We were a little disappointed that we didn't get more reaction to an article which appeared in last week's edition of the Record than we did.

The article appeared on page eight and was submitted for publication to most of the newspapers of the country, several of which ran it in an un-edited form as did The Record.

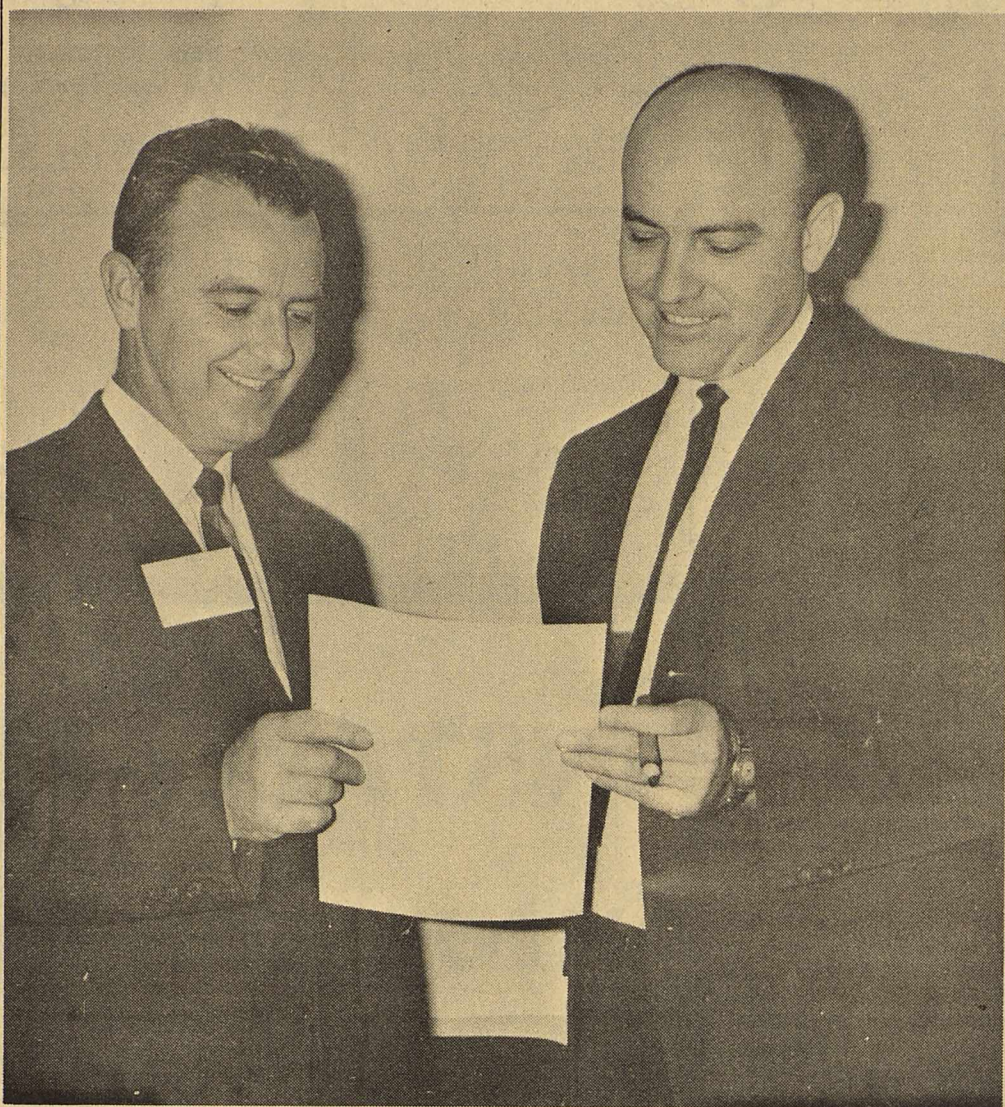
It concerned itself with the liquor industry in our country and especially with how much revenue that industry pays in various and sundry forms of federal, state and local taxes each year.

Even though we didn't agree one whit with the article we felt that possibly it should be run in an effort to show the public to what lengths the liquor industry will go to try to defend itself and to rationalize reasons for its acceptance. Anyone who believed the article in its entirety must surely view the business of procuring booze almost as being on a par with the work done nationally by all the charitable organizations lobbied together.

I personally have a great amount of difficulty in viewing as charitable any industry whose produces as much misery and heartbreak as does the liquor industry.

One very obvious omission in their calculations was the very well known fact that on a national basis, it takes from two and one-half to three times the amount of revenue received from all sources of taxation on the sale and production of booze, to police and clean up after the effect that it produces on our society. And, this is not counting all the heartbreak that is caused either directly or indirectly by alcohol consumption. Such things as broken homes, death due to over-consumption and its part in auto accidents and the rise in crime that can be partly attributed to more and greater consumption of alcoholic beverages.

In my personal view, I would have to discount the article completely, as I just don't believe any golden age of righteousness or charity will ever be ushered in by booze.

Plains Man Takes Own Life

It was reported here yesterday that Bernard Nehbut of Plains died in Yoakum County Hospital in Denver City about 9:30 p. m. last night.

Cause of death was reported to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound, which Nehbut apparently suffered about 2 p. m. yesterday (Wednesday).

Investigating officer, Olan Heath, Plains Deputy, stated that a single bullet, a .22 calibre hollow point, fired from an automatic pistol by Nehbut, by placing the weapon in his mouth and discharging it was the cause of the wound.

Heath said that he discovered Nehbut still alive, but having lost much blood, following a report from Nehbut's estranged wife, who had gone to their Plains home with two other ladies, evidently very shortly after the shooting occurred. She is reported to have found the house locked up, but found Bernard's vehicle outside and became concerned

so she informed Deputy Heath who investigated and in turn found the mortally wounded Nehbut, who had fallen off the bed where the shot had been inflicted, to the floor where he lay unconscious and where he was discovered by Heath.

Dr. Clyde Lynn, Plains physician, was called, as was the local Barrett's Funeral Home ambulance. Upon the

advice of Lynn, Nehbut was rushed to Denver City Hospital where he succumbed to the wound that he had received some seven and one-half hours earlier.

The Nehbuts have one son, D'Wayne, who presently lives in Morton.

Morton Funeral Home is said to be in charge of funeral arrangements which are at the present time, still pending.

HOSPITAL IMPROVEMENTS UNDER CONSIDERATION

Expectation has been expressed that Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County will be discussing some proposed improvements for Yoakum County Hospital in Denver City, according to County Judge Stanley Duvall.

Items to be under discussion include the possible employing

of more registered nurses for the hospital, as it is reported that there are only two RN's presently employed. Also on the agenda was said to be the possible ways and means of bringing some of the facilities of the hospital up to date.

Replacement of certain items of equipment and the possible employment of the additional nurses were ideas suggested, according to Duvall.

Santa Day On Tap Saturday Parade At 10:30

'No Pit' Order Now Official

November 1, 1963.

Climaxing a great deal of effort on the part of Yoakum County Water Conservation Association, a group of men dedicated to proposition of protecting water resources of our area, was the issuance of an official order by the Texas Water Pollution Control Board making it unlawful to dispose of oilfield brine wastes by dumping them open, unlined surface pits anywhere in the County.

The order which is now in effect reads in part as follows: "An Order of the Texas Water Pollution Control Board requiring the termination of discharges onto the surface of the earth in Yoakum County, Texas, of oil and gas field wastes by

"The board is of the opinion and finds that such discharges in Yoakum County cause a condition of pollution and should be discontinued."

The order goes on in detail to explain the further ramifications of the order and its implementation, stating that penalties will be determined by the board.

Most area oil companies have installed redwood tanks to contain the brine water, from which it is taken to various points in the county where pressure injection wells are located. These wells force the brine wastes into strata below the fresh water level making them harmless.

Total amount ginned to date or on the yard ready to be ginned was reported to be 25,739 bales as of noon on Wednesday.



certainly have given the Lobos a run for their money. In the first period, the Cowboys only managed to tally six points while Levelland racked up 23.

In the following three periods of play, Plains scored 42 points while the Lobos scored 41, final score winding up at 48 for the Cowboys and 64 for Levelland.

On Thursday night, the 19th Plains faces Seagraves for the tourney opener, at 7 p. m.

On Friday night Morton is to be the opponent also at 7.

Then on Saturday, the final night, Plains will be pitted against the host, Denver City at 8:30.

Team award will be given to the winner and eight all-tournament winners will be named.

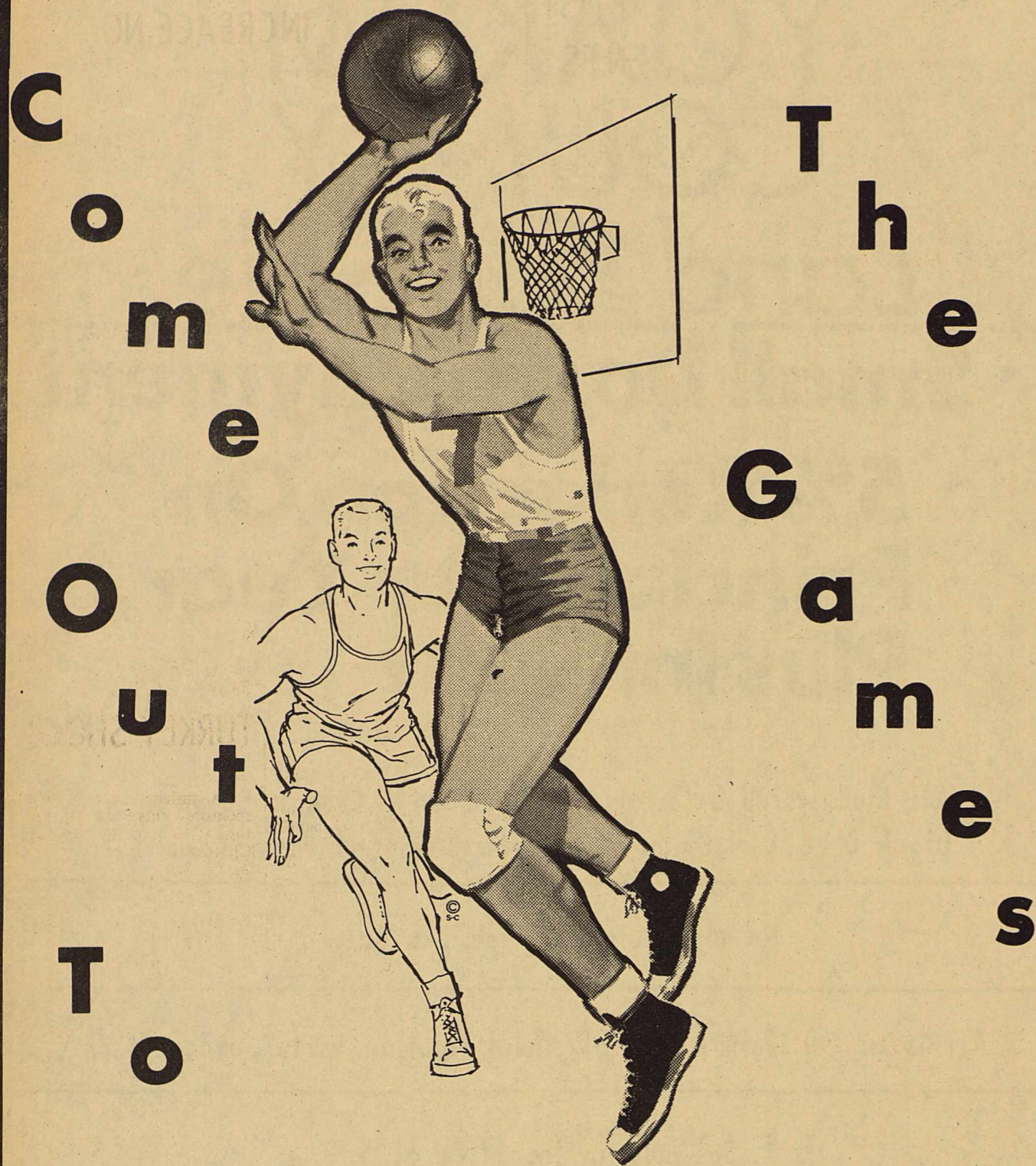

COTTON ALLOTMENT INCREASE NOTED

According to figures released last week, Yoakum County's 1964 Cotton Allotment has been increased over that of 1963.

Allotment reports received from the Texas ASC Office reveal an increase here of 285 acres.

This year's original cotton allotment figured at 32,852, whereas, according to the report it will total 33,127 in '64.

Like increases were noted in all West Texas counties, as all received approximately an increase of 1%.

The ardas total base allotment in 1964 is 2,132,499 acres compared to 2,110,499 in 1963 for the entire South Plains.

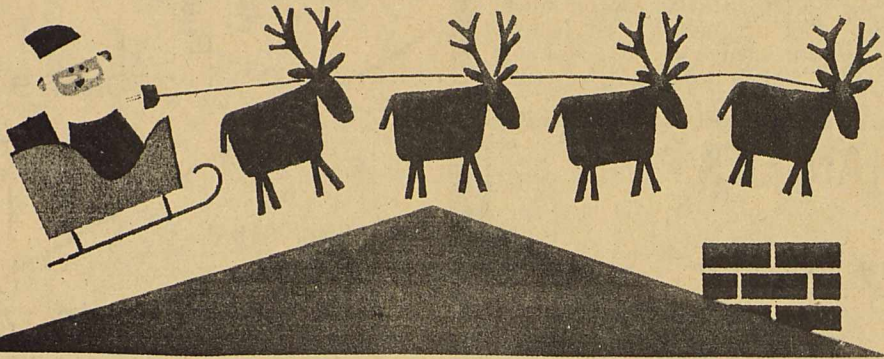
It was pointed out that these are base figures only and do not include acres received

though the Release and Reapportionment program which yielded an additional 91,684 acres for the South Plains in 1964. Plains Cotton Growers state that there is nothing to indicate that this figure will be substantially different for next year.

The increase in area allotment came in spite of the fact that the Texas total allotment for 1964 was reduced 30,657 acres from 6,869,104 to 6,838,347. According to a spokesman for Plains Cotton Growers, this is due to the State Committee's making a more efficient use of the state's allotment.

The national cotton allotment for 1964 was set at the 16 million acre statutory minimum, as it was in 1963.

The group points out that this is a real fine opportunity for you to get your Christmas Turkey.

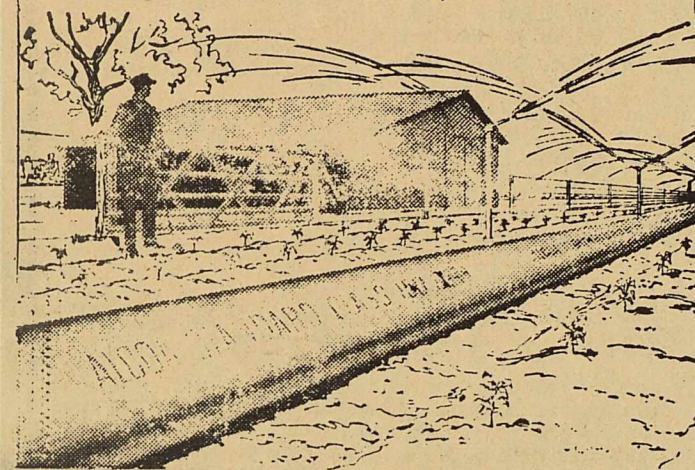
Entrants are asked to bring their own guns and shells and the fee has been set at \$2 per round and it was pointed out that their will be a winner in every round.

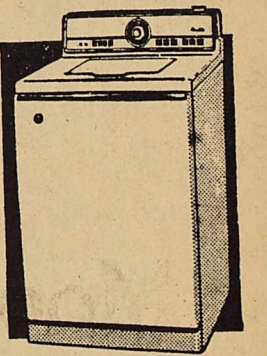

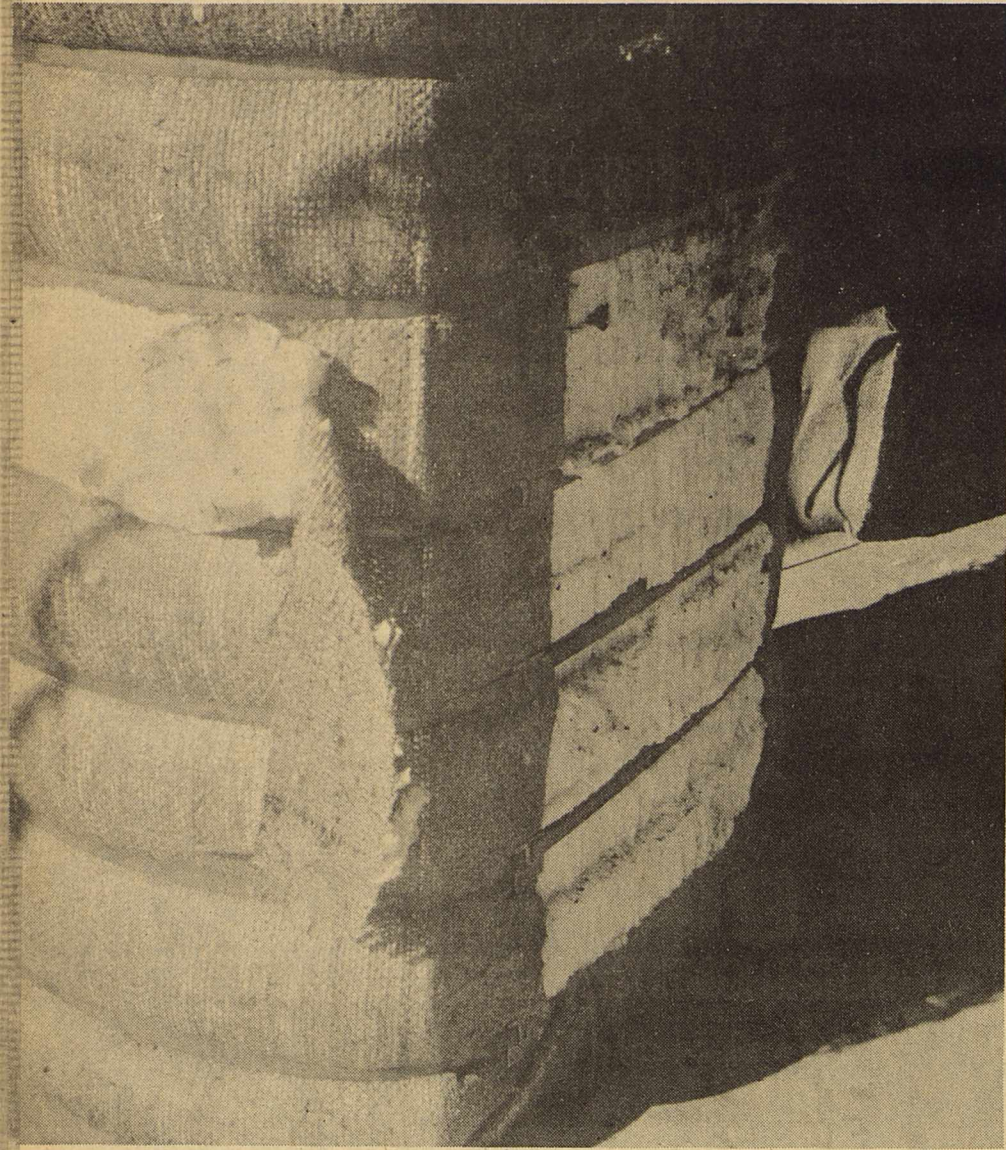

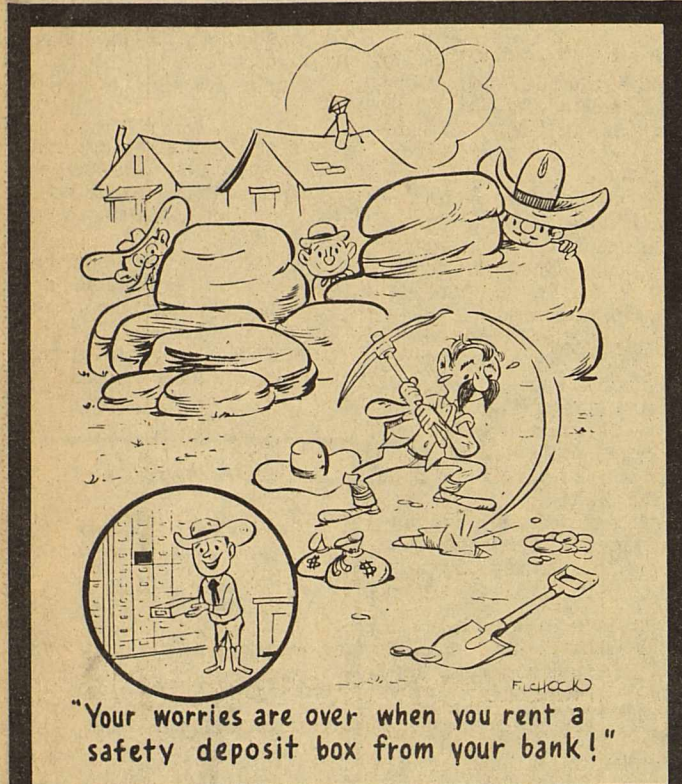
