

Section 8. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance or failing to observe any provision hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in

deemed a seperate offense and punishable as such.

council of the City of Plains, Yoakum Gounty, Texas: Section 1: Deposit required: That from and after the passage of this ordinance no extension of water lines and/or gas lines and/or sewer lines shall be made to serve areas

Section 3: Provision for efund or refunds under the terms hereof are as follows. A. If any water lines larger than 8 inches in diameter are required to be installed under the terms of the designs so prepared as above provided, the City of Plains, Texas will bear the expense of the enstallation of all lines larger than 8 inch lines, and like wise if any sewer lines larger than 8 inch in diameter are required

to be installed the City of Plains, Texas will bear the expense of the difference in the cost of the line actually installed and the estimated cost of an 8 inch line as the estimated is prepared by the City of Plains, Texas, by and through its City Council, Such expense shall be born as follows: The whole cost of the line or

lines so laid, water and/or gas and/or sewer, shall be as provided in this ordinance so deposited under the terms hereof with the City of Plains, Texas, and the City agrees to refund such difference in cost of an 8 inch line and the line actually installed in five equal annual installments, with no interest allowed, the first installment being due and payable on July 1st of the City's next fiscal year followin the fiscal year in which the in-

stallations are made, and the balance on July 1st of each succeeding fiscal year thereafter, until fully refunded, and no interest shall be paid by the City of Plains, Texas on these deposits so made. B. Fifty per Cent of one-half of the total amount deposited by the owner or owners of the land to be served by such water and/or gas and/or sewer line extensions shall not be refunded to the said owner or owners but shall be retained by the City of Plains, Yoakum County, Texas for its sole exculsive ase and C. The other one-half or fifty per cent of the amount so deposited shall be refunded on the following basis: When 10% of the total number of lots served by such water and/or gas and/or sewer extension have been developed and are connected to the water and/or gas and/or sewer lines then 20% of such one-half of the deposit shall be refunded to the said owner or owners so making the deposits: when



b. Any person of Negro extraction would be at liberty to file a charge in federal court against any prospective employer, whether or not the cause of rejection were racial. The prospective employer would have to prove himself innocent of the charge. This would no doubt be the procedure, and the balance of power would shift to the Negro, creating in reverse the same discriminatory situation which now exists. Employers would be inclined to discriminate against the white employee in fear of federal indictment if a Negro were denied employment for ANY reason.

5. That there are many reasons, other than racial why a privately-owned or public facility might refuse admittance or service to a person or persons. Personal cleanliness is one of these. (The operator of a swimming pool told me last week that some people (white people) come to his pool "not to swim but to take a bath.") He denies them admittance. Under the proposed law a Negro, denied admittance for a hygenic reason, could claim that he had been rejected for racial reasons. He could file suit in federal court.

6. That we as a nation have allowed this to become a political issue, accepting the principle and practice of mass demonstrations as a means of coercion. The principle takes the law from the hands of legal authority and invites further disrespect for law and order.

7. That a re-evaluation of the whole question should be made at once and that the principle of the Golden Rule be the yardstick of this study.

8. That in the light of Christian conscience each community at once should take action, retaining control of its own affairs, the alternative being an authoritarian method by the Federal Government and its resultant lessening of personal liberty for everyone.

9. That any citizen, regardless of race, should be made thoroughly to understand that if he is to have equal rights he must be willing, and will be expected to, assume responsibility commensurate with his privileges.

10. That every thinking citizen should make his views known to his Congressmen.

Reduction In Future Wheat Allotments

Overplanting wheat allotments thisyear can reduce a farm's future allotments, according to R. J. Miears agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service This effect on a farm's wheat history is one of several factors which farmers will anwt to consider in planning their 1964 crop operations.

Miears calls attention to a provision of the law passed in 1968 which can affect a farm's wheat acreage history. It directs that when no marketing quotas are in effect, farms exceeding allotments will ree ceive that year's alloted acres as history for future allotments. Complying farms receive their base acreage as history, he

says. The agronomist cited this example of how the provision would apply on a farm with a 100-acre wheat base and a 1964 allotment of 60 acre s. If a farmer complies with his allotment, his wheat acreage credit for 1964 will be based on the 100-acre history. But if he exceeds his allotment, he will be credited with only 60 acres in computing his 19 66 allotment.

Overplanting for the 1964 wheat crop will not affect the the 1965 allotment since national and state 1964 wheat acreage figures will not be available when allotments are determined.

A farmer who overplants his 1964 allotment, Miears points out, can still avoid loss of base acreage history. He can dispose of his excess acreage by the deddling date sters.




