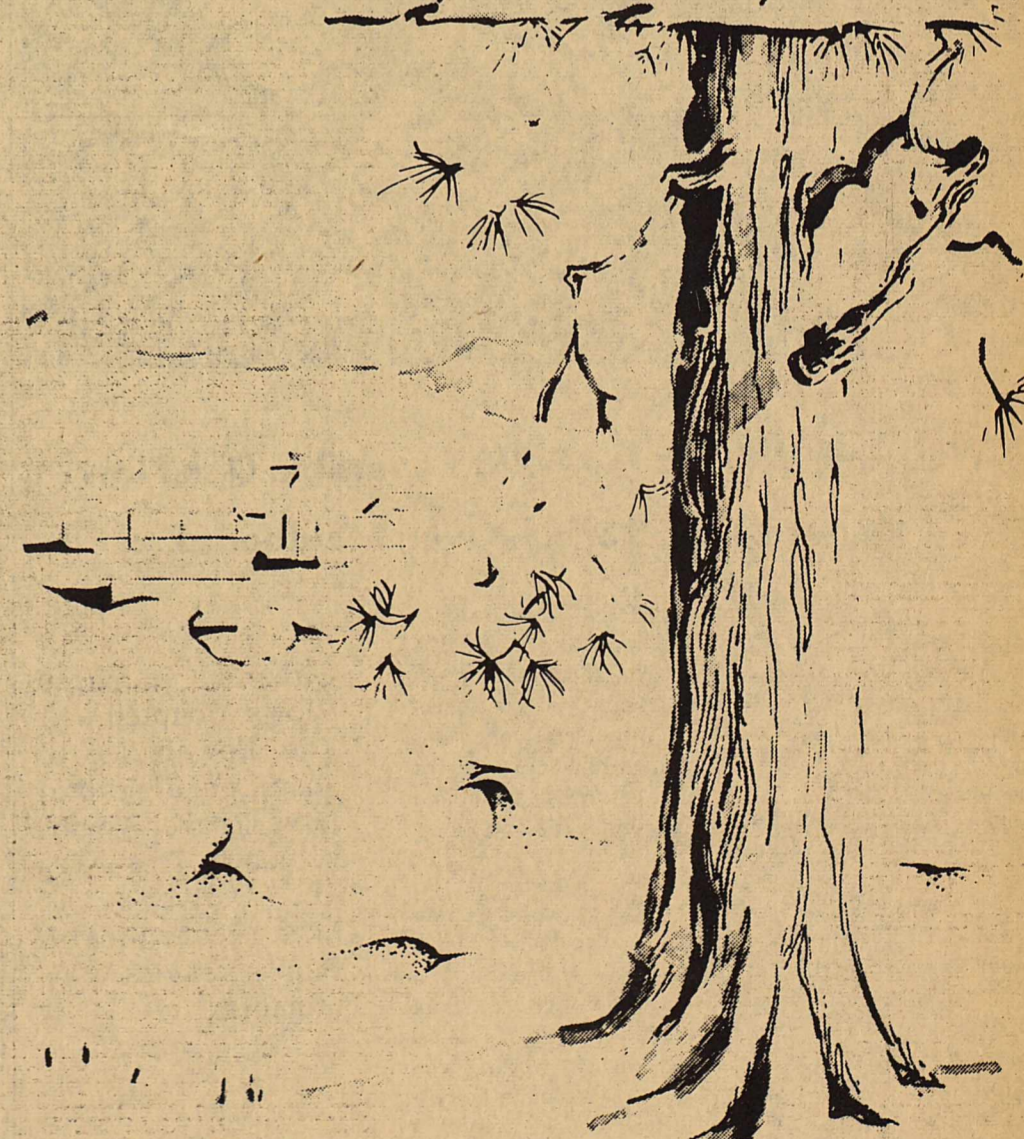

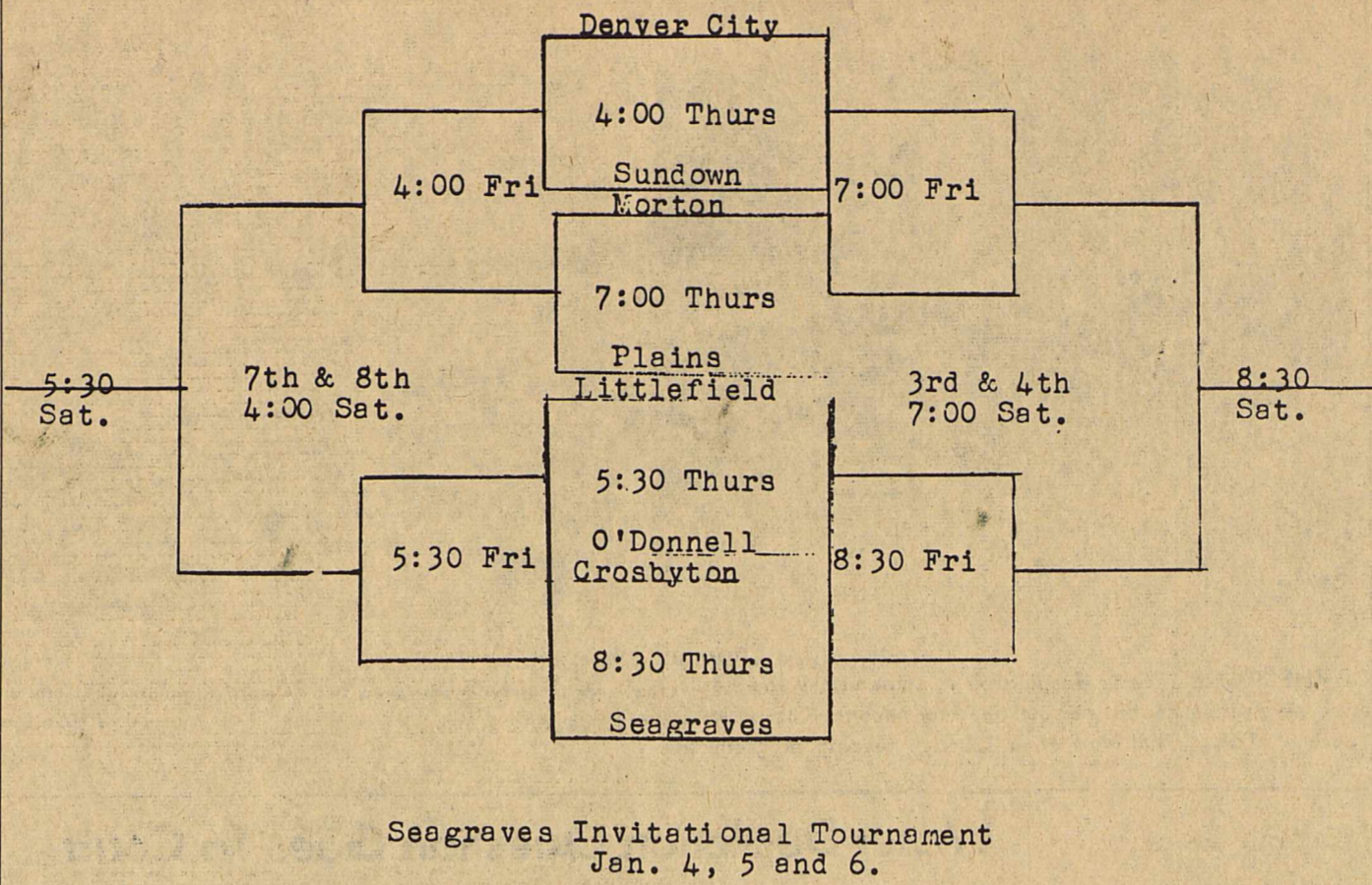
