Reports On Research Work Due At Annual Peanut Meet

Research findings will highlight the annual peanut growers' meeting to be held in the agriculture auditorium at Tarleton State College, Stephenville, on August 16 beginning at 10 a. m., according to Ross Wilson, Manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

Peanut industry leaders, including grower representatives, continue to place emphasis upon the role of research in increasing quality and yield of peanuts, and personnel carrying on the programs of production research under the auspices of Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University are doing an excellent job for peanut growers, Mr. Wilson said.

The extension division of the two colleges is always engaged in the process of getting information developed by researchers into the hands of farmers, and the meeting in Stephenville is an effort in that direction. It is hoped that one basic result of the meeting will be the strengthening of the educational link between the

researchers and the farmer. Mr. Wilson stated that a similar program last year attracted several hundred interested persons and it is believed that this meeting can produce the same beneficial results as did last year's meeting.

John McHaney, economist and a member of the Texas A&M University staff, will speak on "Outlook for Peanuts." Other members of the staff will discuss seedling disease, peanut varieties, insects, weed control, harvesting and curing. Staff members from Oklahoma University will discuss soil management and irrigation.

The meeting will consist of two two-hour sessions. The first will begin at 10 a. m. and conclude at noon. A complimentary lunch will be served in the college cafeteria, followed by the second session at 1:15 p. m. During the afternoon session a panel will be assembled to answer questions which may have come up during the meeting. Door prizes will be awarded just prior to the conclusion of the meeting.

Ruth Ramey Ends Career With Extension Service

Ruth Ramey of Richmond, home demonstration agent in Fort Bend County since March 1, 1945, will close out what is believed to be the longest continuous record of Extension work by a woman agent in Texas when she retires Aug. 31. She will complete 40 years and two months of continuous service on that date.

Her Extension career began in Eastland county on June 26, 1923. She went to Wharton county Nov. 1, 1941, then transferred to Fort Bend county 18 years ago. She has helped bring about many changes in homemaking practices through county extension education programs spanning the

four decades.

"During this period, which began during the heyday of the Model T and lasted through the present period of excellent roads and air-conditioned automobiles, Extension programs have been adapted to meet the needs of the people. We have moved away from basic skill-type instruction in cooking, sewing and canning to the family-centered approach. Major emphasis now is being placed on involvement of people, the coordinated subject matter approach, and management. We work with people through the county program building process and strengthen our programs by calling on professional and resource people to help us," she pointed out.

There was a time when it was easy to distinguish between rural and urban women, but today the woman who lives outside the city is just as smartly dressed and as well informed as her urban friend, Miss Ramey said. "Today, we work more and more with women who do not belong to home demonstration clubs. The HD members, who are thoroughly trained in leadership, assist on subcommittees of the overall county program building committee and work as adult leaders with the 4-H program."

At the time she began work with the Extension Service,

Three To Be Drafted In September

Mrs. Jewell Reaves, clerk of the Texas Local Board No. 36, Selective Service System, announced this week that September's draft call will include three men from Eastland County with five being called for pre-induction.

State draft boards will get their biggest monthly quota in nearly two years during September.

The September state call asks for 609 men for Army service, the largest since November 1961, when the quota was 923.

The September call of 609 compares with 552 for August, 349 for July and 187 for June.

Pre-induction physical and mental examinations for 2,060 men in the state were also announced for September.

Quotas will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on September 1, except volunteers and those legally termed delinquent under the law, who may be younger.

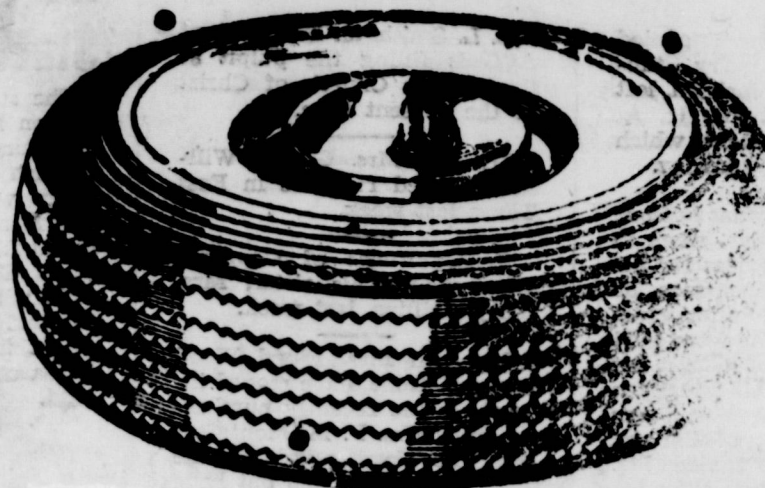

Does your mattress meet the size requirements set up by bedding experts?

If it does not, you may be robbing your family and yourself of necessary physical rest and mental relaxation.

Bedding authorities report that a mattress should be 6 to 8 inches longer than the person who uses it.

Since the average man is 5 feet 9 inches or over, many regular-length mattresses are not long enough for adequate restful sleep. Minimum width for adult sleeping comfort is 39 inches.

As a result of these research findings — combined with the fact that the average height of Americans has increased one inch during the past 23 years — a growing interest has developed in longer and wider sleeping equipment. Supersize bedding and mattresses, 78 inches wide compared with the average 54 inches wide, can now be found in most stores and in many

standard brands.

The degree of firmness also is important. Research shows that you rest best on a mattress scientifically constructed to give firm support with the right amount of resiliency. A newly developed cotton batting promises an even more comfortable mattress in the near future.

If your present mattress is between 10 and 15 years old, its probably time for a new one. Check for broken stitching, depressions and lumps, and sagging borders. Infants and children need the best bedding you can buy.

A must for the homemaker who wants to protect mattresses against soil is a cotton mattress pad. Check to see that the mattress pads have been preshrunk, as they should be laundered periodically.

the beef canning program was underway, and agents did virtually everything "but kill the animal." Cutting up the meat was an ordinary part of the job, and the canning was done primarily in a "retort," a large cast iron container in which 15 of the No. 3 cans of meat could be processed at the same time. Pressure canners were being used also, but they could process only 8 cans of that size at one time, so the larger container was more popular, she said.

"When a beef was to be canned, everyone in the family took part. There was plenty of work to keep the men, women and children busy from dawn to dusk and sometimes later. From 300 to 500 cans a day was a peak performance by using several retorts," Miss Ramey said.

The shift to food freezing began about 20 years ago, when frozen food lockers became available to families, and freezing still dominates the food preservation work. Glass containers have replaced the cans for today's preserved and home canned foods, the agent emphasized.

Miss Ramey has worked with adults and youth during her 40-year career as a county home demonstration agent. Assistant agents have worked with her in the youth programs of Wharton and Fort Bend counties. Her outstanding work won for her the Distinguished Service Award given by the National Home Demonstration Agents Association several years ago.

A native of Sulphur Springs, Miss Ramey was graduated from high school there and from Texas Woman's University. She has attended workshops there and at Texas A&M College and Fort Collins, Colorado.

Confederate Torpedo



WASHINGTON (ANF) — A rare Confederate torpedo has been uncovered in a garden at Fort Lesley J. McNair in Washington, D. C. A small portion of the torpedo had long been exposed in the garden of Quarters 3-B, a location formerly occupied by an Arsenal headquarters. It was believed to be a small artifact until men of the 67th Ordnance Detachment found they had to dig down several feet to reach the missile's base. The Smithsonian Institute identified the relic on the basis of comparison with a similar torpedo obtained from Charleston, S.C., in 1939.
