

He will be enrolled in the


course until July 8,1964, and has stated that following its completion, he has made no definite plans or commitments.







Your chance of remaining well during the cold winter months head may be increased if you take certain simple precautions

With the onset of winter, the commonest causes of illness are arious respiratory infections. of these, influenza is undoubtly most important. It breaks in epidemic form about very two or three years, af-ecting large numbers of inividuals within a short time. t is a more serious disease then it occurs in the middleged and older groups and in pregnant women. Influenza akes its greatest toll among ith such debilitating diseases high blood pressure, rheuma-heart disease, asthma, bronitis, tuberculosis, and hardeng of the arteries.

The health hazard from flu as in the past been lessened a simple immunization pro-Vaccination now is recnmended as a useful precau-on, and, if the virus does not ange, should provide protec-on for a significant number of shows that in 1957 Asian flu was substantially reduced after

vaccination. Flu vaccine is manufactured according to formulas and procedures prescribed by the United States Public Health Service. It presently contains killed virus of the A and B strains now prevalent in the United States, and of several other strains known to cause influence in the property i influenza in the past.
Surgeon General Luther L.

Terry strongly urges the use of flu vaccine, especially by certain groups. He has repeatedly emphasized that the chronically ill and those over forty-five. but especially those over sixty-five, should be vaccinated. For some of these people, timely immunization may be a lifesaving measure.

HUMBLE TIPS Yoakum County Cotton

farmers voted on December 10 long with other farmers over he nation in favor of cotton narketing quotas on the 1964 otton crop. The vote in Yoaum County was 224 for and 90 gainst. Farmers voted at all he cotton gins in the county and at the Plains Courthouse. This year almost 100% of the Yoakum County farmers voted any cotton referendum in this ount. The percent voting for Marketing Quotas over the nation was 94, 2%. The FOR vote ranged from 38, 3% in California to 98% in Mississippi.

Due to the fact that a number of new cotton bills have been introduced in Congress, it would be well for all interested persons to keep a close watch on new legislation that may be passed affecting cotton.

"There are two things every citizen can do" the Major said "First, obey the law, drive defensively, refrain from drinking and observe the other behavior patterns which may be called self-control. Second, multiply

the efforts of your Highway Patrol and Police by reporting violations quickly in order to control others who are apparently headed for an accident. "

State-wide approximately seven hundred patrolmen plus one hundred fifty patrolmen from the other uniformed servicas of the Department of Public Safety will be on the job during the nine days from December 24 to January 1 and in addition local law enforcement bodies will intensify their efforts. How ever, Texas sixty thousand miles of highway requires that each all traffic accidents. He also patrolman will have an average called attention to the signifiof seventy miles of highway to supervise traffic for on a twentyfour hour basis. The enforcement effort could be greatly multiplied if citizens will report the description and license numbers to the nearest enforcement agency every time a haz-

ardous act is observed, particularly where drinking is suspected. "Studies made each year show that speed and/or drinking are involved in almost all of the Department of Public Safety during the holiday season", the Major said.

No one in his right mind would intentionally be involved in a traffic accident, however, the Major pointed out that lack of attention and lack of keeping the proper lookout is the undercant fact that during the last holiday season, 62% of the fatal accidents on rural highways in= volved only one vehicle, indicating that over one half of the accidents could not be blamed on "the other guy".

"The surest way to avoid

traffic accidents in addition to keeping the proper lookout is to leave yourself an out regardless of what mistakes the other driver may do and voluntary comply with all traffic rules at all times, Major Hutchison concluded.

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

Ag Weather

George Mahon reports that | the effect of weather upon plants he has been successful in securing an appropriation for the establishment of an agricultural weather service an research station in Lubbock, which is to serve the counties of the South Plains area. Final action was taken by the House and Senate last week.

Dr. Terrell Noffsinger, an a-gricultural meteorologist specialist from Washington will be in the South Plains area in January for the purpose of coordinating plans for the new program. An agricultural research me-teorologist will arrive in March and take up his duties at the State Experiment Station. Weather forecasters will be added to the staff in May. The station will not get into full o-

peration until mid-summer.

A total of twelve additional employees will be required for the project. The work will be coordinated between the existing weather station and the State Experiment Station north of Lubbock. The cost of initial elecyronic equipment for the program will be \$30,000. Annual operating cost will be \$143.

The added service will snable farmers of West Texas to get detailed farm weather forecasts and timely information in regard to weather conditions. In addition to being helpful during the planting, cultivation, and harvesting seasons, the program will be of special importance in connection with insect control and defoliation prggrams. Special attention will be given in the research field to






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
