Rumors High As Political Deadline Draws Near

Political activity and interest in the various contests are both increasing a great deal as the deadline for filing, February 3, draws nearer. Rumors of more candidates even one or two of the writers in variety, are making the rounds.

At least one candidate has announced for each of the county offices that will be up for grabs this year, and in two instances, in county races, there are opposing candidates. The only two offices for which there is as yet any competition are the offices of the County Attorney and County

Sheriff. A Plains attorney and former Yoakum County Judge, Don Hancock, announced his intention of seeking the office of County Attorney just a few days after Denver City attorney, Claude Freeman.

In the other race which is at present being sought by more than one candidate, that of County Sheriff, incumbent Vester Sanders first announced his intention of seeking re-election and about two weeks later Denver City Police Chief Woody Sullivan announced his intention of seeking that office.

In three other county races,

County Tax Assessor Collector, and Commissioners of Prcts. No. 1 and No. 3, the incumbents in both of those offices are seeking re-election, and at the present time are doing so without competition. Raymond Bookout is presently the Commissioner of Prct. 3, as is Vance Brown of Prct. 1.

Much talk has been going around about the possibility of a Plains man announcing his candidacy for the office of State Representative from this district in opposition to W. A. Bynum of Brownfield who is presently seeking the office being vacated due to the resignation of Rep. Olen Petty of

Levelland.

Other rumors are prevalent in regard to several other of the offices.

Some say that both of the incumbent precinct commissioners will have opponents. Others say a third candidate will be seeking the office of County Attorney and others report the same possibility in the Sheriff's race.

In any event, the rumors will soon be separated from the facts as the filing deadline is getting real close, and the minds of candidates and prospective candidates are going to have to be made up soon.

DOCTOR TELLS OF INTEREST IN PLAINS

As most Plains and area citizens are undoubtedly aware, due to Dr. Clyde Lynn re-entering military service, and subsequently turning back the local Yoakum County Clinic to the county, the Plains Chamber of Commerce and the County Commissioners have been actively seeking applicants to lease the clinic and to provide medical service for Plains and area residents.

In response to these attempts, Dr. John Gillette of Lovington contacted the local Chamber and asked for an interview in regards to the possibility of his leasing the local clinic and moving here to practice medicine.

He came to Plains on last Saturday and met with a small delegation from the Chamber, and was to have met with the

regard, but was unable to do so because of a patient in Lovington, Dr. Gillette said, however, that he would be most willing to come and meet with this or any other group at almost any time.

At today's Chamber meeting, a committee was appointed, to be headed by Mr. Bill Loyd, to go to Lovington next week and invite Dr. Gillette to come to Plains and practice medicine. Also, it was announced that the committee would have the dual responsibility of meeting with the commissioners' court on Monday week for the purpose, if need be, of drawing up the lease agreement between the County and Dr. Gillette, in the event he accepts the invitation to come to Plains.

Denver City Youth Shooting Facts Told

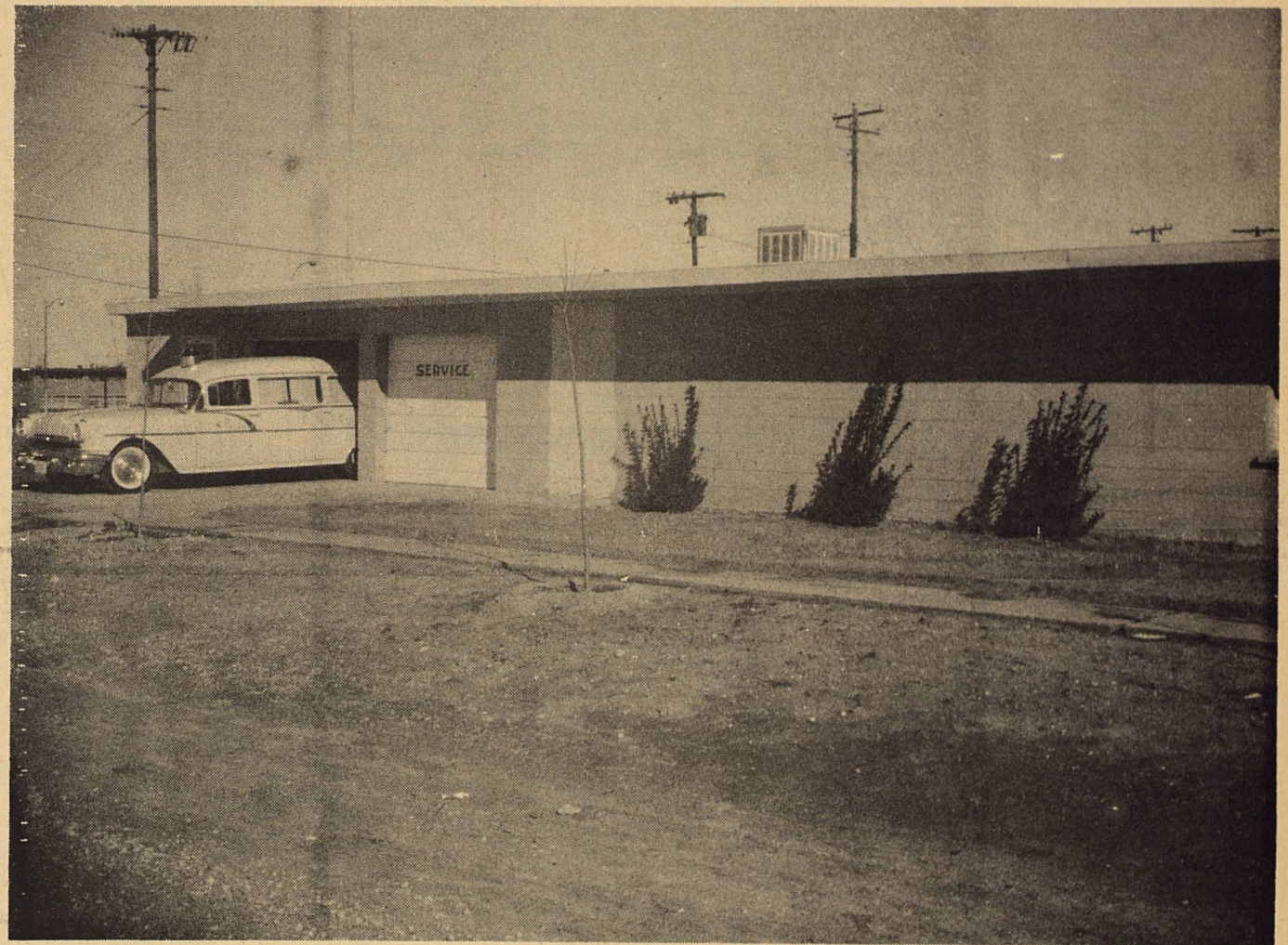
The Denver City Police Department announced today (Thursday) that they have dropped the investigation of the shooting of an 18-year-old Denver City college student after the youth made a statement to County Attorney Vernon Townes.

There were no charges filed and no arrests made in the case.

Jimmy Mobley, a John Tarleton State College freshman, was wounded early last Saturday morning. He collapsed at the emergency entrance of Yoakum County Hospital. He

had been wounded in the chest by two .22 calibre bullets.

Joining in the investigation with County and City officers was Texas Ranger Razz Renfro before the probe was dropped Sunday following the County Attorney's interview with the victim.

Want More Cotton?

Yoakum County cotton farmers will soon be receiving additional cotton acreage. This will come about through the U. S. D. A.'s "Release Cotton" program.

Yoakum County's chapter of Young Farmers is interested in a program that will bring more acreage to their county. This month the Young Farmers

have turned their attentions and monthly program to the County ASC committee.

Monday, the 13th, the meeting will be held in the ag class room of the school. Mr. Bill Overton, local ASC department supervisor will lead a panel discussion with the county committee, which is composed of Ray Bearden, T. A. Elmore and T. J. Murphy.

Formal opening of the local Barrett's Funeral Home is slated for this Sunday, January 12, from 1 to 5 p. m.

The newly-opened establishment is located just one block south of main street, and local and area citizens are invited to come by during the above hours and inspect the modern, up to date facilities which are a part of the many sided operation of a modern funeral home.

New Vehicle Liability Law

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today reminded motorists that more stringent provisions of the state's safety responsibility law--requiring drivers and

owners to be able to pay for damage to others in traffic accidents--became effective January 1, 1964.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, emphasized that

the law required the Department to suspend the driver licenses and vehicle registrations of drivers and owners who are not in compliance with the

NEW GROWER COTTON ALLOTMENT FILING TIME

Farmers that do not have a 1964 cotton acreage allotment may file an application for a 1964 New Grower Allotment at the local ASCS Office, January 24, 1964 is the final closing date for filing. The application forms may be obtained at the ASCS Office. All applications filed will be transmitted

to the State Office after the January 24 closing date. No allotments were held on State or county office levels for new growers; however, since new cotton legislation is pending in Congress that might effect allotments and just in case any acreage becomes available from any source it might be well for any farmer that could file an eligible application to do so before that final date.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ

Well, it's that time again. If you made over \$600, or if you are over 65 years old and made over \$1200, you must file a tax return. If you are a self-employed farmer or businessman you must file if you made more than \$400.

The sooner you file the better, but it had better be before April 15.

If you are a farmer you will make a mistake if you don't get a free copy of the "Farmer's Tax Guide." This booklet is available at the Internal Revenue Service offices and at your County Agent's office.

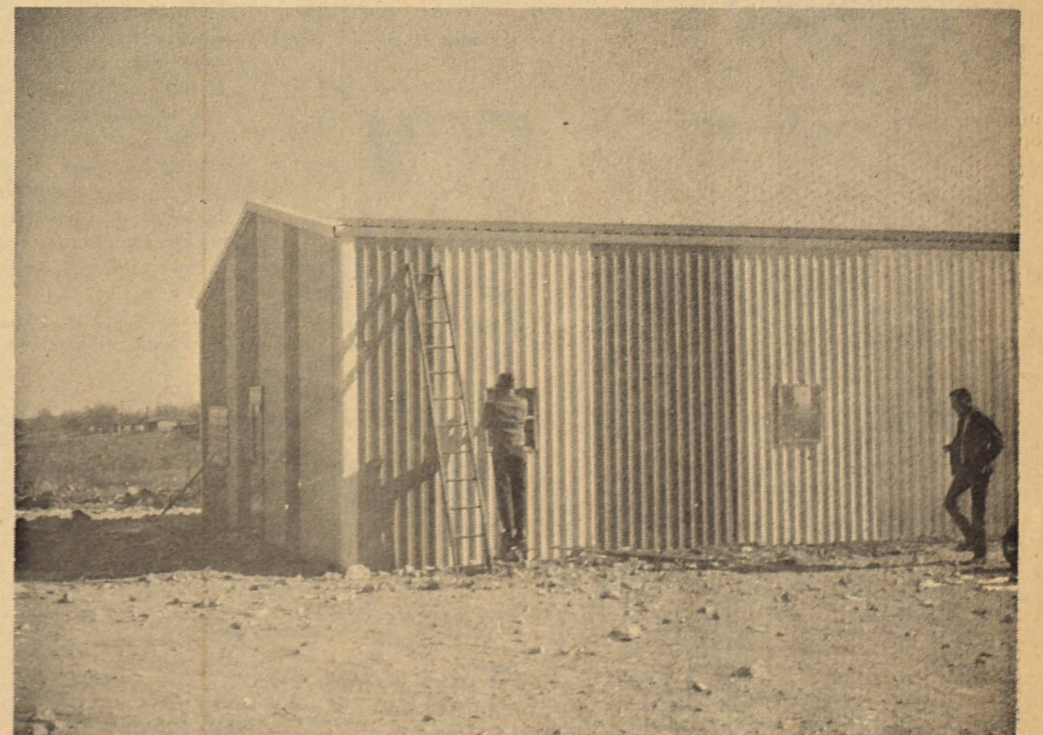
It's also prepared in plain old down-to-earth language that a farmer can understand. A little time ploughing through this booklet will help you reap some tax savings.

Classing Report

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports 127,400 samples classed for the week ending January 3, at the AMS classing office in Lubbock. This brings the season's total for the Lubbock office to 1,394,800 samples and 45,000 samples were on hand to be classed. The classing office at Lamesa reported 190,000 samples classed through Jan-

uary 3, and 7,000 samples on hand to be classed. The Brownfield office reported 192,000 samples classed and 12,000 on hand.

The total samples classed on the South Plains for the season is now 1,776,800. Last year at this time, 1,898,000 samples had been classed and the three offices had 76,000 samples on hand.

law at the time of accident involvement, if the accident comes under the Safety Responsibility Act.

"The law provides that drivers and owners of vehicles involved in traffic accidents occurring or originating on a public street, highway or thoroughfare resulting in \$100 or more property damage, injury or death must file written reports with the Department of Public Safety within 10 days and its requirements must be met," he explained. "Accidents not involving death or injury but with \$25 or more damage involved still must be reported to the Department but will not come under the Safety Responsibility Law.

"The Department is required to suspend driver licenses and all motor vehicle registration plates of both the operator and owner of vehicles involved in an accident coming under the Safety Responsibility Law, unless:

"1. Evidence of liability insurance coverage in the minimum amounts of \$10,000 where one person was injured or killed, \$20,000 where more than one, and \$5,000 for property damage is reported to the Department.

"2. A release signed by damaged or injured persons is filed with the Department.

"3. A signed agreement to pay damages in installments is accepted by the damaged or injured persons, and filed with the Department.

"4. The operator and owner are found not to be liable in a civil court of competent jurisdiction, and a copy of such finding is filed with the Department.

"5. The operator and owner deposit with the Department cash or bond security in an amount sufficient to cover any judgment for damages resulting from the accident that might be obtained by damaged persons, which in no case shall be less than \$200.

In addition, the operator and owner must file proof of financial responsibility for the future and must maintain it for a period of two years, unless the requirements of the Safety Responsibility Act are met.

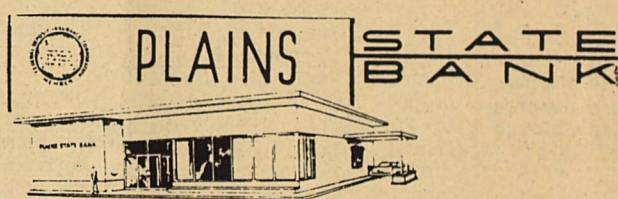

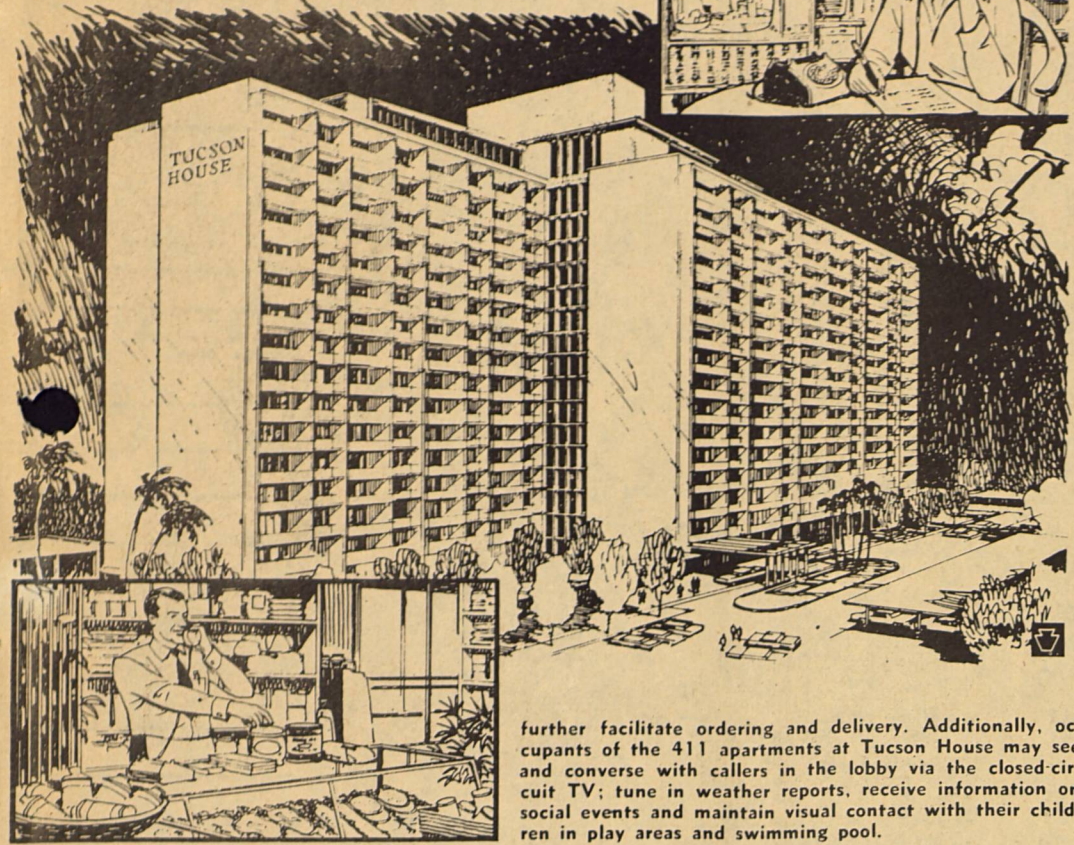

Leadership meeting is set locally for January 14 beginning at 2 p. m. in the club room.

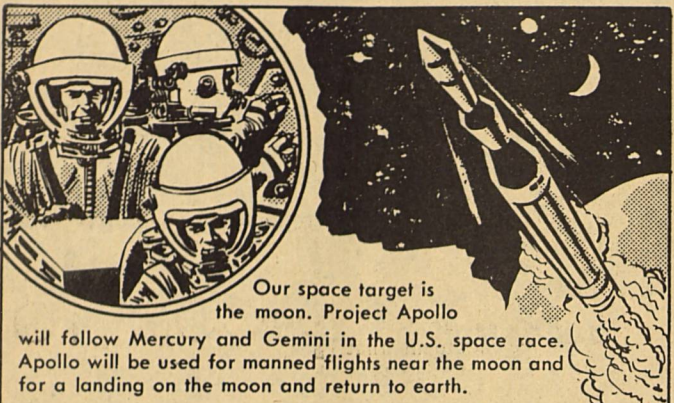

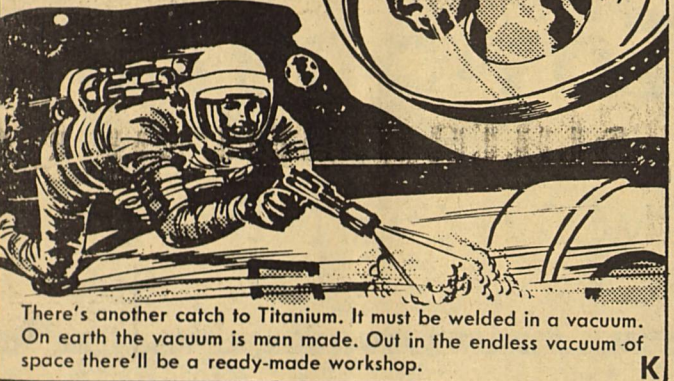
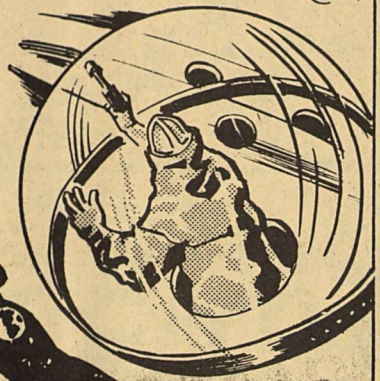
SPACE SCIENCE

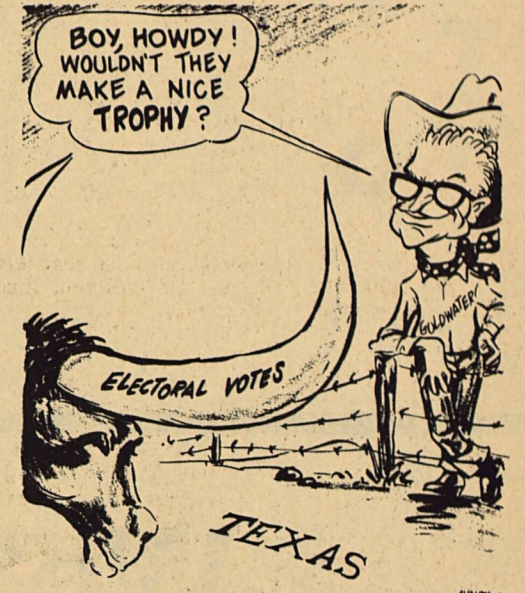

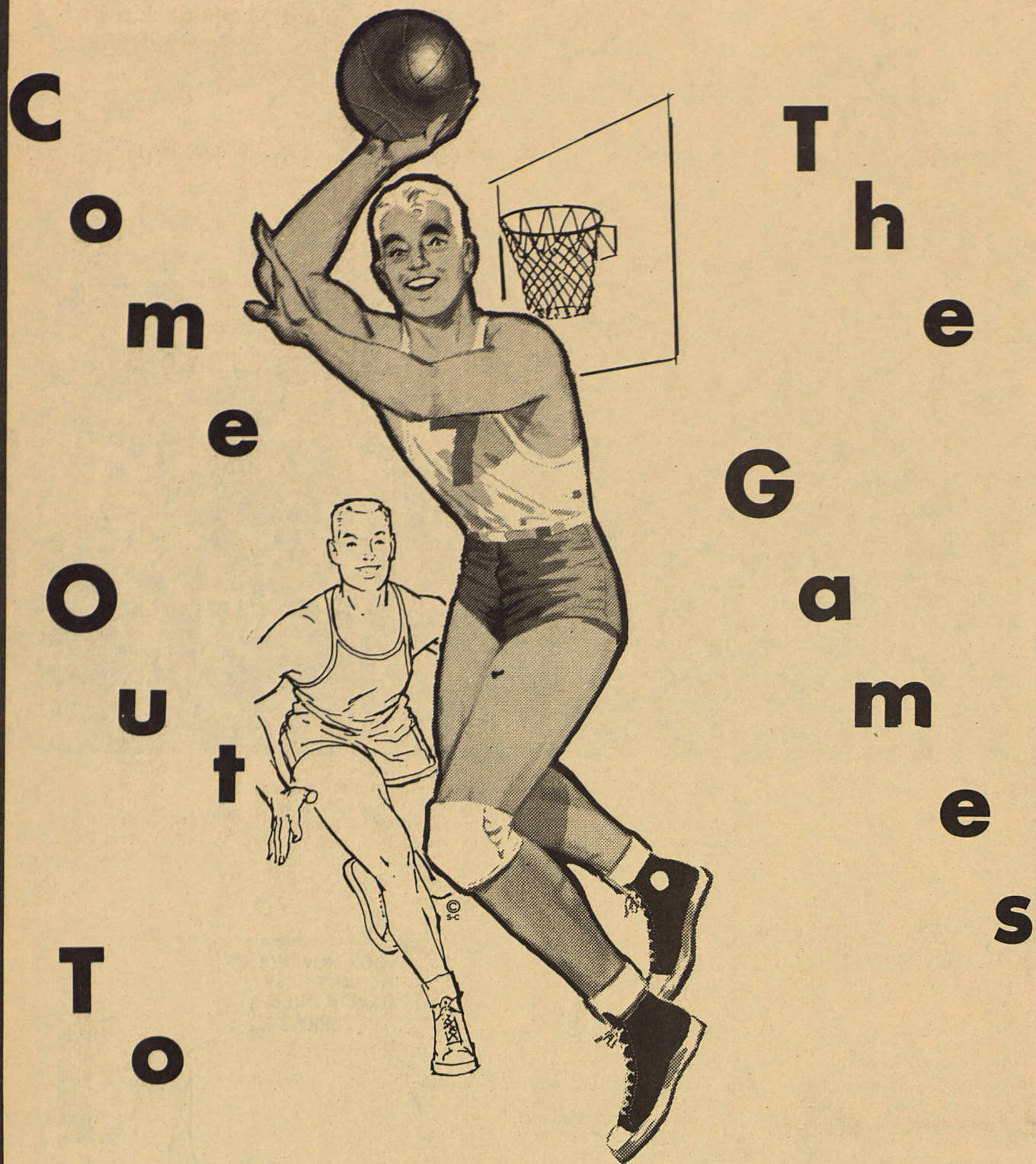

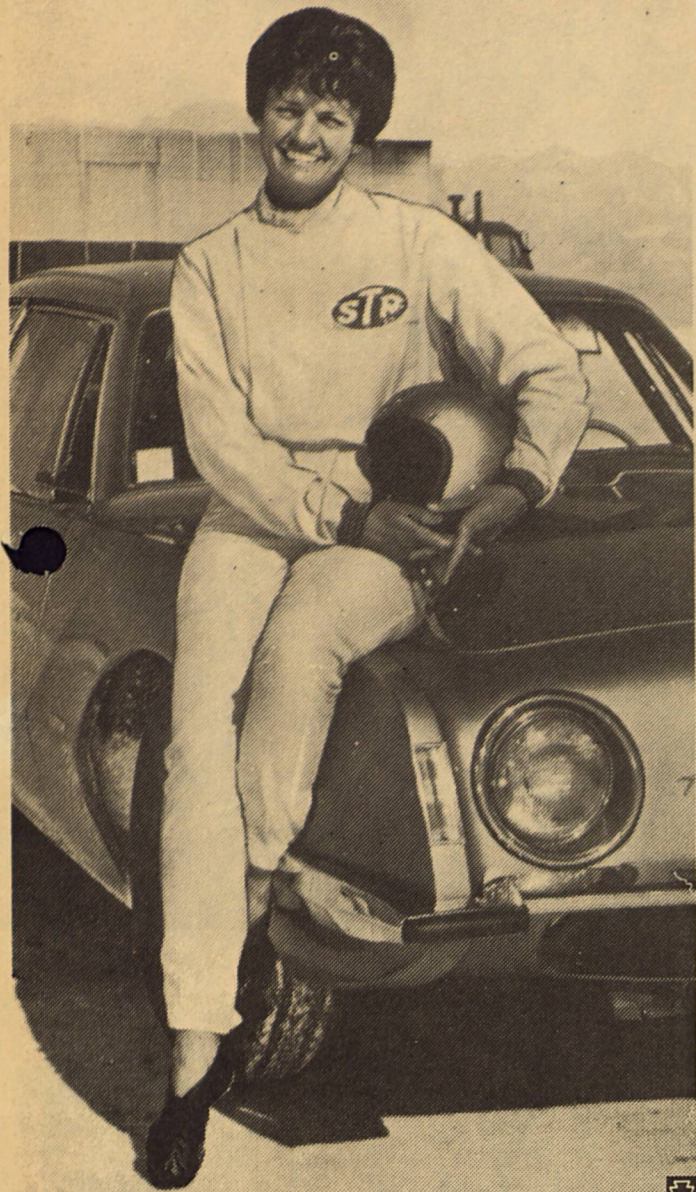

Also, he said that when a person's driver license is suspended or revoked under any Texas law because of a conviction on a serious traffic charge, the Department is required to suspend such person's motor vehicle registration, unless he immediately files proof of Financial Responsibility for the future.

In addition to other statutory filing fees required, a \$10 reinstatement charge has been provided for restoration of unsuspended license and/or vehicle registration in those cases where proof of financial responsibility for the future must be filed.

Garrison listed these exceptions where the law does not apply:

1. The law does not apply to the owner of a vehicle if it is involved in an accident while being driven by another person without the owner's consent.
2. If the operator or owner involved in an accident is the only person damaged or injured.
3. If the vehicle was legally parked or stopped at a traffic signal at the time of the accident.
4. If the vehicle involved was being driven by an employee of the United States Government in connection with official duties.

Name Carr To Head Cancer Crusade

The Attorney General of Texas has accepted appointment by the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society to head its 1964 Cancer Crusade.

Appointed during the division's recent annual meeting in Houston, the Honorable Waggoner Carr will lead 80,000 volunteers from all over the State in a Crusade which will last year totaled \$1,575,203.11 in contributions.

Mr. Carr was also elected to the State's Board of Directors and Executive Committee during the meeting.

The month-long educational fund-raising Crusade which gets under way April 1 marks the beginning of Cancer Control Month, so designated each year by the President of the United States.

"There is a growing need for everyone to do his share in striking back at cancer - a disease that will attack some 48 million Americans now living if current rates continue," Mr. Carr said. "For this reason I accept the Crusade Chairmanship and will do everything within my power to help conduct the most successful Crusade ever held in the state of Texas."

The Attorney General appeals for a record number of volunteers to join the Crusade so the fight against cancer can be accelerated.

Contributions to the annual Crusade will be used in the Society's continuing program of research, education and service, Mr. Carr explains.

In 1959 and 1960, Mr. Carr, then an attorney, worked with the Crusade Committee in Lubbock County where he was graduated from Lubbock High School and Texas Technological College.

He received his law degree from the University of Texas in 1947 and was admitted to the State Bar.

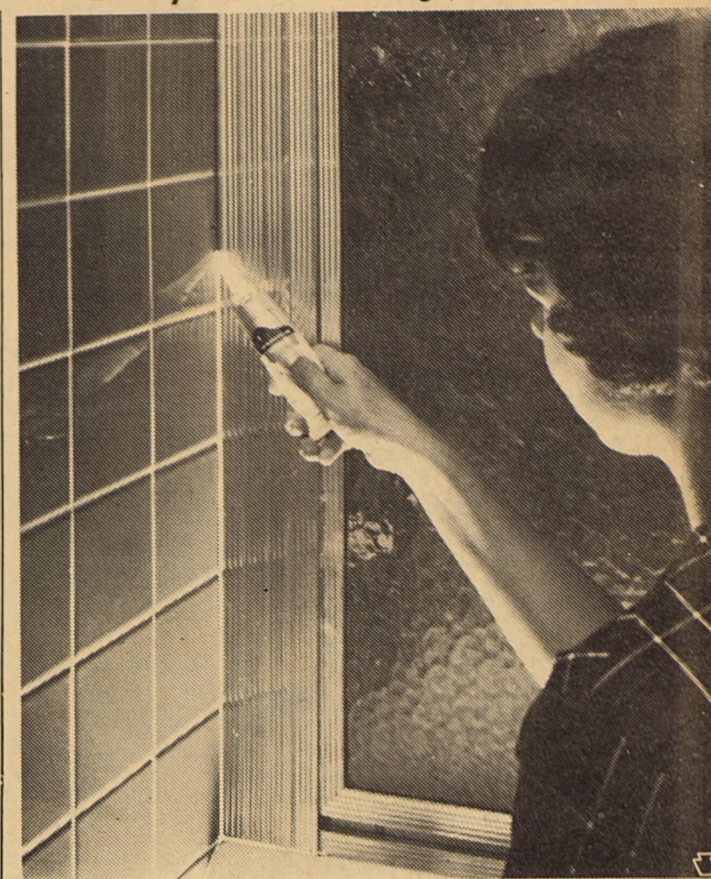
Mr. Carr, with a background in public service as a lawmaker and enforcer, has served five terms in the State House of Representatives and as Speaker of the House in the 65th and 56th Legislatures. He is one of only three men in the state's history to be elected to the



the Speakership for two consecutive terms.

Before election to the Attorney General's office, Mr. Carr practiced law in Lubbock where he was also active in church and various other community projects.

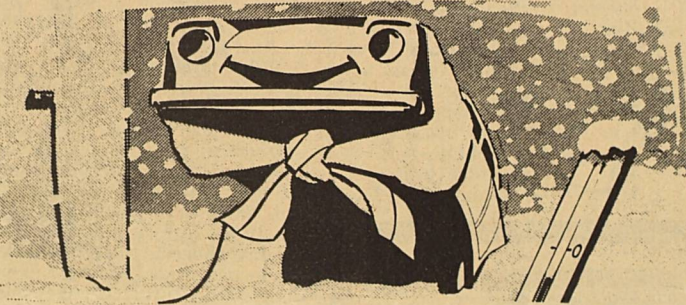

Auto Advice For Cold Weather Starts



To solve the usual wintertime problem of starting an automobile in sub-zero weather, motorists have tried everything from putting electric blankets around the car's engine to running outside three or four times during the night to try and start the motor. These methods offer a possible solution if (1) you have an extremely long extension cord or (2) you don't need much sleep before putting in a full day's work.

Each winter, it's the usual early morning scene: time, 8:45 a.m.; temperature, minus-12 degrees. Automobile batteries up and down the street giving last, pitiful gasps and groans. Automobile owners running back and forth between neighbors (also in the same predicament) sharing their "home remedies" for starting up a "frozen engine."

The term "frozen engine" actually is very misleading. Engines never freeze. The problem essentially lies in two areas: the oil and battery, with the oil being the greater villain.

In sub-zero weather, oil becomes extremely thick. This, in turn, places an enormous heavy load on the battery which has to activate "stiff" engine parts until the normal combustion cycle is established.

To compound this, the battery has already been weakened by winter's increased temperature strains. Cold weather, itself, reduces a battery's efficiency. At zero degrees, for example, a battery is only about 45 per cent as effective as at 80 degrees. Then, too, heaters, defrosters, radios, lights and cigarette lighter use also contribute to decreased battery efficiency.

It's no wonder then, that a weakened battery can't start a car with oil that's become as thick as molasses in January due to the cold.

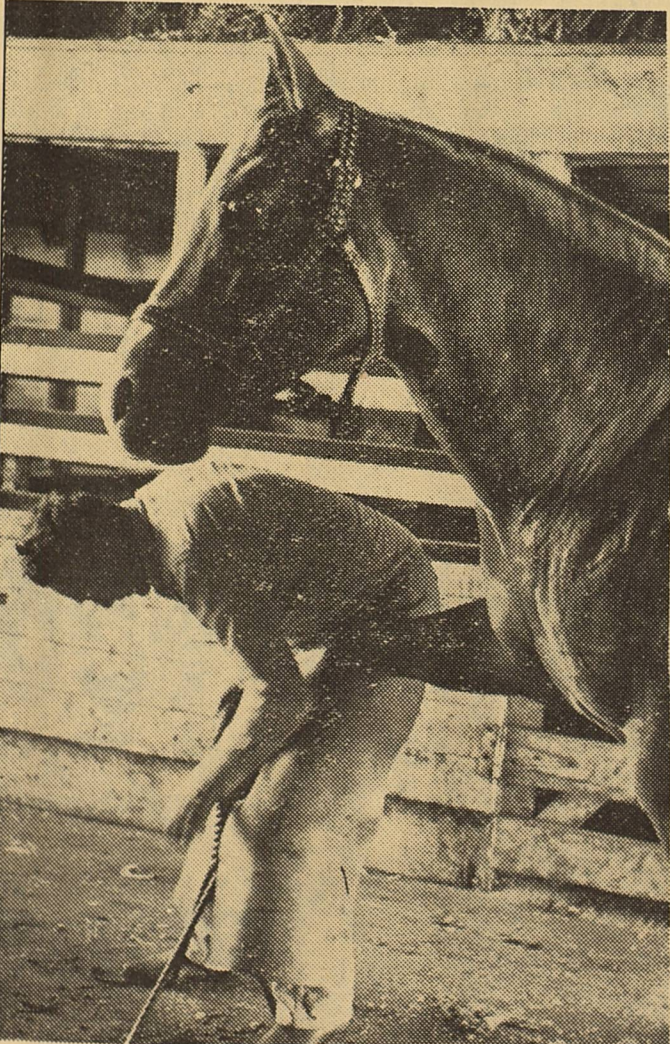
Obviously, to assure a quick start in winter weather, the oil in the engine must flow freely.

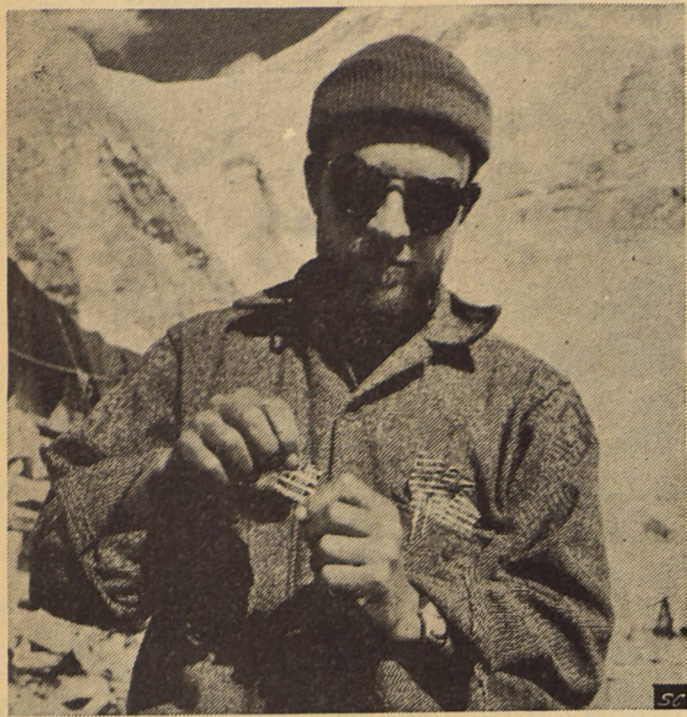

The tablets come in standard toothpaste cartons and each tablet is individually wrapped in foil. A few tablets could easily

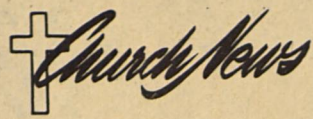
be carried in a coat pocket, purse or school lunch box.

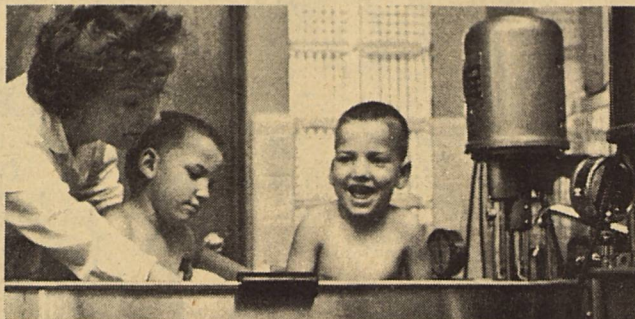

All About Dogs

To The Hounds

"There were five great white dogs silhouetted against the setting sun watching me intently. I was worried... until their owner rode into sight. He was using the Russian wolfhounds to chase coyotes that had been attacking his sheep."



When a friend told me this incident, it reminded me that

one of man's earliest uses of his canine friends was coursing, or chasing wild animals, says Tex Fawcett of the Purina Pet Care Center, in St. Louis, Missouri.

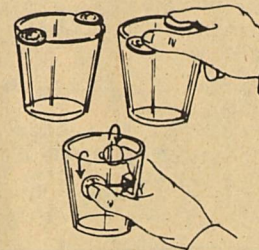
Coursing with greyhounds is probably the oldest competitive sport in which dogs are used. Ancient paintings and other archeological finds give abundant proof that men who had little need to catch their own food were extremely fond of the sport.

Today there are 21 breeds of hounds recognized by the American Kennel Club that owe their development to the chase. They range from the improbable little Dachshund with his short legs and long body to the distinguished Saluki of Egypt, once the companion of pharaohs.

The stately Bloodhound is said to have descended from the Hounds of St. Hubert, patron saint of hunters. Before the Christian era, ancient chroniclers noted the exceptional tracking ability of the hounds, referring to them as sleuth-hounds.

There are a lot of other hounds: Foxhounds, Coonhounds, Basset hounds, Elkhounds, Wolfhounds and Afghan hounds—examples all of the selective breeding of dogs to fulfill their ancient role as man's faithful hunting companion.

TRICK OF THE WEEK



SLIPPERY QUARTERS

This trick requires a little practice before you perform before a group. Place 2 quarters on the edge of a glass rim so they are balanced and stationary. (See drawing) Ask anyone to try to remove these coins from the glass using only the index finger and thumb of one hand. Of course the coins must not be allowed to fall while this is being done.

After several have tried and failed you'll probably be challenged to do the stunt. Here's the technique: Place your thumb over the coin on the left and your index finger over the one on the right. Smoothly tilt the quarters over so they tip in an outward direction put press them firmly so they do not fall. When they are pressed hard against the glass, the trick is to bring them back toward you by squeezing them and having them come toward you and drop into your hand. This is the part that requires the most skill. With practice it can be done.
