Ranger Rodeo Queen Event Open To County Residents

The Rodeo Queen who will be presented and crowned during the final performance of the rodeo, will be selected from contestants from all of Eastland County.

Three judges will be selected from different parts of the County. This will give girls from towns and communities other than Ranger an equal opportunity in the contest.

One important point is that each contestant will be judged on horsemanship. This makes it necessary, of course, that she own or have access to a horse and be able to ride.

The first appearance of the contestants will be in the rodeo parade. They will also all be required to ride in the Grand Entry of each rodeo performance as they will be judged on all four occasions.

The judges will select the queen on the following points: 50 percent horsemanship, 30 percent attire, and 20 percent personality.

It was decided, according to the contest chairman, that entries may either be single or married. To qualify though, she must be between the age of 14 and 21.

All contestants must be sponsored by a club, an organization or an individual.

It has been requested that all girls present, along with her application, a photograph of herself, preferably a studio portrait type, billfold size.

All applications for the contest will be accepted from June 28 to July 5. This may be accomplished by appearing in person at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, 212 Main St.

DEEP OIL TEST IS SPOTTED ON PARMER LAND

A deep oil test for the area nine miles northwest of Cisco was announced today by Fred McCright et al of Cisco as their No. 1 M.M. Parmer. Permit calls for a 4,200-foot hole to test the Ellenburger lime.

Location was given as 330 feet from the south and east lines of Section 3172, TE&L Survey, on a 240-acre lease. The site is north of a Lone Star Gas Company gas discovery drilled last winter on the Pippen land.

Mr. McCright is a well

known Cisco drilling contractor.

Elsewhere in the area, locations for three shallow tests were announced by Apex Exploration, Inc., of Cisco, for the Scranton area, southwest of town. The projects are located on the W. T. Avery place, half a mile south of Scranton.

Locations are in Section 127, Block 3, H&TC Survey, Eastland County. The permits call for 600 feet holes. A cable tool rig will be used.

HOUSTON WINS TWO MORE 1st.

Bryant Houston, Cisco's championship fiddler, won two more firsts in fiddling contests held Friday at Rockdale and Saturday at Hearne.

Mr. Houston, who lives at 407 East 19th Street, will "rosin his bow for championship" in the July 4th Old-Time Fiddlers' contest at Lake Cisco.

Approximately 3,000 people from Cisco and towns in the surrounding area turned out for last year's July 4 program, and the contemplated schedule of events this year should draw a crowd almost twice as large, Mrs. Dennie said.

Plans under discussion include a ski show below the dam to be presented by an experienced ski club from another city; an old time fiddler's

contest, inviting fiddlers from all over the country; a huge fireworks display; sack races, three-legged races, and other competitive events; and of course the Miss Cisco Beauty Pageant.

C. W. Guthrie has been named chairman of the beauty pageant, and all girls interested in participating this year should contact either Mr. Guthrie or Mrs. Eris Ritchie. Entrants will be sponsored individually by Cisco merchants.

Publicity will be the chief factor determining the success of the event, Mr. Dennie said, and publicity plans include the possibility of taking floats to adjoining towns with some of the Miss Cisco entrants.

Mr. Dennie emphasized that although these plans are not complete and are actually still in the "thinking" stage, they will soon get under way.

In French weaving, the weaver takes new thread from the seams of the garment to be mended. Using a sewing needle he replaces each damaged yarn one by one. In peice weaving, the weaver cuts out a square piece of the fabric from an unexposed area of the garment to be mended. He ravel out all four sides of the piece, leaving one-half inch fringe around all of it.

Re-weaving is not inexpensive because of the time and skill needed to do a good job. It can save an expensive garment from the ragbag, and it certainly is cheaper than replacing the item.

New federal labeling rules requiring disclosure of all materials used in making shoes have been announced recently by the Federal Trade Commission.

The FTC said the rules will go into effect at the manufacturing level in 90 days and will apply both to labeling and advertising.

These were among the principal requirements:

No trade name or coined name may be used if it falsely suggests shoes or slippers are made of a certain material.

For instance, it said "non-leather materials may not be described as "dura-leather" or "barkhyde".

If imitation leather is used, this must be disclosed through such statements as imitation leather shoeboard" or "outersole, innersole and linings composed of imitation leather".

House Approves Junketing Curbs In Burleson Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The House of Representatives has passed a bill sponsored by Congressman Omar Burleson that cracks down on travel by Members of the Congress, including a ban on foreign travel by those who will not be back for the succeeding session. It would affect travel practices of both Representatives and Senators.

The bill imposes the same traveling expense limitations upon legislators that now apply to members of other branches of the government who travel abroad on official business. It also would re-

quire the filing of complete expense statements for public inspection, including their use of foreign funds.

Members who for any reason are not returning to the next Congress would be prohibited from arranging trips after Congress adjourns.

The bill was passed by an overwhelming vote, there being only two in opposition.

Burleson was asked what he thought the Senate would do with his bill, and simply said no one could speculate on that point, "but certainly they are going to have an opportunity now, the same as the House had, to support these reforms which correct practices recently under much criticism."

Committee Asks Permission To Erect Marker

County Judge Scott Bailey announced that the Texas State Historical Survey Committee has asked permission to erect a Confederate Memorial Information Marker on the courthouse lawn in Eastland.

This information marker would pay tribute to Confederate Frontier Fort, Camp Solomon, later change to Camp McCord. It was located on the Callahan and Eastland county lines. Mr. Bailey said, "The State Historical Survey Committee feels that the military activities at this camp deserve such recognition by the state."

The planned marker is five feet high, two feet and six inches wide and eight inches thick and is made of Texas pink granite. Tentative plans call for its being located on the northwest corner of the courthouse lawn fronting Highway 80.

Judge Bailey said that the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee will be in charge of ceremonies dedicating this memorial marker. The marker will be paid for and erected by the State at no expense to Eastland County.

E. C. Lloyd Is Buried In Final Rites Monday

Funeral services for Emmett C. Lloyd, 61, were held at 3 p. m. Monday at the First Methodist Church with the Rev. G. W. French, Jr. officiating, assisted by Dr. George C. Humphrey of Waco. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery with Rust Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Lloyd, well known photographer, teacher and inventor, died in Eastland Memorial Hospital Saturday, June 22, at 5:15 p. m. after a prolonged illness.

Mr. Lloyd was the oldest son of Richard Carroll and Minnie Lou Lloyd and the grandson of Texas Ranger R. C. Lloyd, who was killed by a poisoned arrow from an Indian's bow in the pioneer days of Texas.

In the early thirties, Mr. Lloyd established the Lloyd Studio in Waco and operated it continuously since that time. Dissatisfied with hand retouching in photography, Mr. Lloyd set to work to invent a way to do that job mechanically. He finished his invention during the depression but lacked funds for a patent. During the war, he could not get materials for construction. Hence, the Lloyd Retoucher was not placed on the market until 1948 with a patent pending clause.

In 1923 he married Miss Effie Lee Holder, who preceded him in death in 1949. To them was born one son, Marvin N. Lloyd. In 1951, Mr. Lloyd married Lela Latch of Cisco.
