

has dually completed its No. 2 L. More as a producer in the Ownby (upper Clear Fork and upper San Andres) field to Yoakum County.

From upper Clear Fork perforations at 6,636,782 feet, it pumped 168.32 barrels of 31gravity oil, plus three per cent water, daily, after being acidized with 8,000 gallons.

It also pumped 116.92 barrels of 32.8 - gravity oil daily from upper San Andres perforations at 5,262 - 5,317 feet, after being acidized with 8,000 gallons.

Texaco Inc. has completed a 1/2-mile west offset, No. 1-A Annie Miller, to the one-well East Wason (lower Wolfcamp) field of Yoakum County.


The venture pumped 70.62 barrels of 38.5-gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water, daily from perforations at 8,757-64 feet and 8,776-86 feet, after 500gallon acid treatment. Gas oil ration was 76-1.

Total depth is 8,875 feet, with 51/2-inch liner set at 8,874 feet.


The stock show will be held March 19, 20 and 21 on the fairgrounds.
