Funeral services for Harry Hall, 91, were held at his home here Saturday, June 15, 8:30 a. m. with Rev. Bobby Roe officiating. Interment was in the Comanche Cemetery with Harry Hall General Home directing.

Mr. Hall was born at his home about 5 p. m. In spite of his advanced age, he had been active up until the day of his death.

Born March 18, 1872 in Vallejo, Calif., he came with his parents and later at the age of one year to Sipe Springs where his father established the M. W. Hall Mercantile business. He and his brother succeeded their father in the business and later operated general stores in Carbon and Gorman. He had owned ranches in Eastland, Comanche and Moore counties.

On Oct. 11, 1905 he was married to Miss Clyde Acton of Comanche. They moved from Sipe Springs to Hamlin in 1907 where he engaged in ranching, moving later to his ranch in Moore Co. In 1917 they moved to Ft. Worth where he was employed by Armour & Co. He also attended Fort Worth Military University. The family moved to Carbon in 1919 where he engaged in ranching and later bought a mercantile business from W. M. Medford retiring in 1957. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church since the

Our 5 digit Zip Code is 76435, Postmaster C. C. Gilbert announced today. "Everyone in Carbon will use this Zip Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis sent mail," Postmaster Gilbert said.

Zip Code, the Postoffice Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Gilbert stressed the importance of all citizens of Carbon learning this city's Zip Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, Zip Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

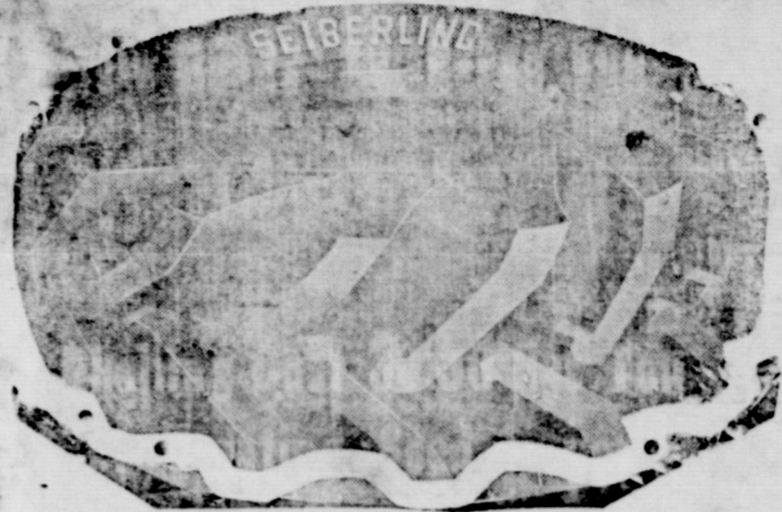

RE-WEAVING MAY BE THE ANSWER

What do you do when a live cigarette ash burns a hole in your newest dress or suit?

Reweaving is an ancient art, and many professional dry cleaners offer a re-weaving service.

Farm Bureau Participating In Fire Program

The Eastland County Farm Bureau is participating in a program to assist volunteer fire departments in fire prevention and protection in rural areas, according to Jack Cozart, Eastland County Farm Bureau president.

The local county FB leader said the Farm Bureau will help defray the expenses for sending a limited number of volunteer firemen to a Firemen's Training School to be held July 21-26 at Texas A&M College. The Farm Bureau will pay \$45 of the \$50 registration fee for members of local volunteer fire departments to attend the school which furnishes up-to-date information on fire protection and fire prevention as well as fire fighting techniques. The \$50 registration fee also covers lodging and meals, he explained.

The Farm Bureau will also pay any local organized fire department for answering calls outside of the city limits to fight fires involving the property of Farm Bureau mem-

bers carrying fire insurance with the Farm Bureau insurance company, he said. The amount of payment will be \$75 per call.

The county president said local fire departments are being urged to cooperate in the plan to reduce fire losses in rural areas of the county. Any volunteer fire department that will agree to serve rural areas will be eligible to submit an applicant for the training school. But the total number of persons that can attend is limited, and only one applicant for each department can be accepted, he concluded.

Those from Eastland County who will attend the Fire Department Training School are the following: Jim Hutchinson of Eastland, J. L. Varner of Ranger, Vernon Cozart of Cisco, Gaylon Wright of Cormant and Gene Kell of Rising Star.
