Crash Claims Three Lives

DUFF RITES ARE HELD MONDAY

FARQUHAR INFANTS' FUNERAL TUESDAY

A car-pickup crash about one mile west of Plains on the Lovington highway last Saturday morning at about 9 a. m. claimed the lives of three persons.

Well-known Plains business leader and civic worker, Rod Duff, and the children of two former Plains residents were killed in the accident.

Two-year old Rickey Dean Farquhar and his four month old sister, Rhonda Ann, children of Mr. and Mrs. Royce Farquhar of Route 1, Ropesville were, in addition to Duff, victims of the accident.

The Farquhar's had come to Plains on Friday to attend the annual homecoming activities, and, at the time of the wreck, were returning to their farm home between Meadow and Ropesville.

Funeral services for the two Farquhar children were held in the local school auditorium at 10 a. m. Tuesday morning. The Rev. C. J. Coffman, a former pastor here, and presently pastor of the Parkview Baptist Church in Littlefield, officiated at the services. Burial was in Yoakum County Cemetery here under direction of Singleton Funeral Home, Denver City.

Memorial services for Rod Duff were held, also in the auditorium, on Monday morning at 11 a. m. Pastor of First Baptist Church here, The Rev. J. L. Bozeman, officiated at the services. Burial was in Resthaven Cemetery in Lubbock, also under the direction of Singleton.

Investigating officers report that the crash occurred when the automobile driven by Farquhar was travelling east approaching Plains, and when the pickup driven by Duff was crossing the highway, evidently going to his place of business, Plains Farm Supply.

The four-month old Farquhar infant was killed instantly as she was thrown against the car's dash. Her brother succumbed while being admitted to the emergency section of Denver City Hospital. Duff died shortly after being admitted, also to the Denver City Hospital.

Royce and Barbara Farquhar are both graduates of Plains High School, and were visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Meil in addition to attending the Plains homecoming. They are presently engaged in farming near Ropesville.

Mrs. Farquhar, who is described as having serious internal injuries, was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where her condition is described as still being very serious.

Her husband, Royce, was released from Yoakum County Hospital on Sunday.

Duff is well known in Plains and the surrounding area as being very active in civic and other areas of endeavor. He was a member and a past-president of the County Hospital Board. He was instrumental in the organization of and was elected first president of the Yoakum County Water Conservation Association. He was a past-president of the Plains Lions Club and was a director

of the Plains Chamber of Commerce. He also was known for his great interest and devotion to his church.

Rod is survived by his wife, Christine; two daughters, Kim and Deborah; a son, Glenn, who live in Plains. Also of Plains are his mother, Mrs. Nell Duff; a sister, Mrs. H. W. Taunton; and a brother Buford.

Other survivors include, a brother, L. J. Jr. of Levelland, and two other sisters, Mrs. Clay Mims of Seminole and Mrs. Pauline Chilton of Beaumont.

The Farquhar children are survived by their parents; and their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Meil of Plains and Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Farquhar of Lamar, Arkansas.

Cowboys Trounce O'Donnell Here TO MEET SEAGRAVES THERE

The Plains Cowboys travel this week to do battle in something of a show-down game with the always-tough Seagraves Eagles.

Game time is 7:30 p. m. in Eagle Stadium in Seagraves.

The Eagles, rated by odds makers as the number three team in Class A rank in the state can be expected to perform well against Plains, and Coach Rip Sewell reports the Cowboys are "ready and rarin' to go."

A fine game of good football should be on tap for an football fan from anywhere.

In Friday night's homecoming tilt which pitted the Cowboys against the O'Donnell Eagles, saw the Plains team do a fine job both offensively and defensively.

The Cowboys jumped out in

the first five minutes of the game and racked up a commanding 14 point lead.

The first tally was scored on a thirty two yard spectacular run by halfback Roland Faires, and the second came in a rather unusual way. A field goal try by Jack Lowe was blocked by O'Donnell. The ball was then scooped up by Lowe, who when he was about to be tackled, lateralled it to Alvie Faulkenberry who tallied from the 10 yard line. Jack Lowe was good for both conversions.

Neither team scored in the second quarter, so the first half ended with the Cowboys leading by 14-0.

The third quarter saw the Cowboys come bounding back again to score six with John Robertson carrying for 2 yards

from the quarterback slot. Lowe again kicked the extra point.

In the fourth period, the Eagles got their one and only score of the game which was set up on a 33 yard pass completion. Tom Ed Vestal tallied from the one and try for two points failed.

The Cowboys tallied again also in the fourth when John Robertson intercepted an Eagle pass and ran it 25 yards to the one, from where he tallied on a keeper. Try for point was blocked, and the game ended with the score 27 for Plains and 6 for O'Donnell.

Coach Sewell pointed out that quarterback, Mike Field, got his hand injured again in the game, and that he is probably out for the balance of the season.

THE PLAINS RECORD has now about completed its move to its new quarters this week.

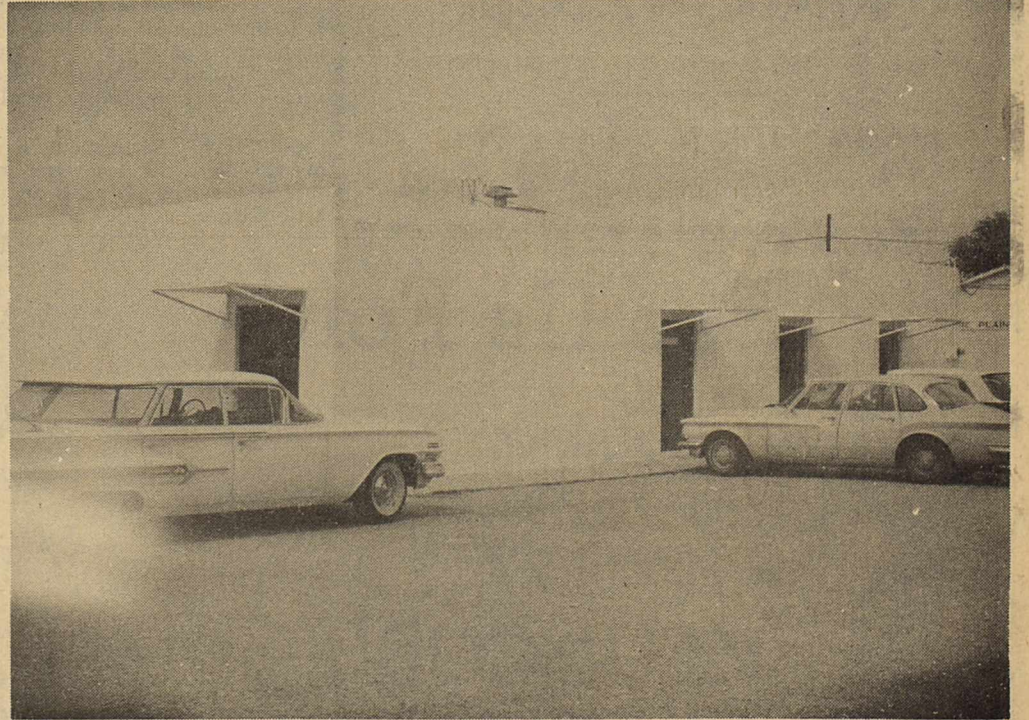
The Record and Plains Quality Printers are now located in the north half of the new Don Hancock building just north of the Courthouse Square and di-

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF SWINE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS; PROVIDING PENALTY FOR VIOLATION

OF THIS ORDINANCE AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith.

BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep or cause to be kept, for any purpose whatever, any swine within the corporate limits of the City of Plains, Texas.

Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction of such violation, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in an amount

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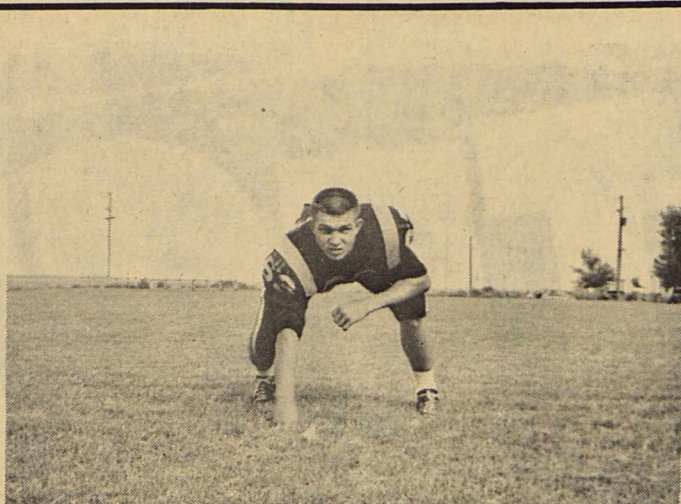


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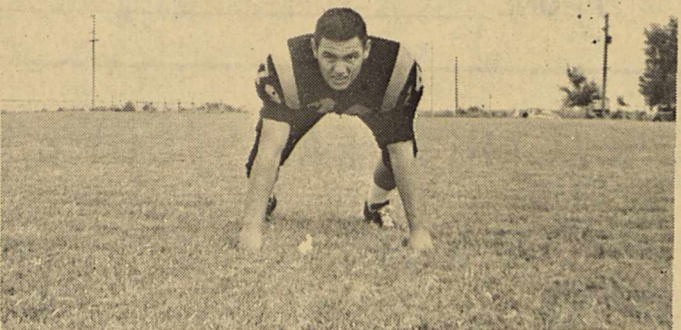
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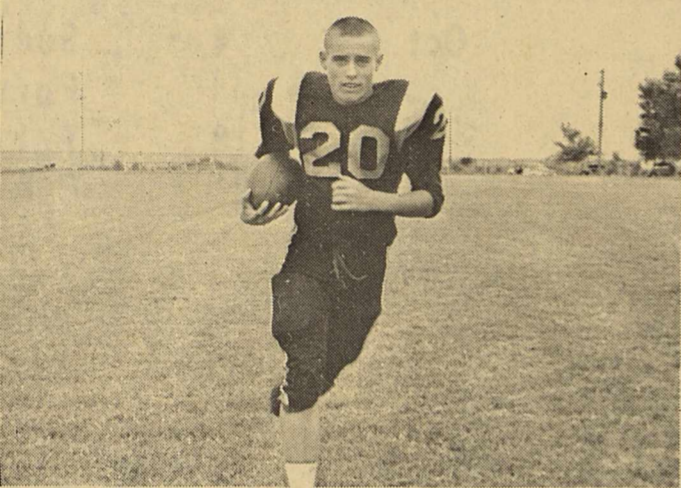

Crop Residue Time Here

Now is the time farmers must decide how they are going to protect their land from wind and water erosion through this winter and spring.

It has been determined by the experience of local farmers, that crop residue left on the surface is one of the best means of protecting the land. A growing crop such as small grain will also provide a satisfactory cover to protect the land.

Residue cover causes the soil to absorb water more rapidly and this will reduce the total runoff. It also reduces the amount of soil lost by either water or wind erosion.

The amount of protection afforded by crop residue depends on a number of conditions. Some of these conditions are: the amount of residue on the surface, the extent to which re-

sidue is anchored in the soil, type of plant from which the residue came, and the extent of decay of residue.

Residue left standing has proven to be the most effective means in providing protection against wind erosion.

When there is insufficient residue for a cover, some type of emergency tillage will be needed to prevent blowing. Emergency tillage should start as soon as it is evident that the soil will start to blow. Don't start sooner than this, but don't wait too long. Considerable moisture is lost from the soil when it is worked before necessary for wind erosion control or for seedbed preparation.

REMEMBER! There is no substitute for a good cover of growing crops or crop residues. Keep the land covered all year.

Rice, ahead 12-1 in the series with Tech, is 3-2 (wins over Louisiana State, Stanford, and SMU; losses to Penn State and Texas).

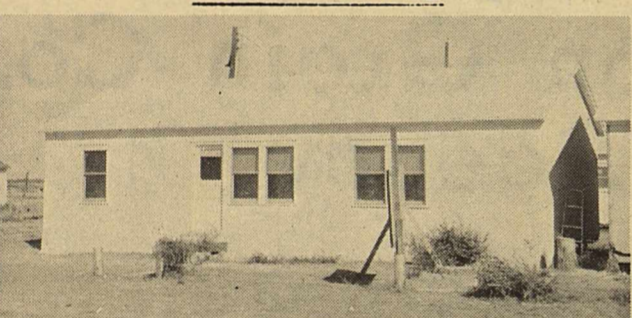

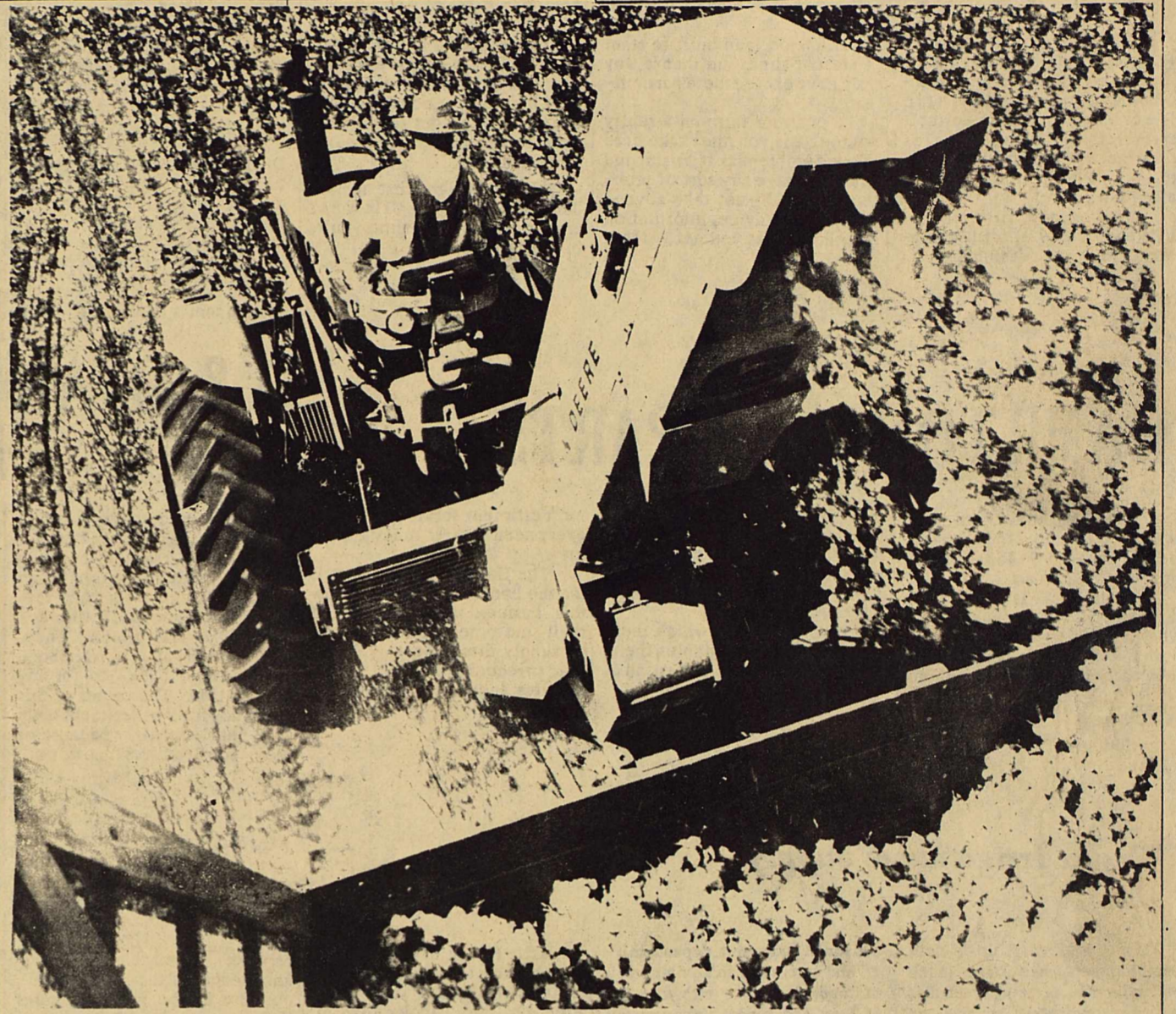
