

Monday night, November 25, and is to begin at 7:30 p.m. It is scheduled to be held in Alma's.







The snowsuit manfacturers, who must accept a good deal of responsibility in this matter also may be awakening to the crying need for improvement in their product. One experimental model being dummytested consists of an X-frame to which the child is strapped. 
was unable to ever cross the 20 yard line. Plains then wound up in third place in District 5-A, and had a season's record of five wins and five losses.






