
General Election Is Thursday - Vote


News Stoies Put In Evidence

CottonReceipts ReportedDown

Effect of the adverse weather conditions was seen in the samples received and classed this week according to W. K. Palmer, of the Lubbock Cot-ton Classing Office. Palmer stated that receipts had de-creased since hands had been unable to work in the fields.

For the week ending Oct. 26, the Lubbock office classed 12, 100 samples, while Lamesa classed 2, 700, and Brownfield classed 4, 600 samples. A to-tal of 99, 400 samples has been classed to date in the 3 offices. Last year on Oct. 26, 327,000 samples had been classed. Quality of the grade declin-

ed this week. For the week ending Oct. 19, the white qualities accounted for 72% of the cotton classed; this past week the percentage of white qualities was only 41 percent. The light spotted qualities accounted for 57 percent of the cotton classed, 46 percent was middling light spotted.

The average staple length improved slightly, increasing from 30. 2 to 30. 4 thirty-sec-onds of an inch. Generally, staple length ranged from 29/32 to 1 inch in length with 15/16 and 31/32 accounting for 86 percent of the samples

classed. Micronaire readings were still good with a slight im-provement noted. Only four percent of the samples read under 3. 5. Lubbock Cotton Exchange

reported 11, 000 bales purchased for the week ending Oct. 26. This was 6,700 bales more than the previous week and compares with 21,300 bales reported a year ago.



State Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe, foe of unlimited trial de novo legislation, predicted this week that Amendment No. 14 will be badly beaten at the polls on November 6.


"The adpotion of Amendment No. 14, last on the bal-lot, would upset the long established balance of powers between the executive, leg-islative and judicial departments of our government, and accomplish no worthwhile purpose. This proposed amendment would transfer much of the law making process from the Legislature to the courts, and probably call for the cre-ation of double the number of

courts we now have. "It would seriously interfere with local self-government, thereby crippling the normal operation of schools, city councils, etc. No other state has such language in their constitution as is proposed in Amendment No. 14, and we don't need it in the Texas Constitution, "concluded Sen-ator Moffett.



The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro. Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county. 

Opponents of this proposal say it would not only render all administrative boards, commissions and councils incapable of making firm decisions, but would transfer their burdens to our already overburdened courts.



Abner V. McCall of Waco, president of Baylor University, has been named to head a statewide committee opposing the trial de novo amendment,
