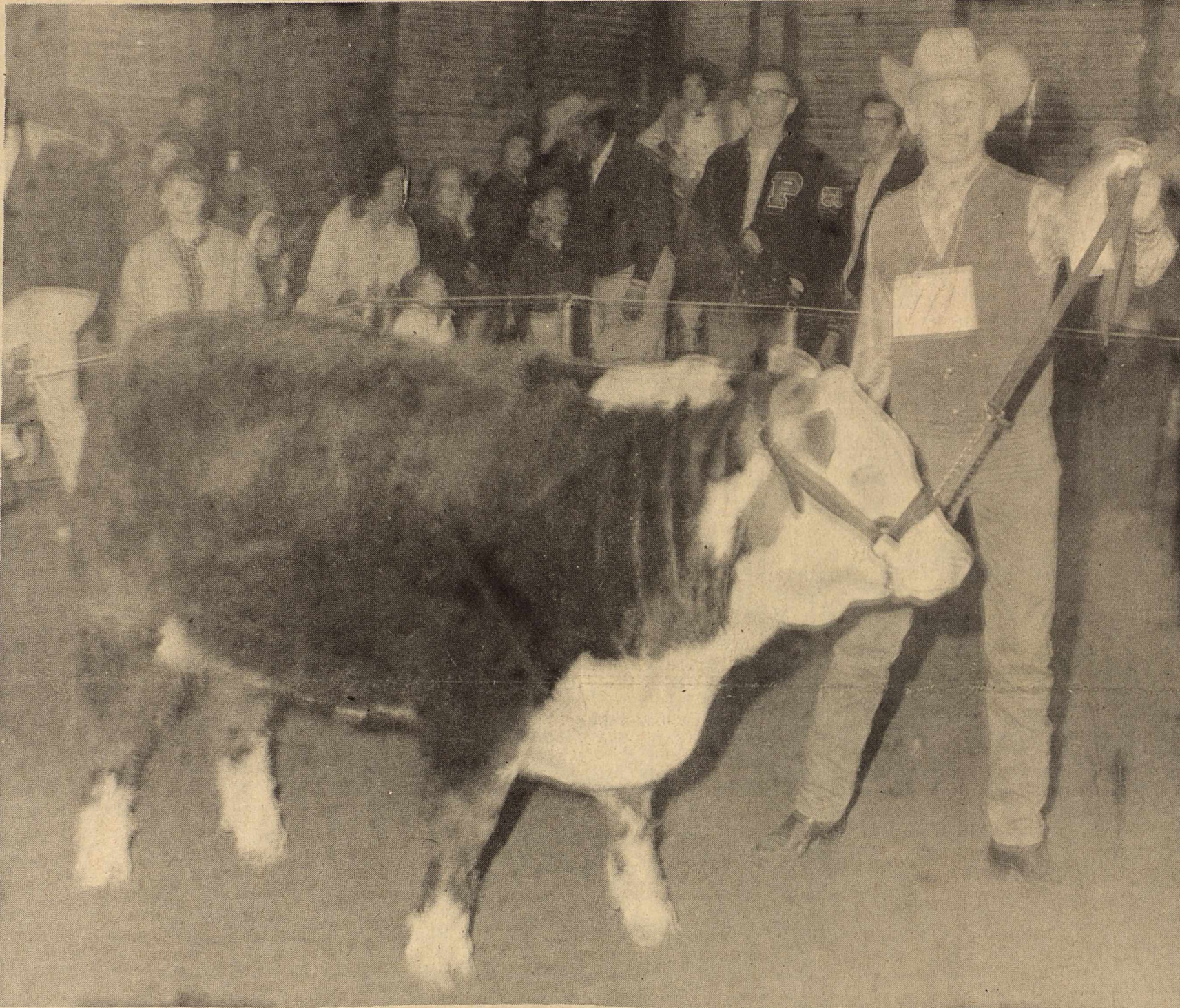

Oscar exhibited a Poland China barrow of his own breeding to grand championship honors on Friday afternoon then Saturday morning his milk fed Hereford Steer was named grand Champion of the beef calf division. Earlier Friday Bobby Taylor's 89 pound South-down was declared the grand champion lamb of the show.

Reserve Champions went to Freddie Carnley in the lamb division with his second place mutton lamb, D'Lynn McGinty second place medium weight barrow was selected as the re-

serve champion of the barrow show, and Kenneth McGinty won reserve championship in the beef calf division with his first place entry in the light weight dry lot class.

1963 Feed Grain Sign-up

According to the Yoakum County ASCS office manager farmers have through March 22, to sign up under the 1963 feed grain program.

W. M. Overton explained that under the 1963 program the total payments are larger and that the loan support price is smaller. To compare the two years the following based, on a 300 acre base and 100 index farm:

Under the 20 percent in '62 a farmer diverted 60 acres and planted 240 in grain sorghum/ and received a payment of \$768 and was limited for the CCC loan, his production on the farm not to exceed 322, 560 pounds.

Under the 1963 program, this same farm diverting 20 percent and planting 80, would receive a total payment of \$1,238.40, and all grain produced on the farm would be eligible for the loan.

To comply on one farm, a farmer must not exceed his base on any other farm, and must divert the acreage signed up.

Under the 1962 program, 296 farms complied with the program.

Final sign-up date should be kept in mind and all who have questions about the program are urged to contact the county ASCS office.

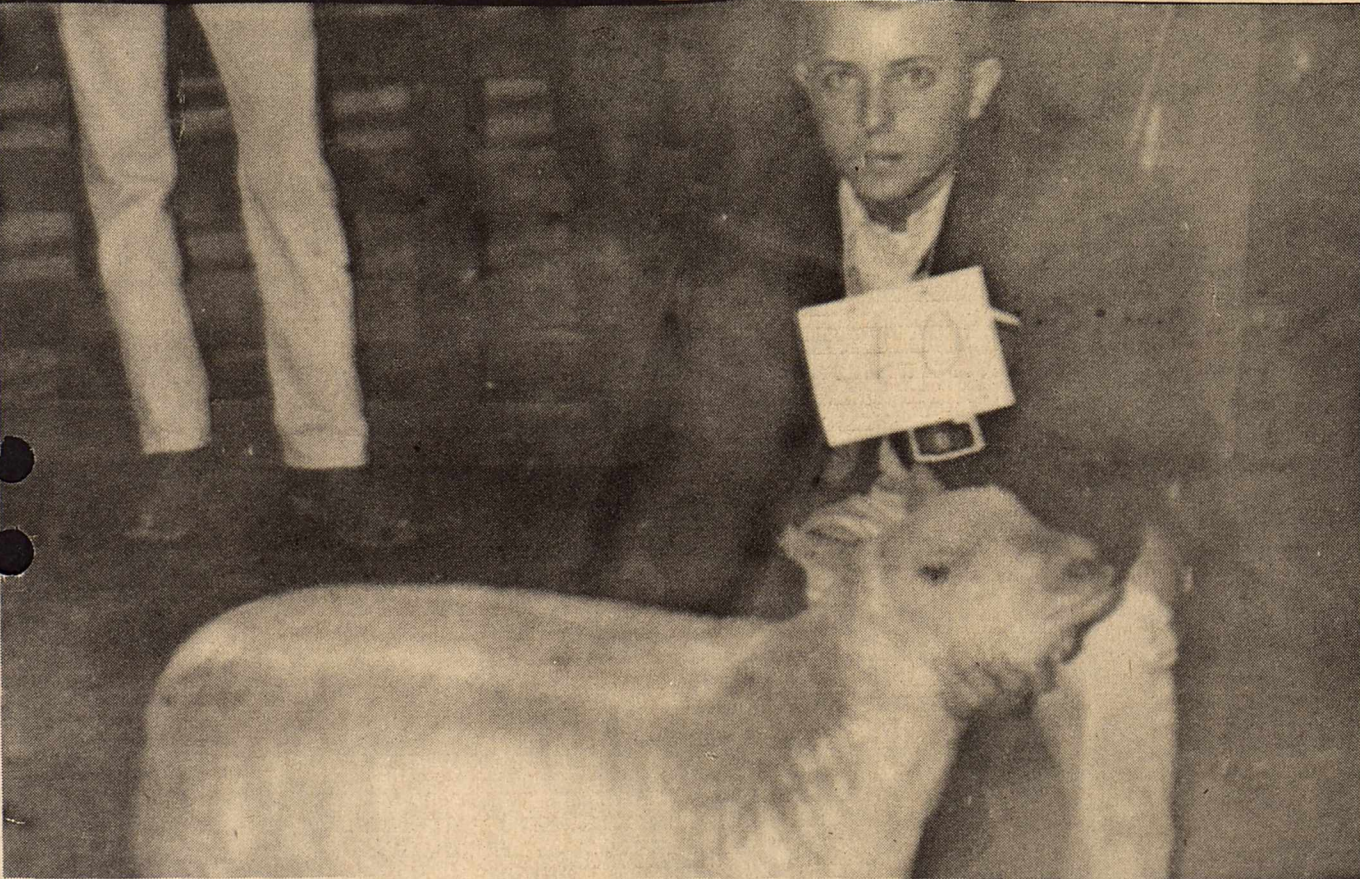
Prct Division Stirs Interest

A great deal of interest has been evident throughout the County concerning the possible changing of the existing precinct boundary lines within the county.

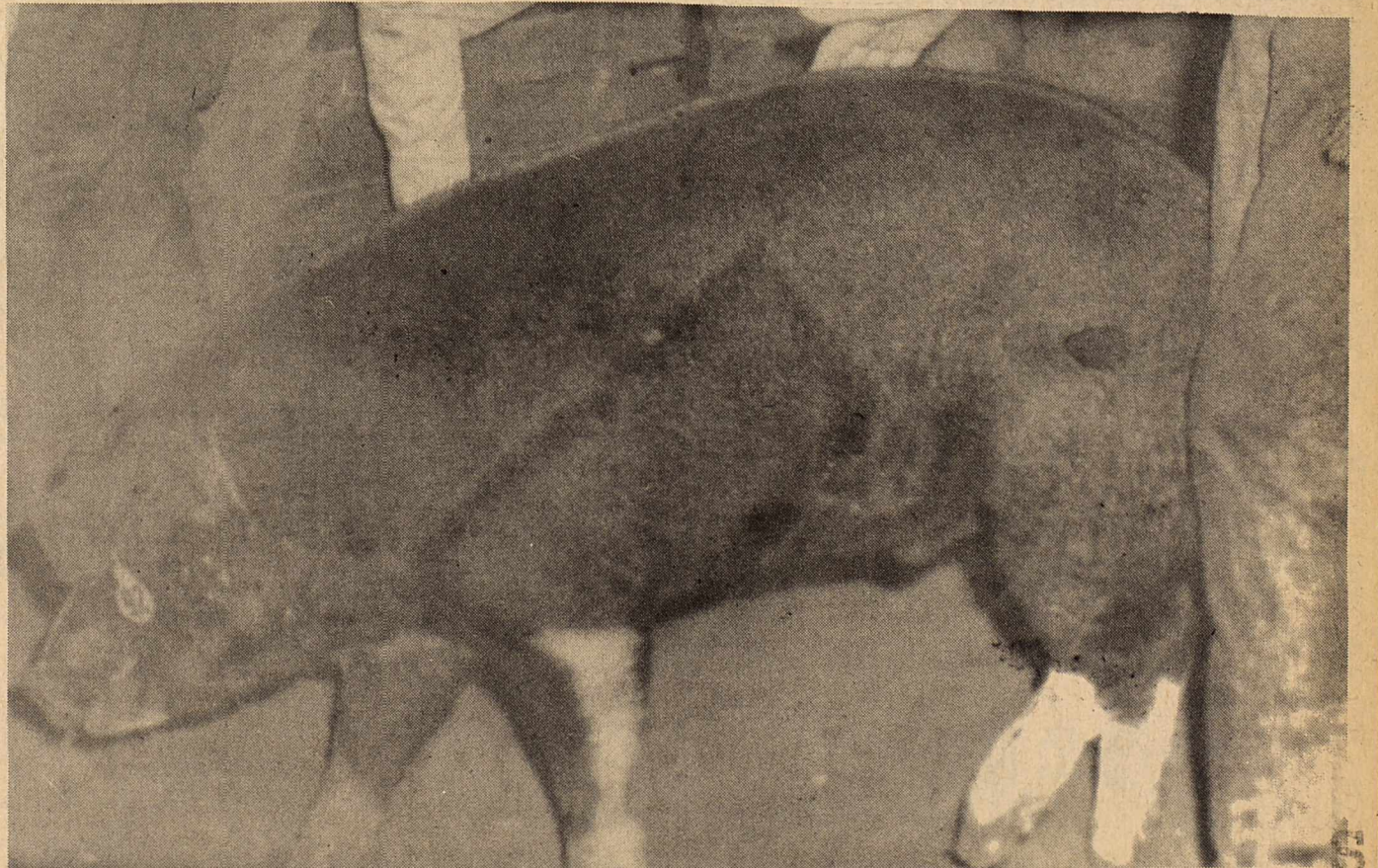
It was told that County Attorney Vernon Townes has been requested, and is in the process of drawing up a brief on the matter to see exactly what the legal ramifications of the proposition are.

The proposed changes, if enacted, would put the line running east and west dividing the county in half, four miles further south than it is presently located, thus enlarging Precincts 3 and 4 and shrinking Precincts 1 and 2.

Todd Wins Lamb Gain

Clarence Todd was the winner of the loving cup donated by Mrs. Daisy Clayton of Lovington.

Clarence made his Rambouillet lamb gain 36 pounds during the 89 day feeding period between November 17 and February 14. His lamb gained an average of .4 lbs. per day.

Bobby Taylor came in second and third in this contest by making each of his lambs put on 34 pounds and there was a tie for fourth between Ter-

rie Taylor and Billy Charles Spencer with 31 pounds each.

This is the second year that Mrs. Clayton has sponsored this contest. It is designed to encourage the lamb feeders to do the best job possible. Too many of the feeders, according to Mr. Leo White, Yoakum County Agent, make the mistake of buying large lambs that can't be pushed all during the feeding period without weighing more than the 110 pound limit at show time.

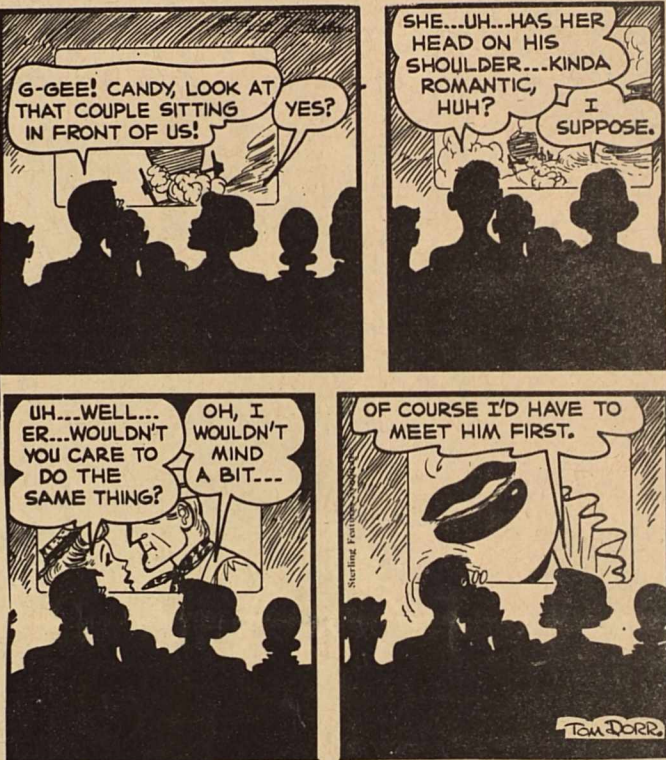

ITEM: Potatoes are not necessarily fattening. It's what the cook does to them that makes them high in calorie count. Mashed potatoes, with fat and whole milk per serving, average 115 calories. French fries jump to 155 calories; hash-brown up to 235. Lowest calorie counter of all, plain boiled potatoes, about 45 calories per serving.

ITEM: The simple practice of buying two sheets per year for each bed in the house will help the homemaker keep an adequate supply on hand—which should be about six sheets for every bed. This allows for two sheets in use, two in the laundry, two in reserve.

ITEM: Refrigerators operating on the thermoelectric principle are on the retail market this year. This principle of refrigeration lends itself to small units with no moving parts to wear or cause mechanical troubles. Many models are of console style with wood-grained exterior, and intended use will be for living and recreation rooms.



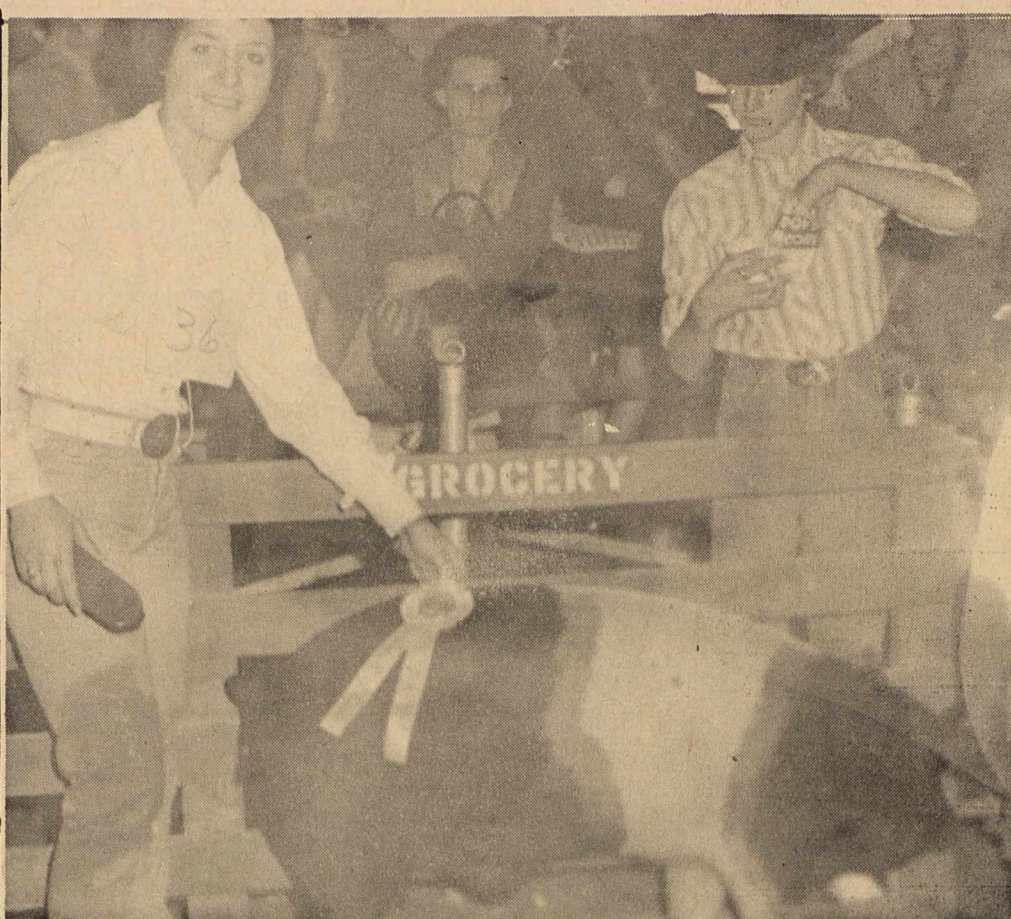

Field Wins Beef Gain

The beef calf gain contest, sponsored by Mr. G. W. Cleveland, was won this year by Dan Field. Dan fed a Santa Gertrudis steer that gained 698 pounds during the 272 day feeding period. This gave him a daily gain of 2.56 lbs. The steer was bred by Dan's father, Ty Field.

Beef calf feeders set a goal each year and strive to make their animals gain 700 pounds during the period which begins on the third Saturday in May and ends at the weighing at show time.

Dan fell short of the goal by only two pounds. Only four animals have reached the

700 pound goal during the nine years that Mr. Cleveland has sponsored the contest and all of those were in the same year, 1959, when there was, a 286 day feeding period.

Others standing high in the gain contest were Jimmy O'Neal, 645; Ty Earl Powell, 616; Micheal McPherson, 607; Lynn Fitzgerald, 581; Kathleen McGinty, 563; and Craig McPherson, 546. Thirty three calves were in the gain contest at the finish.

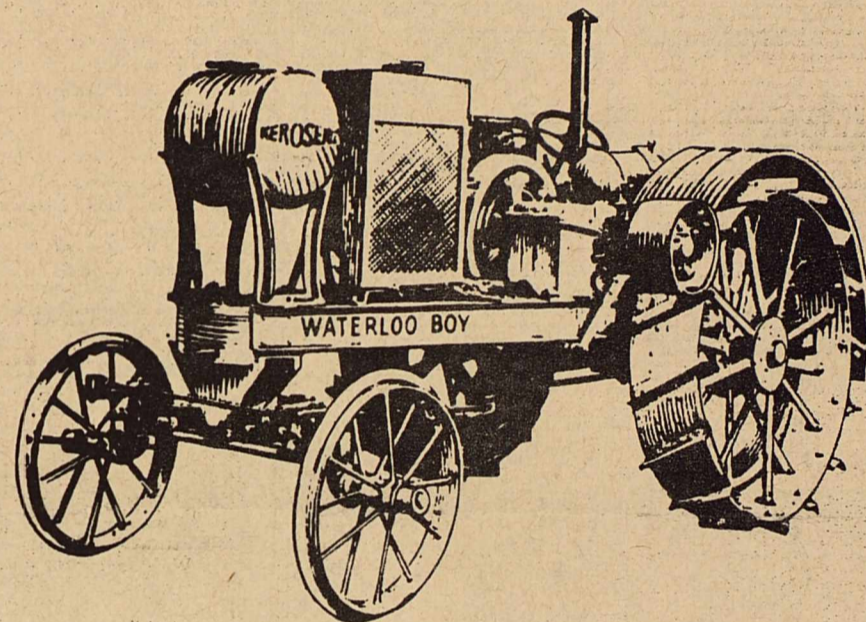

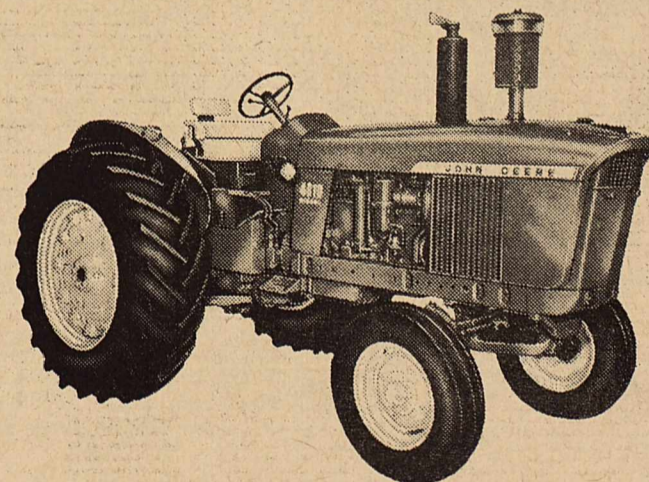

Mention was made this week of the fact that City of Plains elections are slated for the very near future.

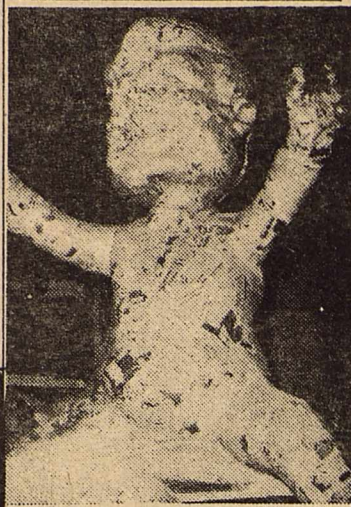
The election is set for the 2nd of April, at which time there will be elected three councilmen and the City Judge.

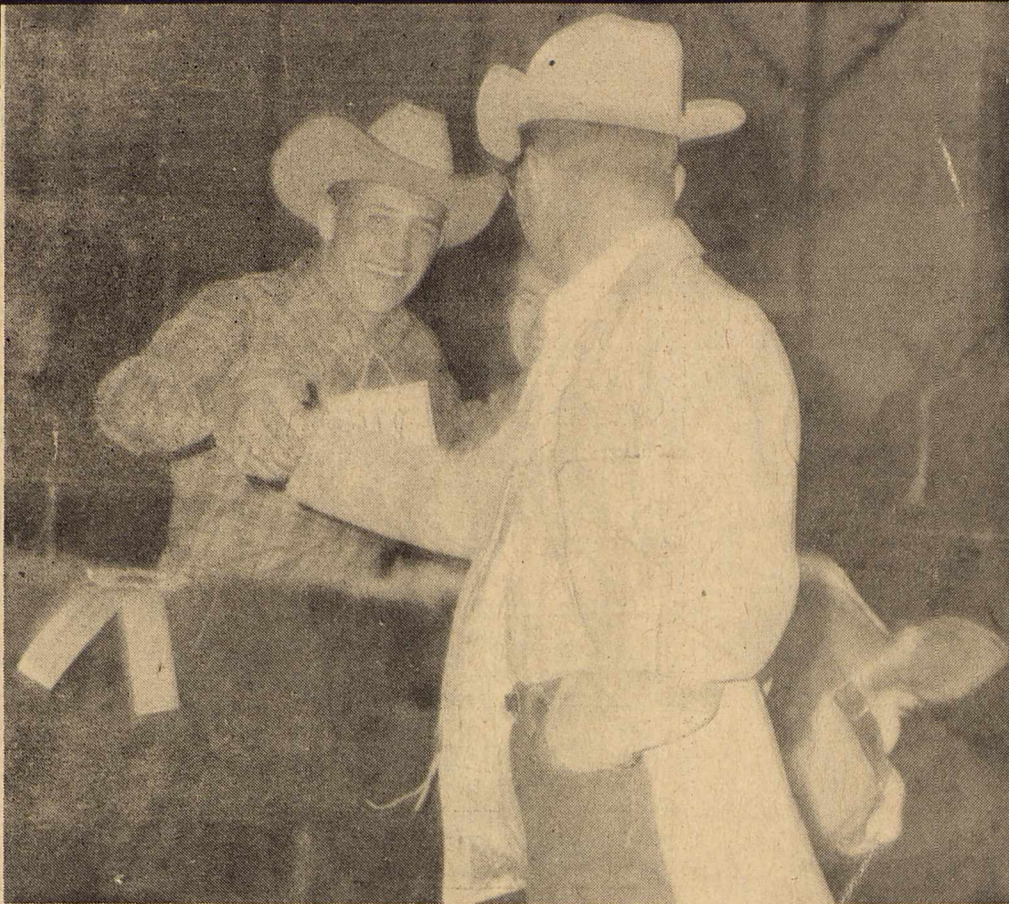
Filing deadline for the election was stated to be twelve o'clock midnight on March 3.

113 Animals Sell For \$15,253.62

The 1963 sale was another big success for the Yoakum County Livestock and Agriculture Improvement Association. Beef Calves had a floor of \$24.25 and the average price was \$36.91. The barrows were on a floor of \$15.75 and the average price was

\$38.06. The biggest jump was in the lambs where there was a floor of \$17 and the average price was \$74.86.

The 113 animals were valued at \$7,296.14, so the buyers made a contribution of \$7,957.48. All the totals and averages are including the grand and reserve champions.

South then led three rounds of clubs, sluffing a small heart on the queen of clubs and ruffing the third round to establish the 10 in the dummy. A small diamond was then trumped on the board and another heart sluffed on the ten of clubs. A small heart failed to entice East, who held up on the ace and the trick fell to the king. South then led the ace of diamonds and trumped the last small diamond on the board to make one over contract.

COMMENT: North decided the slam depended on location of the ace of hearts; therefore she took the chance and jumped to the slam bid after her partner's jump bid. East should have taken the heart trick, although South already had the bid made.
